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THE COMING PACIFIC SERVICE.

Project of the Canadian Pacific Railway—First-Class Steamers and Great Expedition.

The London correspondent of the Auckland Weekly News, writing under date of October 19th, gives some particulars of the steamship service likely to be established shortly between Vancouver and Australia, with Honolulu as a calling station, as follows:

LOCAL AND GENERAL.

A Ministerial visit was paid on board the U. S. S. Dolphin yesterday. Tamasese and Brandeis are entered on the Hotel register.

Mr. Severin has a fine panoramic view of Honolulu, photographed from the lighthouse. He has also taken a group of officers and men of the U. S. S. Alert.

Mr. Peacock is distributing gorgeous calendars of the Fredericksburg Brewing Co. A locomotive with train is the most conspicuous object in a colored view of the company's premises.

After drill yesterday evening Co. B, Captain Fisher, Honolulu Rifles, held a meeting, when the idea of holding a company ball was discussed without definite action being taken.

The embarkation of a lot of mules delayed the Kinaiu more than half an hour in departure. They had fine bracing qualities, but were not match for the steam donkey pitted against them.

The Alameda carried hence a mail of 4,215 letters and 1,187 papers, and the Australia one of 5,351 letters and 1,868 papers. This makes an outgoing foreign mail within three business days of 9,566 letters and 3,055 papers.

Messrs. J. A. Dwyer and Charles Purdy have taken the job of repairing the barkentine Cathona, that put in here as a "lame duck" the other day. The work is such that it can be done while the vessel lies in the stream.

Mr. C. J. McCarthy and Miss Morgan will be married at the Roman Catholic Cathedral this evening. After the ceremony a reception will be held at the residence of the bride's mother.

Departure of the Adams. After a stay of twelve days in this port, homeward bound for San Francisco from Samoa, the U. S. S. Adams, Commander Leary, sailed at 5:15 p. m. yesterday.

The direct steamer Australia of the Oceanic line swung off from the wharf at sharp 12 noon on Tuesday for San Francisco. There were far less people leaving on this trip than has been usual during a year past.

SUPREME COURT.

January Term—Mr. Justice Bickerton Presiding. Tuesday, Jan. 15. The Court opens at 10 a. m. Foreign jurors in attendance. Recess from 11:05 a. m. till 1 p. m.

The King vs. Charley Bolahola, Hombreaking. Deputy Attorney-General Peterson for the Crown; defendant in person. Tried before the following named foreign jury: W. E. H. Deverill, G. C. Stratemever, G. E. Howe, J. H. Black, Hugh Gunn, Chas. Lucas, J. A. Spear, J. A. Hopper, A. Gillfillan, J. Welsh, J. W. Gibbs and C. Hammer.

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CHINA AND JAPAN—A CONTRAST. It is highly problematical whether the student, who, with extensive view, surveys mankind from China to Peru, will find two other countries, neighboring each other, which, though inhabited by people that in common belief belong to the same race—the Mongolian—show so many striking dissimilarities in character, manners, and customs, and who offer a more interesting subject for study, than is the case with China and Japan.

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JUDICIAL DECISION.

Mr. Justice McCully Decides for the Defendant in John F. Bowler vs. The Board of Immigration. The following decision was filed in the Clerk's office of the Supreme Court yesterday: John F. Bowler vs. The Board of Immigration. Before McCully, J., in Chambers. Rulings on the demurrer.

1. I overrule the first point, that the suit is in effect and fact a suit against the Hawaiian Government, brought without the consent of the Justices of the Supreme Court, the endorsement being a sufficient reason for this ruling.

2. I sustain the demurrer in the second point, that Henderson (master of bark Kalakana) should be joined as co-plaintiff. He is a party to the contract. It does not appear that he has not an interest in it, and that Bowler has the sole interest. It is not in the form of a charter party which the master has made for the owner. All the inferences are that Henderson has an interest therein, or he would not be joined in the contract.

3. I sustain the third point, that it does not appear from the contract that the Board of Immigration is a party, for it is nowhere expressed therein that the Board of Immigration enters into a contract. The sole color for bringing the action against the defendant is that L. Aholo describes himself as Minister of the Interior and President of the Board of Immigration, and proceeds thereafter as the party of the second part. It is not a contract by the Board of Immigration nor on behalf of the Board.

4. I hold pro forma that the Board of Immigration cannot be made a party defendant to a suit in assumpsit.

5. The whole record being brought before the Court upon demurrer, I hold upon a point not raised in the defendant's demurrer that this action in manner and form declared will not lie, because there is no agreement by the party of the second part to put any passenger on board the plaintiff's vessel. This specially meets the allegation in the second count of the complaint that the party of the second part agreed that there should be three hundred adult passengers placed on board. I must find the terms of the agreement in the written instrument on which the action is brought.

Judgment for the defendant. Appeal allowed by plaintiff. A. S. Hartwell and W. A. Whiting for the plaintiff; Attorney-General C. W. Ashford for the defendant.

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MARRIAGE IN EUROPE.

It Seems to Be Going Out of Fashion in England and Other Countries. The numbers who marry seem to be steadily decreasing. The figures supplied under the head of International Vital Statistics, which are tabulated from returns furnished by the authorities of various European States, show an all-round fall in the proportion of marriages.

