THE KING'S BIRTHDAY.

The fiftieth birthday anniversary of His Majesty the King will be celebrated to-day. Elaborate preparations have been made to give eclat to the occasion, and should the weather prove favorable, it will no doubt be an imposing and impressive ceremonial.

It is to be regretted perhaps, that the idea embodied in the minority report of the Legislative Committee on the birthday ceremonial was not carried out. This was to the effect that there should be an exhibition of Hawaiian products as part of the programme.

The years embraced within the King's life may be said in truth to cover the entire period of national history. When His Majesty was born at Honolulu, on November 16, 1836, Kamehameha III was the reigning Sovereign, but the administration of affairs was in the hands of a Regent, the High Chiefess Kaula.

The existence of the Kingdom of Hawaii, therefore, as an independent sovereign power dates from November 28, 1843, at which time the present King was seven years and twelve days old, then wholly unconscious of the high destiny in store for him.

The first Constitution was proclaimed by Kamehameha III in 1840, and this great Sovereign at the same time destroyed the feudal system, and changed the entire polity of the nation.

The departments of the Government were soon after constituted, the Judiciary being organized in 1847, when the reigning Sovereign was eleven years old. It was a recognition of the importance and magnitude of these great reforms that induced the British and French Governments and the United States to acknowledge the Hawaiian State as capable of maintaining international relations and administering its domestic affairs upon lines of policy common to all civilized people.

Another step in advance was taken when the Constitution of 1852 was promulgated. This country steadily progressed under this Constitution until 1864, when Kamehameha V. proclaimed the existing Organic Law, under which His Majesty was elected King, February 13, 1874, in the thirty-eighth year of his age.

unsurpassed perhaps in the world. Starting with barbarous tribes just emerging from a long period of intercourse and destructive wars, without commerce, without industries of any kind, the mere way-place of whale ships, it has developed a settled form of government, and is recognized and respected by all the Powers of earth.

The progress made in these directions during His Majesty's reign has been most marked. The Treaty of Reciprocity with the United States which he did so much to bring about, has added immense wealth to the country, and built up manufactures that otherwise would not have existed.

These considerations naturally suggest themselves at this time when the King's fiftieth birthday has been made a national festival by common consent. It is well, when entering upon these festivities, to give thought to the past, and attend to the lines upon which the country has advanced to its present condition of wealth and influence.

Attorney General. In our "By Authority" the public will be pleased to learn that His Majesty the King has appointed Antonio Rosa, Esq., to be Attorney General of the Kingdom, vice His Excellency Hon. L. Aholo, resigned.

THE KING'S BIRTHDAY.

The Palace Decorated for the Festivities.

Changes in the Pictures and Decorations Which Bring Out the Ancient History of the People.

In view of the festivities which commence this morning in honor of the fiftieth anniversary of the natal day of His Majesty the King, Iolani Palace has undergone extensive preparations, the arrangements for the reception and entertainment of the guests being very complete.

The throne room, in which the receptions will take place, has been newly furnished with a rich crimson carpet. On either side of the dais are suspended the Royal Orders of Kamehameha, Kalakaua, Kapiolani and the Crown of Hawaii, whilst the walls on every side are adorned with the numerous foreign decorations with which His Majesty has from time to time been invested.

Ascending the grand staircase the upper hall is next entered, wherein the King's Privy Council of State is usually held. The central figure is a bust in bronze of His Majesty the King, oil paintings and tasteful cabinets, containing articles of vertu, are disposed on either side, while the hall, which runs the entire width of the building, commands a magnificent vista of Puna Valley, the mountains, tier behind tier, with the different hues forming an effective background.

At the further end, facing the entrance, is a speaking likeness of Her Majesty the Queen, life size, in oil, by Furneaux. The room also contains a very fine painting of the King, together with cabinet photographs of Sir John and Lady Franklin. Less obtrusive, but of considerable interest, is a study in music, framed in a peculiarly chaste and unique manner.

The private apartments of Her Majesty the Queen are on the Waikiki side, and are elegantly furnished with a variety of styles, the upholstery being for the most part of embroidered satin, while an infinity of small and elegant ornaments and mounted portraits of members of the Royal Family are disposed around in studied negligence,

numerous mirrors reflecting and re-reflecting the brilliant scene. Her Majesty's boudoir is entered from one corner of the apartment in miniature of the foregoing. The bedchamber of H. R. H. the late Princess Kekauliki is likewise entirely renovated for the accommodation of the young Princess who are shortly expected from the United States.

A spacious lanai has been erected in the Palace grounds at the approach to the front entrance, for holding the hula. The building, which is a temporary structure, is about 300 feet in length, and will be elaborately decorated with the national colors. An electric battery for lighting purposes has been placed in position, and the effect of the numerous and costly innovations under the dazzling influence of this great modern invention is one of peculiar splendor.

