TAXATION IN HAWAII NEI.

To those of our readers who are residents of long standing, an explanation of the kind and amount of the taxes assessed by the Hawaiian Government may seem to be unnecessary; but it must be remembered that we have amongst us a large number of new-comers who are of course quite in the dark as to these matters, and even among the older hands it is seldom that one is found perfectly familiar with the details of taxation—except perhaps during the period when the collector makes his annual call. We will name the taxes *seriatim*; and first—

**The Poll Tax.** An annual tax of one dollar is payable by every male inhabitant of the Kingdom, between the ages of seventeen and sixty years, whether a Hawaiian subject or an alien, unless the person be excused from such payment by law, or by the assessor of the district in which he resides, on account of age, infirmity or poverty. The following persons are exempt from this and all other personal taxes: clergymen, school teachers, soldiers in actual service, and members of any organized fire company.

**The School Tax.** An annual tax of two dollars, for the support of education, is payable by every male inhabitant of the Kingdom between the ages of twenty and sixty years, whether a Hawaiian subject or an alien, unless the person be exempted from such payment by law, or by the assessor of the district in which he resides, on account of age, infirmity and poverty, or unless he is a student actually in attendance at any of the high schools or colleges.

**The Road Tax.** An annual tax of two dollars is payable by every male inhabitant of the Kingdom between the ages of seventeen and fifty years, whether a Hawaiian subject or an alien, unless the person be exempted from such payment by law, or by the assessor of the district in which he resides, on account of infirmity; or unless he be a school teacher actually employed, or a fireman belonging to a legally organized company, or a student actually in attendance at any of the high schools or colleges. The road tax may be commuted by laboring four days under the direction of the road supervisor of the district.

**Tax on Personal Property.** All personal property of whatever kind, not subject to specific taxes, or specially exempt from taxation, is subject to an annual tax of three-quarters of one per cent, upon the full cash valuation. The term "personal property" is construed in law to include all household furniture, goods and chattels, wares and merchandise, all ships and vessels whether at home or abroad, all moneys, notes of hand, unsecured debts, growing crops, public stocks, stocks in corporations, and every species of property not included in real estate.

**Tax on Real Property.** All real property within the Kingdom, not specially exempt from taxation, is subject to an annual tax of three-quarters of one per cent, on the full cash value of the same, to be assessed

in the district where situated, irrespective of any mortgage. The term "real property" with respect to the assessment and collection of taxes, is deemed to include all lands and town lots, with the buildings, structures, and other erections on or annexed to the same.

The above tax of three-quarters of one per cent, on personal and real property, is collectable only upon property in excess of three hundred dollars.

The Legislature of 1882 passed a lengthy Act "to consolidate and amend the law of Taxation." As, however this act does not take effect until June 30, 1883, it is not a matter for consideration in view of the assessment for the present year.

By law it is made the duty of the tax assessor to either call personally upon every tax-payer, to ascertain the amount due by him, or else to give public notice of where such assessor may be found for that purpose. It is hardly necessary to say that the latter alternative is the one almost universally adopted. The law also provides that if any tax-payer shall have not furnished to the assessor a list of persons residing with him subject to taxation, and of any property belonging to him or them subject to assessment, on or before the 1st day of September, then the assessor is authorized to make out a list according to the best of his knowledge, which shall be binding upon all parties.

In a future issue we intend giving the results of an examination into the actual revenue of the country, to show who pay these taxes.

The steamer Iwalani will be due to-morrow morning from Kona and Kau.

The Jane A. Falkenburg took 1084 packages sugar, 2,225 packages rice and 4 packages coffee, for San Francisco. This is the first coffee exported for quite a while.

A meeting of the Trustees of the Planters' Labor and Supply Co. was held yesterday morning at which we understand very important business was transacted.

The quieter portion of our community would like to see the present political contest carried on just as vigorously as it is but couched in more respectful language.

We hear that on Tuesday the Chinese Steam Bakery on Maunakea street took fire, but was soon put out. This is said to be the 8th time that this place has taken fire.

