The Cloven Hoof.

The peculiar pedal formation of the missionary deity is, but too apparent in the list of members of the so-called Union party which was organized in the First District, last night. The *Tiser* prints the list, which shows a total of 78, and not one among them who is, in any sense, representative of the Hawaiian people, of the sentiments of the masses, or of any other element except the two factions of office-holders and "missionaries," shop-keepers reveling in the custom of the P. G.; office-holders, who expect to pocket a month's salary today; a few chronic applicants for government support, in default of ability to support themselves; that much-nursed ward of two governments,—Mr. H. W. Severance; old Pa Whitney, of the *Tiser*,—so feeble in everything except the making of fat government contracts; a few briefless barristers, the usual contingent of the Castle family, and some of the mounted Police and other "army men," complete the list.

It simply represents one of the perennial missionary schemes to capture a party organization, and retain control of it long enough to carry on the election, as was done in 1887.

The PEOPLE, and all who distrust missionary methods, as well as all who object to being used as cappers to retain in place an army of office-holders, in whom they have no personal interest, will do well to give the *Union Party* a wide berth.

Their Intentions.

It is now understood that the Provisional Government intends to play a smart game, and if possible repeat the 1887 racket. A constitutional convention will be called, but under somewhat different conditions as heretofore supposed. In fact the principle of 1887 will be adopted; that is a vote will be given to every man—except Asiatics—now in the country, if he will subscribe to an oath which pledges him to oppose any monarchical form of government, and at the same time insures his eternal support of the provisional government or its successors. It is easy to understand the motives which have lead our present rulers to adopt such a policy. The P. G. is virtually in the last ditch. The members of it realize the fact and they are willing to sacrifice their own ambitions designs if they thereby can block and defeat the object of the people—to wit, the restoration of the monarchy.

They are aware that a republic established by bayonets and against the will of the people will never be recognized by the Cleveland administration and they are also perfectly well aware that the displeasure of the United States Government will mean the abrogation of the reciprocity resulting in total ruin and financial disaster for the property-holders here.

By establishing a republic through a popular vote, they believe that they can command the recognition of all powers and the good will of the United States especially. They do not believe that anybody will look into the ways and means through which the vote was obtained, but that a claim of a popular ratification will suffice. Chief Justice Judd was asked by Mr. Blount if the constitution of 1887 ever was submitted to the people. Mr. Judd very ingeniously said that he considered it was. And as his reasons for this belief he advanced the idea that everybody who voted under the new constitution took an oath to support it,—and thereby virtually ratified it. Mr. Blount whose shrewdness and sarcasm are equally develop-

ed, then suggested that according to Mr. Judd's statement, the people had the choice of either ratifying the new constitution, or become disfranchised to which Mr. Judd said that such was the case. Now, they are trying to come the same dodge over again.

We can though assure our wise men and very learned politicians that the fraud is too conspicuous and that the scheme won't work worth a cent. It would undoubtedly be eminently satisfactory to Mr. Dole, and his satellites to be able to go before the American people and say, "Behold the error of your Cleveland, your Blount, and your Congress for let the people of Hawaii do not want a monarchy, but 13,000 voters have sworn allegiance to our republic."

The idea is good enough and we do not withhold our admiration for the shrewd schemer who is fathering it, but the fact is that the Hawaiians cannot be deceived any longer, any more than can the representatives of the American people. The Hawaiian nation wants self-government in any shape which suits the majority and they are not going to be cajoled or bulldozed into taking any oaths or accepting any conditions which virtually deprive them of the right to decide the future of their own and beloved country.

Something Rotten.

During former regimes the *Advertiser* and the Reform party were profuse in condemning and "showing up" the police and custom authorities and in a most reckless manner accusing them of corruption. Why is the morning organette so silent now? Why is it that the lynx eyed editor of that paper no longer quotes the price of opium, the amount of it in town, the sales of it, the drawings of Che fa and pakapio, and the misdeeds and criminal neglects of the officials supposed to prevent crimes and misdemeanors in the community? The reform party is now in power and as a consequence the missionaries will claim that all corruption has ceased and that the government is absolutely immaculate. But we ask how is it that opium today is more plentiful and much cheaper than has ever yet been the case? How is it that the new custom house officials have not yet made one single seizure although the price of the stuff and the few raids made by the police prove that the contraband article passes through the gates and under the very noses of the Collector General and his employees? While the guards display great activity in opening the hand-bags and trunks of passengers by the steamers, and while they with owl-like wisdom unpack and scrutinize every apple, peach or pear imported—and then eat most of them,—they never happen to come across the packages containing opium. We do not know if this is due to corruption or to the inability and ignorance of the present guards, but the fact remains that the town is simply flooded with the drug and that, since the P. G. got into power, there has been imported enough opium to supply the Chinese here for more than three years to come at a very moderate price. The police force is no better than the custom officials. An occasional raid is of course made, and one or two tins of opium seized or a few Japanese hauled up for gambling, but the big games are running with more impunity than ever, the opium joints are in full blast, and every conceivable kind of vagabonds, and vagrants are infesting the town. Marshal Hitchcock who is about the poorest official which we ever have had devotes his time in listening to the dilapidated spies who stuff his ears with the most impossible yarns and make the poor gullible man see conspiracies and smell treason in every corner and in every house. If the government ever expects to gain the respect leave alone the confidence of the community they should begin to eliminate politics from the administration and look forward to an efficient and honorable execution of the old laws.

Unappreciated Royalist Art.

The following designs for the new issue of Hawaiian postal stamps was picked up near the Post Office evidently blown out from the waste basket. It is a pity that it was not accepted. It seems to us that it would have been a vast improvement on the stamps which are now offered for sale.

Dear sir:—In compliance with your call for designs for an issue of P. G. Postage stamps we beg leave herewith to submit the following. In the event of our suggestion being contemplated in a jocular vein permit us to say that it appears to us no less so than the illegal conditions which called forth your advertisement.

ONE CENT STAMP.

A large soup tureen bearing the legend "Mulligatawny" with the initials P. G. on either side. Figures denoting the value of stamp on each of the four corners. Color: yellow ochre, indicative of the kind of soup.

TWO CENT STAMP.

A P. G. guardsman (save the mark!) in a retreating posture on right side of stamp, with a large hob nailed boot occupying the centre of the design, in the act of kicking him off the picture, and it is to be hoped, the face of the earth. Color sky blue pink.

FIVE CENT STAMP.

A large "all seeing eye" in centre of design with the initials P. and G. on either side. While the monosyllable resulting from this combination was accidental to the designers.

TEN CENT STAMP.

A well fed porker, couchant, with initials P. G. upon either flank. Puzzle: Find the pig's eye. Color: indicative of a deep dark brown taste in the mouth.

TWENTY-FIVE CENT STAMP.

A sinking ship, disappearing stern foremost in the turbulent sea of public opinion, name P. G. on bow of ship, numerous carpet bags floating upon the waves indicative of the nature of the present so-called government. Figure head of an Hawaiian Neptune in a doleful attitude on bow.

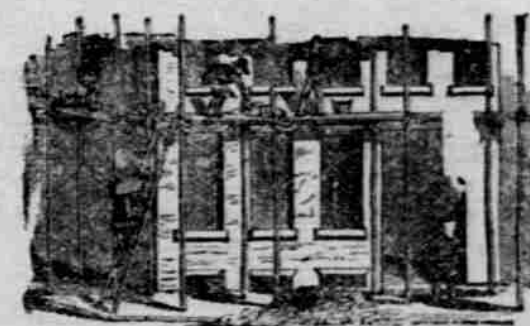
