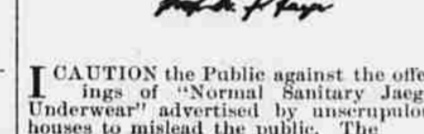

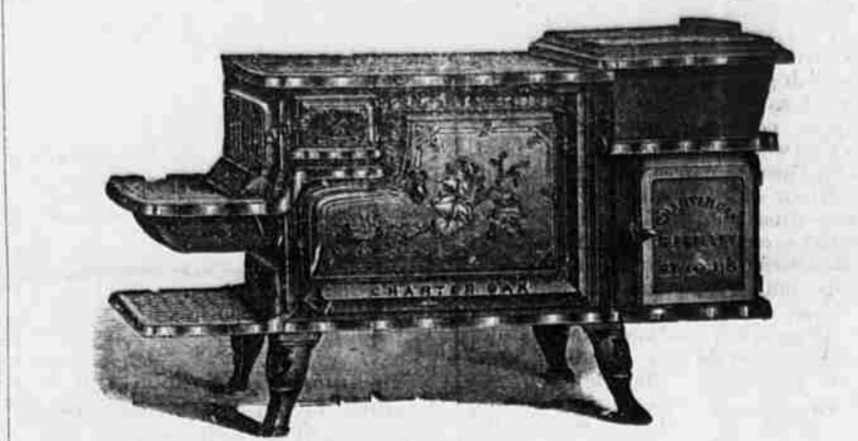

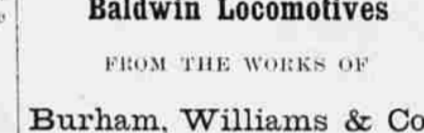

BISHOP OF PANOPOLIS.

Consecration of the Roman Catholic
Bishop of Hawaii in San Fran-
cisco.

St. Mary's Cathedral on Van Ness
avenue was crowded to the doors
yesterday morning, the occasion be-
ing the consecration of Rev. Father
Guilstan P. Roberts as Bishop of the
Hawaiian Islands.

Among the immense congregation
were several natives of Hawaii, who
had come here to be present at the
ceremony.

It was a spectacle of great pomp
and magnificence.

The beautiful interior of the sacred
edifice, the brilliant lights and colors
around the altar, and the clergy
with their scarlet and white vest-
ments and the insignia of their higher
offices, formed a picture of rare grand-
eur and impressiveness.

There were about forty clergy
within the altar rails, including,
besides the celebrants, Bishop Nichols
of the Greco-Russian Church and
several visiting priests.

The consecration ceremony was
commenced by the celebration of
pontifical high mass, in which Bishop
Scanlan of Salt Lake City and Bishop
Mora of Los Angeles assisted.

Most Rev. Archbishop Riordan
was the celebrant, Very Rev. Father
Prendergast assistant priest, Rev.
Father York deacon of the mass,
Rev. Father Doran sub-deacon of the
mass, Rev. Fathers P. Gray and
Patrick Scanlan deacons of honor,
Rev. Fathers Montgomery, Kirby
and Imola masters of ceremonies,
Rev. Father Crowley chaplain to
Bishop Scanlan, Rev. William Dye
chaplain to Bishop Mora, Rev. Fath-
ers Valentine and Remondier attend-
ants on the new Bishop.

Consecrator, Francis Leonard;
acolyte-bearer, Council J. Goodell;
chanters, Richard A. Donne, William
A. Hughes, Aloysius Mallon and
John Kelly; book-bearers, Robert
G. Drady and Cornelius E. Ken-
nedy; candle-bearer, John H. Wil-
son; apron-bearer, Edward M. Dea-
sy; cross-bearer, James J. O'Dea;
miter-bearer, Charles V. A. Drady;
cross-bearers, James J. King, Daniel
A. Ryan and Aloysius Dunnigan;
leaders, Stanislaus E. Ranken and
Thomas M. Deasy.

The sermon was preached by Rev.
Father Sasia of the Society of Jesus.
He took for his text: "Faith cometh
by hearing and hearing by the word
of God; but how shall they hear unless
they have a preacher, and how shall
he preach unless he be sent?"

