ELECTRIC RAILWAY BILL.

POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE
MINISTER OF THE INTERIOR
CONCERNING IT.

Style of Rails to be Used and Hours
of Traffic—Repairs to Road-
way and Track.

(Continued from July 8.)

Section 20. The Company shall at all times, during the construction of such tracks or railway lines, or the erection of such poles, or the laying of such wires, and during any repairs or alterations of the same, take due and proper precaution for the safety of foot or other passengers along said streets and roads, or any of them on which such construction, alteration or repair is being performed.

Section 21. All the works necessary for constructing and laying down the several railway tracks, shall be made in a substantial manner, according to the best modern practice, and under the supervision of the Minister of the Interior or other officer duly appointed.

Section 22. The tracks shall conform to the grades of the said streets, or roads, on which they are laid down as furnished by the Minister of the Interior, or other officer as aforesaid, and the Company shall not in any way change or alter the same without the written consent of the said Minister or other officer.

Section 23. The location of the line of railway in any of the streets or roads, shall not be made until the plans thereof, showing the position of the rails and other works in each street or road, shall have been submitted to the Minister of the Interior, or such other officer, as may be appointed for that purpose, for his approval.

Section 24. The Minister of the Interior shall have the right to take up the streets traversed by the rails, either for the purpose of altering the grades thereof, constructing or repairing drains, or for laying down, removing, or repairing water or gas pipes, or electrical conduits of any kind, and for all other purposes within the province and privileges of the said Minister of the Interior, without being liable for any compensation or damage that may be occasioned to the working of the railway, or to the works herein contemplated, but the said Minister shall, nevertheless, replace and put in good order and condition as before such removal and displacement any and all the tracks, poles, wires, or works belonging to the said Company, which the Minister of the Interior may at any time cause to be removed or displaced; and if not so replaced and put in good order and condition by the said Minister of the Interior, within a reasonable time, with due regard to the completion of the work that may be in hand by the said Minister of the Interior, the said Company may cause the same to be done at the expense of the Government.

Section 25. The style of rail to be employed by the Company, in constructing and laying down the several railway tracks, shall be such as is used in the best modern practice in the United States of America, and subject to the approval of the said Minister of the Interior, or other officer appointed for that purpose, as to the manner of laying the said rails.

Section 26. The executive council may make reasonable and just regulations, with the consent of the Company, regarding the hours during which the cars shall run on the said streets and roads; and the fares to be charged and collected by the said Company, for the carriage of passengers over the Company's lines.

Section 27. Before breaking up, opening or interfering with any of the said streets for the purpose of constructing the said railways, the said company will give, or cause to be given to the said Minister of the Interior, at least thirty days notice of their intention, and that no more than 1500 feet, on any one of the said streets, shall be broken up or opened at any one time, and that when the work thereon shall have been commenced, the same shall be proceeded with steadily, and

without intermission, and as rapidly as the same can be carried on, due regard being had to the proper and efficient construction of the same.

Section 28. During the construction of the said railways, due and proper care shall be taken to leave sufficient space and crossings, so that the traffic and travel on the said streets, and other streets intersecting the same, shall not be unnecessarily impeded, and lights be kept burning, or watchmen be provided and kept by the company, when and where required, to prevent accidents to the public.

TWENTIETH DAY.
Proceedings at Monday Afternoon's Session of the House.
In the House of Representatives yesterday afternoon the following joint resolution was received from the Senate and referred to the public lands committee:
"Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Republic of Hawaii that the President of the Republic be requested to appoint a commission to consist of three civil engineers to inquire into and report with all convenient dispatch to the Legislature of the Republic of Hawaii as to the feasibility of making a new road over the Nuuanu pali, and its probable cost."

On motion of Mr. Pali, section 42 of the Electric Railway bill was reconsidered, for the purpose of restoring the provision for exemption from taxation.
Mr. Winston moved the term of exemption be two years.
Mr. Rycroft opposed the concession, saying it would cut only a small figure with a rich corporation.
Mr. Robertson supported a motion by Mr. Pali for four years' exemption. The railway would cause the building of houses, and the Government would get more than it gave.
Mr. Kamaoaha favored exempting one-fifth of the capital stock.
Mr. McBryde supported exemption for two years.
On vote the term was fixed at two years. Third reading of the bill was set for Thursday.

The alcohol bill passed second reading, to be read a third time on Thursday.
Mr. Robertson's bill to prohibit the sale of goods by traveling agents, outside of the district in which the firms employing them were licensed, came up for second reading.
Mr. Richards opposed the bill as one to throw the entire country wholesale trade into the hands of two or three firms, shutting out the smaller firms that had established connections in the outer districts.

