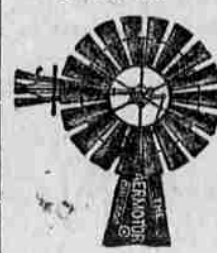

LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS

The Sonoma left this morning for San Francisco.

Be sure to be at the Opera House this evening and watch the tourney of the Boys' Brigade.

The fire commissioners will hold daily sessions on and after Monday, May 27th, in the rooms of the Chamber of Commerce, in the Campbell block, between 9 a. m. and 4 p. m.

The report that the Boers have provided themselves with a portable latrine, suited to quick transportation over rough mountain roads, is not generally credited at the London clubs.

The Territorial Band will assist in the celebration of the Feast of the Holy Ghost at the Catholic Church this afternoon and tomorrow. There will be no concert at Emma Square this afternoon, or at Makee Island tomorrow.

The services at Kawaiahae Church tomorrow evening when Rev. Mr. Gail will speak should be largely attended by our Hawaiian friends. The evangelist is a celebrated orator and takes a deep interest in the Christian work in our Territory.

The Right Man.

In charging this Grand Jury Judge Humphreys told it to examine all accusations of bribery made against the Legislature, instancing the street and press rumors which, at the time, had most to do with the possible causes which led to the defeat of the Dispensary bill.

To find out what malign influences blighted the Dispensary bill was evidently near to the judicial heart, and strange to say, the fates worked with Humphreys, for when the Grand Jury was "accidentally drawn, lo and behold, there appeared the following names, like Abou Ben Adhem's leading all the rest:

E. C. Macfarlane: Wholesale liquor dealer, owner of the Hawaiian Hotel and Annex bars; owner of a wholesale liquor house and saloon on Maui and of the Commercial Saloon here.

A. V. Gear: Business partner of the auditor of Peacock & Co., Limited, owners of seven saloons, including a hotel, and of wholesale liquor stores here and in Hilo.

J. F. Colburn: Stockholder of the Orpheum Company, which operates a liquor license.

J. C. Cohen: Stockholder of the Orpheum Company.

J. D. Holt, Jr.: Partner in the firm of Lovejoy & Co., wholesale and retail liquor dealers (Anchor Saloon.)

George E. Smithies: S. in-law of Sam Nowlin, part proprietor of the Merchants' Exchange Saloon, Cusario's Saloon in Hilo and of Seely Shaw's wholesale liquor store.

Oliver Stillman: A relative by marriage of J. D. Holt, Jr., of Lovejoy & Co.

S. C. Dwight: Brother-in-law of the late Mr. Lovejoy and administrator of the Lovejoy estate.

Out of fifteen members of the Grand Jury there are eight interested either directly or indirectly, in the liquor business.

Verily, fate is a strange thing. Perhaps the Judge was right, for if there was any monkeying with the liquor Dispensary bill, or nudus conviviality at the Bungalow Club, who so likely to know of and attend to it as the liquor men?

The public can await the result with full assurance that this jury of experts will sift the Dispensary bill scandal to the bottom, and that we shall learn all of the inside history of why that bill fell by the wayside.

The Eleu Must Go.

The Senate adopted the following report yesterday:

Hon. S. E. Kaiue, President of the Senate.

Sir:—Your Committee on Public Lands, to whom was referred item for "Pay roll, steam tug," would report as follows:

Your committee find the pay roll as follows: Captain, \$150 per month; mate, \$60 per month; engineer, \$150 per month; two deck-hands \$86 per month; two fire-men, \$104 per month; total, \$550 per month. Two years, \$13,200.

Your committee find to this is to be added the sum of \$20,000 for coal and other expenses, making the total expense of the tug \$33,200 for the two years.

We also find that since the arrival of the Fearless the Government tug has not been paying but losing money as far as towage of vessels go. The only saving to the Government has been in the removal of garbage and carrying piles, etc., in the harbor.

This bill provides for a garbage crematory which, if built, will do away with the need of the tug for this work.

Your committee do not consider it wise for the Government to try and compete with private enterprise in the matter of towage of vessels.

We would therefore recommend that the appropriation be inserted for one year at the rate asked for, or until the garbage crematory is erected and then the tug be dispensed with.

Senate Chamber, May 23, 1901.

Dr Garvin Turned Down.

The Senate declined yesterday to approve of the governor's appointment of Dr. C. L. Garvin as a member of the Board of Health. No reasons were given but it is understood that Dr. Garvin was slated to be president of the Board of Health upon the resignation of Dr. C. B. Cooper, and that the Independents believe that a layman and not a physician should be the president of the Board, an office which will in the future be salaried. The man wanted by the Independents is Charles Wilcox, who for years has been the secretary and chief de facto of the Board.

The appointments of James H. Boyd, W. H. Wright and E. S. Boyd were confirmed.

Senator Kanuha introduced the following resolution which carried with a slight amendment:

Dear Sir: Whereas, information has been received from reliable sources that there are other appointees of the Governor whose names were not submitted for the confirmation of this Senate:

Resolved, That the Governor is hereby requested to submit to this Senate all names of appointees other than already submitted.

