JUDICIAL NOTICES.
Two Convicts by Foreign Jury.
Doubt as to Chambers.

Yesterday's Court report will be found in the supplement to this issue.
Lum Chow alias Lam Tsow was found guilty of larceny in the fourth degree by the jury yesterday, and Judge Cooper sentenced him to imprisonment at hard labor six months.

F. Pereira was tried for assault and battery this morning by the following jury: W. W. Diamond, C. V. Sturdevant, Jas. Torbert, F. J. Lowrey, T. Krouse, C. M. V. Forster, J. M. Tracy, A. Young, E. M. Marshall, W. Phillips, C. B. Ripley and W. G. Wooten. A verdict of guilty was returned, the jury recommending the prisoner to the mercy of the court. He was fined \$50 and costs \$18.50. Deputy Attorney General Robertson for prosecution; A. Rosa for defendant.

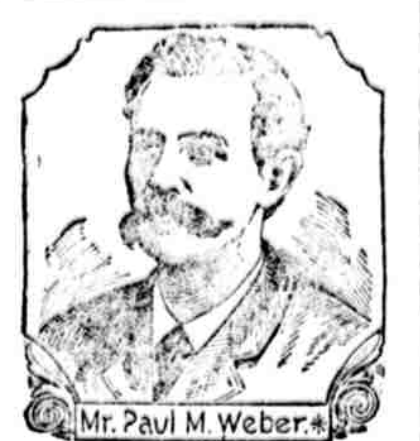

THE ORIENTAL WAR.

Japanese Occupation of Headquarters in Manchuria.

The Japanese Official Gazette of Nov. 5 contains the following war news:

Telegram received at the War Department in Tokio, sent from headquarters at Hiroshima, which was sent at 3:51 a. m., the 4th Nov., in regard to the condition of Fungwang Chang Castle, next stronghold to Chiu Len Chong Castle in Manchuria, China.

OCCUPATION OF FUNGWANG CHANG CASTLE.

On Oct. 31, a detachment led by Major-General Takumi, entered the Fungwang Chang Castle.

A part of the enemy fled toward the direction of Moukden and another party for Haichang, while the third division fled for Taikosan. The commissioned officers fled toward the direction of Moukden.

The tendency of the people's feeling on the road along which the Japanese army passed is against the outrageous conduct and seizure of goods by the Chinese soldiers, while the people are respecting and appreciating the Japanese army.

The number of Chinese soldiers who were killed, wounded and captured by the Japanese army in the battle near Chiu Len Chong Castle is about 300 in all.

According to a telegram sent by Field Marshal Yamagata at Chiu Len Chong Castle, in Manchuria, China, at 2:30 p. m. the 3d inst., the spoils of arms and ammunition captured by the Japanese army till today are about as follows: Cannon 55, rifles 1500, cartridges for cannon 20,000, cartridges for rifles 250,000, sundries, great quantity not countable.

The Fiji Shimo (Japanese newspaper), of the 6th inst. states:

Japanese Territorial Executive Department was established there in Manchuria where 1st Japanese army led by Field Marshal Yamagata has already passed and occupied. Hon. J. Komura, formerly charge d' affaires of the Japanese Legation at Peking, was appointed as the chief of that department, under the recommendation of Field Marshal Yamagata. It was already proclaimed there that all the taxes to be paid by the people have been exempted by the Japanese authority. The place is guarded by the Japanese police. It is said that the second executive office will be established as soon as the second army has occupied one more fort.

Christian Mission Meetings

Eric Lewis addressed his audience in Harmony hall Sunday morning upon the general topic of the Christian life. He scored unsparringly the hypocritical life of the man who professes to love God whom he has not seen, while ignoring the claims upon him of his brother whom he has seen. The discourse was pointed and earnest throughout, as are all the sermons of this popular young man.

The services at the gospel tent on Union Square in the evening were conducted by T. D. Garvin. The claims of the gospel were presented by him in his usual plain and forcible manner. The increasing audacity and growing interest in these evangelistic meetings prove the wisdom of trying to reach the ear of the people by this method. Hereafter the people are to have the privilege of handing in written questions pertaining to the subject of christianity to be answered by Dr. Garvin.

The singing of popular gospel hymns will be a feature of the present protracted meeting. The song service begins promptly at 7:30 each evening.

JUDICIARY JOTTINGS

Two Japs Acquitted of Conspiracy - Achi Must Pay Alimony.