He drew a beautiful comparison
between civil and religious society.
God was the author of both. But
in civil society he leaves men to
choose their form of government,
but in religious society he chooses
his own way.

The sermon was a learned disquisi-
tion on the establishment of the
divine institution of the church, the
central thought being that a man to
preach the word of God must be
sent by God to so preach it.

The consecration ceremony was
most solemn and impressive. Arch-
bishop Riordan took his seat on a
gold stool which had been placed on
a small platform in front of the
altar.

The distinguished prelate read the
office of consecration, the priests
forming themselves into a pictur-
esque group around the celebrant
and Bishop-elect.

During the reading of the office
the Bishop-elect prostrated himself
out at full length on the carpet, face
down, until the Archbishop told him
to rise and approach the altar.

He was then anointed and made
his profession of faith.

Before the conclusion of the mass
the new Bishop bestowed his bless-
ing upon the worshippers.

The music under the direction of
the organist, Professor Eisner, was
in keeping with the solemnity and
grandeur of the occasion and was
finely rendered by the well-trained
choir.

It began with the Hawaiian na-
tional hymn, organ and solo. The
"Kyrie." Mozart's Twelfth, followed.
After the consecration of the Bishop,
the "Gloria" and balance of Mozart's
Twelfth were sung. The offertory
was Diabelli's "Gaudemus," in which
Miss Clara McGowan and S. J. Sandy
sustained the leading parts. The
grand "Et Incarnatus Est" was sung
by Charles Gottung, tenor.

The ceremony commenced at 10:30
o'clock and did not conclude till
nearly 2 o'clock.

The new Bishop, who has been a
missionary in the Hawaiian Islands
for twenty-five years, will bear the
title of Bishop of Panopolis in parti-
bus. He is the fourth Bishop who
has been appointed to the episcopate
of these islands, his immediate pre-
decessor being Bishop Hermann,
who died last February.

He will return to Honolulu on
Wednesday morning by the steamer
Australia, accompanied by Father
Valentine, who came with him to
witness the consecration ceremonies.

Hawaiian Letter Signals for Use at Sea.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT, HONOLULU, September 27th, 1892. The Collector-General of Customs for the Hawaiian Kingdom is hereby authorized and empowered to assign, issue and publish a code of letter signals for the use of vessels registered under the Hawaiian Flag.

By virtue of the authority above conferred, I have assigned to the Hawaiian Merchant Vessels below mentioned and described, the signal letters following their official number.

Table with columns: OFFICIAL SIGNAL, NUMBER, LETTERS, NAME OF VESSEL, TONNAGE, LENGTH, BREADTH, DEPTH, WHISKER, and OWNERS. Lists various vessels like 'H B C F Steamship', 'H B C J Bark', etc.

HEALTH NOTICE.

The Board of Health has directed its Agents to make a special inspection of houses and premises in the City of Honolulu with a view of putting the same in a good sanitary condition.

PROCLAMATION.

By virtue of authority given by an Act of the Legislative Assembly entitled, An Act to Prevent the Infection of Cholera in the Hawaiian Islands, approved on the 27th day of September, 1892, and upon the recommendation of the Board of Health, I do hereby declare all Ports of Entry in this Kingdom, excepting Honolulu, closed to shipping other than coasting until further notice.

Postal Savings Bank Notice.

By authority of Section 11 of 'An Act to Amend and Consolidate the Laws relating to the Hawaiian Postal Savings Bank,' approved on the 7th day of September, 1892, and on that day taking effect, notice is hereby given that the rate of interest on Savings Bank deposits is fixed as follows: On amounts under and up to Five Hundred Dollars (\$500), in Gold Coin of the United States of America, in any one account, already on deposit in the Hawaiian Postal Savings Bank on September 30, 1892, interest will be payable from October 1, 1892, forward until further notice, at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum, in Gold Coin of the United States of America.

Postal Savings Bank Notice.

