Low Figure Favored For Lands At Kapaa

PUBLIC SENTIMENT WILL GUIDE HIM

Land Commissioner Pratt this morning stated as a result of his long negotiations with the emissaries of the Russian colony at Los Angeles, that everything in the matter seemed satisfactory to the two emissaries with the exception of the price, regarding which no information could be given them at present.

"They are satisfied with the lands," said Pratt. "They are satisfied with the conditions offered them by Col. Spalding. They are satisfied with everything, in fact, except that they want to know the price of the lands and want that made as low as possible. I do not think that they themselves gave any figures, but a gentleman present at the conference mentioned \$15 an acre. In reply, the Russians said that a Russian acre was equal to three of our acres, and accordingly, when they returned to their people they would have to give their figures relative to Russian acres, which would make it, in case the land was to cost \$15 an acre, \$45 per Russian acre. This price would seem a very great one to these people, who never had had anything to do with lands so rich and valuable as our cane lands. They had been offered lands at \$15 per acre at another place, and the price seemed very high to them. They did not accept this offer, but the stringent conditions attached to it also had a great deal to do with that.

"It seems that the opinion of the public is somewhat divided on the subject of price. Some people wish us to give the lands to the Russians at a very low figure and others do not. Personally I am in favor of the low figure, not only in this case, but in all cases where the Territory will be able to secure settlers of the stamp of these Russians. They intend to make their homes on their holdings with no thought of speculation. They also intend to cultivate every inch of the land where it is possible. If the kickers at Hilo or any other place would submit to such conditions I should always favor the disposal of lands at a low price. It is not the price that the Government wants. It is the reducing

Louis Berndt, former fish inspector, was fined \$12 and costs in the Police Court this morning for an assault on Charles Schoellkopf. The trouble was caused by Berndt accusing Schoellkopf of being instrumental in getting him out of his position.

The good sweet smell of sugar is becoming noticeable around the rail road and other wharves, an indication that the sugar shipping season is arriving.

PETERS IS AFTER SIXTY DAY LAW

The hearing on the writ of prohibition sought by C. W. Ashford to prevent Judge De Bolt from trying the Buckle vs. Ahmi case, basing his petition on the new statute preventing the trial of civil cases after sixty days of the term have elapsed, came up before the Supreme Court today.

Ashford did not appear in court, as he is at present on Kaula. Attorney Clemons filed a return in which he held that the sixty-day lapse statute was contrary to the Organic Act and void. He asked for a continuance of the matter until tomorrow, but the court set it for next Monday morning.

At this point Attorney General Peters made his appearance in the matter. He said that the sixty-day lapse statute was involved in the case, and for this reason he appeared. The settlement of this question was an important one to the Territory. There were a great many civil actions on the calendar, which would not be tried during the present term if this statute continued in force. Undoubtedly the propriety of the Attorney General's Department at tacking a statute made by the Legislature was questionable, but in this case it was for the advancement of justice if it was found to be void. For this reason Peters asked for permission to file a brief in the matter. The court immediately granted the desired permission.

Andrie Polokoff, a sailor on the Russian cruiser Lena, deserted late Monday night and was caught this morning by Policemen Joe and Manuel Leal. His whereabouts and identity were disclosed to the officers by parties who are after the reward, but do not want their names mentioned. They were not Japanese. Andrie was arrested near Russian Frank's house in Kamohihi. The money will be divided between the civilian and the policeman.

Continuing on her journey across the ocean the Pacific Mail liner Manchuria left the Hackfeld wharf shortly after 10 o'clock this morning with more notable aboard than have been in town at any one time since the same ship passed through Honolulu with the Taft party some months ago.

The S. S. Sierra with Thanksgiving mail, due this morning, had not been sighted at 2:50 this afternoon. She left San Francisco eight hours late.

The next mail for San Francisco will leave on the transport from Manila about a week from tomorrow. She is due to arrive here December 6th.

CAPT. BRAY EXHONERATED

Captain Bray, superintendent of the Sakers' Home, accused some months ago by the British Consul of harboring deserting sailors, was exonerated today at a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the institution. The executive committee made an investigation. The meeting was held in the office of Schaeffer & Co.

FINDS FAULT WITH THE LAND LAWS

Captain P. A. Demens, Philip Shuliu and Michael Shlykoff, of Los Angeles, who came here for the purpose of buying government land on Kaula for a colony of Russians, left this morning on the Manchuria for their homes.

"We have been ready to close a deal in two minutes ever since we came here," Captain Demens said this morning, "and we are ready yet. I came here having taken a personal interest in the matter of bringing the Russians and their families to the islands. My idea was to see that they did not get the worst of any deal. I am a thorough business man, an American for 21 years and would like to help my countrymen."

"I do not blame the Governor. In fact I am obliged to him and other officials for the trouble we have caused them. But the land laws; they should be fixed. Complete revision would be proper if you want to bring white people here to cultivate lands and make good citizens. If you want conditions to remain as they are at present why leave the land laws as they are. They are all right for the people here now but not for the immigration of people into this country."

"Further, if white people are wanted, you Hawaiians will have to make concessions. There is no question about this. The Russians are willing to pay reasonable amounts, but \$15 or even \$12.50 is too much, altogether too much. We cannot and will not pay that amount for your lands. I am a business man and would not recommend it to my subjects."

"Your Governor and other dignitaries are shrewd business men. The people's interests are well looked after." Incidentally, it may be remarked that Captain Demens is also a mighty good business man and the Russians at Los Angeles were fortunate in having such a representative.

