The letters of Mr. Davies and an anonymous correspondent to-day cover ground that was necessary to be covered for the true information of the American Government and people.

Mr. W. H. Corawell desires an emphatic denial put on record of the statement in the Star that he held a royalist loan and addressed the company on Maui. He has not given a loan there for years. It is another lie.

"Confusing the issues," as Mr. Davies puts it, is the main reliance of the anti-national revolutionists. There is no relation whatever between the Queen's wrong stop and the offer, without any consultation of the people at large, to cede the islands to a foreign power.

And the P. G. is to have another minister extraordinary at Washington. Of all men, P. C. Jones is the one selected. He will be the right man in the right place to establish an entente cordiale between the P. G. and the United States administration. How he will make Cleveland's big cheeks wreathe in smiles by his repetition of that little joke about the three R's that put him in power, and the other three R's that are going to impeach him, which Mr. Jones got off at the mass meeting the other night!

There is not the slightest doubt that Republican wire-pullers in the United States are egging the Hawaiian revolutionists on to extremities, so as to make political capital against President Cleveland's administration. These offers of armed support from Maine to California, mentioned in the P. G. papers, are part of the game. The President has gone too far in the direction of doing justice to an outraged friendly though weak nation to turn back. The people he is befriending have full faith, also, that Congress will support the President in right-doing.

From its futile biting at the royalist file, the Star viper has taken to stinging the hands that have cherished it thus far. Friday evening the Annexation Club's organ made a bitter attack upon Mr. S. M. Damon, Minister of Finance, because he declined to be dictated to by the Maes and the Times of the club and its sister society. This sort of thing will show the American administration, the American Minister here and the American people—better than anything the opponents of the revolution can put forth—what class is behind the sandbags of the P. G.

It is bad for the P. G. cause that its leaders are so far sundered by mountain and sea that they cannot get their heads together before any of them opens his mouth. Were it otherwise, we should not have the spectacle of Thurston contradicting Stevens, and giving amended versions of the true history of the January revolt. Where the P. C. A.'s history gave 1200 at the January 16 mass meeting, Mr. Thurston multiplies even that stretched estimate by two and carries 600! It is noticeable here in Honolulu that the P. G. organs have not yet published the evidence on which Secretary Grosvenor's letter was based. This is so they can go on with their lying that it was royalist evidence, when the fact is the letter quotes the highest P. G. authority and official correspondence and memoranda of Minister Stevens, Mr. Dole and the committee of safety.

Some Lies of the Citizens' Protest.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—The clique of aliens, who call themselves simply "citizens," because they have no legal claim to the title of "Hawaiian citizens" nor "American citizens," as they are a conglomeration of Portuguese, Germans, Scandinavians and Irishmen, headed by some renegade sons of missionaries, have been heard from, in an attempt to bully the American government. Abroad, they have naturally depended on a campaign of lies to carry out their bold attempt at pirating this country away from its legal owners, the aborigines; and they would have succeeded, had it not been for the admirable integrity and impartiality of Commissioner Blount. However, lying abroad is easy, when contradiction is difficult and slow, and when such arch-liars as Thurston and his worthy accomplices, are daily concocting new misrepresentations. But it was hardly expected that the same policy of lies would be attempted even here, on the spot, where everyone knows better. Yet this is what has been boldly done in the monumental "Citizens' Protest," a document published by the Advertiser without signatures, probably because the signers would be ashamed to own their participation in it; and it may be interesting to point out some of the misrepresentations of this document.

It is a lie that on the 11th of January, the constitution offered by the Queen as a modification of the revolutionary one then in force, would have "disregarded and annulled the rights of Life, Liberty and Property, guaranteed by the previous constitution." The only change contemplated was to regulate the right of suffrage, now unjustly discriminating against the natives in their own country, through the "bayonet" modifications of 1857. The protesting citizens never saw a copy of this proposed document; what impudence is theirs to presume to say what its contents were!

