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The Autumn Exhibition of the Kilohana Art League.

Monday night the public opening of the autumn exhibition of the Kilohana Art League took place at the studio of D. Howard Hitchcock in Merchant street. The exhibition will remain open until December 15, and will well repay a visit. There are handsome decorations in drapery and green plants at the entrance to the rooms, with a Venus of Milo standing in the midst of the foliage. From day to day notices of the different works will appear in these columns, as space will not permit mention of all in one issue.

Mr. Hitchcock's chef d'œuvre is hung at the head of the hall. It is entitled "Summer" and its theme is a landscape in France. Fine effects in still water, spangled with lilies and shaded with reflections of trees, are produced. The same artist has many other paintings on view. One is of a green glade on the Volcano road, depicting charmingly an umbrageous vista. A view of the Moret Cathedral, France, is characterized by lovely mirror-like water in the

foreground.
Mrs. Kate M. Wells of Maui shows several products of her bold and free brush. Most conspicuous of these, and one of the most striking paintings in the gallery, is "A Stick of Cane." That article is being nibbled by two boys, whose bright eyes seem to see one through. "Roses" is a subject treated by this artist with an impressionist dash requiring time for the undoubted merits to grow upon one. Faces showing expression are, however,

her forte.
Mrs. A. B. Tucker's brush has been prolific, with attractive results. "Stream" contains remarkably vivid atmosphere, and visitors pause to admire it.

Miss Annie Parke has a goodly share of space, her subjects being of Hawaiian scenery. "Native House at Hilo" evinces a fine comprehension of tropical vegetation, while Mauua Loa's lofty crest of snow, in the back ground, gives an air of sublimity to the picture as well as showing the sharp contrast of cli-mate on Hawaii within a narrow circle. Miss l'arke's works all show a dainty touch together with fidelity

Mrs. Gillin's name appears but once in the catalogue, but her single contribution is a gem. Its subject is "Roses," and its execution reveals 'brains" mixed with the colors, as the advice of a famous artist to bis pupil put it. There is a delicacy of shading, blending and toning of colors which is delightful to con-

template. Bette Jones (Mrs. E. A.) has an excellent study of cocoanuts. She as also a meritorious Diamond Head and other works that will be noticed later.

Mrs. Pierre Jones exhibits a Waikiki, characterized by neat drawing, rich foliage, and a dreamy vision of still water on the reef. A good painting of Diamond Head also comes from this lady's brush. Another Diamond Head is by Mrs.

T. J. King, who, together with true drawing, imparts an atmospheric effect that evinces good talent. Philip Dodge selects the same familiar subject—the stately sentinel of Honolulu. The waves on the beach in the foreground display not the only merit of the work. Augusta Graham (Mrs. W. M.)

shows models in plaster for her favorite art of wood carving. They are deftly executed and lend variety to the exhibition. Allen Hutchinson exhibits models in plaster of wild and domestic animals, which must be reserved for fuller notice.

Miss Jane Lishman agreeably interrupts the abounding line of Hawaiian topics with a beautiful representation of Australian wild flowers.

THE FORMAL OPENING.

At the formal opening of the exhibition yesterday evening there was a large and fashionable gathering. The studio was brilliantly illuminated with electric lights, giving it a cheery and inviting aspect, From 8 until 10 o'clock the visitors moved about the gallery, discussing the works with animation. 

Two Convictions by Foreign Jury Doings at Chambers.

found guilty of larceny in the fourth degree by the jury yesterday, and Judge Cooper sentenced him to imprisonment at hard labor six months. F. Perreira was tried for assault and battery this morning by the fol-lowing jury: W. W. Dimond, C. V. Sturdevant, Jas. Torbert, F. J. Lowrey, T. Krouse, C. M. V. Forster, J. M. Tracy, A. Young, E. M. Marshall, W. Phillips, C. B Ripley and W. G. Wooten. A verdict of guilty was returned, the jury recommending the prisoner to the mercy of the court. He was fixed \$50 and costs \$1850.
