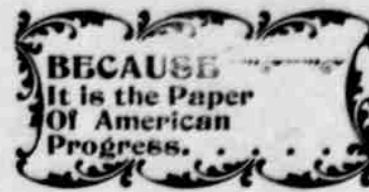

## BREWING AND MALTING CO.

The Honolulu Brewing and Malting Company, incorporated not long since at \$200,000 is ready for business now. The stock has all been taken. Plans and specifications are expected from the States in the near future. This is all that the company is waiting for now.

The building the company proposes to put up will be a three-story affair, fitted up according to the latest and most improved methods. It will be well insulated so that all the beer can be kept cool, ready to be sent out in good shape when ordered.

It has not yet been decided where to place the brewery but it is certain that the promoters will put it as near the center of the city as possible so that it will be in a convenient position. Several sites have already been picked out but no decision has yet been reached.

An attempt will be made to get the Government to guarantee the company artesian water but, if no success is met with in this, the company will proceed to bore its own wells.

The promoters say that they will be able to place beer on the market in six months from date. Erecting the building will take three months. An experienced brewer from the East has been secured.

## AN AERIAL VISITOR

Shortly after six o'clock last evening an immense meteor made its way across the heavens from the direction of the Pali straight out to sea.

It appeared to be very low and as it took its course in an almost perfectly horizontal line it threw out a great quantity of sparks and in its wake left a long trail of meteoric dust which after some time collected into a compact mass which was quite luminous.

The strange sight was witnessed by several people at the boat-houses and along the water front.

Honolulu people were not the only ones who saw the meteor. It was, from a description given by Captain Tullett of the James Makee, much brighter on Kauai. It is very probable that reports of the meteor will come in from Maui and Molokai on the island steamers Saturday. Captain Tullett described the meteor as follows:

"We were just getting away from Kapaa at about 6:15 last evening when we saw a vivid flash in the direction of the northwest. A large ball of fire had made its appearance and shot far out to sea, leaving in its wake what appeared to be smoke, highly illuminated. This pathway of the ball of fire, remained bright for quite a while. The ball of fire showed red, yellow, blue and green most vividly."

## SUGAR PLANTING IN KONA

### Large Future Destiny of Kona Sugar Company's Plantation.

### Many Thousands of Acres for Cultivation—Big Mill Projected—Profit Sharing System in Successful Operation.

A plantation not much heard about is that of the Kona Sugar Co. started in a small way two years ago, its operations both preliminary and of actual cultivation have become greatly extended. The fields make a noticeable feature on the slopes of Hualalai, to a passenger on the steamer sailing along the North Kona coast.

The company has now under long leases about 3,000 acres of the best cane lands in the district, and owns in fee simple about 800 acres more. Upon its lands are the finest water springs in Kona and a stream that runs through all the rainy season, which supplies a large reservoir built by the company. Cane from the uplands can be flumed to the mill in the rainy season, the water then being used in the mill. In other seasons the reservoir will supply water for mill purposes.

Besides the 400 acres now planted, Mr. Cooper the manager expects to plant this year about 1200 acres more, and in 1900 from 1500 to 2000 additional. It is alleged by officers of the company that there is no place on these islands where cane grows so large or so sweet as in Kona, and above 800 feet elevation it never requires irrigation. Last year the crop of a few acres, ground in a small mill with inferior extraction, yielded six tons of sugar to the acre which was of excellent quality. The company is now starting a mill of 25 tons a day capacity, which will be used only for grinding the first two crops, most of the cane being required for seed.

It is proposed to run a railroad from the mill about seven miles south to Kapaeha, where the company's largest fields will be, and the road will probably run for two or three miles to the north to take in tracts of fine land, some owned by the company and others by planters now preparing their ground for cane. The railroad may be continued on to the landing at Kailua. About fifty men have been engaged lately to build roads and work on the mill building and machinery. The finest road in Kona is now being built by the company from the Government road to the mill site, and is to be continued to the upper Government road near the manager's house and company's store.

Excepting about 50 acres owned by the company, the cane is being raised by burs of four to ten men each. This profit sharing system thus far has worked to a charm. No trouble with strikes, nor fights with lunas, as each man is working for himself. The company furnishes the necessary land and seed for planting, and makes advances in money and supplies for the completion of the work, all of which are to be returned with interest when the sugar is marketed. The planter receives half and the mill half.

