

(a) Field inspections by USN PERSONNEL.

A constant effort is made to maintain and improve the sanitary conditions in the Truk district by frequent inspections. The importance of sanitation is well understood by all personnel in the Civil Administration Unit and the officers and men not directly connected with the medical section have assisted appreciably in noting unsanitary practices and instructing the chiefs of islands as to their action or bringing them to the attention of the native health aide or the medical personnel responsible. This greatly increases the actual number of inspections possible by medical personnel alone and has aided considerably in keeping the sanitary standards up. During this quarter, inspection has shown a steady improvement throughout the Truk district. It has been most marked on the islands north and west of Truk, which were staffed with health aides at the end of the last quarter.
