GENERAL ITEMS.

Captain Anthony Vanderlee of the ferry boat Atlantic City was killed by taking up a live electric light wire on the sidewalk at Camden, N. J.

A cold snap in the vicinity of Burlington, Iowa, is unequalled in the memory of the oldest inhabitants.

It is said Secretary Herbert will order a court-martial of the officers of the cruiser Atlanta, in connection with her alleged disgraceful condition.

Frank Bruce, leader of a gang of burglars caught at Terre Haute, Indiana, has been identified as the man who committed the daring \$15,000 diamond robbery on the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy train last fall.

Miss Victoria Bateman has been expelled from the Professional Women's League, a society composed chiefly of actresses in New York, on account of her connection with a divorce suit.

A collision on the Long Island railroad killed 14 people and injured 18 others. Among the dead is Colonel Beck, editor of the leading sports journal, Spirit of the Times.

Three calcium light men, employees of the Henry Irving company, were detained at Ellis Island, N. Y., as contract laborers.

Another opium ring is said to be at work in San Francisco, smuggling the drug from Victoria. High officials as usual are said to be implicated.

Capt. Fraser of the British ship Lonsdale had his skull fractured by a block falling from aloft, while on the voyage from Newcastle, N. S. W., to San Francisco. His recovery is doubtful.

Heath is liable to be re-arrested for the McWhirter murder on account of irregularity in the bail bonds.

Judge Weller of Milpitas, Cal., sues the estate of Rhoda M. Palmer for \$5000, on the ground that the Wellers gave her a home when she lived on the Coast.

Councilmen Graham and Steep have been arrested at Spokane, Wash., for taking bribes.

A fire at Elgin, Ore., destroyed most of the business portion of the town.

It is reported that Lillian Russell the actress is to marry again, her new mate to be Eugene Sandow, the strongest man in the world.

Henry Irving, the famous actor, is in San Francisco.

Kansas City, Missouri, has been squeezed by the sugar trust. For a week not a bit of sugar could be bought at the wholesale houses.

The great demand for the fruit season it appears had exhausted the wholesale supplies.

Crops in the southern Rocky Mountain district are the best for years, while in the northern district the ground is dry, crops need rain, and the ranges are in poor condition.

The half a dozen Chinese at Mentone, Cal., have been compelled to leave the place by a committee of unemployed.

A partly successful attempt was made at Fresno to blow up the house of Sam Lee, a Chinese merchant. Two partition walls were blown out and skylights and windows shattered.

Henry Miller the millionaire is sued at San Francisco to compel him to sell his great ranch in Southern California, according to an alleged agreement, and take \$800,000 as one-fourth payment with a mortgage for the rest.

Horace Johnson, of Middletown, Conn., who predicted the recent storm, says a bigger one is coming between Sept. 6 and 10.

Foxhall Keene's colt Domino, for which he paid \$3000 as a yearling, won the great Futurity Stakes at Sheepshead Bay.

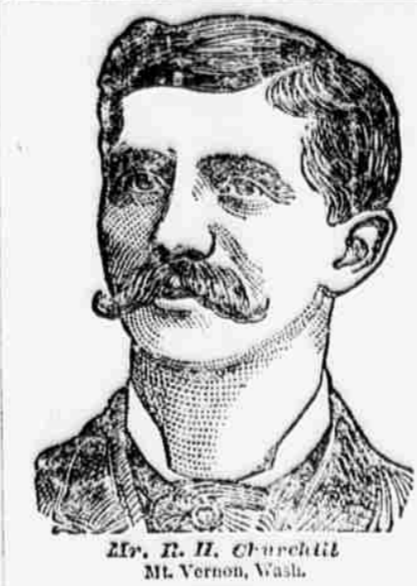
