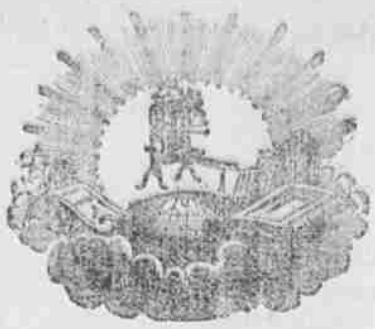

LILUOKALANI EDUCATIONAL SOCIETY.

Our one point of objection has been and is, that the projected Punchbowl hill road is a luxury which the public finances are not in a condition to afford at present.

be prosecuted. Not so with the proposed road to the top of Punchbowl. Nobody lives there, and nobody need go there unless they choose. To be sure, if a good road existed many would go for pleasure and recreation, and probably the writer would make one of the many. But the roads of the city most of us have to use daily, whether we will or not, and some of these are badly in need of attention.

ANNEXATION.

Hereunder we publish from the Boston "Advertiser" of Dec. 6th an editorial article concerning the annexation of these islands to the United States, which will set tongues wagging, no doubt, and, it may be, cause serious reflection in more quarters than one.

Our advices from Hawaii show that elections were duly held in Honolulu and other places in that island kingdom for President of the United States, resulting by a very close vote in the choice of Harrison.

The elections were due we suppose partly to sheer love of amusement, but mainly to the fact that American residents enjoyed the opportunity to make political speeches and banter each other about the candidates to their heart's content, as well as if they were on their native soil. We believe the same thing was done in Honolulu at the last presidential election, so that it has no political significance.

REPLY TO "AN AUSTRALIAN."

EDITOR BULLETIN:—My communication in the BULLETIN of the 18th inst. has received critical attention both in the "Advertiser" and the BULLETIN. The comments in the former journal were evidently written by someone who knows nothing of Australian matters; but to some extent, it is otherwise with the writer in the BULLETIN, and I can only reply to the latter.

"An Australian" begins his letter in the usual Hawaiian style of calling his opponent ignorant; but the epithet is so common-place that I need not throw it back. In his second paragraph he denies that Fiji and New Zealand are Australian Colonies, but says they belong to Australasia. Every school-boy knows that Australia and Australasia are synonymous terms—a matter of twaddle and twaddle. If he means that the word Australian only relates to the larger island, usually called the "mainland" of Australia, then Tasmania is not Australian; nor any of the islands that are more or less near the mainland coast. Fiji is, properly speaking, in Polynesia; but in grouping the British colonies of these seas it is usual to speak of

them as the "Australian colonies;" and the British naval squadron, cruising around these dependencies, is always spoken of as the "Australian squadron," not Australasian; because the shorter word expresses the same idea. New Zealand was, less than fifty years ago, a dependency of New South Wales, an Australian colony.

Australian's next paragraph states that I "seem not to know that Western Australia and Fiji are not constitutional but crown colonies." If he will refer to lines 6 and 7 from the top of my letter he will find that I expressed this fact very plainly. Paragraph 4 of your correspondent's letter states that I imply that the government of Queensland objected to the appointment of Sir Henry Blake because he had been a draper's assistant, and not a nobleman. There is no such idea expressed in my letter further than an opinion that such a reason was possible, but I distinctly stated that "the text of the objections had not been published," and that therefore the true reason was unknown.

Paragraph 5 relates to the veneration (not craving) of Australians for lords as governors. This proposition Australian says is "absolutely false." In matters of opinion, such as this, I can only re-affirm my former statement against his dogmatical contradiction.

Paragraph 6 states that Australians "have long had home-rule with all its freedom and responsibilities, excepting protection from a foreign foe." It is pretty cool for Englishmen to be told by an Australian that the mother country has nothing to do with Australia further than to "fork out" millions of treasure to afford them the needed protection. The facts are, however, that the mother country has still an Imperial control of all matters relating to Australian legislation, and appoints a viceroy or governor to each of the colonies to see that nothing is done in opposition to Imperial interests. These governors, appointed by the British government, have full power to nullify all acts of the colonial legislatures, or to submit the measures for Imperial sanction before he attaches his signature, without which no legislative enactment can become law.

The re-ins of power are thus in the hands of the British-appointed governors; and if this is "home rule with all its freedom" I fail to see it. At the same time the colonies with constitutions have restricted home rule, and its character was explained in the first paragraph of my letter. In the last paragraph of "An Australian's" letter he denies that the Australian immigrants "are nearly all from the British Isles," but he admits they are mainly from thence. I am surprised, considering the tone of his letter, that he even makes that admission. He asserts that in South Australia "immense tracts are occupied entirely by Germans, and that Danes and Norwegians form an important element of the population." I deny that there is any truth in these assertions, and I make the counter assertion that in South Australia the Germans do not exceed 5 per cent. of the population; while in all the Australian colonies combined, the three nationalities named do not exceed in number 3 per cent. of the total inhabitants. In influence or wealth they are very far short of 1 per cent.

The absence of convenient statistical information, that is reliable, gives "An Australian" the advantage of making the wildest kind of assertions regarding his country; but I hold that a visitor to Australia, who goes for the purpose of seeing and knowing the conditions of the country, can arrive at truer conclusions and form more correct impressions of the Australian regions, than can an Australian native of similar intelligence. The stranger has the power of wider comparison, while the native can only compare one part of Australia with another. I am sorry that "Australian" does not have a better knowledge of his country than he seems to have. A. B.

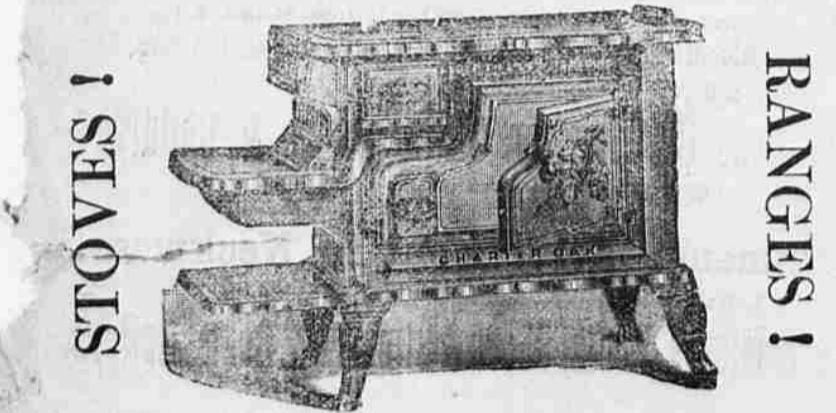

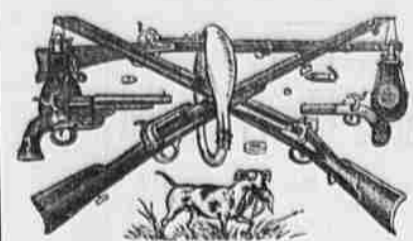
