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RECEPTION TO THE SENATOR

Tendered by the Government for Next Monday Evening.

To be Followed by a Grand Ball at the Government Building—Elaborate Preparations Being Made.

Late on yesterday the Cabinet decided to tender a state reception to United States Senator Morgan next Monday evening, his departure from these islands having been arranged by the Alameda leaving here next Thursday. It is understood that the Central Committee of the American Union party took the initiative in the matter and pressed it to a favorable consideration. The reception will take place at the Executive building and will be followed by a ball.

The expense of the affair will come out of the special appropriation of \$5000, set aside by the last Legislature for the entertainment of notable visitors. At the time the appropriation was passed it was expected that Li Hung Chang, the King of Siam, Marquis Ito and other notables would visit Honolulu and Minister Cooper procured the passage of the appropriation which now comes in handy for the present affair.

No invitations to the general public will be extended as everybody is expected to consider themselves invited. An exception will be made in the case of the Diplomatic and Consular Corps, who will be officially invited, although if they attend it will be only in their private capacity. It should be remembered that Senator Morgan is visiting Hawaii as a private citizen and not as the accredited representative of the United States in any official capacity.

Minister King decided yesterday afternoon that instead of wasting money in temporary electric light fittings the ball room and hallways of the Executive building should be permanently wired and Superintendent Cassidy has received the necessary orders to that effect and is already at work. Some of the old chandeliers will be pressed into service until more suitable ones can be obtained from the Coast.

It has been decided that during the ball only light refreshments, such as sandwiches, cakes, ice-cream, etc., will be served. There will be no elaborate supper to turn out unsatisfactory as on previous occasions.

To satisfy the thirst of those attending there will be only lemonade and claret punch. President Dole was in favor of leaving the claret out of the punch but finally compromised on claret cup with those who wanted something stronger than citric acid and water.

The members of the President's staff have been given supervision of the affair and are buying themselves in getting up new and effective decorations. The dancing will be in the old throne room, of course, while the band will be stationed on the Waikiki balcony. Lemonade and claret punch will be served all the evening in the little room behind the dais, while the more solid refreshments will be obtainable on the Ewa balcony. The Interior and Finance offices will be closed entirely, except that portion of the Interior office used as Minister King's private sanctum, which will be turned into a ladies cloak room. Caterer Chapman will furnish the refreshments and he has been ordered to prepare for 1000 people.

The Hawaiian Electric Light Company is wiring the new Fire Station for electric lights.

Colonel Soper and not Major Iaukea is chief of President Dole's staff.

QUEEN EMMA ESTATE.

Has the Decision in Hemen vs. Kamakia a Hearing?

In the case of Hemen vs. Kamakia, 10 Hawaiian, pages 547-559, among other points decided was the following, as contained in the syllabus of opinion:

"The words 'without a child' in this case mean 'without a child born,' that is, 'without having had a child,' not 'without a child then living or surviving,' and, therefore, L.'s estate became indefeasible upon the birth of her child, although the child afterward died during L.'s lifetime."

Dr. Rooke left his estate to his adopted daughter, Queen Emma, with a provision that if she died without issue the estate was to go to Col. Rooke, the testator's nephew. Queen Emma had a son born in 1858, who lived more than four years, and whose parents, Kamehameha IV. and Queen Emma, both survived him. Queen Emma, who lived for 23 years after the death of her son, left her estate principally to the Queen's Hospital, which had been founded by herself and her late husband. Col. Rooke of England now brings suit to recover the estate, on the ground that it fell to him, under his uncle's will, when Queen Emma died without living issue.

It will be for the courts now to decide whether the cases are similar, for, if they are, Queen Emma whenever her son was born—according to the decision in Hemen vs. Kamakia—became possessed of the indefeasible title to her adoptive father's estate, and might have willed it on that instant, or any time later, to whomsoever she pleased.

CLAUDINE GOES TOMORROW

Carries Coal and Stores for the Round Voyage.

Expects to be on the Drydock at San Francisco Between Two and Three Weeks Only.

The steamship Claudine of the Wilder Company is announced to sail at noon tomorrow, having already taken on board 375 tons of coal and a considerable quantity of stores. The coal is estimated as being sufficient for the round trip and serves as ballast going up. On her return she will bring a quantity of stores from San Francisco for the company and possibly some freight for other parties.

Captain Cameron will be in command on the voyage and he will have Mr. Moore as chief officer and Mr. Fisher as second. Chief Engineer Sutherland with the aid of First Assistant J. Ward and Second Assistant J. McKee will look out for the engine room, and the vessel will have about forty in her crew. Chief Steward Joyce will look after the catering.

Among those who go as passengers are Mrs. Cameron, wife of the captain; Captain Chas. Kibling, wife and daughter; Mrs. Sutherland, W. F. Pogue, agent of the Wilder Company at Keae landing; John K. Wilder of Wilder & Co.; W. R. Sims and R. W. Atkinson.