Utsunomiya and Kurashige were tried for conspiracy before Judge Cooper by the following jury in the Circuit Court, Monday: W. L. Hopper, Jas. Torbert, E. F. Bishop, C. W. Gray, C. B. Ripley, Fred. Philp, F. Hustace, J. J. Sullivan, F. J. Lowrey, E. M. Marshall, Peter High, A. Young. A verdict of not guilty, two jurors dissenting, was returned. Hartwell assisting the prosecution; Neumann for the defendant.

Lum Chow alias Nam Tsow was placed on trial Monday afternoon for larceny in the fourth degree. Deputy Attorney General Robertson, in questioning the panel as to prejudice, said defendant was accused of stealing fowls on March 19. Mr. Kaulukou for defendant objected that the date given for the offense had been changed since defendant had pleaded not guilty in the lower court. He should not be tried on the new charge in this Court. Judge Cooper overruled the objection, and counsel objected to the ruling.

The following jury was drawn: C. B. Ripley, J. Weir Robertson, F. J. Lowrey, Wm. Phillips, W. H. Smith, J. S. Martin, E. F. Bishop, Peter High, J. M. Tracy, Jas. T. Copeland, Geo. Gray, W. M. V. Forster.

Mr. Lowrey, answering the usual interrogations, said one of the counsel was prejudiced against himself, as he generally challenged him when he appeared in the box for a case in which that counsel was engaged.

Mr. Kaulukou thought the juror ought to be more explicit. Perhaps he meant the Deputy Attorney General. (Laughter.) He (Mr. K.) did not want to have his client injured through dislike of a jury toward himself.

The Court would not entertain the excuse of the juror, who was not challenged by defendant's counsel.

Judge Whiting yesterday morning heard the motion of W. C. Achi, to dissolve order for alimony; also Isabella A. Achi, respondent's, motion to commit plaintiff for contempt in neglecting to obey the order for alimony. The Court overruled the motion of plaintiff, he not having complied with the order to pay alimony; also holding that the affidavits on which the motion was based were not sufficient nor explicit enough. V. V. Ashford for respondent did not press the motion for contempt, believing that Mr. Achi would now obey the order of Court for alimony.

Mrs. Nakuina by her attorney, W. A. Kinney, has entered a demurrer to the bill in equity of Kuamu and Luka and Clarissa E. Cummings vs. Mrs. Niau Iaukoa and Mrs. E. M. Nakuina, for cause alleging that in so far as this defendant is concerned the complaint fails to state a cause of action.

Compliments of France.

Mons. Verleye, Commissioner of France, paid his official visit to President Dole Monday morning, he having presented the letter of recognition from President Perier, while President Dole was absent on Hawaii, to the Minister of Foreign Affairs. The Cabinet and military staff were present, the garrison paraded, and the band attended, playing the "Marseillaise." W. M. Giffard, acting Chancellor of Legation, accompanied the Commissioner.

Mons. Verleye expressed his great pleasure at the opportunity of presenting his official congratulations to President Dole, with most cordial wishes for his health and the prosperity of the Republic of Hawaii.

President Dole responded in hearty reciprocation of the friendly sentiments of the representative of France. He hoped that Mons. Casimir Perier would long continue to preside over the destinies of his country.

DANGEROUS RUNAWAY.

Mr. King the Feed Man Has an Exciting Experience.

Thos. J. King, manager of the California Feed Co., had an exciting ride on Saturday afternoon. Mr. King was driving along King street, when, near Thomas Square, the horse he was driving, a spirited animal, bolted and the traces parted. All efforts of Mr. King to control the animal were fruitless. The animal's speed was accelerated by the whiffletree striking him in the rear at intervals. At Pawa the runaway turned into Beretania street. Several people on horseback gave chase without success. Near Thomas Square, M. Leal, a BULLETIN messenger, took up the pursuit. He caught the animal and with no little trouble and danger succeeded in bringing the runaway to a standstill. Mr. King was fairly well fagged out, and his hands were sore and tired. If the runaway had continued its furious career into town, Mr. King would probably have met with serious injury.

New Postal Tokens

A new postal card has been issued by the French Government in commemoration of the visit of the Russian squadron to Toulon on Oct. 13, 1893. In each corner on the left hand side are one cent stamps. In the center is a picture of the Russian fleet, and on the right hand side an image of the Czar of Russia. It is quite a curiosity, being inscribed in both the French and Russian languages.

Another recent issue by the French Government that will interest philatelists all the world over is an envelope. It is in commemoration of Joan of Arc, Maid of Orleans. Jas. F. Hunter received specimens of these new issues by the S. S. Oceanic.
