The Kinau brought July 20, 881 bags sugar, 109 sheep, 45 hogs, 2 horses, 62 csks molasses, 19 cs pine apples, 4 lbs wool, 50 bags ginger, 15 bags peanuts, 73 pkgs hides, 690 goat skins, 200 bags spuds, 18 bags corn, and 210 pkgs sundries.

POLICE COURT. SATURDAY, July 20th. Ah Ho, charged with violating chapter 40 laws of 1886, by being found on premises without lawful excuse, was sentenced to one month's imprisonment. Henry and Kalili had each to pay the usual amount for drunkenness.

SUPREME COURT—AT CHAMBERS. BEFORE BICKERTON, J. SATURDAY, July 20th. In equity. Valdemar Knudsen vs. Board of Education. Bill to have a royal patent declared void and for injunction. Return day. Demurrer of defendant argued and submitted. A. S. Hartwell for petitioner; Attorney-General Ashford for respondent.

In the matter of the estate of J. Hamakua. Petition of S. M. Damon, administrator, for approval of accounts and discharge. Partly heard and continued till next Friday. W. O. Smith for petitioner; A. Rosa opposing petition.

SUPREME COURT—JULY TERM. BEFORE M'CALLY, J. FRIDAY, July 19th. The King vs. C. Ah Fat. Perjury. Tried before a foreign jury who disagree. A. Rosa for defendant.

SATURDAY, July 20. The King vs. Ah Hee. Larceny of Government coal. Appeal from Police Court. Tried before a foreign jury who return a verdict of not guilty. Paul Neumann for defendant.

Almira M. Kahananui vs. B. H. Kahananui. Divorce. Plaintiff's motion for alimony and counsel fees. The Court said it doubted its authority to order that any moneys defendant had in court be paid for alimony and counsel fees, and therefore refused to order that the judgment in the case of Kahananui vs. Ashford be paid to plaintiff for alimony and counsel fees. The Court further said that upon the affidavits and in view of the circumstances which have transpired since the filing of the suit and which are well known to the Court, the motion to rescind all orders of the Court for alimony and counsel fees is granted and the motion for alimony and counsel fees is refused. V. V. Ashford for plaintiff; A. Rosa for defendant.

Kamakani (w) vs. Lono (k). Divorce. Granted. W. O. Smith for plaintiff. J. Kanoho (k) vs. Kealoha Kanoho (w). Divorce on the grounds of adultery and desertion. Divorce granted.

It is estimated that there are four thousand co-operative savings and loan associations in the United States, that their accumulations of property represent \$300,000,000, and that the amount which will be paid to them this year in the form of dues alone will exceed \$65,000,000.

LOCAL & GENERAL NEWS. A SOUND carriage horse is wanted. Lots of good things at the Elite to-day. No concert at Emma Square this afternoon. The Supreme Court will sit in banco on Monday. The band will play at the baseball match this afternoon. There were no female witnesses in the pool selling case. There will be no blue ribbon entertainment this evening. There was a large picnic at Coconut Island, Hilo, last Wednesday. The Kilanea Hou took a number of lepers to Molokai this morning. MONDAY is the eighteenth anniversary of the birth of the Emperor of China. There were nine applications on file up to this morning for 332 electric lights. CAPT. Clarke and officers of H. B. M. S. Espiegle were at the Volcano house, July 10th. Mr. Geo. C. Potter, the new secretary of the Board of Health, arrived from Maui this morning. ENGINE Co. No. 1 will have a drill at 4:30 o'clock this afternoon at the corner of Queen and Fort streets. The Jones-Judd-Carter party returned from their trip to the Volcano this morning, having had a fine time. The Rev. Dr. E. G. Beckwith, pastor of the Central Union Church, will enjoy a vacation of five or six weeks. The barkentine S. N. Castle sails for San Francisco on Tuesday. Messrs. Castle & Cooke are the agents. There has been rain at Kipahulu and Hanalei, Maui, but none in the other districts. This puts planting behind. COL. M. Thompson has surrendered his license to practise in the Courts of this Kingdom dated Nov. 27th, 1883. Mr. A. L. Smith is getting better and able to be around at business. Gus hopes to take a trip to the Volcano ere long. THE biennial meeting of the Queen's Hospital will be held on Monday next the 22d, at 11 o'clock a. m., at the Chamber of Commerce. The Kinau sails on Tuesday the 23d, at 2 p. m., for Maui and Hawaii. She returns on Sunday the 28th, on account of going on the Marine Railway. The services in the Central Union Church to-morrow will be conducted by the Rev. W. D. Westervelt. In the evening there will be a sermon for young people. THE Kinau arrived early this morning from windward with 37 cabin and 69 deck passengers and nearly nine thousand bags of sugar. Purser Beckley reports fine weather.