Mr. Robertson replied that the intention was to put an end to the pernicious business of drumming. It had been drawn at the request of small merchants. The big firms were now selling contrary to law. If \$500 was not high enough for a license fee, let it be placed at \$1000.
Mr. Richards, as one who was conducting a small country business, opposed the bill because it would give a few houses in Honolulu a cinch on the traveling trade. These houses could well afford to pay \$5000 to secure the exclusive right.

Mr. Robertson said that if the bill would not effect its intention, he did not desire its passage.
On motion of Mr. Hanana the bill was indefinitely postponed.
Several bills were referred to appropriate standing committees, and at 3:25 the House adjourned.

AUDITOR GENERAL'S REPORT.

Considerable of meat for legislative digestion is afforded by the report of Mr. H. Laws, Auditor General, to the Legislature of 1895. In the introductory paragraphs he pays the following compliments to his predecessor, Mr. George J. Ross:

"I cannot refrain, however, from favorable comment here, on the systematic and accurate methods in vogue by my predecessor as regards the recording and filing of vouchers and statements which constitute the records of the Audit office, and on the courtesy with which I was introduced by him to my new and strange duties, and made acquainted, as far as it was possible in two or three interviews, with their nature; in confirmation of this system and accuracy, I have only to state that I have not found it necessary to make any radical changes in the routine work of the office."

Upon a careful examination of the biennial statement of the Minister of Finance for the period ending March 31, 1894, and the statement for the nine months ending December 31, 1894, the Auditor General finds that they agree with the records on file in the Audit office. He could not find, however, any record of approval by the Auditor General of vouchers covering expenditures for expenses of the Legislature of 1892, for which there were appropriations amounting to \$42,000. He had been informed that the Legislature regarded it as only necessary to have payments of its expenses approved by its own finance committee. This he holds to be in direct disregard and disobedience to the language of the Audit Act.

The Auditor General reports that the sworn statements of "public accountants," the only means of his becoming officially cognizant of the revenues of the Government, have been as a rule made with promptness and regularity. But some instances have occurred nearly every month, where it has been necessary to return these statements on account of errors and omissions. District magistrates are the most frequent offenders in this respect, they being with few exceptions unable to make correct returns or to appreciate their necessity. These blundering statements take up time of the Auditor General in correspondence to correct them which might be employed to more valuable purpose. In the matter of vouchers for expenditures the official has little of which to complain. Original vouchers for traveling expenses, express and horse hire, etc., are insisted upon where they can be secured.

Complaint is made of the large proportion of expenditures not subject to audit, which are permanent settlements, salaries and road taxes in the outer districts. These exemptions amounted in the twelve months ending March 31, 1895, to \$605,219.35 out of a total expenditure of \$1,778,976.73, or 34 percent of the whole. The Auditor General describes the duties of his office as at present conducted. Among other things he checks vouchers signed by Ministers or heads of bureaus, although such checking is not a part of the Auditor's duties under the Act. Yet he frequently finds

errors in vouchers notwithstanding that they are presumed to have been carefully computed and checked by clerks in the various departments and bureaus. This fact he says "is a proof of a laxness in the performance of clerical duties in this regard in the different branches of the Government service." The Auditor General brings up practically the question that arose between Minister of the Interior Thurston and Auditor General Ross in 1889-90, namely, as to whether the responsibility for expenditures rests with the Minister or the Auditor General. He thinks it should be vested in his own office according to his understanding of the Audit Act, saying, in another connection, that, "instead of performing the functions implied by his title, his time and attention are mainly taken up with the work of a mere checking and correspondence clerk."

Mr. Laws formulates a comprehensive scheme for the re-organization of the Auditor General's Department. It is in brief to make that official the head of all the actual financial transactions of the Government, according to the system in vogue in State and county organizations of the United States. So that he may give personal supervision to a uniform accounting in all the departments and bureaus, he would have a deputy appointed to attend to the office details now performed by himself, also two or three checking clerks. It is his opinion that the additional machinery and expense would be compensated for by the simplifying of the accounting work in the departments and bureaus.

In the event of the pressure of matters of immediate and urgent necessity precluding the passage of a law at this session covering the points suggested, the Auditor General urges that the whole matter be referred to a commission to report at the regular session in February next. All thoughtful persons will probably be of opinion that so important a measure ought to be given ample consideration, and that the Legislature should only deal with it at this session to the extent of appointing a commission.

OBSERVATIONS.

By the financial returns for the quarter ending June 30, published by the Registrar of Public Accounts, the receipts are shown to have been \$398,076.90, and the expenditures \$476,665.43. This leaves a cash deficit of \$78,588.53. As \$98,400 was borrowed under the loan acts of 1892 and 1893 and the treasury note act of 1894, the treasury has gone behind, deducting \$600 national debt falling due, to the amount of \$176,388.53. The treasury balance on March 31 was \$200,532.99, and on June 30 \$121,944.46, showing a reduction of \$78,588.53.

