AN ACT

TO PROVIDE FOR THE PAYMENT OF SALARIES AND EXPENSES OF THE GOVERNMENT, UNTIL THE 30TH DAY OF SEPTEMBER, A. D. 1890.

consequences to the company. Therefore, there should be no reluctance on the part of the Legislature in consenting.

WHAT THEY LOSE.

EDITOR BULLETIN:— Do our members of the Legislature, who do not understand native, lose anything by the prayers of the Chaplain of the House, not being understood or interpreted? We hope that no one will misconstrue our intention in calling the attention of your readers to one thing that the native Hawaiian can do, and do it well. We cannot illustrate our desire better than by relating a little incident that took place some ten years ago on Hawaii. The writer with others was whiling away the time at the landing, waiting for the steamer, by playing a much condemned (and for reason) but matter of fact, game of poker. It was about nine p. m., when the game was interrupted by a venerable looking native, who was also a guest of the house, who said that he was about to retire and requested humbly that we should stop the game until he could perform his devotions for the night. We did so, and the writer then listened to one of the most eloquent prayers that it was ever his good fortune to listen to. The gates he appeared to be so near, he shortly after passed through. Poi was getting scarce. But God is good, and what our members in the Legislature lose by not understanding what the Chaplain is saying, no doubt will be made up to them in sugar or some other way, in the sweet by and by.

CORRECTION.

EDITOR BULLETIN:— Permit me to make a slight correction of your report of some of my remarks made in the House Thursday, about the "Assessor in Chief." I did not object to the Assessors in Chief, nor their work. I objected only to the office as being expensive and useless. I gave my reasons, which were, that if that office was abolished we still had left a thorough and an effective organization for assessing and collecting of the taxes, consisting of the Minister of Finance, who, under the laws, was charged with the responsibility of assessing and collecting of the taxes. Then come in his deputies, who do all the labor of assessing and collecting. Then to insure justice and prevent bribery—as I explained—a Board of Appeals was organized by the Government, consisting of three supposed honorable and intelligent gentlemen, whose duty was to hear all appeals and the testimony under oath as to the value of the property, and if they found the assessment too high they reduced it, and if too low they raised it. I did not object to the Government appointing all of the officers and the Appeal Board. I only noted the fact to illustrate my idea, that the machinery for assessing and collecting of taxes was thorough and effective without the Assessors in Chief, who being only the "fifth wheel of the wagon," the \$25,000 paid to them was a loss.

Latest Foreign News.

(San Francisco, July 27, per barkentine S. G. Wilder.)

AMERICA.

REVOLUTION IN THE ARGENTINE REPUBLIC. A revolution broke out at Buenos Ayres July 26. The troops in the garrison rebelled. All the shops closed and fighting took place in the streets. Garcia, Minister of Finance, was held a prisoner by the revolutionists. 1:50 p. m.—Desperate fighting now going on. Many have been killed on both sides. The insurgents are advancing towards the Plaza de la Victoria, where the President's palace and the Town Hall are located. The President has escaped to Rosario. 3:50 p. m.—A revolutionary Government has been announced, with Senator Axen as President and Senator Romero as Minister of Finance. The city still holds out, but the revolutionary movement is extending hourly. President Celman declared the republic in a state of siege, but soon took refuge himself on a foreign ship. Later reports are that five more battalions of the Marine Arsenal and part of the artillery have declared for the revolution. The revolutionary party issued a manifesto, and liberated Emanuel J. Campos, awaiting trial as a conspirator, who at once placed himself at the head of the revolution. Gold closed on the 25th at 200 percent premium. THE CENTRAL AMERICAN WAR. A despatch received in Paris confirms the news of Salvador's victories. Costa Rica had withdrawn from the Guatemalan compact, and Nicaragua would do likewise. The French syndicate which was to have loaned Guatemala \$20,000,000 has positively refused to negotiate with that country. A revolt has broken out in Guatemala directed against President Barillas and his Cabinet. Armed soldiers were parading the streets day and night, but on the morning of the 26th many of them refused duty, as

they had not been paid. Over 100 were arrested and imprisoned. At 11 o'clock a mob paraded the streets shouting, "Death to Barillas!" The revolutionists were arrested and imprisoned. It was feared that the military would make common cause with the revolutionists, who were gaining more power every moment. The Cabinet has resigned. President Barillas has suspended his duties with Salvador and turned his attention to the situation at home. The President held a council of war and troops are being daily conscripted to carry on war with Salvador. President Barillas abandoned the intention of taking the leadership of the troops against Salvador, owing to the unsettled condition of affairs at the capital. A proclamation has been issued warning all the natives of Salvador to leave the territory of Guatemala within forty-eight hours. President Barillas has issued a decree declaring the whole republic in a state of siege and suspending constitutional guarantees. The Salvador troops are said to be within sixty miles of Guatemala City and being constantly reinforced. There are two sections of the Salvador army now in Guatemala, one in the Department of Jutiapa and the other in the Department of Santa Rosa. It is reported that the Guatemalan Government has called to the United States, asking that nation's interference to prevent Mexico's interference with Central American affairs. The American Minister at Guatemala City is much annoyed over the searching of the American steamer Colman. The U. S. S. Rafter has just arrived. She only stopped at Amapulco for coal. UNITED STATES ITEMS. Secretary Windom is preparing a statistical statement relating to sugar for President Harrison. It is believed to be intended as the basis of a message to Congress in support of Secretary Blaine's reciprocity views. In the Senate Mitchell offered a concurrent resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Finance, stating that the United States would hail with appreciation any reciprocal arrangement, by treaty or otherwise, between the Government of the United States and the Governments of all or any of the South American or Central American States. The P. M. S. S. Co. will fight the Canadian Pacific steamship line alone, as for the present the O. & O. Co. will not send its steamers to Vancouver. John D. Fiske, a wealthy citizen of Fresno, Cal., was shot dead in that town on the 26th, by J. L. Stillman. Fiske had been attempting to blackmail Stillman for some time, in order to compel him to sell Fiske a share in certain patents, Stillman being an inventive mechanic. Stillman was also to be the principal witness in a divorce suit of Mrs. Fiske against her husband. The cyclone has visited New England, hitherto exempt from the awful visitation, except on a limited scale. South Lawrence, Mass., was devastated in a path 100 feet wide and a mile long, by a cyclone the morning of the 26th. Eight people were killed, from 15 to 25 seriously injured. From 75 to 100 buildings, mostly dwellings, were destroyed or badly damaged, and a beautiful square containing 500 trees was swept clean. The property loss is placed at \$100,000. The calamity is the greatest which has visited Lawrence since the fall and burning of the Pemberton mills thirty years ago.
