WARRANT OUT FOR WALLACH'S ARREST

Complaints Made By Pinkham And Parker

Wallach will be arrested this afternoon on two charges, both of practicing medicine without a license. Both of the usual summons were sworn to this afternoon, one by President L. B. Pinkham of the Board of Health and the other by Captain Parker of the police.

WHEN GASOLINE IS NOT GASOLINE

Delicate Question Of Law Decided By Supreme Court

Gasoline is not a component part of gasoline. Such is the decision of the Supreme Court in the "gasoline case," known on the calendar as the case of the Territory versus Sing Yuen.

The matter was argued before the court yesterday by Deputy Attorney General Whitney for the Territory and C. L. Clemens for the defendant. The court decided right off the bat that the Territory had no case and that Thompson's office boy might sell Thompson all the gasoline he pleased and Thompson's stenographer would have no justifiable ground for preferring a complaint against him.

So everybody is happy—the Standard Oil Company because it can now sell all the gasoline it pleases; the Deputy Attorney General because he lost his case and hence can still continue to run his automobile, and the Supreme Justices because they, too, own automobiles—at least, two of them do—and they did not have to rule themselves out of their cars and onto the street cars.

The court held that the question had already been decided in the case of the Territory versus Fernandez. The selling of turpentine was the matter at issue in that case, instead of gasoline, but the principle holds good. The law prohibits the storage of liquid of which the component part is gasoline, but as gasoline itself is gasoline, the court held, could not be a component part of itself.

SHIP ASTRAL HAS RECORD VOYAGE

Makes Distance From "Fifty to Fifty" In Nine Days

Captain Jonathan W. Dunham, with the good ship Astral, arrived here yesterday afternoon from Norfolk, Virginia, after a trip that almost broke several records for a sailing vessel around the Horn. The Astral was 42 days from New York in the Equator, and nine days from "fifty to fifty." The best time heretofore between fifty and fifty has been in the neighborhood of eleven days, but every condition

GREAT FUTURE FOR HAWAII, SAYS ROSSI

Well Known Wine Grower Discusses Conditions As He Sees Them

COUNTRY IS TOO WARM FOR GRAPES, HE THINKS

Pineapple Industry Promises Great Things, But the Transportation Problem Must Be First Solved

P. C. Rossi, president and manager of the Italian-Swiss Colony, the big wine company of California, who, with his family, is in Honolulu on vacation, called on Governor Frear yesterday, together with President Pinkham of the Board of Health, in regard to the proposition of San Francisco that the lepers of that city be allowed to be sent to Molokai.

When asked about the conference, after leaving the executive chamber, Mr. Rossi said that nothing definite had been done. "The subject, as I realized when I accepted the mission, is a delicate one," he said, "but San Francisco is not trying to dump her unfortunate onto Hawaii. We realize that the lepers of this Territory have a little Paradise of their own over on Molokai, and if we can make arrangements to send our own unfortunate over there, we will be willing to offer liberal compensation to the Territory."

"I am acting purely from the dictates of humanity. Lepers are sick people, not criminals, and we want to do the best we can for them. Over

Garbage Grab Is Defeated

It is now fairly certain that the garbage grab, which was sprung at the last meeting of the Board of Supervisors, has fallen through. It is reported on good authority that Supervisor Frank Archer has seen the error of his way, and that he will vote against the resolution to separate the garbage department from the road department. Archer has explained that he was not thoroughly conversant with the situation at the last meeting, and that he has since then secured information which has convinced him that the separation of the two departments would not be for the best interests of the County.

When Archer leaves the quartet which fought for the resolution at the last meeting, the rest of the clique, namely: Harvey, Fern and Cox, will form the minority instead of the majority, as was previously the case. As Keolaha, who was absent at the last meeting, is strong in his support of the attitude taken by Dwight and Justice against the separation.

