The mass meeting the other evening was as complete a fiasco as though the hose of the fire company had been turned on the fiery orators, instead of upon an oil can on King street Bridge.

The morning after Rep. R. W. Wilcox's inflammatory remarks in the House, he asked the Attorney-General why there had been an extra supply of police at the Station during the mass meeting the evening before.

The Bulletin published yesterday evening three sensational columns devoted to the supposed sayings of Admiral Brown to a correspondent of the Examiner, and to the comments of the Bulletin correspondent upon them.

Even if Admiral Brown had said just what the Examiner puts into his mouth, it would simply show that he believed Bush and Wilcox would try to do what they have the hardihood openly to say they will.

THE POLICE FORCE.

The committee to which the item for pay of police was referred, have reported, recommending a considerable increase in the force, which will involve an increase in the appropriation of about \$60,000.

A CURIOUS POSTAL REPORT.

The Post-Office Committee, whose soul and leading spirit is Rep. Marques, made another attack upon the Postmaster-General yesterday morning, in the shape of a pretended report.

as to the way in which the committee propose to do the work of the Post-Office. Clearly the next best thing to being Postmaster-General yourself is to be chairman of a committee which claims to be postmaster. The honors are "easy."

The report referred to contains among other curiosities an investigation of the friction alleged to exist between the Postmaster-General and his subordinates.

These are surely matters for legislative investigation, if ever any such there were, and they are earnestly recommended by the committee to the prayerful consideration of the House.

A Voice from Hawaii.

Mr. Editor: Once in a while, a friend sends me a batch of Honolulu papers, in which there is an everlasting yelping about "the missionaries" doing this and doing that.

There's the Bulletin that's run by a pack of Englishmen, and the Elele by an Irishman, and Leo Lahui by another Irishman, and they're all the time cussing Americans under the name of "missionaries" in every paper, and trying to make the kanakas believe that we want to steal the country and make slaves of them.

Rep. Brown presented report of special committee on the bill to amend the law of corporations. The present bill enables any body of persons not less than five, to incorporate without requiring the permission of the Minister of the Interior or any Government official.

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THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

Seventy-Seventh Day.

FRIDAY, Sept. 12. House met at 10:20 A. M. Prayer by Chaplain. Minutes of preceding day read and approved.

Rep. Kahookano for the Judiciary Committee reported on the petition asking that the Cabinet be composed of two foreigners and two Hawaiians, recommending that it be indefinitely postponed.

The committee also make certain recommendations regarding other petitions.

Rep. Marques for the Post Office Committee reports that it has examined each of the clerks separately, and has come to the conclusion that the cause of friction between the Postmaster and the clerks is the well-known violent temper of the former and his propensity to use profane language.

Rep. R. W. Wilcox said a great many of the Hawaiians had understood a part of its great length, that it be not read, but translated and printed.

Portuguese immigration has been discontinued. It is not best to bring into the country Japanese on the one hand, and to give to this Legislature to pass the necessary legislation to introduce Chinese under restrictions, and for this Government to negotiate a convention with China to carry out this object.

We find that during the past five periods the amounts appropriated by the Legislature for the encouragement of immigration were as follows:

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for 1890. There were 1,210 less Chinese employed on the plantations January, 1890, than in January, 1888. All classes of labor engaged on plantations decreased during the last period, except Japanese. That is to say, there was a decrease in the number of Hawaiians, Portuguese, Chinese, and S. S. Islanders employed on the plantations from 1888 to 1890.

There is a greater demand for laborers in the country to-day than there was in 1888, notwithstanding that the Board of Immigration placed on the plantations during the last period 7,527 laborers, and since then 1,064, making a total of 8,591. This demand for labor is due to the expansion and increase of the operations of plantations already existing in the country.

Not only the projectors of all these operations, but every man or woman who employs a cook or yard man, every mechanic and tradesman in the country, is interested in there being an ample supply of the lower classes of labor. It is estimated that an additional 20,000 to 30,000 laborers will be required during the present period for plantation purposes, and if 4,600 laborers—the number that left the plantations last period—leave that service there will be necessary to introduce about 10,000 laborers the present period.