By Section 17 of 'An Act to Amend and Consolidate the Laws relating to the Hawaiian Postal Savings Bank,' approved on the 7th day of September, 1892, and on that day taking effect, the Minister of Finance is authorized to issue Coupon Bonds of the Hawaiian Government, to be styled the 'Postal Savings Bank Loan,' to be issued only to depositors in the Hawaiian Postal Savings Bank who may apply for the same.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

During the process of Deepening the Channel at the entrance to Honolulu harbor the Dredger will be in operation night and day.

At night there will be a Danger Signal placed on the forward derrick of Dredger, about 30 feet above sea level, which can be seen by all vessels approaching the harbor.

IRRIGATION NOTICE.

Holders of Water Privileges, or those paying Water Rates, are hereby notified that, owing to the drought and the scarcity of water in the Government Reservoirs, the hours for using water for Irrigation purposes are from 7 to 8 o'clock A. M., and 5 to 6 o'clock P. M., until further notice.

NOTICE.

Owing to the drought and scarcity of water, the residents of Maunaloa and other places are requested to collect what water they may require for household purposes before 8 o'clock A. M.

Among those who have kindly consented to take part in the concert Saturday evening is Mr. H. S. Williams. All who have heard him before will be glad to hear him again.

Lieutenant A. J. Mountney Jephson, a member of the last Stanley expedition, and Miss Anna Head of San Francisco are engaged. Miss Head is a popular California girl and is well known in England and on the Continent.

The passengers on the S. S. Australia are wishing the hours would fly a little faster so as to allow them to see their friends ashore. "So near and yet so far." A large number of people have been out in boats and conversed with their friends at a distance.

Mr. W. F. Reynolds, of the Golden Rule Bazaar, will leave on the S. S. Australia for the States to select Christmas and holiday goods. Mr. Reynolds will be happy to execute any commission with regard to selecting books, if any orders are left with him before departure.

Lieutenant-Commander J. C. Rich is in command of the U. S. S. Alliance, now due here from San Francisco. Captain William Barclay is on his way from Washington, D. C. and will join the Alliance here to relieve Lieutenant-Commander Rich. It is expected the Alliance will remain here six months.

John S. Johnson lowered the bicycle records for a quarter and a half mile on September 17, in Independence, Iowa, on a kite-shaped track. He covered the quarter mile in 26.35 seconds and the half-mile in 55.5 seconds, slowing up at the finish in the quarter mile in order to allow Ned Gordon, a famous old runner, who kept him pace, to get out of the way.

Mrs. F. Nichols, Mrs. Burnheimer and Miss Ida Pleumer were received by Her Majesty the Queen on Tuesday at the Palace. The ladies represented a delegation from the Daughters of Rebekah and accorded an invitation to Her Majesty to attend their social this evening in Harmony Hall. The Queen will probably honor the event with her presence.

All the talk since the election is centered in the boat race on Saturday. The crews are out daily for a spin in the harbor. The stroke of the Myrtle crew is much admired, their pulling being like clockwork. The Heatons are not to be passed over, however, as their crew is a strong one, and every outing seems to show a perceptible improvement in their stroke.

Steamship Excursion Coming.

Mr. J. J. Williams has received a colored placard announcing an excursion from San Diego to the Hawaiian Islands. It says "the splendid passenger steamship Mannel Dublin, Captain Dillingham master, will leave San Diego for Honolulu and Hawaiian groups on October 17, 1892."

At Lunailo Home.

A middle aged native was sent to the Lunailo Home some months ago because his relations could not afford to keep him. He was nearly blind and a paralytic, and the poor house was the only suitable place for him. The man behaved well until yesterday when it is believed his reason temporarily left him and he started in to smash everything in his room. The keeper came in with his food and was unceremoniously ushered out. He would not allow any one near, locking the door of his room. A telephone message was sent down to the Police Station and officers brought the man into town and lodged him in the Station. Inquiries were made for his relatives, and this morning three of them turned up, two women and a man. The man recognized his friends and allowed them to take him to his former home in town.

