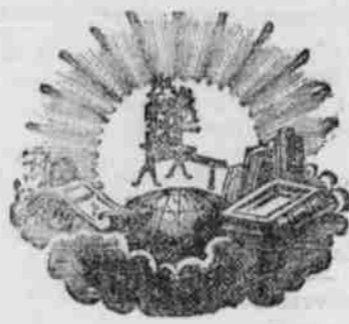

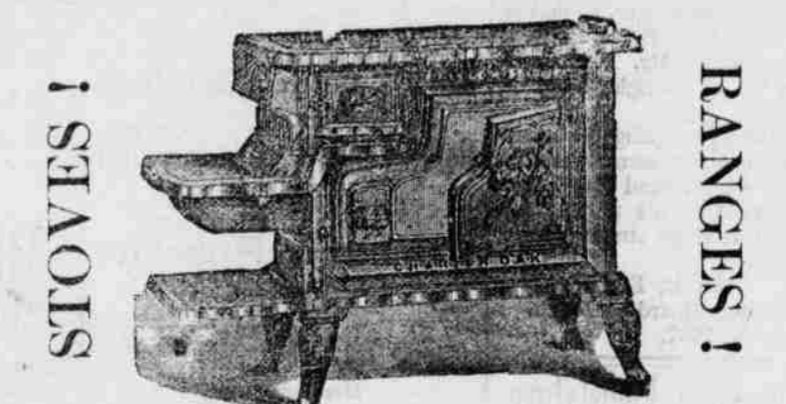

A DIFFERENCE.

In most countries with an elective Parliament and a Ministry responsible to the electors through their parliamentary representatives, the difference between a Minister in his ministerial capacity and the same person as a private member of that representative legislative body, is pretty clearly understood by all intelligent persons who take an interest in public matters.

ANOTHER SPECIMEN.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—Being on the best of terms with the "Gazette" and its sentiments, I yet would beg leave to ask the editor of that paper if he has not overstepped the bounds of discretion in attacking and ridiculing the contributors of your paper, by stigmatizing their productions as containing stilted and cloudy rhetoric.

MR. MAGFARLANE'S LETTER TO THE MINISTER OF FINANCE.

HONOLULU, December 2, 1887. SIR: As the time approaches for the transmission of the Hawaiian Government bonds to London, I beg to state to you that I had perfected arrangements with the U. S. Collector of the Port at San Francisco, with Messrs. Wells, Fargo & Co., and with the Hawaiian Consul-General at San Francisco, to forward said bonds by express directly to London. The expense of forwarding the same will amount to from \$40 to \$50.

"Scio" is not voicing the hard fought for new Constitution if he calls men, who might differ from him, upstarts, and hints that they are his inferiors, and have come to worry him with an underhanded meaning on his part that they have no such rights. If, I as a contributor to your paper am meant as being one of "THE BULLETIN'S" irresponsible syndicate of constitutional advisers, or, if, I am meant to write "inspired" articles for your or any other paper, permit me to tell this self assuming "Scio" that I am quiet responsible both legally and privately for my actions, and further that their is not money enough in Hawaii to inspire me or to influence me to adopt the principles of any clique, party or political section beyond my own religion, and that is, my conscience, my honor! Can you honestly say as much Scio? Surely, I am voicing the sentiments of this superior personage if I ask that gentleman in all his bristling superiority of rank, power and everything else "except brains" to look into this little matter of \$71,000 which our infallible King "accidentally" appropriated to himself, and thus help the "upstarts" to reap some benefit through this kindly swindle by the superiority of "Scio's" brains!

THE PREMIER AND THE FINANCIAL AGENTS.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—I was glad to see that Mr. Green had somewhat changed his "base" in regard to "our financial agents," as your reporter informs us in your issue of yesterday evening that he now sees the advisability of having an agent, whom we can trust, appointed in London to investigate the enormous charge of £15,000 made by these gentlemen. A charge which they do not and will not explain or produce a single item for.