On Tuesday the schooner Ehukai was registered at the Custom House, as No. 232, 36-95 45 tons, length 42 feet, breadth 19 feet 6 inches, depth 5 feet 6 inches, built in Honolulu by James A. Dower for the owners.

The *Kuokoa* editorial office in Cooke's building on Queen street will be occupied for the first time to-morrow, Mr. H. Waterhouse has generously furnished it with some fine fibre matting.

We learn that H. Johnson, District Justice of North Kohala, Hawaii has been appointed Clerk of the Police Court of Honolulu, at a salary of \$2,400 for the biennial period. This is a new office created by the last Legislature.

It is said that a certain high personage was very much alarmed at the BULLETIN's statement that Mr. Nolte had a Gatling Gun, so much so, indeed, that he came in person, to inspect the aforesaid gun. Who says,

after this, that the BULLETIN is not read?

THREE opium smokers were captured last night.

A FRAME cottage on Judd street took fire last night at 9:30. It was put out after the greater part burnt down.

YESTERDAY was a heavy day at the Police Court. In the criminal sessions 2 assault and battery and heedless driving, and 1 common nuisance. In the civil sessions no less than nine cases were called on, and still Judge Bickerton looks fresh.

Mr. Julian Monsarratt gave a party at his mother's residence on Tuesday night, to celebrate his coming of age. Dancing was kept up to a late hour, and everybody enjoyed themselves. A fine supper was provided, and the general opinion was that it reflected the greatest credit on Mr. Von Oehlhauffen, the caterer.

By the courtesy of the Post-officials, we are able to give the following mail statistics: From Sydney and Auckland, per steamer Australia, Aug. 27th, 265 letters and 322 papers. For San Francisco 2,785 letters and 701 papers. For San Francisco, per schooner Rosario, Aug. 29th, 76 letters and 22 papers.

We learn that Mr. Wray Taylor, the organist of St. Andrew's, is preparing a new series of organ recitals to begin next month. Every attempt to elevate the public taste in musical matters is deserving of encouragement. And the success of organ recitals in other countries justifies us in hoping for results of equal value here.

On dit, that a Cabinet Council was held lately at which two of the Ministers urged strongly that measures be taken for the suppression of the *Gazette* and the *Saturday Press*. One of the other two felt inclined to do it but was doubtful whether it was expedient or not, but the fourth one is reported to have said, "If Your Majesty desires to remain a monarch with a large income you will not do it, but if you wish to become a private gentleman with little or no income, do it at once." If this be true, one of the Ministry has some backbone at least.

"THOSE MULES."—People who have read our advertising columns and studied them carefully will understand the following: A firm in this town some months ago advertised mules for sale. In a short time the mules were sold and the firm thought no more about it, but the advertisement still kept its place, and people read it. And for months afterwards the firm was pestered with inquiries for "those mules." And now, if the word "mules" is heard you will hear encomiums from everyone in that store on the superlative excellence of the BULLETIN columns as an advertising medium.

OUR great contemporary, the Hawaiian thunderer, the *Gazette*, seems a little ruffled over the Postmaster General and his officials. Our big friend is evidently not in accord with what he terms "the wise regulation of the P. M. G." This "wise regulation" requires newspapers and registered letters to be at the Post Office an hour before the closing of the ordinary letter mail. To unbiased minds this looks like a reasonable arrangement. Wise or not wise, it is a common regulation in other countries.

TALKING of guns, a gentleman related to us the following anecdote: Some time ago the gentleman who had charge of the household troops here saw an advertisement of a gun which had the property of a noiseless discharge. He wrote at once to the Hawaiian agent in London asking him to procure a supply for the troops here and enclosing a flattering letter to the proprietor of the gun,

in which he remarked, among other things, that it would completely revolutionize modern warfare when it got into general use." The agent immediately went in search of this gun and found it in a toy-shop. He purchased one for twenty-five cents, and forwarded it. The narrator seemed of the opinion that it would be just as well to order a complete supply for the use of our brave defenders.

