TO ASSIST DELEGATE KUHIO

Attorney Clark In Washington

Among the passengers for the Coast in the China was Charles Clark, who was here some years ago as a practicing attorney and who, after a prolonged stay on the mainland, returned to Honolulu some months since on account of the ill health of his wife. Mr. Clark, previous to his first trip to the islands, spent a great part of his time in Washington in connection with the work of New Jersey Republican Senators and Representatives. He likewise represented the Pennsylvania railway in so far as New Jersey interests were concerned. For five years consecutively, Mr. Clark labored in Washington and became acquainted there with the powerful men from the various sections of the country. It is on this account that, when here last, he was consulted by men anxious for the welfare of the country and after several conferences, it was seen that he had a firm hold on the situation. There were more conferences and it was finally decided that Mr. Clark, in furtherance of such views as those expressed by the Builders & Traders' Exchange in their memorial to Congress praying for the expenditure in the Territory of certain stipulated amounts, should be sent on to do what he could. In accordance with this decision, Mr. Clark left in the China and is probably now in New York. His instructions were to go straight to Prince Kuhio, Hawaii's Delegate to Congress and tender him his services, to be used in whatsoever capacity the Prince might see fit, every bit of the work done by

Played For High Stakes BUT LOST BY Use of Paltry Methods

"I played for high stakes and lost." In this statement of the woman of the sealed envelopes is contained the most of the operations that have been going on here since her arrival some months ago. It suggests that she had a definite purpose in view which, in the light of later events, has turned out to be an attempt at a gigantic plan which too much haste ruined. This statement was made to a prominent real estate man of the city who sought to tell the woman of the evil of her ways. He had asked in wonderment why she had brought upon herself such worry for a few paltry hundreds. The woman of the sealed envelopes, marked "Shaw," is not yet in the toll nor is it likely, from the latest developments, that she will be. Those whom she has defrauded are simply awaiting developments and through their attorneys, pressing her for payment. She has promised and promised to pay but invariably, in the morning of the day of the promised payment, she has telephoned her inability "to get to the office on account of illness."

It is rumored, in connection with this tale of woe, that an attempt is being made simultaneously to get her out of the city. There are several interesting bits in connection with the life of this woman in Honolulu since her return from the Coast. It appears that shortly after her arrival here she went to J. J. Donnell, Deputy United States District Attorney, and arranged for the drawing up of papers making Robert Canton trustee of \$20,000 which she alleged was coming to her from the mainland, it's a being the money from the sale of some mines owned by her recently divorced husband, Mr. Shaw. Mr. Donnell drew up the necessary papers and mentioned a fee of a hundred dollars which so far has failed to materialize, as all other money secured in various ways from the unsuspecting. The divorced husband idea was played for every count it was worth. The woman said she had been made trustee of mining property owned by Mr. Shaw previous to the divorce and upon this being consummated, there was a failure to revoke the trusteeship. It was under this that she said she had sold the property and deposited the money with reputable trust companies in San Francisco. In the meantime the sealed envelopes were deposited at a local bank and the Waterhouse Trust Company was approached.

