IGNORANCE. EDITOR BULLETIN:— When one reads over the last exertion of Dr. Hammond, he will coincide with the above heading. There the Dr. gives me the lie. I take it with good grace (that is upon the right check, Dr.) Christ says: "That ye resist not evil: but whosoever shall smite thee on thy right cheek, turn to him the other also." Before you smite the other cheek, Dr., please go back the eight days you spoke of, and read the article over, thus learning who it was that offered the \$1000. Not for my interest, but for your own, in the eyes of the public. Why are you so anxious that I should hunt a dictionary, or a lawyer? No, Dr., no traditions of men for me. It is enough for me to take God's word, and let Him (God) be his own expositor. Dr. Hammond says: "The law for Adam, Noah, and all those that lived prior to Moses, was a different law than that given to the children of Israel at Sinai." Christ did not teach that such was the case. If he had, it would have been denying himself, for He (Christ) spoke the law at Sinai, after he had led the children of Israel two months. No, neither did Christ hear the Great Teacher's summary: "Let us hear the conclusion of the whole matter: Fear God and keep his commandments: for this is the whole duty of man."—Ecc. 12: 13, 14. Christ fulfilled (fully preached) the seventh commandment. "Whosoever looketh on a woman to lust after her hath committed adultery with her already in his heart." (broken God's law).—Matt. 5:28. He (Christ) also taught that to hate a brother is murder. In all his teachings He magnified the law, and made it honorable, that we simple-minded people might understand it. I wonder what kind of a law Adam and Noah had to point them to their duty to God, and to their fellow-men? Perhaps the Dr. can give us some light upon the subject. "There is one lawgiver (Christ), who is able to save and to destroy."—James 4:12. Paul did teach, that those who would walk, not after the flesh, but after the spirit, were not under the law, but under grace. This was to those who obeyed the law. The Dr. seems to think we are not under the law even if we become adulterers (have two husbands or lawgivers), sin what you like. Paul says:—"Sin is the transgression of the law," that is, under the law, as "by the law is the knowledge of sin." Many people class the Bible truths as a conglomeration. I had not supposed the Dr. as one of them, but when the clear truth is presented, how quick he shows his colors. God's standard (law), has been trailed in the dust. How is it to be raised? "If thou turn away thy foot from the Sabbath, from doing thy pleasure on my holy day; and call the Sabbath a delight, the holy of the Lord, honorable; and shalt honor him, not doing thine own ways, nor finding thine own pleasure, nor speaking thine own words: Then shalt thou delight thyself in the Lord; and I will cause thee to ride upon the high places of the earth, and feed thee with the heritage of Jacob thy father: for the month of the Lord hath spoken it." LATEST FOREIGN NEWS

San Francisco, Sept. 23, per barkentine S. G. Wilder.

UNITED STATES

United States Attorney Cole, acting under instructions from Washington, has dismissed the second libel against the Chilean steamer Itata.

Representative Hebrews from all parts of the United States met in conference in New York, and formed plans for the reception, placing and distribution of Jewish refugees from Russia. Refugees have been arriving at seaport towns on the Atlantic coast at the rate of 10,000 a month for nearly a year.

The hearing of the greatest will case known to the Massachusetts courts, a contest over \$30,000,000, began at Salem on Sept. 22. It is the will of the late Mrs. Hopkins-Searle of California. Mr. Searles agreeably disappointed the people who had only known him through newspaper portraits by his prepossessing appearance. His evidence occupied all the afternoon. He first met Mrs. Hopkins in San Francisco in March, 1883, when he went to her house with a letter of introduction to look over the place. The first proposition of marriage between the two came from Mrs. Hopkins in New York in the fall of 1883. Searles entertained the proposal not until December, 1884. In answer to a question he said he married Mrs. Hopkins for all she had, both love and money, but should never have married her for money alone. The hearing was adjourned till next day.