Dr. von Pettenkofer does not accept the comma bacillus as cholera's cause, thus taking issue with Dr. Koch. He says the same bacillus is found in all choleraic diseases and that at Calcutta observers have detected a dozen varieties of these bacilli. He predicts another epidemic next year.

THE LEGISLATURE.

102d DAY. THURSDAY, Oct. 6, 1892. Morning Session.

The Assembly convened at 10 o'clock. Prayer by the Chaplain. Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. Noble Baldwin from the Finance Committee presented the following report:

Your Committee on Finance to whom was referred petition No. 326 from some of the business houses of Honolulu, praying that the law imposing a tax of 25 cents a pack on playing cards be repealed, beg leave to report that we have had the above petition under consideration.

This law introduced this Session of the Legislature by the Minister of Finance originally proposed a tax of 10 cents a pack on playing cards. The amount was raised by the Legislature and the law passed imposing an Internal Revenue Tax of 25 cents a pack.

Playing cards are worth only from 10 to 15 cents a pack, a tax of 25 cents a pack is obviously an absurdly high tax. Your committee is therefore in favor of granting the prayer of the petitioners and here-with introduce a bill to repeal the above mentioned law.

The report was tabled for consideration with bill on the subject. Noble Baldwin from the same committee also presented the following report:

Your Committee on Finance to whom was referred a bill against the Hawaiian Government from the trustees under the will of Bernice Pauahi Bishop for \$120, taxes for 1889, 1890 and 1891, for land at Kakaako used for Marine Railway, report that they have ascertained the following facts relative to the matter:

We find that, on March 10, 1881, Ruth Keelikouli leased a portion of the Marine Railway property for a term of fifty years at a rental of \$500 per annum, the Government to pay all taxes and assessments. The Government built a Marine Railway and re-leased it to S. G. Wilder for 15 years.

Ruth Keelikouli willed the land to Mrs. Bernice Pauahi Bishop, and the Trustees of the estate of Mrs. Bishop acquired possession on the death of Mrs. Bishop Oct. 16, 1884. Up to December, 1887, no taxes were paid by the Trustees on the land, their claim to exemption to that time being allowed on the ground of it being school property, but in 1888 this land was assessed and the tax was paid under protest, and an action instituted by the Trustees for the return of the taxes paid resulted in the Board of Appeal deciding that the Trustees must return the land for taxation. Taxes have been paid for 1889, 1890 and 1891, and applications have been made for the Government to refund but without avail.

The last reason given for delay in payment was that there was no appropriation. Your committee are satisfied that this claim of \$120 for 3 years taxes on the site of the Marine Railway is a just and true claim and recommend that this amount be inserted in the Appropriation Bill to pay this claim and we would recommend that the Minister of Finance instruct the Assessor not to assess in future that portion of the land called Kakaokouli leased to the Government for the Marine Railway. Signed by H. P. Baldwin, L. A. Thurston, J. A. Akina, R. D. Walbridge, K. M. Kohouhu.

Report adopted. Noble Williams from the Printing Committee reported that Bill 183, 184, 186 and 188 and a report of the Sanitary Committee were printed. Noble W. Y. Horner offered a resolution that, as a measure of economy, the House hold extra sessions on Saturday afternoons and on Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings.

After some little discussion the resolution was tabled. Rep. Wilcox offered a resolution that the bill relative to the Constitutional amendments be taken from the committee to which they had been referred and be made the Order of the Day for Tuesday next.

On motion the Order of the Day was taken up and Bill No. 157a relating to the restriction of Chinese immigration was considered. Some argument was indulged in and pending action the Assembly at 12 o'clock adjourned on motion of Minister Neumann, took recess until 1:30 p. m.

Motion for Nonsuit Denied.

In the civil suit of Jos. Tinker against A. Rosa, executor of the estate of A. Rodriguez, for \$233, the value of two horses, reported the other day, counsel for the defense moved for nonsuit "because no privity of contract is shown, and because no liability of defendant as executor has been proven." Police Justice Foster rendered a decision on Monday denying the motion and making the following findings: An order sustaining demurrer is not a judgment, nor does it, in this Court at least, lay any foundation for a judgment on the merits. Secondly, the Court is of opinion that there is some evidence to support plaintiff's claim, and that the points raised by defendant are matters of defense, which he must prove.