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He did not know what was the right place. Rep. Kapaehaole said there were about thirty acres at Kamalo where natives were planting cane. They had decided a piece of land to the Government there, and on this land they wanted the Government to dig a well. There was a good deal of land at Kamalo which would be cultivated if there were water.

Rep. Brown did not approve of the government doing this. The parties who would get the benefit of the water ought to sink the well themselves. All the wells on Oahu were dug by private persons. There was plenty of water there for washing and drinking purposes.

Rep. Kapaehaole said the rule laid down by the hon. member was very well if it were consistently applied. \$60,000 had just been passed for immigration; who would get the benefit of that? The planters. If it was wrong to help the planters to water, it was to help them to immigrate. Why did the hon. member vote a large subsidy to the Oahu R. R. & L. Co.? The speaker saw himself no harm in the government sinking a well.

Noble Widemann would like to ask the member from Molokai a question or two. Where was the well to be dug? (Rep. Kapaehaole—On a piece of land at Kamalo.) The same place as the former well? (That was something for the Minister to decide.) There was no reason why work on the old well should have been dropped merely because there was a stone in the way. Under the circumstances, the people themselves ought to do something. At Kahuku and Honouliuli they always get flowing water. He had bored a dozen wells himself, and never got any flowing water yet. He was making a note of the government would like to help them go down a moderate distance.

Noble Pua said Rep. Brown did not believe in helping these people to dig a well. Yet, as in that case, the House passed \$10,000 to help coffee growing. He would favor paying for the well if water was struck, otherwise nothing.

Noble Cornwell would favor the well if there was any government land there to be benefited by the well, otherwise not.

Noble Isenberg moved it be \$2,500, with which an experiment could be made.

The motion to pass at \$5,000 was lost. Rep. Kapaehaole moved \$3,000. Noble Isenberg withdrew his motion. Passed at \$3,000.

Noble Pua moved to insert \$848.25, claim of Wong Ching Sam for road work. The committee report was read, recommending that a part of the claim should be read.

Minister Brown moved the item be struck out. The road had been built by a Chinese on his rice mill, where it stopped. Next year he would want the government to build him a new mill. He thought it was an outrage.

Noble Pua said the idea was to extend it to the road leading to the Insane Asylum.

Rep. R. W. Wilcox favored the item, and thundered a little against the Ministers.

Noble Widemann asked over whose land the road was built. Rep. Brown said there was formerly a path there. This Chinaman got some land up there, and in order to be able to convenience and profit, he built this road. He did not take his neighbors into consideration. If anyone who builds a road for his own convenience can come into the House and get paid for it, we shall have everybody in the country building roads and coming here to get paid. If it were proposed to deed all the land over to the government, and put the road under control of the Minister, it would be a different thing. The report of the committee tells us to guess at the amount to be given. If giving nothing at all.

Noble Widemann said twenty-eight years ago he lived at Kalapahau, where the Insane Asylum is. I used to come to the town through the taro patches. I did not like the road, and I sold out and came to town. I didn't go again until I went for the Legislature, I think, and I went in a carriage.

Rep. Cummings was acquainted with Achi's land. He built the road over his own land, at his own expense. The Chinaman has merely added to this road. If we pay the Chinaman we shall have a claim from Charlie Achi. This is merely a resolution of Noble Pua's. There is no petition. It does not look right.

Noble Pua was stirred to great eloquence by the false notions of Rep. Cummings, but his remarks were not translated.

Noble J. M. Horner began to be excited. He saw money in it. He had built a long piece of road on the plantation. It cost \$5,000. There were three or four miles of it, and everybody travelled over it because it was better than the Government. He should put this at \$10,000, and get the Government to buy it. Just the thought of it made his pocket feel heavy. He had built about twenty miles in California a long time ago. Would that come in? It seemed to him that claims like this were very improper, but he would make one too if the Legislature pass this.

Rep. Kahookano moved \$400. Rep. Nawahi said he understood that the report recommended payment of the whole claim.

Rep. Halstead moved to pay \$100. Rep. R. W. Wilcox said this was merely a claim for building the road. Anyone who had not been paid could still close the road.