At 6 o'clock last evening the Nihoa Society called at the Palace in a body to present their respects to His Majesty, whom they presented with a very handsome silver mounted with a shield bearing the dates 1836 and 1886. Dependent from the shield is a pair of rare feathers. Before leaving the members of the society rendered several native songs.

His Excellency Mr. Gibson waited upon His Majesty during the evening and presented, with congratulations, a magnificent pair of elephant's tusks, each weighing 9 1/2 pounds. They are mounted on a stand of koa and other descriptions of fancy native woods, and suspended by a chain is a silver tablet bearing on one side the following inscription: "His Majesty King Kalakaua, born November 16, 1839, ascended throne of Hawaii February 12, 1874."

Mr. Gibson, we understand, has presented these tusks as symbols of royal authority and dominion. The Bible abounds in reference to the significance of tusks of horn as signifying glory, honor and dominion. In one instance Ezekiel speaks of the presentation to a ruler, saying: "They brought for thee a piece of tusks of horns of ivory." And in a score of texts there is reference to the horns or tusks of animals as symbols of royal authority and dominion.

At midnight the birthday of His Majesty was ushered in by a Royal salute of 21 guns from the battery on the summit of Punchbowl hill, from whence a row of bonfires simultaneously shot their flames into the heavens. Rockets were also fired off at intervals, and the mountain was brilliantly illuminated, casting a rosy glare over the mauka side of the city.

It has pleased His Majesty the King to appoint ANTOINE ROSA, ESQ., to be Attorney General of the Kingdom, vice His Excellency HON. LUTHER AHOLO, resigned.

Foreign Office, Nov. 15, 1886.

This day had audience of the King: Frank P. Hastings, Esq., Acting Charge d'Affaires and Deputy Consul General for the United States of America, to present to His Majesty the congratulations of the President of the United States on his fiftieth birthday.

Mr. Hastings addressed His Majesty in the following terms: YOUR MAJESTY—By special direction of the President of the United States, it becomes my agreeable duty to convey on this auspicious event the President's cordial felicitations on the attainment of your fiftieth year.

It is needless for me to refer to the many evidences Your Majesty has received of the steady friendship of the government and people of the United States, or to repeat the many expressions of regard and goodwill that have so often been made by them in regard to the welfare and success of Hawaii and its people.

In assuring Your Majesty of the continuance of all these friendly wishes, I am requested to add the sincere hope of our President and people that the close and mutually beneficial relations now existing between Hawaii and the United States may be maintained and developed.

Mr. Hastings then proceeded to say: I cannot let this occasion so kindly granted to me by Your Majesty pass without expressing on behalf of the people of Charleston, South Carolina, their deep gratitude for the gracious message of sympathy so promptly sent to them in their distress. It will be remembered by them so long as kindly sympathies shall exist in the human heart.

To which His Majesty replied, expressing his gratitude for the kindly message sent to him in this special manner by the President of the United States, a message which was peculiarly pleasing as being the first to reach him and coming from the heart of so great a nation as the United States of America.

His Majesty was attended on this occasion by His Excellency Hon. Walter M. Gibson, Minister of Foreign Affairs and Premier, Major General the Hon. Curtis P. Iaukea, Governor of Oahu, His Majesty's Chamberlain, Major John D. Holt, of the staff of the Governor of Oahu; and Captain Samuel Nowlein, Quartermaster General of the Forces.

It has pleased His Majesty the King to restore to their civil rights: Kakaia, David Watson, Joseph Woodward, and Ma.

Police Court.

BEFORE POLICE JUSTICE BICKERTON. MONDAY, November 15th.

J. Patterson, Samuela, Ioane, Kaloke, Kahuli alias Apiki, Lawrence and H. Y. Clemens were dealt with in the customary manner for drunkenness.

Ah See and Kenn Yee, on a charge of violating the Sabbath, were admonished and discharged.

Seventeen Chinese were brought up for gaming during the week, particularly on Sunday. Their names are: Ah Hong, Ah Yong, Ah Wai, Ah Man, Ah Tong, Ah Ho, Ah Hoon, Ah Chun, Wong Kim, Loong Ho, Ah Lam, Chun King, Lee Tai, Ah Hu, Ah Chong, Hing Chew and Tun Gip. Hon. Paul Neumann appeared for the defense, and at his request they were remanded until the 19th instant.

Keokeaw pleaded guilty to a charge of assault and battery on Hoohuli and was fined \$7 and \$3 costs.

Ah Hu, on remand, charged with assault and battery on Ah Tong, was discharged.