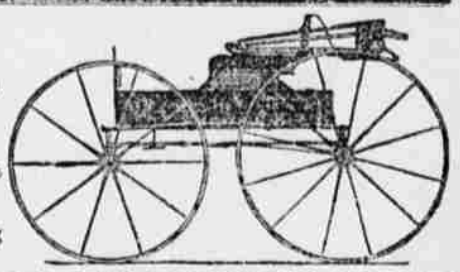

### An Obstinate Conscript.

Last year, writes the Rome correspondent of the Philadelphia *Bulletin*, there was a youth who declared he might draw the bad number or not, he would not be a soldier; he did draw the bad number and still he declared that he would not be a soldier. After having drawn it he returned home, and there he stayed until he was fetched by force. He followed the sergeant who had been sent for him, declaring all the time that it was useless to force him, because he would not be a soldier. He passively allowed himself to be stripped for the examination, without helping the operation by a finger. When he was told to put on his uniform he refused, saying he would not be a soldier. He was shut up alone in a room with the uniform, but when they went to see how far the toilette had progressed, they still found him standing, Adam-like in the middle of the room, with the uniform where they had laid it. They could not leave him there, as you may imagine, so they dressed him, he remaining quite passive, as usual; but when they put the gun into his hands, he sternly refused to touch it, saying it was contrary to his convictions to carry any murderous weapon. In vain they tried to reason with him, but they might as well have appealed to a stone. They took him to the Captain, where he repeated the same thing—that he would never touch a gun in his life. "You may do what you will with me," he said; "I am not afraid of death, but I will kill no man!" They put him into prison, and kept him on bread and water; they threatened, they coaxed and did all they could to persuade him, but it was useless. He only replied: "I will never hold or use a gun. I will kill no man; I will not be a soldier!"

I was never able to learn what they finally did with him, although I had the story from the Prefect's Secretary, charged with drawing the conscription.

### No Apologies for Dinner.

Apologies for a poor dinner are generally out of place. But when a forgetful husband, who, without warning, brings a dozen guests home to sit down to a plain family dinner for three or four, it is not in human nature to keep absolute silence.

What to say and how to say it form the problem. Mrs. Tucker, the wife of Judge Tucker of Williamsburg, celebrated for her wit, ease, grace of manner and beauty, solved this problem years ago. He

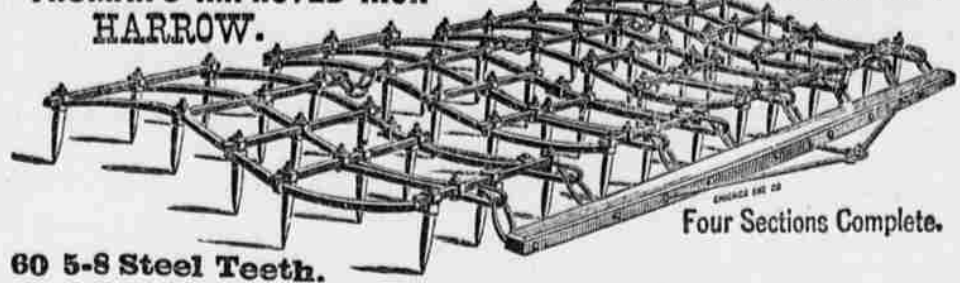

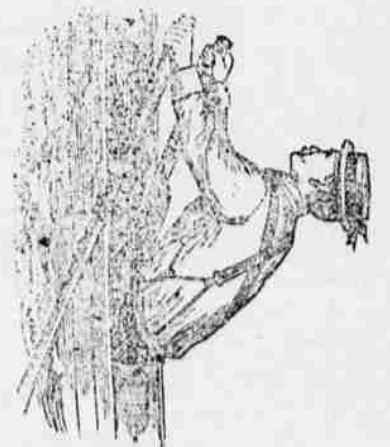