The Claudine goes direct to the Union Iron Works, San Francisco, where she will be put on the drydock and thoroughly overhauled. Among other repairs to be made to the vessel may be mentioned the putting in of new plates in her bow and the laying of a new deck.

Captain Cameron expects to make the trip in 9 days and says it will take from two to three weeks to have the necessary repairs done. He expects to be back in Honolulu within six weeks from tomorrow.

John K. Wilder will leave the islands tomorrow for the first time in 35 years and his many friends hope he will enjoy his hard-earned vacation and not get lost in the ramifications of the big city of San Francisco.

Petition for Reinstatement.

William C. Achi humbly petitions the Justices of the Supreme Court to reinstate him in the practise of law in all the courts. Attorney General W. O. Smith certifies that there are no complaints in his office against the petitioner, whose prayer is supported by J. Q. Wood, J. L. Kaulukou, Rev. E. S. Timoteo, J. M. Poopoe, John F. Colburn and W. R. Castle. Mr. Achi is one of the newly elected members of the House of Representatives.

Anti-Annexation Mass Meeting.

Preparations are being made for a combined native and foreign mass meeting on Palace square Friday evening, to adopt a memorial against annexation for presentation to Senator John T. Morgan before his departure. There are separate calls, it is understood, signed by leading annexationists of native and foreign races. It is in the scheme to have a deputation elected at the meeting to wait on the visiting Senator with the memorial.

Street Damages.

Geo. A. Davis, C. Hustace Jr. and R. N. Boyd, commissioners, have awarded the estate of Wm. Braah \$3000 for land and \$1000 for buildings, as damages in connection with the extension of Vineyard street.

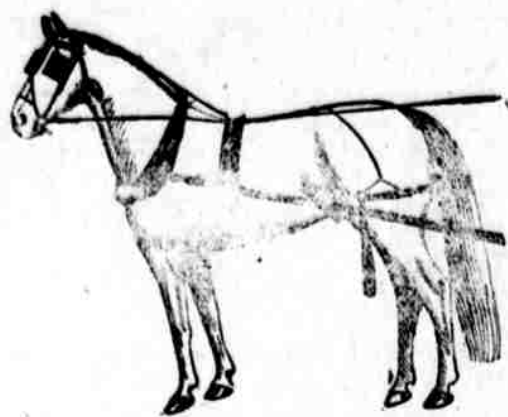

One day Amilias made an impenetrable suit of armor for a second class gjoed, and put it on himself to test it, and boastfully inserted a card in the

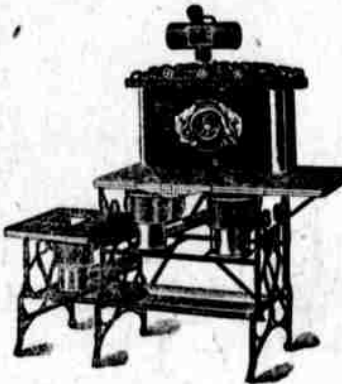

Hawaii's delegation to the House of Representatives is supposed to contain quite a nucleus of opposition to the administration. Mr. Paris reputedly ran to get satisfaction for the Board of Education's breaking with him on the census matter. He refused to disclose his property in the census blanks, and upon being prosecuted came out on top in the courts. There proved to be no law to compel him to inventory his estate to the Government. Mr. Loebenstein is understood to be after the scalp of the Attorney General, but after taking off his coat he discovered that want of confidence votes, against the Cabinet or any of its members, have no place in the present system of government. Mr. Achi, having only his own exertions to thank for getting his long coveted seat in the Legislature, may be put down as a free lance. Mr. Richards probably comes back to his seat as full as ever of the Greater Hilo ideas, with friendly regard for the Executive in proportion to its favor therefor. Notwithstanding the prospect of a distinct storm center hovering over the deliberations of the next session, it is not likely that there will be much flying of fur in the air. Only the record of the Government with regard to the big island and its ambitious metropolis will be closely examined in every detail, and there will be a struggle for guarantees of the fulfillment of all promises that may be got into the appropriation bill. The two supposedly pronounced opposition members, Messrs. Paris and Loebenstein, may well be regarded as having equipments whereby to make themselves in a high degree the creditors of their different constituencies and therefore of the whole island. Their intelligence, their business capacity, and their minute knowledge of the country and its needs, leave nothing to be proved excepting the quality of the discretion they will bring to bear upon their public duties and responsibilities.