Ah Tong, on remand, charged with assault and battery on Ah Hu. Nolle prosequi entered.

E. F. Willer was charged with assault and battery on Kumahoa on board the steamer Likelike on or about the 12th instant. Plea not guilty. Accused is Mate of the vessel, and complainant, who is one of the crew, had interfered between the Mate and a boy, whom the former was alleged to have struck. The Captain separated the disputants, and it was stated that the Mate afterwards struck complainant with a belaying pin. The assault was denied, and a witness testified that he did not see it. Accused was discharged.

Also, an insane person, was committed to the Asylum on the testimony of Dr. Webb.

Cavenagh will be found behind the bar to attend to the wants of customers.

AN ACT

TO AMEND AND CONSOLIDATE THE LAW RELATIVE TO THE COMMISSIONERS OF PRIVATE WAYS AND WATER RIGHTS.

Be it Enacted by the King and the Legislative Assembly of the Hawaiian Islands in the Legislature of the Kingdom Assembled:

SECTION 1. The word "Commissioners" wherever used in this Act shall refer to and mean the Commissioners of private ways and water rights. The word "Court" shall refer to and mean the Circuit or Supreme Court in banco as the case may be. The word "party" or "parties" shall refer to and mean the respective parties to the controversy before Commissioners or Court. The word "controversy" shall refer to and mean the matter or question at issue before the Commissioners. The words "private individuals" or "persons" shall relate to and mean either individuals, companies, corporations, the Commissioners of Crown Lands, or any others, except the Government.

SECTION 2. There shall be appointed by the Minister of the Interior in each election district of the Kingdom three competent persons to act as Commissioners of private ways and water rights, provided however that nothing herein shall prevent the appointment of one person for two or more districts, if the same can be done without prejudice to the rights of the inhabitants thereof. No person shall act as Commissioner in any case in which he shall have a direct personal interest, or where he shall have direct business relations with either party, or shall be connected with either by ties of relationship of blood or marriage. In case of disability from these or any other cause, a Commissioner pro tem shall be appointed at once by the said Minister of the Interior if on the Island of Oahu, or by the Governor if on any other island. Any vacancy shall be filled as soon as possible by a new appointment by the Minister of the Interior as aforesaid.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of such Commissioners within their several districts to hear and determine all controversies respecting rights of private ways and water rights between private individuals, or between private individuals and the Government. Any person or persons interested, or the Government, may apply for the settlement of any rights involved hereunder whereupon the Commissioners shall issue a written or printed summons in like form as that used in the District or Police Courts, to the party or parties defendant. It shall be personally served upon each landowner or occupant having an interest in the controversy whenever such owner or occupant can be found. If however any such owners or occupants cannot be found for such service, the Commissioners shall cause notices in the Hawaiian or English language, or, as the case may be, to be published either by posting on the premises, the owners or occupants whereof cannot be found, or by insertion in one or more newspapers, which publication shall continue for at least two full weeks prior to the date set for hearing. Such notice shall designate the time and place of hearing, shall indicate the nature of application made, and shall notify all parties interested to attend and prove their rights, or they will be adjudicated without such attendance, besides any other matter deemed important by the Commissioners. Such notices may be published in any case in the discretion of the Commissioners. No summons shall be set aside or dismissed because of any technical informality, provided it shall set forth the time and place of hearing, and the nature of the right claimed in terms sufficiently clear for the appraisal of all parties interested. Parties may appear personally or by properly authorized attorney.

SECTION 4. At the time set for hearing, service of summons or publication of notice having been proved, the Commissioners or a majority of them shall hear the evidence offered relative to the right in controversy, and shall, as far as possible, ascertain the rights of absent parties not served where notice as herein provided shall have been published. They may if they deem it desirable or conclusive to the rendering of a correct decision, visit the locality where the controversy arose. They shall give such decision as may in each particular case appear to be in conformity with vested rights, and shall be just and equitable between the parties. The decision shall state expressly the findings of fact on the evidence, and shall in case of rights of way clearly indicate the location (if possible) and nature of the way, if on a water right it shall state the proportion or time for use and any other things necessary to the right. It may also regulate the methods by which water may be obtained, and by which its supply can be controlled. All of the testimony and the decision shall be recorded in books of record to be kept and preserved by the Commissioners. The said books when filled shall be deposited with the clerks of the respective Courts. The decision of the Commissioners shall be final and binding upon all parties, except those who may be absent from the Kingdom without a legal representative in this Kingdom during the whole time of the pendency of such suit, subject to the right of appeal.