JUSTICE BICKERTON ILL.

His Place Temporarily Filled on the Supreme Court Bench.

First Associate Justice Richard F. Bickerton of the Supreme Court has been lying dangerously ill at his residence for several days. After the Court had adjourned nearly a week on account of his poor health, Justice Bickerton appeared on the bench Wednesday of last week, when the Court heard argument in the appeal of Young Tree, reported in this paper under the heading, "A Question of Blood." After that he had to take to his bed again, and now the gravest fears are entertained for his recovery. His place on the bench is occupied by Judges Whiting and Cooper, according to which of them the appeal in a given case is assigned.

Now that the excitement of hearing the annual screeches of the great American and small Hawaiian eagles has died out and people have got tired of talking about the dressing down that the great Joe Cook received at the hands of Minister Willis and have settled down to their usual avocations again, it is time for us to do a little business ourselves. One thousand dollars in nickels was received here on the last steamer.

The Hawaiian band will play at the hotel tonight instead of Thomas Square.

The government band gave a concert at the Executive building this morning.

Larsen's Express seems to be doing a good business in carting away garbage.

The Hotel street entrance to the Executive building grounds is being graveled.

Levey held a big sale of household furniture at his auction rooms this morning.

H. F. Wichman, the Fort street jeweler, expects a big lot of goods by the next Australia.

The Portuguese kids at Ewa plantation are playing ball. They may send a team to town one day.

The ten-oared barge race which was declared off on the Fourth of July will be rowed on Saturday afternoon at 5 o'clock.

The prayers of the chaplains of both Houses of the Legislature were accompanied by the music of the band this morning.

Emmeluth's pineapple canning factory at Ewa is about ready for operation. It is in a large iron building close to the railroad.

It is said the house of Representatives will refuse to pass any appropriation bills until their own salaries are paid. The law allows them to draw their money every twenty days, but owing to some formality which has to be complied with first none was forthcoming today.

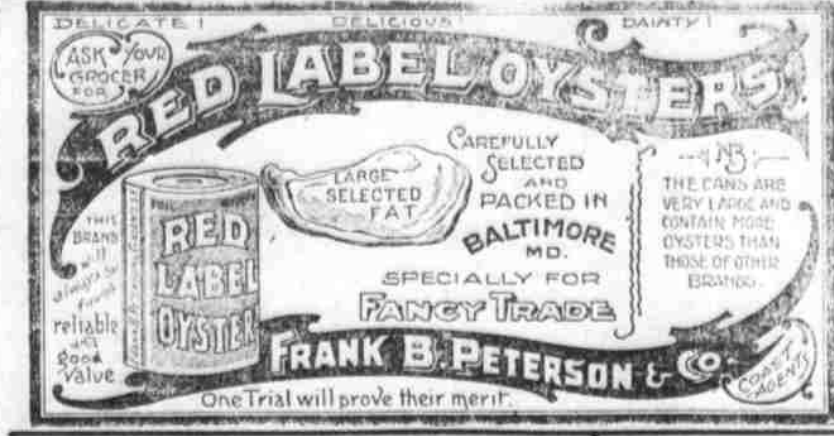
LATEST BY THE COPTIC.

TWO HUNDRED BUILDINGS BURNED IN SAN FRANCISCO.

Russia and Japan May Fight—Eighty Thousand Troops Concentrated at Vladivostock.

At 6 o'clock on the evening of June 27th, a fire started in San Francisco in the rear of Carriek, Williams & Wright's box factory, on Fifth Street, between Bryant and Brannan. By 6 o'clock the two blocks bounded by Bryant and Bluxome, Fourth and Fifth streets were reduced to piles of glowing embers. Then, to complete the ruin, the fire jumped Fourth street, fanned by a stiff breeze, and licked up the western half of two blocks divided by Brannan, between Third and Fourth. Fortunately the breeze which prevailed during the hottest part of the conflagration died away, or more of the town would have been swept. The water pressure was not sufficient for the drain made upon it by the full complement of engines, and in some places the fire was left to burn itself out. Everything possible was done by the department but the blaze was too fierce for the fighters.

After destroying two complete blocks with the exception of the northeast quarter bounded by Fourth and Welsh streets, the destruction continued across Fourth street. It ravaged a strip half a block in width south to Townsend from Brannan and north to Welsh, a small thoroughfare between Bryant and Brannan. To the east, midway to Third, the progress was checked by the brick wine vaults of S. Lachman, on Zoe street, below Brannan. On the upper side the new Mechanics' Hotel and a Chinese wash-



house headed off a further advance at Freelon street.

It was the worst fire in years and one of the most stubborn the firemen have tried to handle. The dry wooden buildings were like so much kindling wood and tall, three-story frames were snapped up in an instant. But one brick structure stood in the path of the devastating element, and that was St. Rose's Church on Brannan, near Fourth. The church was only partly completed, but was destroyed along with the rectory and schoolhouse. Several hotels, lodging-houses and a hundred or so humble homes were swept out of existence during the three hours the fire raged.