FIRE CLAIMS COMMISSION.

In pursuance of the requirements of Act 15 of the Legislature of the Territory of Hawaii, being "An act to provide for the ascertainment and payment of all claims which may be made by persons whose property was destroyed by fire in the years A. D. 1899 and 1900, under orders of the Board of Health," public notice is hereby given that the Commission provided for in said Act has been duly organized, and claims for damages may be presented and filed with the Commission, at the rooms of the Chamber of Commerce, Campbell Block, corner of Fort and Merchant Streets, Honolulu, H. T., daily on and after MONDAY, the 27th day of May, 1901, between the hours of 9 o'clock A. M. and 4 o'clock P. M.

No claim for speculative or consequential damage, or for loss of rent or use of property, or loss of profits through the interruption of business, nor any loss except for destruction of or direct damage to property by fire or removal, will be considered by the Commission, nor any such claim be considered at all unless presented to and filed with the Commission within four months from this date as provided for in said Act.

Claims will be heard in the order in which they are filed, unless for special reasons the Commission shall otherwise direct, but no claim shall be heard within three days after the same is filed.

All claims shall be filed in duplicate by the claimants or their assignees and shall be verified by their oath respectively, and if the claimant be deceased or a minor the claim shall be presented by his legal representatives.

Each claim shall contain an itemized statement in the English or Hawaiian language of the loss sustained, the date of the loss and how it occurred, the nature of the property lost and its situation at the time of its loss, and if the loss consists of destruction of or damage to a building, the name of the owner of the land whereon it stood and the nature of the interest of the claimant or his assignee in the building, and in case of insurance, the amount for which the property was insured, the name of the insurer and how much insurance was paid thereon.

Blank forms for use of claimants in making up statement of losses will be furnished upon application.

Due notice will be given of the time and place the Commission will be in session to hear and examine proof of alleged losses.

RULE XIV: In order to facilitate business, claimants are directed to present claims for losses of merchandise, goods, wares and stocks in trade in an itemized form, describing the kind and value thereof, upon a schedule to be marked "Exhibit A," and all claims for losses of personal belongings, jewelry, house furnishings and other chattels upon a schedule to be marked "Exhibit B," and for all losses appertaining to buildings or of building fixtures upon a schedule to be marked "Exhibit C." 11-3t

Railroad Wants Money.

The following communication was read in the House of Representatives yesterday:

HONOLULU, May 22, 1911.

To the Finance Committee of the House of Representatives of the Territory of Hawaii.

Gentlemen:—We beg to call the attention of your honorable committee to the inclosed statement of subsidy to which the Oahu Railway and Land Company is entitled and which becomes due during the current biennial period, the amount of which is \$73,800.

The wisdom of the Legislature of 1890 in granting this aid to the O. R. & L. Co. has been fully justified by the vast amount of taxable property which has come into existence through the construction of this road. The road would never have been built without the subsidy. If it had not been built, the Ewa and Waiialua districts would have remained undeveloped to the present time.

The question before your honorable body at the present time is not should the subsidy have been granted, but shall default be made?

The credit of the Government was pledged to assist in the construction of this railroad. Bonds were sold and purchased by the public, and obligations were entered into on the faith of this underwriting on the part of the Government. The subsidy therefore became a part of the national obligations standing exactly on the same footing as the national debt. Default can not be allowed to take place in the payment of the one any more than of the other without impairing or destroying the credit of Hawaii.

We therefore beg to submit this matter to your attention in order that the proper appropriations may be made, and to prevent any default through oversight. Respectfully yours,

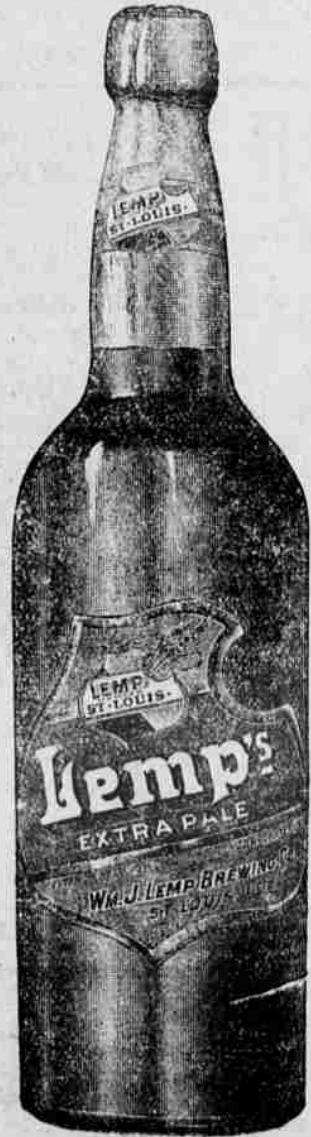

E. C. Macfarlane: Wholesale liquor dealer, owner of the Hawaiian Hotel and Annex bars; owner of a wholesale liquor house and saloon on Maui and of the Commercial Saloon here.