It was also reported this morning that Frank Harvey was likely to change his attitude. Harvey, when seen, said that he would not change his vote on the resolution. He added as a qualifying clause, however, that if figures should be shown, which would show that the separation of the two departments would involve an additional expense for the County, he would vote against it.

TWO SURVIVORS OF SHIP PRUSSIA HERE

On Astral Is Pair Of Men Wrecked On Bare Coast

FOUR WEEKS WITH NOTHING TO EAT

E. E. Ranney and Herman Haena, With Eleven Others, Only Survived the Terrible Experience

Four weeks on a bare, bleak, rock-bound coast, with nothing to eat save the leathery hides of two seals and the occasional limpet or sea-fish that could be caught with the bare hand, the story of E. E. Ranney and Herman Haena, two sailors who arrived here on the Astral, rivals even that of the terrible tale told by the survivors of the abandoned ship Eclipse, which is still fresh in the minds of all Hawaii people.

It was on the bark Prussia, bound from Norfolk to Bremerton with a cargo of United States coal, that these two men, along with the rest of the crew and the officers, had their never-to-be-forgotten experience. The vessel had had a very good passage from Norfolk, until they arrived at a point a short distance from the Straits of Le Maire. Then one of those terrible storms, storms such as go down in history as the most havoc-wreaking and death-dealing of their kind,—was encountered, and the vessel was blown from her course.

It was impossible to tell exactly where she was or where she was headed, and in the blackness of night,—it was twenty minutes past twelve, June 19, 1907,—the fact was discovered that the vessel was in some kind of a bay or harbor. The wild, cruel surf, beating against the rocks, could be heard, and those on the ship knew that they must get away or the ship, and themselves probably, would be smashed to atoms before long. Every attempt to head the ship around proved futile. The action of wind and wave were far too strong for mere sail and rudder.

And finally, with a roar of triumphs,

PINEAPPLE LAND TO BE DISPOSED OF

Government Will Sell Several Right - Of - Purchase Leases

Governor Frear announced this morning that about five lots of land, suitable for raising pineapples, at Paumotu, are to be disposed of soon under the right-of-purchase lease clause of the land laws, preferably to American farmers, of whom he understands there are several in town looking for land. Paumotu is between Waimea Gulch and Kahuku. These lots average about 100 acres each, though not all of land suitable for pineapple growing. They are cut up by gulches and much of the land is not cultivable.

These leases are for 21 years. The purchaser pays only eight per cent. per annum of the purchase price, as rental, being obliged to maintain his home on the premises from the end of the first year to the end of the fifth. Before the end of the third year he must have at least five per cent. of the land under cultivation; at the end of the fifth year not less than ten per cent., with not less than ten trees per acre growing. Any time after the third year, the lessee shall be entitled to a patent conveying to him in fee simple the land upon his paying to the Government the appraised value of the premises. If he has resorted to cultivation 25 per cent. of the premises and has resided there on two years.

Seven or eight lots of mixed land at Kenai, between Makahu and Makua, this side of Waialua, are also to be disposed of. They contain 40 to 50 acres each.

WILL APPEAL TO FREAR FOR HELP

Rapid Transit patrons from Kaimuki, Palolo and Beretania street held a meeting last evening to discuss ways and means of securing an improved car service on the Beretania-Kaimuki line. The committee which had been appointed to handle the matter, reported through W. M. Minton, who stated that it had secured from Governor Frear the promise that he would not approve of the present service before the committee had had a chance to present facts and figures.

W. L. Howard presented some data which he had obtained from the Rapid Transit Co., which showed that the company was making only \$2000 a year on the line, and that it must lose money in case it improved the service by placing extra cars on the run.

L. A. Dickey explained peculiarities in the R. T. arithmetic. He said that while the company figured that it cost it \$700 a month to run a car, this figure included fixed charges which had already been paid, and the actual running expense was only \$300 a month.

Ashford went even further in an attack on the peculiar financial methods of the company, stating baldly, among other things, that the concern had watered its stock in order to hoodwink the Government in the matter of taxes.