A WAREHOUSE SPEECH. The Paris Siecle publishes a despatch from its correspondent in Baden, giving the substance of a speech said to have been made by the Grand Duke at the close of the recent maneuvers of the Southwest Army. According to the despatch he said in part: "We must meet the future with energy and resolution."

"The time is near when Germany must again unsheath her sword in defense of her independence against an enemy who has not learned prudence by bloody defeat. It will be the duty of the valiant corps of Baden to support the first onset, to flee the first shot and carry the palm of victory." He referred to "the culpable proceedings of our neighbors, who are only awaiting a propitious occasion to again open an era of bloody conspiracy."

VIENNA, Sept. 22 - At a conference of the Austrian Cabinet, the Emperor Francis Joseph presiding, it has been decided to increase the military budget 6,000,000 florins and to strengthen the peace effective force of the Austrian empire.

LONDON, Sept. 22 - The Standard's correspondent at Sebastopol says: "A party of officers has been sent from St. Petersburg to survey the Crimea and prepare topographical plans for the War Department. This fact is intell. commented upon in military circles."

THE HAGUE, Sept. 22 - Minister of War Col. Bergansius proposes a period of enforced military service similar to that of other continental countries.

BALMACEA COMMITS SUICIDE. Ex-President Balmaceda of Chile shot himself through the temple in his room at the Argentine Legation in Santiago at 8:30 o'clock the morning of Sept. 19. Valparaiso was illuminated in honor of the fallen leader's suicide.

Balmaceda left Santiago on Aug. 29 in the hope of escaping from Chile, but finding every avenue of retreat cut off he returned, going direct to the Argentine Legation for refuge. After returning he was in an extremely nervous condition, and nobody, except the Argentine Minister and one other man who was devoted to the ex-President's cause, was allowed to see or talk with him.

The night before his suicide Balmaceda had a long discussion with the Minister about giving himself up to the Junta. A letter to the Argentine Minister left by the ex-President shows that he considered the feeling against him in all departments of the government, including the Judiciary, was too strong for him to expect any leniency. Balmaceda also left a letter to his mother, and a statement for the New York Herald. He said he acted during the last eight months in the conviction that he was right, that he sought to rescue his country from foreign domination and strove to make Chile the first republic in America. His enemies had charged him with being cruel. Circumstances, he said, compelled him to sanction certain acts, but many had deeds, that had been attributed to his orders, were never known by him until they had been committed.

Volunteer soldiers from a northern province threatened an outbreak in Santiago on the 22d. They made an outcry against being kept at Santiago and complained about their food. A serious disturbance was averted by the coolness and firmness of President Montt and Col. Camo, who promised to see the grievances of the soldiers redressed.

Balmaceda's death has tended to soften the measures adopted by the Junta in its conduct toward many of the supporters of the late Government who are still in hiding.

CHINA GROWING WORSE

A Shanghai despatch of Sept. 22 says: The situation here is much worse. Disorders are increasing at Ichang and this is the prelude to other disorders. The viceroy Yang-see-Kiang is in rebellion. Wu-

chang, the central seat of the Viceroy, is ready to revolt, and Hankow and Chanking are likely to follow. The latter town is difficult to defend by warships, owing to the shallowness of the river. Great excitement prevails. Strangers are fleeing from Shanghai, which is among the threatened towns, but measures of defense are being taken. Three ships of war are at Woosung and fleets are concentrating at Shanghai. Minister Lemaire of France has left here for Peking.

A despatch to the London Times says Sir George Grey, ex-Premier of New Zealand, is author of a proposition to be submitted to the House of Representatives, that a new upper house be formed in the government of New Zealand, to be composed entirely of women.

Santiago papers are attacking U. S. Minister Egan.

The Governor of Yemen and all Turkish officials have fled from Sana, Arabia, in consequence of an insurrection. It is feared the insurgents will march to Mecca and proclaim an Arab caliph.

On account of popular opposition, the Mexican Government has cancelled the concession to William H. Ellis and Henry C. Ferguson, to establish colonies of negroes from the United States in several States of Mexico.