It is claimed that if the little one-horse mill that was used last year could produce six tons an acre, certainly the 2-ton mill should give seven or eight tons an acre. When the 3000 or 4000 acres of land shall be planted, it is intended to erect a large nine roller mill like that of Ewa. One of the directors says:

"There is an abundance of free laborer to take contracts, and many of their own lands may own. The contracts, receiving half enter into and rentals for their the sugar. Probably no plantations besides. They will be able to produce sugar as cheaply as there is Kona Sugar Company."

no expense for irrigating, no coal bills and little labor to pay for. On most plantations each laborer does as little as he can, here each man is a proprietor and does as much as he can.

"One field of cane growing at 3000 feet elevation is looking as well as any of the lower cane and the upper cane not tasseling may be allowed to grow for several years if necessary. Grinding can go on all through the year. The conditions are somewhat like those at Pahala but more favorable, as the upper Kona lands have abundance of rain and much less wind. The Kona Sugar Co. is destined to be one of the large plantations of the islands."

## PROPERTY IS TWICE SOLD

### James Ashford Ordered to Deliver a Deed Under Penalty.

### Kaneohe Drainage Controversy—Klondike Mining Suit—Pali Road Saloon Man's Trouble—Lazarus Dover Case.

Judge Perry has signed a decree ordering James Ashford to deliver to Henry Smith, Clerk of the Judiciary Department, within fifteen days under penalty for contempt, a deed to S. Ahmi, complainant against that respondent and A. V. Marcial, of certain lands at Wailuku. Mr. Ashford was found in default on hearing of the complaint, wherein it was alleged he agreed on October 2, 1897, to sell to complainant these lands for \$2200, of which he received \$500 in hand and consented to leave the remainder on mortgage; also that when the mortgage had been executed, and on December 8, 1897, Mr. Ashford sold the same lands to A. V. Marcial, the deed being registered. On the hearing, as reported at the time, the demurrer of Mr. Marcial was sustained, the suit as to him being dismissed.

James A. King and wife by their attorney, W. O. Smith, file an answer to Nannie E. Rice and David Rice her husband, and the Kaneohe Ranch Co., for the acquisition of right of way at Kailua, Oahu. Among other things they say: "That the proposed drain, if made, would traverse the whole length of the respondent's land and so divide it as to greatly impair its value and injure the reversion. That deeming the request of the petitioners to be unnecessary and unreasonable, these respondents have refused to consent to the making of said drain."

Charles I. Holua by his attorneys, Paul Neuman and Geo. A. Davis, has demurred to the complaint of Theo. W. Hobron, who claimed \$2000 under a contract defendant was alleged to have made to work in the Klondike goldfields. He sets up that the parties are shown to be partners, therefore a remedy should be sought not in law but in equity. Also, that the agreement was to be performed in a foreign country, therefore the Hawaiian courts have no jurisdiction in the matter.

In the separation suit of Justina France vs. A. F. France, Judge Stanley ordered respondent yesterday to provide plaintiff with the necessities of life instantly, and to pay her the March alimony allowance by noon Saturday. Respondent, in an affidavit, alleged that he was losing money in running the light wine and beer saloon on the Pali road, also complained that his wife was paying \$30 a month rent in Fort street instead of moving into a house in School street of which the rent is \$16. Robertson & Wilder for plaintiff; W. A. Henshall for respondent.

Kaunimakaole Lazarus by her attorney, W. A. Henshall, has appealed from Judge Stanley's decree dismissing her bill against Alexander Lazarus to admeasure dower.

## THEY MUST BE UNANIMOUS

### Germany Maintains Dignified Attitude Regarding Samoa.

### Two of the Three Powers May Act in an Emergency But Their Acts Are Not Necessarily Binding.

Berlin, March 28.—The correspondent here of the Associated Press has obtained on the highest authority at this capital the following explanation of a feature of the Samoan question which has lately arisen.

On the report that the American Government had cabled to its Admiral at Samoa to act in accordance with the decision of two of the representatives of the powers, the German Government made earnest representation to the American Ambassador here, Andrew White, that the Berlin treaty requires the concurrence of the three powers and called attention to the dangers which would arise if there was anything like a violation of the treaty.

