CONDELMAN A. HARTWELL.—By the last mail news was received of the sudden death of this officer on the 10th of October, near San Antonio, Texas. He entered the military service as a 1st Lieutenant of the 11th Infantry, in August, 1861, was severely wounded and taken prisoner at Gettysburg, and in December, 1862, he was captured by the 7th regiment colored troops. He served with gallantry through the war, receiving honors on a number of occasions. For the past few years he has been serving on the plains, taking part in some of the Indian campaigns. At the time of his death he was the second captain of the 5th Cavalry. He was the only brother of our fellow countryman, Mr. A. S. Hartwig, who, in this severe trial, will have the sympathy of all. We quote the following touching tribute to the deceased from the "Army and Navy Journal": "As to the gallantry of this officer it is scarcely necessary to speak; it has been so conspicuously exhibited whenever the opportunity presented itself. He was also a time to organize and the maintenance of discipline prominently efficient; but his thoroughness in those respects was tempered with such gentlemanly consideration for his subordinates, that the strictness of the discipline lost all its sting, and made him the idol of his officers and men. He was a gentleman in the highest sense of the word, and as a friend, he was a warm and true one. There are many who mourn his loss—many whose memory he will never fade away—and whose sympathy with the bereaved wife and child is the sympathy of those who know the great worth of this fine officer and noble man."

Probable Election of Tilden and Hendricks.

(From the N. Y. Times, Nov. 8.)

The actual result of the election was in doubt last night, till a very late hour, though the early indications pointed clearly to the election of Tilden and Hendricks. Though there may be some mistake in placing the States—Wisconsin, for instance—it is clear that Tilden has secured a majority of the Electoral College, the Republican Committee at Columbus giving up the election about midnight last night.

In this light, it is still difficult to say how the canvass will result, though the Democrats claim 2,800 majority, and concede the defeat of Congressman Tilden.

The State will give a small Republican majority, and probably return a majority of the Congressmen.

COMMENTS OF THE PRESS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—The Tribune says: Tilden and Hendricks are undoubtedly elected by a fair majority of the Electoral College. They have probably carried the solid South, with the possible exception of South Carolina and Louisiana; have carried New York by over 25,000 to 20,000 majority; Connecticut by about 100 majority; Indiana by 10,000 majority. The vote of the Electoral College is likely to exceed 500. Hayes and Wheeler have carried all the New England States, except Connecticut; Pennsylvania and all the Western States, except Missouri. Their vote to the Electoral College will not fall short of 100; the Republicans claim control of the United States Senate, but their majority, which is now 15, will certainly be reduced to 10 and possibly to 6. The House of Representatives is in doubt. The news thus far received make it apparently Democratic by 18 majority, but returns are so incomplete that later information may increase this or give it to the Republicans by a small majority. Adams has no behind Tilden a little, and Rice is elected Governor by a vote slightly below that for Hayes. In New York, the Congressional delegation is substantially unchanged, with possible Republican gains of one or two. The returns from South Carolina, Louisiana and Wisconsin are in conclusive, and no news whatever has been received from the Pacific States.