Government Land Sales.

The following auction sales of lots and a lease were made at the front entrance of Aliolani Hale by Chief Clerk Hassinger at noon to-day: A lot on the south corner of Punch-bow street and Truitt's lane, Honolulu, containing 12,314 square feet, to Geoffrey Brown for \$1000. A piece of kula land at Lanilua 2d, Kailua, North Kona, Hawaii, containing 1 3/4 acres, upset price \$150, to Kanakani for \$210. The lease of the lot occupied by the Honolulu Iron Works, for ten years, to the Honolulu Iron Works for the upset price, \$500.

TO BOOM HAWAII.

The Bureau of Information Preparing to Invade the Colonies. A meeting of the Board of Directors of the Hawaiian Bureau of Information was held this morning in the office of the Secretary, Hon. L. A. Thurston.

There were present Hon. J. E. King, Hon. H. H. H. W. Castle, J. J. Williams and E. Ellsworth Carey were also present by invitation. The matter of placing the attractions of Hawaii before the people of the Australian Colonies was the subject under discussion. The following letter from J. J. Williams was read:

Gentlemen—Realizing that the tourist agents of the southern colonies will shortly commence booking tourists for the coming year, and knowing that unless speedy action is taken, Hawaii will receive no benefit therefrom, I would be willing to undertake a visit to said colonies, to represent the Bureau, and to remain as long as might be necessary, two, four or six months, and give my time unconditionally.

I should expect, of course, that all my actual and necessary expenses should be guaranteed, and that the Board supply me with all necessary material. I make the proposition for the benefit of every business interest in Honolulu.

But as the people of the southern provinces are considering their trade with Hawaii, and making plans in connection with the World's Fair, can we afford to delay? We must have an agent in the field, whose interests are our interests, and who will give the work the attention which its importance demands.

If we put this matter properly before our southern neighbors, this country should have an annual income from colonial travelers of not less than \$100,000. More travelers will pass our threshold, and now it would be folly not to make the most strenuous efforts to have their money and their company. Let the merchants and tradespeople of Honolulu stand together on this proposition and the results will be satisfactory.

Very respectfully, J. J. WILLIAMS. The necessity of taking some such action as indicated in Mr. Williams' letter was fully appreciated, and the Board will doubtless accept his proposition. It is desired to have ready a large supply of descriptive literature for distribution, and it was voted to prepare 5000 special pamphlets. Mr. Irwin also stated that an order for a large number of copies of a pamphlet issued by the Oceanic S. S. Co., would go to the coast by next mail and be ready for distribution as speedily as possible. The pamphlet is entitled "A Trip To Hawaii," by Charles Warren Stoddard, and contains a number of beautiful and attractive photographic reproductions of typical Hawaiian scenes.

Mr. Williams will doubtless be commissioned as a representative of the Bureau, and start in about six weeks. On Another's Premises. A Chinaman named Ah You was arrested the other day for breaking into the premises of Mrs. Brown, near the kerosene warehouse, on Saturday last. This morning in the Police Court charge was not made, and a charge of having been found unlawfully on another's premises was substituted. A Chinese servant of Mrs. Brown's testified to having left his room for a walk on Saturday night. Feeling his pockets he missed his money and decided to return to his room to get the desired change. When he returned he found his door ajar and the lock tampered with. Entering he saw the defendant endeavoring to climb over the partition. The servant called for assistance and Ah You was arrested. The night prowler was sentenced to imprisonment at hard labor for six months and pay costs of Court.

A Scandinavian Circus. A Scandinavian raised Cain in the Bay View Hotel opposite the O. R. & L. Co.'s station on Tuesday night. He was under the influence of liquor and started in to clear out the hotel with a chair. The bad characters which infest the place as lodgers were scared out of the place. Almost every window in the place was smashed, and in fact everything he could get his hands on was trampled around and broken by the infuriated man. Finally his efforts relaxed through exhaustion and he left for fields anew, and entered a Chinese store adjoining. He started in to clean the place out, but the Chinese locked around him and he was forced to leave with alacrity. Just as he left the store a policeman nabbed him and off he was marched to the Station.

