Mr. Cruzan's Sermon on Sunday.
TEXT, EXODUS 20:7.

"Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain."
It is well for young men, and some old ones, that the law of England imposing a fine of a shilling for each oath, does not prevail everywhere, else their salaries would scarcely pay their fines.
Swearing is a thing of degrees. The first degree is the use of expletives and exclamations. Such as "Mercy!" "Gracious!" "Fiddle Sticks!"—these for the ladies. "By Golly!" "By George!" "By Jehu!"—these for the men. Of course these are not profanity, but they are nigh of kin. They are the first step to it. No man becomes a swearer at once, any more than a man becomes a drunkard at once. The use of such expletives is verbal tipping.
2—The next stage is the use of coward's oaths. The man says "Darn it!" He means something a great deal stronger but don't dare say it. He says "By Jupiter!" when he means to swear by the Supreme One. All such oaths are cowardly.
3—The third stage is the reckless, thoughtless use of the divine name. It is the most common of all sins. The speaker then gave the following "good reasons" why young men should not swear.
1—It is sinful. "Take not the name of the Lord thy God in vain," was uttered from Sinai as well as "Thou shalt not kill." The breaking of the one is just as clearly a sin as breaking the other.
2—Swearing is vulgar and unmanly. Washington said: "Swearing is a vice so mean and low that every person of sense and character despises it."
Of course if it is vulgar it is unmanly. The most worthless and vile, the drunkard and the prostitute are adepts in swearing. In fact as you descend the social scale swearing becomes a "fine art." No man is believed any sooner because he swears to a thing. By that act he confesses that his plain word is not sufficient to establish the truth of what he says, but much be bolstered up.
3—Swearing is inexcusable nearly every man who swears will admit this. Still some do offer so-called excuses. Some say, "I swear without thinking." Suppose a man should steal, and when brought to trial say, "Well, really, I have become so careless of the difference between mine and thine that I steal without thinking."—would that be any excuse? Others say, "I cannot stop it." Is it a "cannot" or "will not?" When you go to church, or to a party, or where clergymen are present, you do not swear. That fact shows that you can stop swearing whenever you choose.
4—Swearing is injurious. It injures the man himself. It is impossible for a man to wipe out, as with a sponge, as profanity does, all respect for God and for sacred things and be as good a man as he was before.
The swearer injures others. He pollutes the moral atmosphere with his oaths, and others must in-breathe his vileness. To spew out oaths along the street, in boats and public places, where men, and women, and

REV. JOSEPH COOK.

As the Y. M. C. A. has appointed Chief Justice Judd (a class-mate of Mr. Cook's), and the Rev. Dr. Damon to wait on Mr. Cook and try to induce him to stay over here for a month or so, and deliver some of his celebrated lectures, the following account of his biography, condensed from the Melbourne Leader, may prove acceptable:

The world-wide reputation which Mr. Cook may be said to have attained was first established for him at Boston, about seven years ago, almost as soon as he commenced to lecture. It is partly due to his oratorical power; but mainly we suspect to the class of themes he has chosen for discussion. These themes are specially fitted for the present time, when religion, as many fear, is being undermined by certain scientific tendencies and speculations. Is there a soul in man? Does death end all? Is there a hereafter? Can nature with its mysterious forces, can the universe with its teeming life, be adequately explained in terms of mere matter? Can the great realities of thought, of feeling, and of choice be explained away so as to leave no room for spirit? In other words, is matter the sole reality, and is natural law the only God? Or is it spirit that is the great reality of the universal, and is natural law but the orderly manifestation of the spiritual presences and powers? These are the great questions to which Mr. Cook has given special attention. Dr. McCosh, the well-known President of Princeton College, regards Mr. Cook as a man who has a heaven-ordained mission, and one who has been prepared for it by an overruling guidance.

Mr. Cook was a student at Yale Harvard and Andover. Then he went to Germany studying at Halle, Berlin and Heidelberg. There he received a mighty impulse from Julius Muller of Halle, Dorner of Berlin, Kuno Fischer of Heidelberg, and Herman Lotze of Gottingen. After leaving Germany he travelled in Italy, Egypt, Syria, Greece, Turkey, Switzerland, France, England and Scotland.

He returned to the United States in 1873, and took up his residence in Boston, lecturing on the subject to which his studies had been so long directed—the relations of religion and science.

He first lectured in the Meionauon in 1875. The attendance was so large that his meetings had to be transferred to Park Street Church in October, 1876, and finally to the enormous Tremont Temple which is often crowded to excess.

His audiences were crowded with the elite of letters and intellect. His lectures appeared in whole or in abstract, in the leading newspapers and his fame spread over all America. He has since lectured to simi-

lar enthusiastic audience in England, Scotland, India and Australia.

Dr. McCosh says, "He lightens and thunders, throwing a vivid light on a topic by an expression or comparison, or striking a presumptuous error as by a bolt from heaven. He arrests his hearers first by his earnestness, then by the clearness of his exposition, and fixes the whole in the mind by the earnestness of his moral purpose." Professor Peabody, of Harvard says, "No other American author has done what he has done, or anything like it." Mr. Spurgeon says, "We bless God for raising up such a champion of truth as Joseph Cook."

We trust our readers will have an opportunity to hear this celebrated man and judge for themselves of his views concerning the reconciliation of science and religion.

SHIPPING NOTES.

The bark Josefa cleared on the 7th for Guaymas, Mexico, probably for a cargo of logwood.

The Mary Dodge took 16 days in coming from Eureka. She brought 217,890 feet of lumber and 300,000 shingles.

The bark Emerald cleared for Port Townsend yesterday with stores and ballast.

Messrs. J. W. Robertson & Co. report, that the four masted vessel which passed the port yesterday, was the British ship Euphrates, Capt. Cameron, 37 days out from New Castle, N.S.W., bound to San Francisco, with cargo of 3,610 tons coal.

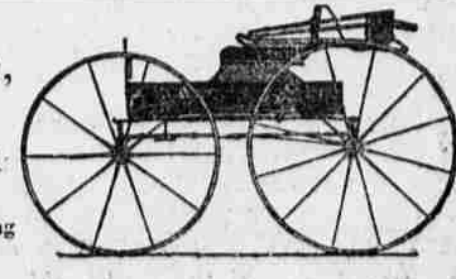

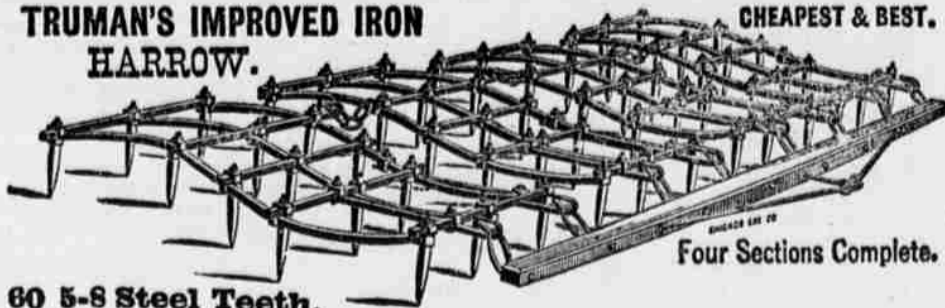