It is a lie that on the same day, the legal Hawaiian Government was incapable of controlling the "element of anarchy intended by the Queen," as she did not contemplate any anarchy; if she had, the "citizens" would not now have been alive to protest.

It is a lie that the legal Government, on the same day, was incapable of "preventing mob violence or keeping public peace." There was no disturbance of the peace, no mob disorder contemplated, no violence outside of the conspirators acting at the dictation of the arch-conspirator and pirate Minister Stevens.

It is a lie that, at the public meeting on the 17th (the aliens' meeting), the self-appointed Committee of Public Safety (all foreigners) were empowered to proclaim a new Government and make a rush for annexation. I, for one, was present at the meeting, heard every word there pronounced, and have a collection of all the documents published on the matter, and one assertion is undeniable, viz., that the only thing granted by the meeting to the Committee was "to take measures to obtain and secure guarantees for a better government," nothing more.

And nobody in the crowd, outside of the heads of the conspiracy, contemplated the overthrow of the monarchy, and still less, nobody dreamed of that wild scheme of annexation, which was really detrimental to the majority of the population, and, later, approved only by such who thought that through it they could fill their pockets at Uncle Sam's expense.

It is a lie that foreign Powers have recognized the Provisional Government. None have, except Russia, and the foreign representatives here, outside of one Consul accomplice of the revolution, are still only acting on a temporary "modus-vivendi," pending the definitive settlement by America.

It is a lie that the just interfering of the United States forces would constitute a danger for the inoffensive population, on account of the unusual position of Honolulu. Let the forwards retire to Ewa or Waialua, which would be a godsend to the Oahu Railroad Co.

Such is the veracity of the "protest." Therefore, I do hope that Minister Willis and the American Government will put it where it belongs—in the waste basket. Only, please keep record of the signers, so that if any more lies are wanted we may know to whom to apply for them.

JUSTICE.

THAT ALLEGED MISCONDUCT.

The Government Must Give Specifications Against Clerk Wundenberg.

Mr. Fred Wundenberg, deputy clerk of the Judiciary Department, appeared before Chief Justice Judd and Associate Justices Bickerton and Frear—constituting the full Supreme Court bench—at 10 o'clock this morning, on an information with an order to show cause why he should not be dismissed from his office in position for misconduct while in office.

Attorney-General W. O. Smith appeared for the prosecution, and read the complaint worn to by himself, which was published in Friday's BULLETIN.

Mr. Paul Neumann, counsel for respondent, argued that the complaint was too general. They were entitled to specifications, and as such had not been made, respondent could not, and ought not to be tried. Mr. Smith claimed that the specification was fully set forth in the summons. The charges were particularly specific. He did not desire to take advantage of respondent and he harbored no ill-feeling against him, but he did not think counsel's claims necessary to justice.

Mr. C. W. Ashford, associate counsel for respondent, ventured to say that the proceedings were a criminal nature. It was like taking property from a man and respondent was entitled to a trial under due process of law. Respondent had an inalienable right under the Constitution—that is, if there was one—of this country, and a hearing under the statute—if we have one—nobody knows whether we have or not.

Chief Justice Judd—Those points are not in question, Mr. Ashford. You will please omit such remarks. Mr. Ashford—Perhaps they are. Well, all right. He continued his argument in favor of a more specific statement of the charges. It was a criminal proceeding. No one knew what language was used by respondent to Mr. Blount, and no one knows whether Mr. Blount or respondent designed it.

Chief Justice Judd explained that it was no criminal action; it was only misconduct in office, in violation of Sec. 59 of the Judiciary Act. Mr. Ashford—To constitute an illegal act one has to violate some statute of the land, and wherein he has violated the law must be shown. They must have something of an indictment, as to what may constitute a misconduct. The prosecution claim that respondent made divers statements at divers times on divers occasions. These must be specified. It looked as if the prosecution wanted to railroad Mr. Wundenberg out of office. It was simply a charge of sedition without setting out the words used.