The item was struck out. Minister Brown moved the committee rise. Carried.

The committee reported and the report was adopted. Noble Marsden moved to adjourn until Monday.

Noble Isenberg protested. Noble Widemann said there was a good deal of committee work still out. Rep. Kapaehaole rose to a point of order—this motion to postpone to a certain time was not debatable.

The President ruled that a motion to adjourn to a certain time different from that fixed by the resolution, was debatable.

Rep. Halstead wanted the extra time for the Opium Committee. He belonged to this Judiciary arrangement, and the new chairman would not be so idle as the old one. Rep. Kapaehaole had been. The House adjourned at 3:40 P. M. till Monday.

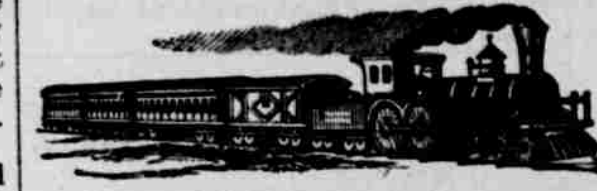

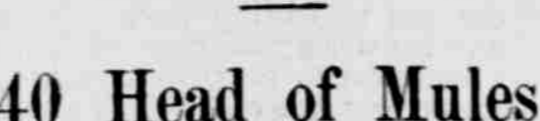

DICKENS AND FORSTER. How the Latter Meddled With All the Great Novelist's Affairs. It is hard to understand how Dickens put up with Forster. The great novelist was a good man of business, even before he came in for the inestimable privilege of Forster's guidance; but after the "arbitrary" person took him in charge he was always treated as a more or less helpless infant, and he accepted the situation with a comical patience that was all his own.

Forster interfered in Dickens' literary affairs, in his monetary affairs, in the minutest of his social affairs, and in most of his family affairs. How the incubus was endured none can tell. Sometimes Dickens objected, and told his mentor some salutary truths; there then ensued a quarrel of some duration, and a good deal of verbal sparring by no means light in character; but in the end Dickens' real esteem for his beardless friend's sterling character always caused him to relapse into amused tolerance.

One example of Forster's colossal capacity for meddling would be reckoned incredible, had not so many people been present when the "arbitrary" philosopher made an exhibition of himself. At a somewhat large dinner party Dickens happened to mention that he had five children. The meddler could not miss the chance, so he shouted: "No, you have not! You know you are wrong by one. You have only four living."

This tremendous piece of impudence was doubtless uttered with a purpose; it meant: "You may think that there are some matters which you can decide without my assistance, but I assure you that you are quite wrong." Dickens smiled and said, mildly: "My dear Forster, you must really allow me to know something on that point."

We should think so, and we should have thought that the polite astonishment of the assembled guests might have curbed the exuberance of the inflexible meddler; but he seems to have gone on gaily to the bitter end, and he closed the proceedings by writing a biography of Dickens which may be better described as "The Autobiography of John Forster, with Incidental References to Charles Dickens." So strongly did this most heroic of meddlers wish to thrust himself forward that he compelled those who loved Charles Dickens to publish a collection of beautiful letters which proved that our great man did not depend, as it were, for the breath of life upon the active and commanding Forster.—Frank Leslie's Magazine.

The People of Bulgaria. In 1887 the population of Bulgaria amounted to 3,154,375, or 31 inhabitants to the square kilometer. The population of the principal communes was distributed as follows: Philippopolis, 33,412; Sofia, 30,428; Rustchuk, 27,198; Varna, 23,256; Shumla, 23,161; Slivno, 20,893; Zagora, 16,039; Tatar Bazarjik, 16,659; Nidine, 14,772; Plevna, 14,307; Sisto, 12,482; Silistria, 11,414; Turnova, 11,314; and Cautendji, 889 inhabitants. As regards nationalities, the population of 1887 was composed as follows: Bulgarians, 2,326,260; Russians, 1,069; Servians, 2,142; Turks, 607,319; Greeks, 68,338; Jews, 23,540; gypsies, 60,291; Geras, 2,247; French, 444 and 860, 074 persons belonging to other nationalities.—Science.
