A RIDDLE

Judd, the only man in the country, we hope, who would, and did pry into the private papers of Queen Liliuokalani to satisfy his morbid sense of curiosity and to gratify the mob?

It is interesting to foreigners living in Hawaii, who have suffered imprisonment and outrage by the hands of the Republic to learn that President Cleveland in his message intimates that in Cuba the United States took the following stand: Military arrests of citizens of the United States in Cuba have occasioned frequent reclamations. Where held on criminal charges their delivery to the ordinary civil jurisdiction for trial has been demanded and obtained, in conformity with treaty provisions, and where merely detained by way of military accusation under a proclaimed state of siege, without formulated accusation, their release or trial has been insisted upon. And yet poor Atkinson scorns the claims for indemnity of the foreigners illegally imprisoned during the late unpleasantness and says: "It might have added that, after the other side of the case had been presented, the 'remonstrance' would not be much heard of." Wait till they find it out.

Good Music.

Honolulu people have again been offered a chance to listen to good music. Professor Ovide Musin is here and has consented to give a few concerts which ought to be patronized by the music loving public of Honolulu. Musin is a violin virtuoso. He plays with a skill rarely heard and his reputation as a musician is noted in two hemispheres.

Mr. Musin is accompanied by his wife, a skilful soprano, and by Mr. E. Scharf, a pianist of great merit. The three concerts which these talented musicians have consented to give will be the star event of this season. It is unfortunate that Honolulu cannot offer to Mr. Musin a larger and better hall than the one owned by the Y. M. C. A. The public will show its appreciation by crowding that small hall in an endeavor to listen to the strains of Musin's violin, the sweet voice of Mrs. Musin and the skill of Mr. Scharf. 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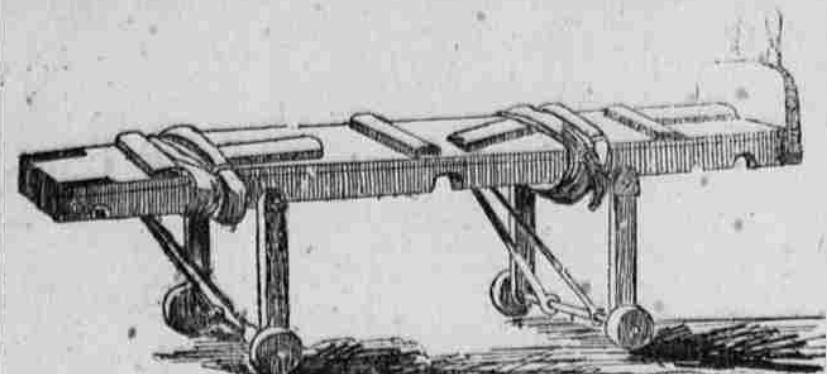

Speech Making. Minister Hatch was received by President Cleveland on the 4th inst. at Washington. Our Minister presented his credentials and spoke as follows:

"MR. PRESIDENT:—I have the honor to hand you a letter written by the President of the Republic of Hawaii accrediting me to you in the capacity of Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary for Hawaii. "I have been charged to express to you the feelings of profound respect and attachment felt by the Hawaiian Government and people toward the institutions of your country, and to assure you of the good wishes entertained by them for your own continued prosperity. "I am further instructed by every means in my power to seek to preserve and draw closer the bonds of amity which have so long united the United States and Hawaii in friendly and cordial intercourse. In performing this duty I shall endeavor, sir, in all matters to act in a manner which may prove acceptable to your government."

The President who looked bored rattled off the following stereotyped answer: "The sentiments of goodwill you express in behalf of your Government and people are most gratifying and find a cordial response in the feeling of my countrymen and their government. You may be assured, Mr. Minister, of the earnestness with which I and my associates in government will respond to all endeavors on your part to promote the amity existing between the two countries; while for yourself I bespeak no less agreeable personal associations in both public and private life than have been invariably enjoyed by your predecessor."

Mr. W. R. Castle, whose mission to Washington is still clouded in mystery, presented his letters of recall and lisped the following speech: "MR. PRESIDENT:—In presenting my letters of recall I review, with pleasure, the events of my short stay in the capitol of the United States as representative of the Hawaiian Republic.

"The cordiality of my reception, with the continued courtesy extended to me during my residence, is a renewed assurance of that friendship which, from early days, the United States has shown Hawaii. This sentiment, which in its expression has done so much for the civilization and material advancement of that distant country, has been appreciated and reciprocated by my Government from the earliest times, but, I think I may say, it was never stronger than at present.

"In bidding you farewell, and in wishing you and this great nation a continuance of that prosperity which has been so signal in the past, I bespeak for my successor the same cordial relations which have existed during my brief incumbency."

The President, feeling quite hilarious in getting rid of the Hawaiian ambassador, responded: "MR. MINISTER:—In receiving the letters whereby the President of Hawaii announces your recall from the mission you have filled at this capitol during the past few months, I take pleasure in knowing that you have found your brief residence congenial, and that the reception accorded, as well to yourself personally as to your efforts to promote friendship and goodwill in the relations of your Government to that of the United States, has been all that you could desire. I trust that your short sojourn here, with its official and social connections and associations, may never cease to be a source of agreeable recollection."

Monowai by Mr. and Mrs. Ovide Musin, Mr. Scharf and other fellow passengers for the benefit of the lepers on Molokai, and a subscription to the amount of one hundred dollars (\$100) was raised to serve as a Christmas present for the poor unfortunates.