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THE BOSTON RECEPTION.

Delightful Party Given by Captain Witte and Officers on Board the Cruiser. Honolulu society was entertained in great style on board the United States cruiser Boston last night.

The program was so arranged as to give each dance that everybody had an opportunity to engage in the exercise. Then the supper. It would have done credit to the best housekeeper in Honolulu. The table in the cabin was beautifully decorated, one of the devices being a fountain throwing scented water. Dancing was kept up till well toward the midnight watches. Everyone left feeling that Captain Witte and officers of the Boston had given them a delightful evening's entertainment.

Among those on board were Governor Cleghorn, Prince Kawana-aka, Chief Justice and Mr. Judd, His Excellency Sam'l Parker, Minister of Foreign Affairs, Miss Helen Parker, Hon. and Mrs. W. G. Irwin, the Misses Stevens (daughters of the United States Minister), and Mr. H. W. Sovereign, United States Consul General.

THE LEGISLATURE.

101st DAY.
WEDNESDAY, Oct. 5, 1892.
Afternoon Session.

The Assembly reconvened at 1:40 o'clock, from recess, and consideration of the items in the report from a special committee, in re scholarships, were considered and passed as follows:

Oahu College, 9; St. Louis, 21; Iolani, 12; Hilo Boarding Schools, 8; Kamehameha School, 7 (a total of 57), \$3000. Passed.

Salary Professor of Chemistry, \$2000. Passed.
Building and repairs of school houses, \$10,000.

There was but little argument on the passage of this amount, it being deemed so small that there was no ground for objection.

The item in the report relative to the appropriation for a school and a dwelling house for the teacher at Hanalei, Kauai, \$2,000, was considered.

Rep. Smith said that the amount was much needed for the object intended. There were 250 children in the district, and although not all of school age yet many of them had to travel through rain and mud to attend school at present. This would be a more central spot.

Rep. A. Horner objected to separate items. He could see that Rep. Smith was inclined to think only of himself and his district and was not thoughtful of the calls of other places nor of the money to be obtained.

Minister Macfarlane stated that in conversation with the President of the Board of Education he had been informed that the amount appropriated, viz., \$10,000, was much too small. He believed that the amount was too small himself, but the exigency of the times was such that the country could not now afford to be liberal and not even generous. The President of the Board was a gentleman whom he and his colleagues had faith in, and he (Mr. Bishop) was well acquainted with the needs of the Board of Education, better by far than the members of the House. He was not in favor of increasing items, but in this case he would be willing to add to the general fund, previously passed, and isolate the particularization of this item. He would favor the addition of \$2500 to the general item, making it \$12,500, but this or other special items he would oppose.

After long and wearisome argument the item was passed at \$1500 but immediately after, on motion of Noble Marsden, the items of \$10,000 for building and repairs of school-houses and the one just passed were both again brought up in statu quo by reconsideration.

On motion the fund was made general, notwithstanding arguments to particularize, and passed as Building and repairs to school-houses, \$12,500.

A decided and strong attempt to clean up the first section of the bill was now evinced, the following items being presented and passed almost without comment, viz.:

Support and care of prisoners, \$80,000. Passed.
Salary Auditor-General, \$10,000. Passed.
Salary Deputy Auditor-General, \$5000. Passed.

Free removal of garbage, \$12,000. Passed.
Honolulu Fire Department, \$40,000. Passed.

The item relative to subsidy for the Oceanic Steamship Co., \$30,000, was brought up but for a brief moment only, there being doubt about whether it was yet entirely cut loose from section 2 of the bill. When that doubt was removed there was no definite report of the committee presented although Noble Cornwell, a member of the committee, stated that \$30,000 would be recommended by them.

Pending action Noble Marsden at 4:05 moved adjournment and the Assembly dissolved.