Six firemen were killed at Minneapolis by a falling wall.

Prof. Eaton of Yale, an eminent botanist, died June 29 in his 61st year.

Prof. Thomas H. Huxley, the famous English scientist, died June 29.

Yale defeated Harvard in the Varsity race at New London by ten lengths.

The new yacht Valkyrie was beaten in her maiden contest by the Britannia.

The cruiser Olympia averaged 20 knots under natural draught on her final trial.

There was a failure in launching the yacht Defender at Bristol, R. I., owing to the ways sticking in the mud.

Dr. Robert W. Buchanan was electrocuted in New York on the 1st for the murder of his wife, of which he was convicted on April 26, 1893.

China still stands Russia off in treaty negotiations. Russia has requested the government at Peking to put an end to delays and tergiversation.

Judge Ross has sustained Mrs Stanford's demurrer, and the great case against her is practically ended. It is held that the Central Pacific stockholders were agents of the United States.

Congressman Livingstone has returned from a trip to Venezuela bringing maps showing that the British claim Venezuelan territory on seven different lines of survey.

Walter R. Lamberty, defaulting clerk of the Oakland Police Court, who ran away to Honolulu and returned, has been sentenced to five years in San Quentin.

The large Pacific squadron of Russia is scattered along the coast from Vladivostock, with some vessels at that port, the squadron being thus divided to prevent anyone getting an idea of the exact point where the greatest naval strength is combined. There are 80,000 troops quartered at Vladivostock.

Almost three entire blocks covered with dwellings, lumber yards and expensive manufacturing plants went up in smoke. Over two hundred buildings in all were wiped out of existence, entailing a loss of over \$1,000,000. Insurance \$250,000. No lives were lost but several casualties were reported.

The London Chronicle says a more audacious piece of nepotism was never perpetrated than that in the formation of Lord Salisbury's Cabinet. The Premiership, the Secretaryship of Foreign Affairs, the leadership in the House of Commons and the Irish Secretaryship are held by members of a single family, while an Under-Secretaryship is held by Lord Salisbury's son-in-law. Gerald Balfour's appointment as Chief Secretary is a calamity for Ireland. He is a brother of A. J. Balfour, First Lord of the Treasury.

THE CUBAN REBELLION.

Regia, across the bay from Havana, is under martial law.

Preparations for reorganizing the provisional government are being made.

Cuban insurgents burned the town of San Geronimo and captured its garrison of Spanish troops.

It is reported the Cubans expect three torpedo boats from France, and not until their arrival will the Cubans begin what is intended to be their most effective work.

A large quantity of explosives has been shipped on the steamer Earwood at Philadelphia for Marshal Campos, Captain General of Cuba. When the Spanish consul protested, a permit from Campos was produced.

Victories on both sides are reported from Cuba. In Puerto Principe the Cubans were beaten by the Spanish. The Spanish cruiser Magallanes drove rebels out of Marabi, a village at the eastern end of Santiago de Cuba.

Private advices received at Tampa, Florida, say General Campos is preparing a conveyance loaded with poisoned food and cartridges without powder. His idea is to let the Cubans capture the stuff and eat the poisoned food.

General de Quesada has issued an address on behalf of the Cubans to the American people. He says they are fighting a system of infamy and oppression. They are fighting the Spanish troops, not the Spanish people, and they find American sentiment with them.

A gentleman who came from Havana to Key West, Florida, by steamer says the island of Cuba is ablaze with the revolutionary fever. Gomez is marching on Havana at the head of 8000 well-drilled troops. He surprised and routed 1500 Spanish troops at Alta Gracia and burned that town.

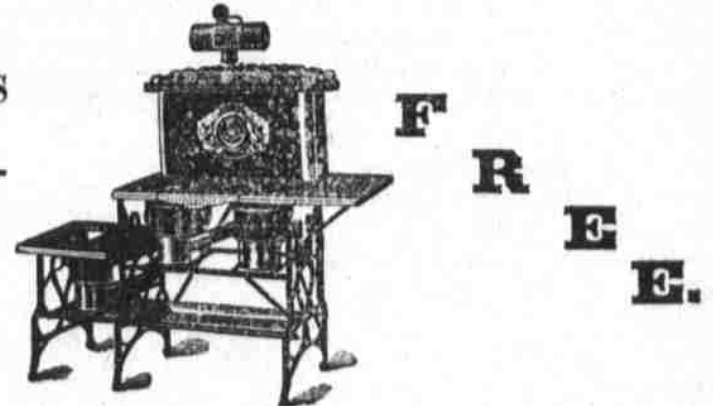