Mr. Castle had been watching the proceedings and he now asked the purported Mr. Shaw about the marriage license. He was told that none was necessary and Mr. Castle, who had had some previous dealings with the woman, said that a license was necessary in order that any proceeding "brought in the courts might be binding. This settled the matter and the wedding was declared off and for once it could be said with truth that "marriage is a failure." Some think there are more than the woman of the sealed envelopes in the deal and if it had not been for the bungling of the woman herself, people in Honolulu might have lost more. Unlike the Humberts, she stooped to such methods as borrowing fifty and a hundred dollars and this resulted in her undoing. That her brain must have been affected by the written stories of these swindlers seems to be proven by the fact of her insistence that there be a marriage in the case. What lends color to the theory that there were more in the case than just the woman alone is the fact that she was able to show to people about town a letter from "attorneys" in San Francisco saying that \$30,000 for her was on the way to Honolulu in the Alameda. It was on the strength of this that she borrowed a hundred dollars of a real estate man from whom she had "bought" many thousands of dollars worth of real estate. Undoubtedly the object of the woman was to have her name come out in the papers as "the rich Mrs. Shaw." She was great on trustees and went into more than one prominent business house in town and tried to bait one but did not succeed. She went to Bishop & Co. for one place, and was shown the way into the street. The woman has taste, at least for she hit on the home of Norman Halstead, Wilder Avenue, and offered \$10,000 for it. This price was to be paid in cash. Next she offered \$7,200 for the two lots of Geo. B. McClellan on Hastings street and a lot on McCully street, between Borntania and Young, owned by Bruce Cartwright, for \$6000. She even went so far as to have an abstract title prepared in the case of the latter lot. It was after this and other "purchases" had been made that she showed the San Francisco letter and borrowed the hundred.

Colombian Troops March On Panama

RUSSIA THREATENS KOREA

TOKIO, Dec. 9.—Eight Russian warships have arrived at Chemulpo to oppose the opening of the port of Yonampgho to commerce. The Russians threaten to land 3,000 men and march upon Seoul should Korea disregard the warning. The opening of the port of Yonampgho furnishes one of the crucial points in the negotiations now going on between Russia and Japan. A tentative agreement is said to have been reached by which Japan recognizes Russia's dominant influence in Manchuria and agrees to place no obstacles in the way of the solution of the problem. In return Japan demands the recognition of her influence in Korea and the opening of Yonampgho to foreign trade. Russia opposes this on the ground of the port's proximity to the mouth of the Yalu river and that it will threaten her interests and complicate her difficulties in Manchuria. The Korean Government has indicated its readiness to declare Yonampgho an open port.

JURY LISTENS TO JONES' CONFESSION

The confession of E. M. Jones, charged with the murder of his wife and mother-in-law, made at the receiving station on the night his young son took him there to turn him over to the police, at his father's request, figured largely in this morning's proceedings in Judge Gear's criminal court. Deputy High Sheriff Chillingworth testified as to what Jones had said on that occasion, as did also H. W. Kinney, who was then present representing the Bulletin. A. G. M. Robertson, for the defense, read, paragraph by paragraph, from a copy of the transcribed stenographer's notes taken during Jones' statement, asking Chillingworth as to the correctness of each separate statement. Except for the difference of an oath, having been left out here and there, which omission Robertson credited to the modesty of the lady stenographer, Chillingworth swore to the entire statement as correct. The much argued question as to the admissibility of Mrs. Sarah Parmenter's alleged dying statement will be passed upon this afternoon by Judge Gear. Hearing in the case after occupying all of yesterday's daylight, went on into the night hours, resuming at 9:30 this morning. (Continued on Page 4.)

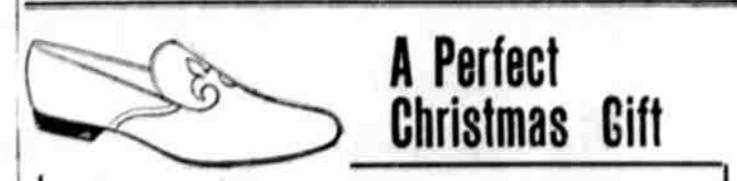

MORTUARY REPORT... The mortuary report for the month ending November 30, has just been issued by the Board of Health. There were 49 deaths in all, 43 being males and 26 females. As usual the Hawaiians lead with 21, and the Japanese came next with 14. The Chinese had 10 deaths, Portuguese 5, U. S. C. British 1 and other nationalities, 2. Deaths by wards were as follows: Ward 1, 25; Ward 2, 9; Ward 3, 7; Ward 4, 12; and Ward 5, 16. The monthly death rate per 1000 of population was 1.75.

CAPT. CALHOUN DEAD.

The deceased was very well known in Honolulu, he having commanded vessels on the local run for several decades.