LECTURE ON GOLD. A small but appreciative audience greeted Mr. F. M. English at the Y. M. C. A. hall yesterday evening. The occasion was a lecture by that gentleman on "The History of Gold as a Precious Metal." The lecturer traced the discovery of gold at 4000 B. C., and traced the metal through the different stages of the ancient world, connecting the ancient kings' thirst for gold with the ravages and disasters of olden times. He spoke of Spain as being the Eldorado of gold, and attributed the majority of the wars which occurred in that country as being directly caused by the craze for the precious metal. He spoke of the wars of Rome being almost exclusively for gold and treasures. He also cited evidence of gold mines abounding in Switzerland, Italy and even among the Alps, also of the river Rhine's yielding the precious metal. Gold had been the ruin of many a soul, and he gave statistics of crime in California about '49, which were directly attributable to the gold craze. The lecture occupied about three-quarters of an hour and was very interesting throughout.

TO CARRY THE ANIMALS

The Zealandia Chartered for the Trip to Australia.

The steamer Zealandia has been chartered to carry Sells Brothers' circus to Australia. It will be the largest party of the sort ever taken across the Pacific ocean.

Of course the steamer had to be altered especially for the trip, for elephants cannot be quartered in the cabin or the ordinary steamer freight accommodations. The hold of the ship will contain the tents and other such heavy paraphernalia, including the show wagons. The lions, tigers and other animals will have quarters built for them. The regular passenger berths will all be filled with the people connected with the circus. The advertised trip of the Zealandia between here and the Hawaiian Islands has been announced off, it being stated in the advertisement that the ship has gone to the dry dock for repairs. These are the alterations mentioned. - [S. F. Chronicle, September 19.]

LATER. The Chronicle of Sept. 23d states that "Sells Brothers' circus will be taken down to the colonies by the steamer Monowai on her next trip. The Zealandia, which is now repairing at little Main street dock, will resume her trips on the Honolulu route on October 20th."

The Queen vs. Mrs. K. Lazarus. Assault and battery. Appeal from Police Court of Honolulu. Rosa for defendant. The jury retired at 1:50 o'clock this afternoon, the examination of witnesses, addresses of counsel and charge of the Court having occupied the whole of this morning. Awaiting the verdict of the jury, the case of Lui Self, charged with maintaining a lottery, was brought up, but on the jury panel being exhausted another postponement was taken, in order that a drawing of postponement may be made.

FOOTBALL TEAM FOR AMERICA

Ted Sullivan has completed arrangements for a football team to be played in America by an English football team under the auspices of the Rugby Union. The English team will arrive October 25th and will first play Yale at the Polo grounds or Eastern Park. Then they will tackle in turn Princeton, Harvard and the University of Pennsylvania. Sullivan will next be visited and the Johns Hopkins played at Oriole Park. From here they go to Washington to play the Columbias, and thence to St. Louis, Chicago and Ann Arbor. From the latter city they go to Canada and then back home.

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SABBATH OR THE LORD'S DAY.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—

In fulfillment of my promise to Mr. Burgess I hereby give the following quotations from history which show beyond a reasonable doubt, that the Church of Christ in the days of the Apostles and from their time down to the present observed the "First day of the week" for religious worship and called that day "The Lord's Day."

In the work entitled, Ignatius ad Magnes, capp. 8, 9. Coteler, tom. ii. Ignatius, the disciple of the Apostle John, who lived and flourished for many years after the Apostle, writes:—"Be not deceived with heterodox opinions * * * if we still live according to Judaism we confess that we have not received grace. * * * If they then who were concerned in the old things, arrived at a newness of hope, no longer observing the Sabbath, but living according to our Lord's life." He calls Sunday, "The Queen of days."