H. F. Dillingham took the point of view of the railroad and corporation man. He spoke of the great boon which the company had been to the community, and advised that more could be done by approaching the company in a friendly manner than by taking the matter to the courts when it would perforce have to take the defensive.

It was decided to appoint a new committee jointly representing Kaimuki, Beretania avenue and Kinau street.

TELEGRAPH BREVITIES

Nichols Pickard, arrested at Monroe, Tex., and taken to Iowa for the murder of Williams Leets twenty-nine years ago, has been found to be not the man wanted. He has started for home with \$199 and a ticket furnished him by a son of the murdered man.

The first report of the receiver of the Jewelers' National Bank of North Attleboro, Mass., shows the liabilities of the bank on the books as \$799,721. The assets at suspension were \$912,822, of which the receiver estimates \$624,344 as good.

Officers have been sent from Marion, Ill., to the mining town of Bush to quell any disturbance that may follow an outbreak of Italians against Americans. A dispute between an Italian miner and a mine superintendent started the trouble.

For the first time in twenty-five years a woman has been convicted of arson in New York. Mrs. Angie Ackery was found guilty of setting fire to an apartment building in a tenement district in Brooklyn.

It was announced at an alumni banquet in New York that \$50,000, needed to obtain the gift of \$50,000 by Andrew Carnegie, for the Illinois College at Jacksonville, Ill., had been raised.

William J. Bryan and Judson Harmon were given an enthusiastic reception in Birmingham, Ala. Mr. Harmon was introduced as "the next vice president."

District Judge George M. Bourquin at Butte, Mont., has approved a loan of \$200,000 by Edward Crelchion Largey to the State Savings Bank, a suspended "heineze institution, to resume business.

Heirs of Louis Peralta are again trying to get title to the sites of the cities of Oakland, Berkeley, Alameda and thousands of acres of rich California land under alleged treaty rights.

It is said that a bill will be introduced in Congress soon providing that the government shall furnish rifles to school boys who wish to learn to shoot.

It is announced that the anthracite coal interests are considering the maintenance of present prices instead of "making a cut of 50 cents a ton April 1.

The position of superintendent of the Carnegie Institution's southern observatory has been offered to Astronomer R. H. Tucker of the Lick Observatory.

Luther Burbank has made an attack upon the report made by the Department of Agriculture upon the use of caeli for feed.

A war between Prof. Jacques Loeb and English biologists over the permeability of cells by salts and ions and water is in progress.

King Alfonso of Spain was nearly killed recently by a bear which he thought had been killed.

Liquor men of Minnesota met in Minneapolis and formed plans to stem the tide of legislation against saloons. The German-American Alliance of St. Paul has started a campaign to give cities and towns larger control over the liquor traffic.

It is announced in New York that W. D. Haywood, who was acquitted on the charge of murdering ex-Gov. Stonewall Jackson, will be the candidate of the socialists for president.

Spain has decided to stand by Abdel-Aziz as the recognized sovereign of Morocco, regarding Mulai Haifi as a pretender.

It is announced in New York that the Vaudeville Comedy club and the "White Rats," both organizations composed of vaudeville performers, will unite to oppose the threatened cut in salaries.

Replying to President's Roosevelt's criticism of his best-trust decision, Judge Humphrey said: "There are many citizens whose action is such that they at least allow us to believe that they expect the judicial department of the government to be run in accordance with public sentiment."

The Western Stock Show Association is considering plans for a stadium and sheds for quartering animals at Denver, the whole to cost \$200,000.

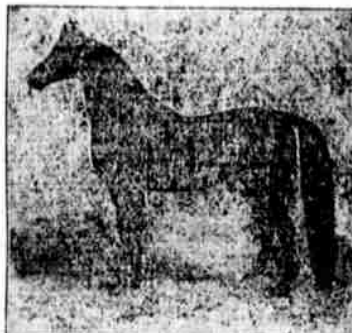