SECTION 5. There may be taxed as costs in cases arising hereunder besides the usual statutory costs as allowed in Police Courts for service, summons, oaths and otherwise, the fees of the Commissioners not to exceed two dollars a day for each Commissioner for each day's hearing, and their reasonable actual expenses in visiting the locality, and not over twenty cents a folio for copies of the evidence and decision either on appeal or as furnished to any party. The case may, in the discretion of the Commissioners, be divided, or taxed against the losing party. In case of appeal the final

award as to costs shall abide the decision of the Court.

SECTION 6. Any party aggrieved by the decision of the Commissioners may appeal therefrom to the Court within ten days from the rendition of the decision, and within said period shall pay all costs accrued and for certificate and record on appeal and deposit with the Commissioners a good and sufficient bond to the Clerk of the Court in the sum of one hundred dollars conditioned for the payment of costs further to accrue in case of defeat. In case of appeal the Commissioner acting as chairman shall promptly transmit to the Clerk of the Court a copy of the record, approved by a majority of the Commissioners, together with any exhibits filed, the bond for costs, and all costs not strictly retainable by them or actually disbursed. The Court may permit the introduction of new evidence which could not with due diligence have been obtained before, and its decision shall be final and binding except as aforesaid.

SECTION 7. The Commissioners shall have power to administer oaths, to punish contempts, to grant adjournments, to subpoena and compel the attendance of witnesses, to issue execution for costs, to enforce a specific performance of judgment, and generally to exercise the same authority in regard to their special jurisdiction as is by law conferred upon Police Courts.

SECTION 8. Nothing in this Act contained shall be construed to interfere with the several laws authorizing the Minister of the Interior to take possession of land and water for the benefit of the Honolulu Water Works, nor with the provisions of an Act to Regulate the Passage of Water over Lands of those not benefitted thereby approved September 18, 1876.

SECTION 9. Sections 996, 997 and 1001 of the Civil Code as amended by the Act of 1860, entitled An Act to Amend Article 44, Chapter 16 of the Civil Code; Sections 998, 999 and 1003 of the Civil Code, as amended by Chapter XIX of the Laws of 1878; Sections 1000 and 1002 of the Civil Code, an Act entitled An Act to Amend Article 44, Chapter 16 of the Civil Code, approved the 28th day of August, A. D. 1860, an Act entitled an Act to amend Section 999 of the Civil Code, approved the 13th day of May, A. D. 1868, and all other laws and parts of laws in contravention hereof are hereby repealed.

SECTION 10. This Act shall take effect from and after the date of its approval.

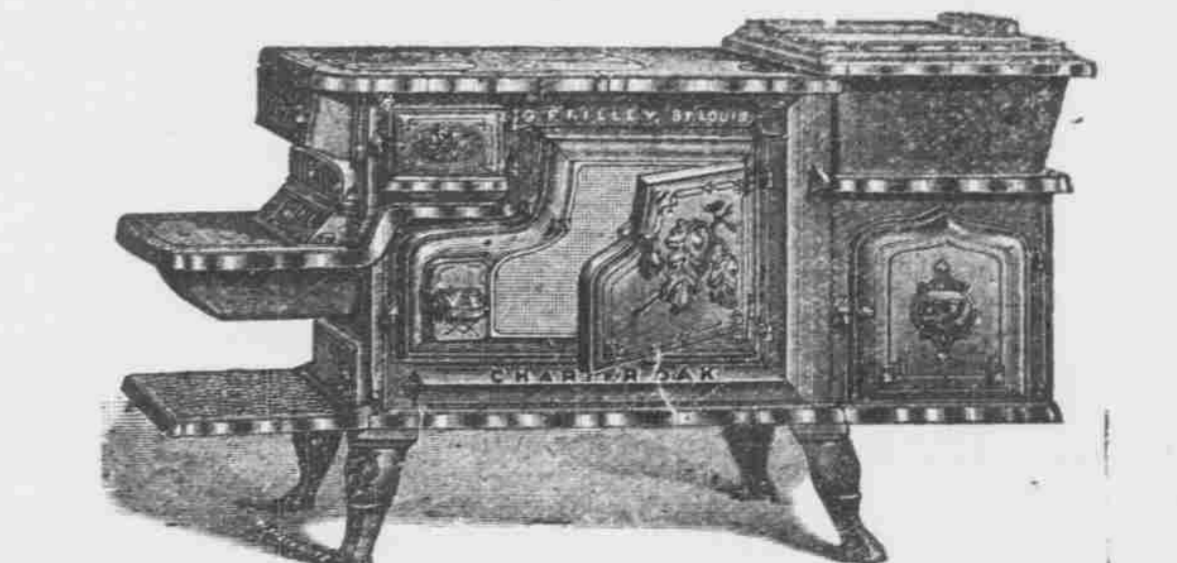