The Jewish Talmud—The Abodah Zarah—that was written about the time of the death of the Apostle John, mentions "the Lord's day" and calls it "the Christian's day." * * * And in the same work, the name Nazarene or Christian, is defined as designating one of the followers of the man who commandeth that, "the first day of the week should be made a holy day for them."

In the epistle entitled "St. Barnabas," page 41, note 97 (this epistle written within 50 years after the Apostle John's death), he says:—"We celebrate the eighth day with joy, on which Jesus rose from the dead."

Justin Martyr wrote about 50 years after John's death. In his work entitled, "Justin Martyr, Apol. Prima, pages 97 and 98," he says, "on the day called Sunday is an assembly of all who live either in the cities or rural districts, and the memoirs of the Apostles and the writings of the prophets are read." He then describes their religious acts:—"Prayer—celebration of the Eucharist, Collection of Alms." * * * He describes the reasons for meeting on "the first day of the week." These are, "Because it is the 'first day' on which God dispelled the darkness and the original state of things and formed the world, and because Jesus Christ our Saviour rose from the dead upon it * * * therefore, it remains the first and chief of days."

Dionysius, Bishop of Corinth, 80 years after the death of the Apostle John, in a letter to the church at Rome, a fragment of which is preserved by Eusebius, the great historian, says:—"To-day we kept the Lord's day in which we read your letter." From Rel. Saere, vol. 1, p. 180, from Euseb. H. E. iv., 25.

Eighty-eight years after the Apostle John, Irenaeus, Bishop of Lyons, in a letter from the churches in Gaul, then under his superintendence, agreed upon a synodical letter to Victor, Bishop of Rome, in which these words occurred:—"The mystery of our Lord's resurrection may not be celebrated on any other day than the Lord's day, and on this alone should we observe the breaking of the Paschal Lamb." While tradition differs as to the yearly celebration of Christ's resurrection, the weekly observance of it is one upon which no diversity of opinion existed up to Irenaeus' time, A. D. 178, or about 88 years after John's death. See "Iron. Contr. Haer. iv., p. 16."

Tertullian, who lived in the second century, says:—"Sunday we give to joy. We have nothing to do with Sabbaths or other Jewish festivals." See "Tertullian Apol. chap. 39."

That masterly scholar, Origen, who wrote about A. D. 230, that is, about 140 years after the Apostle's death, says:—"It is one of the marks of the perfect Christian, to keep the Lord's day. * * * As for the Sabbath it has passed away, as a matter of obligation (as everything else purely Jewish has passed away)." See "Origen Contr. Ceis. viii., §22, tom. i., p. 758."

Cyprian, Bishop of Carthage, A. D. 253, about 163 years after the Apostle John, writes, and his letter is sanctioned by his 66 colleagues in the 3rd Council of Carthage. He says: The Jewish circumcision on the 8th day prefigured the newness of life of the Christian, to which Christ's Resurrection introduces him, and pointed to the Lord's Day, which is at once the eighth and the first. See "Cyprian Epist. LIX, page 98."

If these historians, bishops and ministers of all whom, except the Talmud, writer lived and labored in the cause of Christ within a period of 163 years after the death of the Apostle John, do not convince Mr. Burgess that he is gone away from Christ and Christianity, back into Judaism, by trying to keep Saturday for a Sabbath, then I will be compelled to believe that he prefers to hearken unto illiterate men—men who cannot read the scriptures in the language in which they were written. If desired, I am ready to give a score or more standard historians, all of whom corroborate the statements made by those above mentioned. In addition to these historians, all translators of the Bible—honest Christian men—and all Encyclopedias endorse their statements.

Mosheim, who is considered by the whole world as one of the best historical authorities, says:—"All Christians were unanimous in setting apart the first day of the week, on which the triumphant Saviour rose from the dead, for public worship. This pious custom which was derived from the example of the church of Jerusalem, was founded upon the express appointment of the Apostles, who consecrated that day to the sacred purpose." If the above will not convince Mr. Burgess of his error, he

would not be convinced even though the Apostle John rose from the dead and spoke to him.