The falling off in 1886 below the average of the twenty years, 1861-1880, is very marked, although not so great as the difference between the rate of 1866 and 1886. Here, for instance, are the three sets of figures:

There are three notable exceptions to the uniform decrease of the marriage rate, but they are easily explained. In Prussia, in Austria and in Italy the marriage rate of 1866 was distinctly below that of 1886. The secret, of course, is that in 1866 the three States were at war, and campaigns and matrimony do not go well together. Italy alone of the great European States keeps up her marriage rate. It averaged 15.2 for eighteen years; it was 15.6 in 1886. In this she resembles Sweden. But the other States show the same phenomenon:

These figures all point in one direction, and all tell the same tale. Europeans are not such a marrying people now as they were twenty years ago, and among the marrying peoples we are nearly at the bottom of the tree. The Irish marriage rate is in itself enough to account for much of the misery and unrest of Erin; and the Scotch rate is lower than that of any nation in Europe. Our marriage rate is now lower than it has ever been since 1838, when the statistics were first collected in a scientific basis. The average for quinquennial periods which fluctuated from 15.9 in 1838-40 to 17.2 in 1851-5 has gone down steadily since 1871-5, and is still tending downward. Another fact which no doubt explains one cause of the falling away in the marriage rate is that people, if they do not postpone marriage altogether, postpone it as late as possible. That is to say, an increasing proportion of the years of human existence are spent outside matrimony. The mean age has been steadily rising since 1873, and the mean age of 1886 is the highest yet recorded, being 28.2 for men and 25.9 for women. The average age at which the professional and independent classes marry is 31.22 for the man, 26.40 for the woman.—Pall Mall Gazette.

CURING A GROWLER.

Heroic Treatment Administered by a Chicago Newspaper Man.

I have a friend, an elderly gentleman—old enough to have become level-headed long ago, but he hasn't until lately—who has been always and forever growling at men and things. I hate a chronic growler as I do a barking dog. But this old friend of mine, much as he growls and snaps, never bites. One day last week he and I were trudging leisurely along on Dearborn street. "Do you know Jim Chards?" he asked. "Yes," I replied, "like a book." "Well, do you know he is the most uncomfortable fellow in all this town, for a man who is comfortably off?" "How so?" I asked. 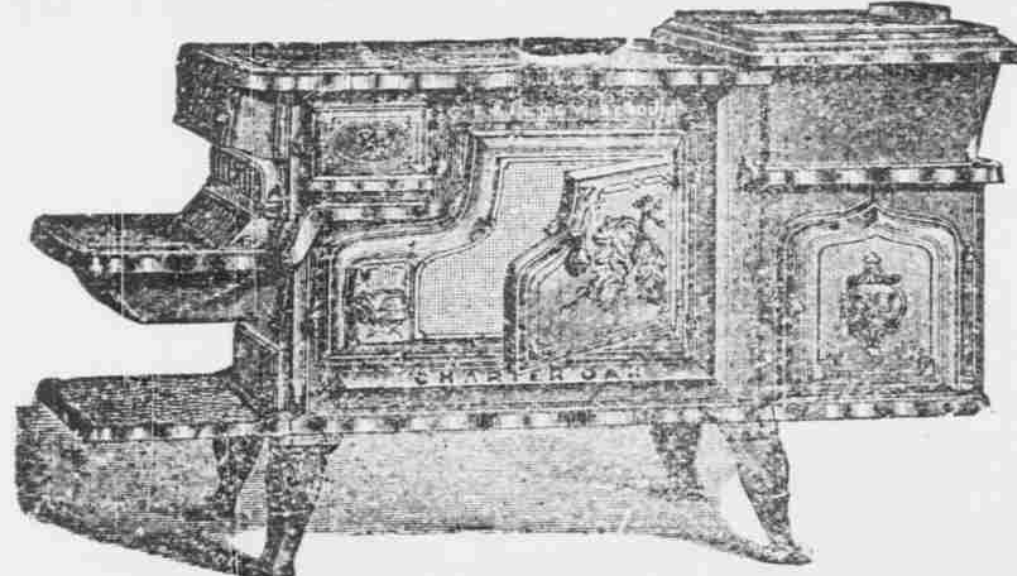

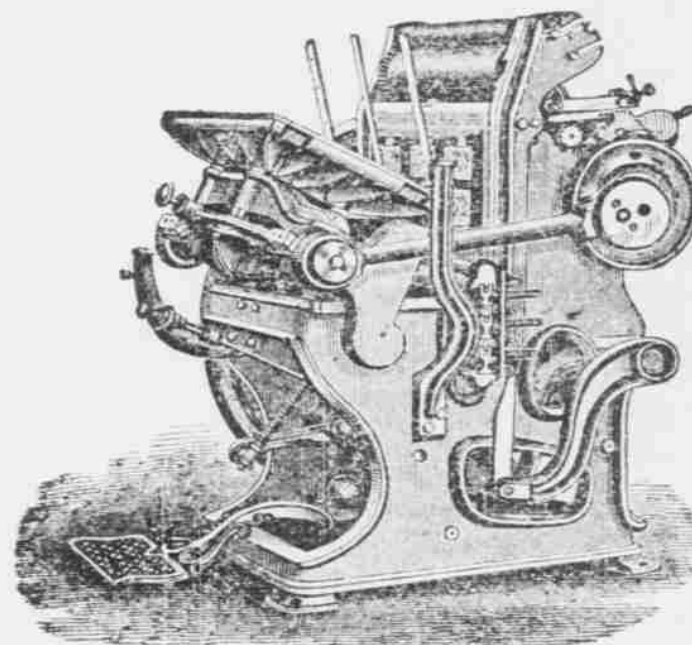
