THE COOKING QUESTION.

The ladies who keep house will meet to-morrow to devise ways and means for saving the digestive organs and good humor of their male relatives by insisting on having cooks who know how to cook. We hope that the meeting will have some practical results. The cooking school is all right of course, but after the tricky heathen has learned the art of cookery will he not desert private families and devote his superior knowledge to the kitchens of hotels, restaurants, men-of-war and other places where no "housewife" has been a long-suffering thrall of her "boss" of the kitchen? It may be an excellent idea to establish cooking schools—one for men and one for girls, but have such schools given any satisfactory results in other countries? It is worth trying and we believe everybody will be willing to assist financially in the scheme. We suggest to the ladies, however, that one of the most important measures that should be adopted is that no employment should be given without a written reference from former employers. Now a Chinaman offers his services as cook to one of the ladies, we will say whose, fame as a housekeeper and cook is well-known. He remains in her service for two weeks and is found useless, but before he is "broken in" he walks out and is received elsewhere by simply saying "me cookie before for Mrs. X, velly good." No inquiries are made from Mrs. X and John is engaged, his new employer believing that he must be a "jewel" because Mrs. X is the "finest" cook in Honolulu. He is not asked how long he has been with Mrs. X, but her name has the necessary effect and he is engaged, proves a miserable failure, is fired and plays the same trick on the next unsuspecting housekeeper. A written reference in which length of service should be stated should be the absolute necessary requisite for any servant wishing to obtain employment and no servant should be employed without he can produce such a reference.

A False Report.

The "yellow" newspapers which a few weeks ago started the yarn of the death of Queen Liliuokalani got "left." Her Majesty writes under date of June 3d to Mr. J. O. Carter that she is still in Washington and enjoying the most excellent health. The purpose of the rumorists can easily be perceived, but the game was carried out in a very clumsy manner and did not work a little bit. We pity the fake reporter.

Queen Dowager Kapiolani's condition is very alarming. The high chiefess has sustained another stroke and it is miraculous that she still survives. Her physicians, her beloved nephews and her devoted retainers are in constant attendance but none look forward to a possibility of recovery.

THE HAWAIIAN GOVERNMENT BILL.

Synopsis of the Bill as Introduced in Congress, and Amended, by Senator Cullum

(Publication Commenced on June 8th.)

Section 89. The Territory of Hawaii shall constitute a district for the collection of internal revenue of the United States, with a collector, whose office shall be at Honolulu, and deputy collectors at such other places in the several islands as the Secretary of the Treasury shall direct.

Section 90. The Territory of Hawaii shall comprise a customs district of the United States with ports of entry and delivery at Honolulu, Hilo, Mahukona and Kahului.

Section 91. That until further provision is made by Congress the wharves and landings constructed or controlled by the Republic of Hawaii on any seacoast, bay, roadstead, or harbor shall remain under the control of the government of the Territory of Hawaii, which shall receive and enjoy all revenues derived therefrom, on condition that said property shall be kept in good condition for the use and convenience of commerce, but no tolls or charges shall be made for the use of such property by the United States, or by any vessel of war, tug, revenue cutter, or other boat or transport in the service of the United States.

Section 92. That the Hawaiian postage stamps, postal cards, and stamped envelopes at the postoffices of the Hawaiian Islands when this Act takes effect shall not be sold, but, together with those that shall hereafter be received at such offices as herein provided, shall be canceled under the direction of the Postmaster-General of the United States; those previously sold and uncanceled shall, if presented at such offices within six months after this Act takes effect, be received at their face value in exchange for postage stamps, postal cards and stamped envelopes of the United States of the same aggregate face value and, so far as may be, of such denominations as desired.

Section 93. That the public property ceded and transferred to the United States by the Republic of Hawaii under the joint resolution of annexation, approved July 7th, 1898, shall be and remain in the possession, use and control of the government of the Territory of Hawaii, and shall be maintained, managed, and cared for by it, at its own expense; until otherwise provided for by Congress, or taken for the use and purposes of the United States by direction of the President or of the Governor of Hawaii.