Coffee growing is bound to be a large industry in the Hawaiian Islands, whoever succeeds or fails in the present initial attempts at cultivation. Because our soil and

climate produce a quality of coffee that is second to none, and where the location is right and the cultivation proper the product is abundant. It is not such an easy proposition, however, to make the industry on either a large or small scale a success, as that unknown persons abroad should be encouraged to rush in, take up land and plant coffee, without adequate means and with little or no experience in any kind of agriculture. The writer like many others has been the recipient of inquiries on the matter from persons in the United States and Canada, and has invariably replied to them by handing the addresses into the Foreign Office, for sending the inquirers each a copy of the comprehensive little official book on the subject. This brochure is about as good as could be devised for the purpose, showing fully the financial and personal equipments requisite to engaging in the industry.

Honolulu and the islands in general have in many things been ready to adopt the latest inventions pertaining to advancing civilization. For many years the city had a telephone system rather ahead of most other towns abroad in efficiency and proportionate extent of patronage. It would have had electric street cars only that when the existing franchise was granted the experimental stage of such had scarcely been passed anywhere else. These will surely come, however, in the near future. The latest adoption of progressive devices, one to be noted with gratification, is the employment of the X rays at the Queen's Hospital, which is a wonderful aid to surgical and medical skill.

When it rains only a little the road to Nuuanu Pali becomes very miry, making driving other than pleasant, not to mention cycling or walking. And it rains up the valley frequently. With the macadamised road now nearing completion over the pass, the road from town to that point ought to be improved. There will be a nice park at the summit when the new forest comes up fairly, which will not be many years the way things grow here. That with the grand scenery on either side of the valley and at the end will make the locality the ideal picnic ground for Honolulu. An electric railway will run up there ultimately, but in the meantime let us have a good carriage road.

At last accounts the relations between the United States and Spain were certainly approaching a critical stage. Strong representations had been made by the American Minister at Madrid of the desire of his Government that the war in Cuba should be brought speedily to an end one way or another. There was a formidable massing of American ships of war at the same time within easy striking distance of Havana. President McKinley's administration has gone so far in the matter that it must go farther. An answer could not be had from Spain until the court returned to Madrid from a summer holiday absence. That was only a matter of days, and the next news may be exciting.

It is semi officially stated to the BULLETIN, in answer to inquiries, that the reception to Senator Morgan next Monday evening is not strictly speaking a state ceremonial. Rather is it an informal farewell to the distinguished visitor, to exhibit public appreciation of the great interest he has taken in the Hawaiian question.

Since the blowing up of the bluff at the Pali, completely put-

ting an embargo to travel on the old road, the wisdom of the official decision to close that thoroughfare in advance is patent to everybody. The alternative suggestion of keeping the road open for certain days off and on, if it had been adopted, could not been carried out and besides lives might have been endangered through the attempt.

COFFEE IN THE COLONIES

How the New South Wales Government Encourages Planters.

Mr. C. Skelton, an experienced Ceylon coffee planter, acting under instructions from the Minister for Agriculture, has investigated the semi-tropical portion of New South Wales, with the view of reporting on its capabilities for producing coffee, and has furnished a most encouraging report. He visited and inspected the country about the Tweed, the Richmond and the Clarence rivers, and found all the coffee plants thriving well and producing splendid results. He states that he never saw finer plants in Ceylon. In consequence of his report Mr. Sydney Smith has given instructions for the formation of a nursery at Wollongbar for the propagation of a large number of plants, to be distributed to planters at a low rate.

Antonio M. Paisano was fined \$10 and costs this morning for assaulting a Chinaman.

Twenty shares of Ewa stock changed hands at \$280 this morning and five shares of Makaweli sold for \$111, although \$115 was asked later in the day.

AT THE PIANO.

To Prevent Marked Unevenness Practice the Hands Separately.

It is often with great surprise that one tries to do the right or left hand part of a long played composition separately and finds that it cannot be done properly at all. It is for the reason that, as a noted teacher once said, "One hand gets on and rides with the other." On carefully criticizing a performance we often notice a marked unevenness and are not a little puzzled to find the cause of it. A writer in the Etude claims that the difficulty will be quickly solved by doing the hands separately. He says: In Chopin's "Impromptu" in A flat, where both hands go at the same pace in triplets and the bass is so difficult, the great trouble in playing this nicely is to avoid all "seesaw" between the hands, and that is most easily accomplished by doing each hand separately in perfect time, trying to strike each note with equal force. As in all things where unevenness occurs, the trouble in the bass may be partly covered by the natural indistinctness in that part or by the prominence of the treble, and the unevenness in the treble may be covered by the indistinctness of the bass. Indistinctness and unevenness are often caused and covered up by the improper use of the pedal.

Many teachers give their pupils the arpeggios of the diminished seventh chord and derivatives to play with both hands at once, but it does not produce the best results, according to the authority quoted. He says: The jerk produced by putting the thumb under is much greater than when putting the finger over, and the big jerk is partly covered by the smaller one. The same applies to scale practice in a marked way and to much technical work. With any composition that is up to the limit of technical abilities the hands should be practiced separately.