Harris for writing an insolent note during a trial. The clerk of the Court can be dismissed for insubordination without violation of any statute. He considered there was sufficient particularity in the complaint.

Mr. Neumann argued at length on the vagueness of the complaint. It was a thing entirely unheard of to make a vague complaint without setting forth the persons spoken of or statements made. Perhaps respondent may have made statements under circumstances which would not constitute misconduct. Mr. Wundenberg cannot be indicted for misdemeanor in office if he went to the Mormon church. Mr. Neumann then filed respondent's request for specifications of everything charged against Mr. Wundenberg.

After a short consultation, a recess was announced by the Chief Justice. On re-assembling the Chief Justice ruled in favor of respondent and allowed the prosecution to amend the complaint. There must be sufficient particularity to allow the respondent to meet the charges.

The Attorney-General announced that he would be ready to continue on Wednesday morning.

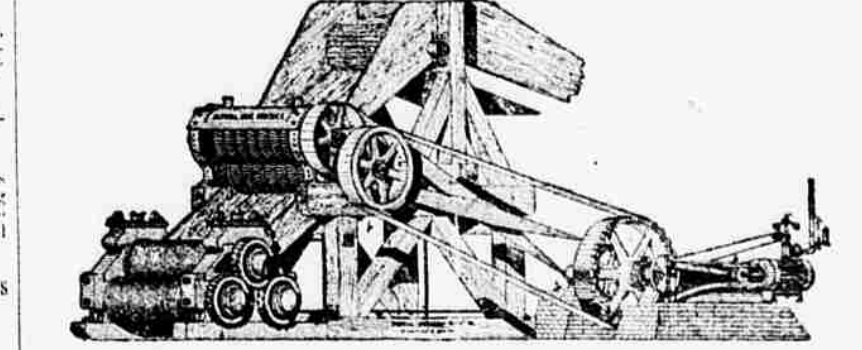

## THE PACIFIC GREYHOUND.

Record breaking on the P. M. S. S. China.

The S. F. Examiner of Nov. 14th has the following with regard to the performances of the P. M. S. S. China. After telling of the steamship's arrival in San Francisco the day previous, in which the time from Honolulu is said to have been shortened by 7 hours and 47 minutes, and Yokohama brought nearer to San Francisco by more than a day, the article continues:

"Last April the China crossed in 16 days, 12 hours and 9 minutes from Yokohama and made the unprecedented record which she has just demolished. Her time from Honolulu on that trip was 5 days, 21 hours and 57 minutes, and the mariners all stood agape at the ocean greyhound's startling performance. "To-day the record of her fast through run stands as follows: From Hongkong to San Francisco, 21 days 55 seconds; from Yokohama to San Francisco, 15 days, 8 hours, 54 seconds; from Honolulu to San Francisco, 5 days, 14 hours, 10 seconds.

"The first fast burst was between Kobe and Yokohama, which interval was encompassed in 23 hours and 19 minutes, and then came the delay that resulted in the rush to Honolulu in 9 days, 19 hours and 14 minutes. From the islands up here she averaged nearly 17 knots an hour, which was nearly a knot an hour less than her average on the run between Yokohama and Honolulu."

### Woman in the Water.

About 3 o'clock yesterday morning, while Capt. Christian and T. McGuire were talking on the dock at the I. I. S. N. wharf, before the arrival of one of the island steamers, a splash and puffing in the water close by startled them. On hastening to the direction from whence the sound came, they were surprised to find a native woman in the water trying to climb the side of a freight boat fastened to the wharf. With their assistance the "mermaid" was hauled on terra firma, when it was found that one of her feet was minus its shoe, and her appearance told of a night's exposure. She immediately pulled off the remaining shoe and threw it in the water. In reply to inquiries she said that she fell off the deck of one of the island steamers lying a few yards away. As if the ducking sobered her into consciousness, she hastened from the scene ere the dawn exposed her to the merciless gaze of curious people, who were flocking to the water front to see the steamer come in.