In another column will be found an advertisement giving the time table for the running of the tram cars on Sunday, on the Beretania, Nuuanu and King street lines. Those persons who attend church will see that cars are specially provided for them. THE weather is so dry in Kau, Hawaii, that the cane crops are suffering. The loss of sugar on the Palaha plantation alone, from the drought will probably be in the neighborhood of 500 tons, and that means some money now-a-days. So says the Hilo Record.

THE net proceeds of the sale of work held by the St. Andrew's Cathedral Sewing Society on the 16th inst., amount to \$240.75. In addition to this the Society has made by its work in the last two years and a half over \$200 which is on deposit in the Postal Savings Bank. The whole amount will be paid to the Trustees for the reduction of the Cathedral loan.

The complimentary concert at the Hawaiian Hotel last evening, to the Captain and officers of the U. S. S. Adams was a very successful affair. The programme of music was finely played by the band. The front of the building was illuminated with colored lanterns, and Manager Lewis was assiduous in his attention to those who attended. After the concert there was a dance in the parlors.

OPIMUM SEIZURE ON MAUI. Mr. W. J. Sheldon, Port Surveyor at Kahului, made two seizures of opium at that place on Wednesday. One was a case marked C. Camara, which contained 20 tins of opium. No one has claimed it. The other was a case of beer directed to J. F. Noble, Pais, in which was found 50 tins. Mr. Noble claimed he knew nothing about the opium.

VOLCANO NOTES. A letter from the Volcano House to the Wilder's Steamship Company dated July 14th, states that the crater is quite active. The temperature for the week was highest 76, lowest 58. It rained once during the week. Between July 10th and 14th forty-one visitors registered at the Volcano house.

MAUI NOTES. Fifty tins of opium were seized at Pais on Thursday this week, owner unknown. A Portuguese child was badly burnt a couple of days ago. Her clothing took fire by accident, and instead of quenching the flames, the clothing was torn off her, with the result as above stated. There is hope of recovery. The burglars in Makawao district have not been seen or heard of lately. They have left shoes, a knife, and a bat with a Chinese name in it. The wonderful institution called Police does not consider these things clever enough to ferret out the robbers. The roads are put in fine shape all over, but, owing to the long spell of dry weather, very dusty. Rain is very much needed, and the plantations have not been able to start planting yet. Here in Kahului everything is quiet, the only excitement is when the Likelike is in port. Mr. Thomas arrived back from a trip up in country, and reports that he has done good business for the Mutual Life Insurance Co. of New York. Kahului, July 19th.

THE LETTER WAS LONG IN COMING. Just like a man! November 26, 1864, Mrs. Hodges of St. Louis mailed a letter to her husband, who was with Sherman's army. On reaching his regiment the letter was given to Captain Bixby to be delivered to Mr. Hodges. The Captain naturally put it in his pocket. Two weeks ago he found it in the same pocket of the same coat, yellow and dingy with twenty-five years' incarceration, but otherwise all right. He immediately mailed it, and Mr. Hodges received it in St. Louis, the city from which it originally started. The news was a little old, but the family enjoyed reading it.—Washington Post.

The most appalling inundation ever known in Europe or America was the general one in Holland in 1530, when the dikes gave way, and, according to the estimates, about four hundred thousand people were drowned. Europe has 129,129 miles of railroad. Austria-Hungary leads with 45,343 miles, and Germany is second with 24,573. France is third with 21,250 miles. Great Britain fourth with 19,674, and Russia stands fifth with 17,710 miles. The Brooklyn Bridge was opened six years ago. During the six years 21,369,935 persons have walked across the structure, and 125,138,594 passengers have gone over on the cars. The total receipts have been \$4,287,497.90. The oldest wine in America is some Madeira of the famous "All Saints'" vintage, brought into Savannah, Ga., in 1791, '92 and '93, when that town was the centre of wine importing for America. One hundred dollars a bottle has been offered to and refused by the present owners.


