THIS DAY'S DOINGS.

THE BULLETIN.

Our readers will see that, with its present issue, the BULLETIN is again enlarged. This has become necessary on account of its growing popularity and the demand upon our space for advertisements, compelling us to hold over from week to week articles and reports of local interest. These reports, though published sometimes days after the events which they chronicle have elapsed, have been fresh to our readers owing to the fact that there has been no daily competition of late in providing a record of events. We hope however in future that such delay will be unnecessary.

The BULLETIN first appeared on 1st February 1882 as a little shipping sheet, printed on one side and distributed gratis. A month later it was printed on both sides and enlarged, and on 20th March a subscription of twenty-five cents a month was charged; on 24th April it had grown to a four page paper, the subscription being raised to fifty cents a month; on 23rd October it had reached the size of its last number, that size being found large enough up to the present time. The success of the paper has been assured from its commencement, but it never stood so high in public opinion as it does to-day.

Our town circulation is considerably larger than that of any other foreign paper published in Honolulu, so that business men will see that the BULLETIN is the best medium for advertising. Our articles have, within the past month, been reprinted in the Gazette, the Press, the Planter's Monthly, the Friend, the Hawaii Pae Aina, the Chinese News and the Advertiser. Though an independent paper, upholding that which is right and condemning that which is wrong, we alone have been able to force Extra-ordinary notice from the Government organ, which the large opposition papers have been, hitherto, unable to do with all their constant charges against the present administration. The excitement caused by our disclosure of the FIVE DOLLAR SCANDAL will long be remembered, a scandal that has never yet been explained and which will remain a lasting disgrace to those concerned.

We thank our many friends for their continued assistance and support, especially at the present time when we are making another financial venture in enlarging our paper, (though a shade of sorrow comes over us at the thought of the recent loss of one good customer); we shall however endeavor to obtain and publish, from day to day, the latest and most important news. The size of the BULLETIN is now half that of the Gazette, and we have the necessary machinery for issuing a paper as large as our Wednesday contemporary. Father, your "Sonny" is growing.

KAUAI COLLEGE RECEPTION.

The parents and friends of scholars, and old scholars of Oahu College attended Friday evening's reception in great force. Visitors on arrival, were introduced to Rev. W. C. Merritt, his wife and mother, and then inspected the new buildings. His Majesty, accompanied by his Chamberlain, Colonel Judd, was present for a considerable time.

At half-past eight, His Honor Mr. Justice Judd, on behalf of the Trustees of the College, welcomed the new president and his corps of teachers to Hawaii and the institution. He said that the College though small in numbers was by no means in its infancy. It was founded over 40 years ago, has done good work and has a noble record. Of suffering by the commercial which has come over the island in consequence of its prosperity and many content themselves with "knowledge" or a "title." We desire shall exorcise the "title" and be a "dist that utilitarian in our vallies, tea only acres of ds or pastures; mountains only supplying irrigating ur forests only fire-a cord, and which scle to hoe cane.

In these classic shades we desire to stimulate a thirst for a higher development of the intellect and heart, not content with a knowledge of book-keeping or a desire to enter a store at 17 years of age and earn \$60 a month, and will not consider the time lost before entering into the eager competition for wealth. There is something higher and nobler than this; the training of the mind and soul to make good citizens of pure morals, disciplined minds and cultivated tastes. This it is that tends more to make a nation great than hordes of immigrants and vaults stacked full of silver coin.

If Oahu College will make its graduates of such a character it will be worth more to this country than a standing army, a fleet or its laws, court houses and jails. Our boys and girls must only be content with the best, and, if it cannot be obtained here, let them seek it at Harvard or Yale or Ann Harbor, or Vassar or Wellesly. I have the greater pleasure in welcoming the president because he comes from my own Alma Mater, under the class of New Haven.

Rev. W. C. Merritt replied as follows. He expressed feelings of pleasure at the cordial welcome extended to him for which he rendered his most hearty thanks. This welcome, and the high ideal you have just set up as the standard of your expectations, makes us feel most keenly our responsibility and important trust. This expectation can only be realized by the aid and hearty and sincere co-operation of the trustees and friends of the College with the faculty. One of the most noticeable and pleasant features, to us, of this reception is, that almost every third person introduced is either a former pupil or a graduate of Oahu College. A few days since I was in company with Dr. E. J. Beekwith, loved and honored by all of you now present. The tender and loving way in which he spoke of "my boys," was as that of a father for his children. From the returned affection that we see, we, as teachers, gather inspiration and courage, and we hope that it may be our high privilege to thus deal with the children who may be placed under our care. Your ideal is the education and development of the whole man, the physical as well as the intellectual nature. I have been most happy to hear your wish that the care and nurture of the moral nature should also be magnified by us. We accept this high ideal and hope that the training we give will be of such a character as to leave no member weak or undeveloped.

Mr. W. R. Castle made some interesting remarks about the buildings, the old ones were pulled down on 1st January 1883 and the new one commenced on 1st May. It was 104 ft long and 44 ft wide; the lower floor was devoted to public uses, there was a parlor, a music room, president's room, dining room, pantry and store rooms. Upstairs there was accommodation for 16 boarders in 8 rooms all of which were furnished by the Trustees; he hoped they would always be occupied and that the institution would ever be an honor to Hawaii. The contractor, Mr. J. W. Lincoln, had performed his work most faithfully and to their entire satisfaction.

Mr. C. M. Cooke then made a statement of the cost of the buildings, which, with extras, amounted to \$27,341.42; of this amount there was still needed the sum of \$12,835. To furnish the building it had cost \$15,800. This included crockery, chandeliers, lamps and the cost of laying pipes for gas.

Mr. P. C. Jones said that he came there to ask for money, four or five months ago he was asked to make an appeal for money on account of his modesty and now on account of his impudence. He was not going to do any pretty work but he believed that God sent back to those who gave.

He then read the following letter which speaks for itself. Honolulu, Oct. 12th 1883. Mr. C. M. Cooke, Treasurer, Oahu College. Dear Sir, If a sum of \$15,000 or more is raised in cash between this evening and the 1st June next, I will give \$15,000 towards a scientific department for the College, to erect a building and provide chemical and other apparatus for the same. Yours truly, Chas. R. Bishop.

Mr. Jones then said that he felt like the man whose watermelons had been let out of his cart, when going up hill, by some boys who ran up to hear him swear. The man could say nothing, and he could say nothing. Mr. Jones then invited subscriptions from those present and a sum of \$6,990 was quickly promised.

During the evening a duet, a selection from Il Trovatore was played by Mrs. Handford and Miss Hessian. Dickson and Schubert's Serenade was sung by Mrs. Handford to a violin and piano accompaniment by Mr. Yarnley and Mr. M. Jones respectively.

Mr. J. T. Waterhouse, senior, in addition to a subscription of \$500, has promised a further sum of \$2,000, on condition that the remainder of the \$15,000 required to secure Mr. Bishop's offer, be obtained by 1st May.

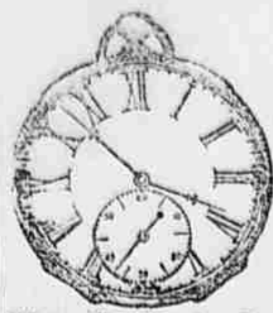