The American Government made a frank and conciliatory answer which caused much satisfaction here. It recognized the necessity for unanimity upon the part of all three powers under the treaty as a condition of any settled policy or permanent action; and declared the admiral was only authorized to act in agreement with a majority of the representatives of the powers in a case of emergency which absolutely does not admit of delay, but in such a case ratification of adjustment by unanimous vote of three powers must be sought at the first possible moment and no permanent arrangement can be made without such unanimity.

The American government it is added, cabled to its representatives in Samoa to pursue the most friendly and conciliatory action toward the German representatives and German interests, carefully avoiding anything likely to be misconstrued or to create ill-will. In consequence of the stories regarding Mataafa having sanctioned sectarian tyranny, the German government assured Mr. White that all its influence would be exerted against interference with the religion of any sect.

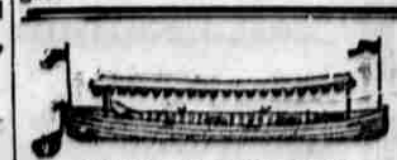

**RAID AT WAIALUA**  
 Deputy Marshal Chillingworth and Special Officer Peneuf went to Waialua yesterday on an opium raid. They proceeded immediately to Ah Chew's place and showing a warrant, started in to search. The officers found ten full tin of opium, over a hundred half Heheo tin filled with opium, a tin box filled with empty tins, a brass canister with a distilling outfit and sixteen square faces filled with okolehao. Ah Chew was immediately arrested and brought to town, where he put up \$500 bail on the charge of unlawful possession of opium and the same amount on the liquor business. The Chinaman produced this money at once. He is known to be one of the richest Chinamen on the Islands.

The officers learned some important facts while making the raid. Many of the tins found were cleaned, ready for filling, showing that the opium comes in bulk and is then put up. This business has evidently been going on for a long time and accounts for much of the opium that has been used in Honolulu of late.

The brass canister, found in a hole in the ground, is used to boil up the bulk opium, preparatory to packing it in the tins.

When the tins have been filled, the tin is set out on the date of sealing stamped on the top.

The Chinaman at Ah Chew's has evidently found that the large tins are inconvenient in the matter of handling and easily detected by the police who have for years past been used to get around this tinners. One has been made. These, carried singly in an ordinary pocket will not give rise to any suspicion.

The okolehao found is supposed to have been distilled right on the premises, as the ordinary apparatus was found.

By raiding Ah Chew's Chillingworth has no doubt broken up the source of much of the opium that has been used in Honolulu of late.

The Kaula steamers report the W G Hall and Kilohana at Koloa and the Wainaloa at Hanalei. There were 57,074 bags sugar left on the Garden Isle yesterday. H M was in the lead with 15,000 bags.

The Kaula came in from Kau late yesterday afternoon. The purser reports as follows: "Fine weather at Kau; Punaluu cleaned out of sugar; 490 bags left at Honouliuli; the windlass broke while heaving anchor at Punaluu.

The Cleveland will probably get away for Manila late this afternoon. However, this is not certain. She was to have sailed a couple of days since but has been delayed for one reason or another. The Cleveland now has as bad a list to port as she had upon entering port.

Zealandia at Pacific Mail.

The Zealandia hauled in from the stream alongside the Pacific Mail wharf this morning. A guard was immediately stationed and then several companies were loaded for drill. The Zealandia has begun to take on her coal already.

Noeau to Mahukona.

The Noeau has been chartered to sail for Mahukona with Senator Henry Waterhouse and others this afternoon. After landing her passengers she will sail for Eleele with a load of coal, returning to Honolulu with sugar. The Noeau has the distinction of being the boat that is always chosen to make special trips.

Wreckage All About.

When the James Makee sailed for Kapa Tuesday afternoon, she passed through a perfect sea of the wreckage of the Edward O'Brien. It was necessary for her to feel her way in a very gingerly manner for some time to prevent running into some large piece that might cause trouble. Captain Tullett of the Makee says that a lot of the wreckage will be piled up on the Kaula coast as a current from around Barber's Point runs directly there.

Diamond Head Telephone Out.

"Central" announced at 1 p m today that the Diamond Head Signal Station telephone was broken. A minute or so afterwards, Charley Peterson, the look out, came into the office with the telephone in question dangling at the end of the strap. He said it was simply impossible to get any use out of the instrument, so he had taken it down and brought it to town. In as an important a place as the signal station he certainly should have a decent telephone.