I think Mr. Green at last "has smelt a rat," or, in plain English, suspects or is certain that an attempt at rascality has been made by persons whom I will not name, but whom everyone conversant with this loan business knows, and I am indeed glad to see him put his foot down in the manner he has done, as it fully bears out my high opinion of this gentleman, whom we have all known for years and whom we have always considered to be like Caesar's wife—"above suspicion."

Mr. Editor, is it a fact that the chairman of the committee on bonds has received a communication from Matheson & Co., of London, repudiating all knowledge of this charge of £15,000, and advising him that this was an improper charge, and also informing him that Mr. Abraham Hoffnung had drawn money from them on account of his also being a financial agent?

Mr. Editor, is there any law in the land for punishing people for "attempting to obtain money under false pretences?" If a man is caught with his hand in the till of the BULLETIN office, wouldn't you give him in charge of the Marshal in quick time? Then what about a man being caught attempting a steal on our public treasury?

Why is no explanation given by "our agents" as to making out the first set of bonds at 48d.? Is it not a fact that Mr. Kanoa knew no more about exchange and finance than Mr. John Wright's Holstein bull "Thoreau," and that the agents knew that they had a different man to deal with in Mr. Green, and consequently they assumed the air of "sweet simplicity," and changed the bonds, merely remarking that they didn't mean anything and it was "absurd" that anyone should for a minute think they did?

Hawaiian Government. No one else but the issuing house, Matheson & Co., can procure the stamping of the same at Somerset House, and without the stamping and registering there they are valueless. I beg further to state to your Excellency, that upon the delivery and stamping of the bonds and the closing of this transaction Mr. Armstrong, who was personally entrusted with the direction and supervision of all proper expenditures connected with the placing of the loan, will render to you a full account of all expenditures incurred in the matter, with the vouchers for the same.

It may not be necessary for me to add—as you are doubtless aware of the fact—that all Wells, Fargo & Co.'s express matter is carried and delivered simultaneously with the mails, and this medium will ensure to His Majesty's Government the safest and most rapid delivery of the bonds in London. I have the honor to remain, Sir, your most obedient servant.

EMERSON, President Board of Health. December 3, 1887. The Hawaiian Legislature. 24TH DAY.—FRIDAY, Dec. 2nd. AFTERNOON SESSION.—CONTINUED. Third reading of an Act to indemnify the Minister of Finance. Mr. Townsend said he wished to have some explanation in regard to the item of \$12,200 Makiki claims. Minister Thurston then gave a brief account of the claims from beginning to end, with which Mr. Townsend said he was fully satisfied.

heretofore discharged and performed by the Governors. On motion of Mr. Smith the fifth paragraph in section 2 was stricken out. The bill then passed third reading as amended. The House then adjourned to 10 o'clock Saturday morning.

25TH DAY.—SATURDAY, Dec. 3rd. MORNING SESSION. The House opened at 10 A. M. President S. G. Wilder in the chair. Mr. Helekunihii presented a petition from Makawao, praying that parties who are pronounced lepers only, be sent to the leper hospital, and that Dr. Iwai be appointed physician to Kakaako. Referred to Sanitary Committee.

Mr. Townsend reported from the special committee on military, that they had framed a new bill, embracing the most salient points of the two bills, which they present to the House for their consideration with the other two bills. Mr. C. Brown stated that he should not sign that report, he had been asked to draft a bill which he did and presented it to the committee, and supposed that it was accepted. Subsequently, the committee had a secret meeting, and he was not notified of such meeting, and the first thing he knew this new report was thrust in his face for his signature.

The report was received and laid on the table to be considered with the three bills. Mr. Castle reported from the committee to whom was referred the resolution in regard to liquors taken from the Custom House free of duty. That they have made some examination of the subject matter contained in said statement, sufficient has been learned to enable the committee to report and make recommendations looking to a correction of the evils therein exposed to the light. The statement shows that the amount of duties re-imputed covers ales, wines and spirits to the amount of \$39,795.89. Adopted.

Mr. Townsend reported from the committee to whom was referred various bills relating to the funeral of Princess Likelike, recommending the payment of certain items not to exceed \$10,000. The House adjourned until 10 o'clock Monday morning.