For a Little Boy.

A useful and at the same time smart little suit for a boy between 3 and 3½ years old has the bodice made after the loose blouse style. The sailor collar is in white linen. The inner vest is also white. The skirt is trimmed with white braid and a finishing touch given with a silk tie knotted in front and of the

same color as the dress. The skirt to this consists simply of one deep killing arranged in even kilts all the way round, edged at the bottom with three rows of white washing braid to match that on the cuffs.

Treatment of Bruises.

Instead of having recourse to applications of tincture of arnica, spirits of camphor and to strong compression of the swelling in the treatment of light bruises, Dr. Anger prefers the use of olive oil, both for children and adults. He applies the oil freely to the contused parts and rubs the latter lightly with a rag, absorbent cotton, or with the fingers, and covers the bruise with a compress saturated with olive oil. The author claims that this treatment gives immediate relief to the patient and that the formation of a bloody protuberance is often prevented, while excoriations and superficial wounds which may be present heal very rapidly.

A Kitchen Danger.

A source of danger is the fact that it is in and about the sink that much food is prepared. There, where the most filth collects, the daintiest preparations are exposed to contamination. It is not an uncommon thing to see milk, puddings, meat and other edibles standing in the sink to cool. All such food is easily tainted by gases and odors. It is obvious little good can be derived from the gas arising from the slimy mud which sticks to soil pipes, remarks an exchange.

NOSE BLEEDING.

How It is Caused and the Best Means of Checking It.

Nosebleed in children is commonly supposed to indicate nothing more than that the child tires easily or is overactive, says The Youth's Companion. Yet even these terms express more than is obvious upon a casual reading of the words.

If a child tires easily, or, in other words, if the least overexertion at play or at study results in a more or less severe attack of nosebleed, the child must be in a weakened state, while, on the other hand, if he is accustomed to allow his play or his studies so to absorb his interest as to make him forget his fatigue, he is placing an injudicious strain upon his constitution.

In either case he will be benefited by a curtailment of work and an increase in the amount of time allotted for rest, until his body is more fully developed. No child's mind can be developed faster than the body except at the expense of health.

Nosebleed occurring in middle life and old age is a more serious thing, as it indicates a graver condition of affairs. It is usually coincident with disease of the liver, heart or kidneys. Its cure is of course dependent upon the restoration of the organs to a normal condition. In elderly persons the disorder sometimes appears to result from weakness, which in turn it aggravates.

It is a common saying that in full blooded persons an occasional nosebleed is beneficial, and this may in a certain sense be true, inasmuch as the nasal membranes are thus relieved of congestion. But it is safe to say that bleeding from the nose is never anything but a sign of weakness.

The treatment of an attack of nosebleed consists in absolute rest and cool applications to the head. The extremities should be warm. The head should not be held down over a basin, as this favors the flow of blood. One of the simplest and most effectual methods of stopping an ordinary attack is for the person to stand erect, with the head in the usual erect position and the hands extended at length directly over the head.

How to Make an Odd Sofa Pillow.

Make the covering of green plush. Roses should be cut from white china silk. These are buttonholed to the plush with pink Roman floss. Stems and leaves are outlined with the same material to form a design which has been previously stamped on the plush. Around the edge is a green, hemstitched ruffle of china silk, and over it a narrower one of pink silk, also hemstitched with Asiatic honiton lace silk. The under covering of the pillow should be of green plush.

How Long Distances Can Be Run With Ease.

There are many manners of walking, some of which are much devoid of grace. But M. de Raoul has come to the conclusion that, as far as fast walking is concerned, the best method is that which he calls marche enflexion. The principle is to run without leaping, to raise the body above the ground as little as possible, to keep the knees bent, the upper part of the body inclined forward, so that practically you are always running after your center of gravity. The feet must be raised only very slightly. Any man between 20 and 60 can be taught to run as long as his legs can carry him without getting out of breath. Some men can, on the very first trial of the method, run seven or eight miles without stopping, while, with the ordinary tactics, they could not have run over a mile. The first kilometer (a kilometer is five-eighths of a mile) is usually covered in 7 1/2 minutes, the second in 6 minutes and the third in 5 minutes and 45 seconds. An interesting feature of M. de Raoul's researches is that even after a long run, according to his method, a stiff walk is no trouble at all. The muscles which work in both cases do not belong to the same set, and while one exercise is performed the muscles which minister to the other rest.

How to Make a Bureau Scarf.

A bureau scarf which will be a novelty to some of our readers was of white linen, cut just a little smaller than the bureau top. This was finished with a very elaborate cut work pattern, but the work was done with butter colored roman floss instead of linen thread. This was used over a pad of blue sateen, the edge of which was trimmed with the narrowest of butter colored lace, which was visible outside the cut work edge.