THE BOARD OF HEALTH

Milk in Honolulu—Fever at Hilo—Bills of Health from San Francisco.

President Cooper presided over yesterday afternoon's session of the Board of Health.

Food Inspector Shorey reported as a proper standard for pure milk 11.5 percent solids and 22 percent butter fat. Action was deferred until further effort has been made in the prosecution of vendors of diluted milk.

Sheriff Andrews reported a fever epidemic in Hilo, and Dr. Moore was instructed to furnish a full report in regard to it in order to ascertain its character.

Dr. Wood, acting for Dr. Day, who was absent, presented a statement in regard to the bills of Health as they are received from San Francisco. The Government, he said, is employing every means in its power to guard against the appearance of the plague or smallpox, so far as the Orient is concerned. Physicians are stationed in China and Japan and the passengers coming from that way are thoroughly inspected by the local port physician. But the bill of health of steamers coming from San Francisco is apparently drawn up without any investigation in regard to the prevalence of contagious diseases. Dr. Wood then cited instances where authoritative news regarding smallpox cases appearing in San Francisco had been published, but no notice had ever been taken of them in the steamer's bill of health. It seems right, continued the doctor, that the Consul General at least mention the fact and state whether or not the disease had actually appeared in the city, in order that more drastic measures might be put into force at this end to guard against it.

The matter was referred to President Cooper for action.

The Oregonians are to leave Manila first, followed by the Californians.

The evidence against Ginje was overwhelming and Mr. Chest-r Doyle deserves great credit in bringing the culprit before the bar of justice and finding the witnesses needed in the case.

Robbery on the Alameda.

News has been received by the China that \$25,000 in gold was robbed from the safe of the Alameda on her trip from Australia to San Francisco. The Alameda carried a treasury of \$150,000 and on the voyage \$25,000 evaporated. Who the guilty party is may never be known.

A very interesting provision of the proposed Government bill for Hawaii relates to the condemnation of private fishing right and opening the fisheries to citizens upon making just compensation therefor. The Treasury of Hawaii will probably be sorely taxed to carry the burthen imposed upon it for the property thus condemned, and the lawyers will reap rich fees. So mote it be! We must pay something for the privilege of being citizens of the Great Republic, and after all "vested rights" are relics of the old fashioned days of feudalism.

Comments have been freely made upon the coincidence of recent important changes in the Custom House at the time of the return to the country of Mr. Harold M. Sewall. What the crafty diplomat who represents McKinley here has up in his sleeve, we do not know; but it was remarkable that McStocker and Clay should resign upon his appearance on the scene, and the brother-in-law of his bosom friend suddenly be selected for the important position as Collector-General. We await some other interesting developments in the near future.

Evidently it is the intention of Senator Cullom, and probably of Congress, that the salaries of officials under the new Government law shall be reduced to a commercial clerk's basis. Two thousand dollars a year is not a very tempting bait for high officials considering the salaries hitherto paid in Hawaii, and a drop from \$12,000 for a President to \$5000 for a Governor is a suggestive hint that the Territory of Hawaii will be a much more picayunish establishment than was the independent Republic. The taxpayers will feel pleased whatever may be the sentiments of office holders; but where are the men to come from to fill the positions?

It seems to us that our Supreme Court has condensed "into a nutshell" the relations existing between the constitution of the United States and the laws of Hawaii in their decision in the customs tariff case. What can be simpler or more equitable than the following dictum:

"The Constitution of the United States was designed to meet the requirements of a sovereign nation and must be construed with reference to recognized principles of municipal and international law; it implies the power to acquire territory by cession or conquest, and that power carries with it all necessary and proper incidental powers; among these is the power, recognized by the law of nations and founded on necessity, to permit, either through inaction or by positive provision, the government of a newly acquired country to continue for such reasonable time as may be deemed necessary and proper by the political department of the acquiring government; and this is so whether the country is acquired by conquest or cession, by treaty or joint resolution."