A. V. Gear: Business partner of the auditor of Peacock & Co., Limited, owners of seven saloons, including a hotel, and of wholesale liquor stores here and in Hilo.

J. F. Colburn: Stockholder of the Orpheum Company, which operates a liquor license.

J. C. Cohen: Stockholder of the Orpheum Company.

J. D. Holt, Jr.: Partner in the firm of Lovejoy & Co., wholesale and retail liquor dealers (Anchor Saloon.)

George E. Smithies: Sub-lawyer of Sam Nowlein, part proprietor of the Merchants' Exchange Saloon, Casario's Saloon in Hilo and of Seely Shaw's wholesale liquor store.

Oliver Stillman: A relative by marriage of J. D. Holt, Jr., of Lovejoy & Co.

S. C. Dwight: Brother-in-law of the late Mr. Lovejoy and administrator of the Lovejoy estate.

Out of fifteen members of the Grand Jury there are eight interested either directly or indirectly, in the liquor business.

Verily, fate is a strange thing. Perhaps the Judge was right, for if there was any monkeying with the liquor Dispensary bill, or undue conviviality at the Bungalow Club, who so likely to know of and attend to it as the liquor men?

The public can await the result with full assurance that this jury of experts will sift the Dispensary bill scandal to the bottom, and that we shall learn all of the inside history of why that bill fell by the wayside.

The Eleu Must Go.

The Senate adopted the following report yesterday:

Hon. S. E. Kaiue, President of the Senate.

Sir:—Your Committee on Public Lands, to whom was referred item for "Pay roll, steam tug," would report as follows:

Your committee find the pay roll as follows: Captain, \$150 per month; mate, \$60 per month; engineer, \$150 per month; two deck-hands \$86 per month; two fire-men, \$104 per month; totals, \$550 per month. Two years, \$13,200.

Your committee find to this is to be added the sum of \$20,000 for coal and other expenses, making the total expense of the tug \$33,200 for the two years.

We also find that since the arrival of the Fearless the Government tug has not been paying but losing money as far as towage of vessels go. The only saving to the Government has been in the removal of garbage and carrying piles, etc., in the harbor.

This bill provides for a garbage crematory which, if built, will do away with the need of the tug for this work.

Your committee do not consider it wise for the Government to try and compete with private enterprise in the matter of towage of vessels.

We would therefore recommend that the appropriation be inserted for one year at the rate asked for, or until the garbage crematory is erected and then the tug be dispensed with.

Dr Garvin Turned Down.

The Senate declined yesterday to approve of the governor's appointment of Dr. C. L. Garvin as a member of the Board of Health. No reasons were given but it is understood that Dr. Garvin was slated to be president of the Board of Health upon the resignation of Dr. C. B. Cooper, and that the Independents believe that a layman and not a physician should be the president of the Board, an office which will in the future be salaried. The man wanted by the Independents is Charles Wilcox, who for years has been the secretary and chief de facto of the Board.

The appointments of James H. Boyd, W. H. Wright and E. S. Boyd were confirmed.

Senator Kanuha introduced the following resolution which carried with a slight amendment:

Dear Sir: Whereas, information has been received from reliable sources that there are other appointees of the Governor whose names were not submitted for the confirmation of this Senate:

Resolved, That the Governor is hereby requested to submit to this Senate all names of appointees other than already submitted.

FIRE CLAIMS COMMISSION.

In pursuance of the requirements of Act 15 of the Legislature of the Territory of Hawaii, being "An act to provide for the ascertainment and payment of all claims which may be made by persons whose property was destroyed by fire in the years A. D. 1899 and 1900, under orders of the Board of Health," public notice is hereby given that the Commission provided for in said Act has been duly organized, and claims for damages may be presented and filed with the Commission, at the rooms of the Chamber of Commerce, Campbell Block, corner of Fort and Merchant Streets, Honolulu, H. T., daily on and after MONDAY, the 27th day of May, 1901, between the hours of 9 o'clock A. M. and 4 o'clock P. M.

No claim for speculative or consequential damage, or for loss of rent or use of property, or loss of profits through the interruption of business, nor any loss except for destruction of or direct damage to property by fire or removal, will be considered by the Commission, nor any such claim be considered at all unless presented to and filed with the Commission within four months from this date as provided for in said Act.

Claims will be heard in the order in which they are filed, unless for special reasons the Commission shall otherwise direct, but no claim shall be heard within three days after the same is filed.

All claims shall be filed in duplicate by the claimants or their assignees and shall be verified by their oath respectively, and if the claimant be deceased or a minor the claim shall be presented by his legal representatives.

Each claim shall contain an itemized statement in the English or Hawaiian language of the loss sustained, the date of the loss and how it occurred, the nature of the property lost and its situation at the time of its loss, and if the loss consists of destruction of or damage to a building, the name of the owner of the land whereon it stood and the nature of the interest of the claimant or his assignee in the building, and in case of insurance, the amount for which the property was insured, the name of the insurer and how much insurance was paid thereon.

Blank forms for use of claimants in making up statement of losses will be furnished upon application. Due notice will be given of the time and place the Commission will be in session to hear and examine proof of alleged losses.