ALAMEDA MAKES HER TRIAL TRIP

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 29.—The Oceanic steamer Alameda made her trial trip today. She struck the docking pier and sprung her plates. The damage was not serious.

\$250,000 SAN FRANCISCO FIRE.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 29.—Fire today in the Fremont street district did damage to the amount of \$250,000. The principal loss was suffered by the Union Iron Works and the machinery branch of the Golden State Miners foundry.

ST. PETERSBURG IS CUT OFF.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 29.—The situation is much more serious. There is no telegraphic communication with other cities of the Empire.

BURTON SENTENCED TO JAIL.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 29.—U. S. Senator J. R. Burton was today sentenced to six months in jail and \$2500. fine for accepting bribes.

MINISTERS CHANGE PLACES.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Morgan, Minister to Korea, has been transferred to Cuba to succeed Minister Squires, who has resigned on account of Cuba being dissatisfied with his attitude on the Isle of Pines affair.

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—The resignation of President McCurdy of the New York Mutual Life Insurance Co. has been accepted. Treasurer Cromwell will act in his place temporarily. Justice Peckham who has served as trustee, has resigned.

ALOHA TO BE THE FIRST TO LEAVE WITH SUGAR

The schooner Aloha, now tied up at the Hackfeld wharf taking on sugar from the steamer Mikahala, will leave probably Friday for the Coast with the first shipment of sugar for the season. She will take in the neighborhood of 1,200 tons. This is little more than half a load for the Aloha.

This morning the Mikahala brought nearly 5,000 bags of sugar from the Kekaha plantation on Kaula. The Hall has also brought several thousand bags for the schooner at different times.

The Russian cruiser Lena is taking on more water from the Pioneer. She is expected to sail for Vladivostok Friday or Saturday.

The S. S. Supply from Guam will sail for San Francisco either Saturday or Sunday. She has been repaired.

The Russian cruiser has been repaired while here.

There is a scarcity of island turkeys.

TRENT MUST PAY S-Y-S COURT

BLANKEI WARRANT

The Supreme Court this afternoon rendered decision in the case of E. B. McClanahan vs. County Treasurer Trent, reversing Judge Robinson's decree restraining Trent from paying the famous Andrew Adams blanket warrant.

The opinion by Hartwell is in part as follows: This is a taxpayer's bill brought to restrain the Treasurer of the County of Oahu from paying a county warrant issued by the County Auditor in favor of Andrew Adams in the sum of \$141, which warrant had been examined, allowed and ordered paid by the Board of Supervisors of the county, the plaintiff claiming that the warrant is unauthorized by law and its issuance to Adams unlawful as he is not entitled thereto in payment of any claim or claims, demand or demands due to him from or chargeable against the said County of Oahu.

OLD MOKOLII STEAMER CHANGES HANDS AGAIN

The hull of the old steamer Mokolii, one of the steamers used years ago about the islands and which was replaced by more modern vessels, and formerly used between Honolulu and the settlement at Mokolii, was sold this morning by Young Brothers to Captain Miller of the Lehua. The Mokolii was condemned some five or six years ago. Later the Wilder Company disposed of her to Young Brothers, who have been using her in their diving business.

KAIMUKI READY FOR ARBOR DAY

The Kaimuki, Palolo and Waihee Improvement Clubs is at present making strenuous preparations for its Arbor Day tomorrow, when the first step will be taken towards the realization of that organization's ambitious plans for the beautifying of the at present comparatively barren waste at the place indicated by its name. While tomorrow will be the actual Arbor Day, the club does not by any means intend to let its tree planting be limited to that one day, but expects to go right along with the work, planning streets and lots as they become cleared and are prepared for receiving trees.

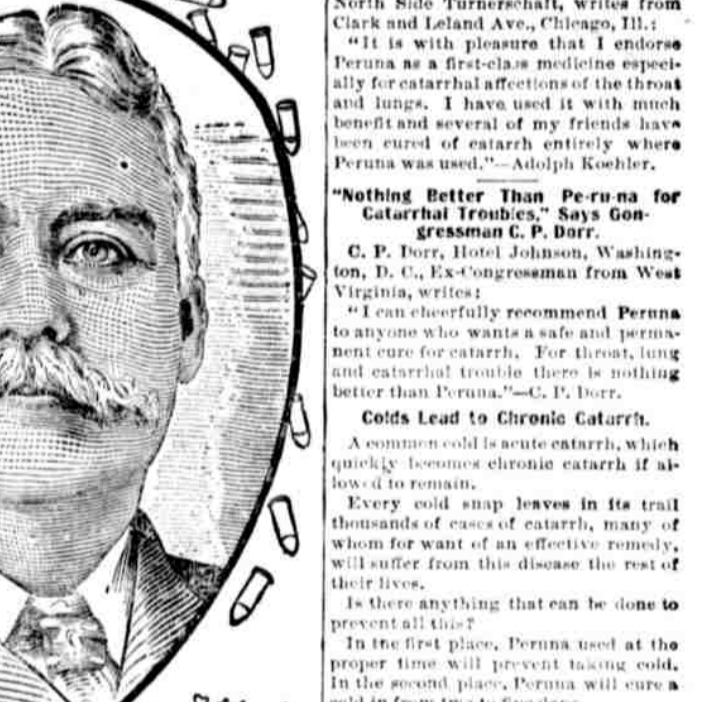
