

CALLS A HALT ON THE LANAI DEAL

L. L. McCANDLESS SECURES A TEMPORARY INJUNCTION RESTRAINING THE GOVERNOR AND THE LAND COMMISSIONER FROM CARRYING OUT THE PROPOSAL TO EXCHANGE LANAI GOVERNMENT LANDS FOR LAND IN OTHER PARTS OF TERRITORY.

The proposed exchange of the government lands on the island of Lanai has been checked. Late yesterday afternoon Senator L. L. McCandless secured an injunction from Circuit Judge Robison, preventing Governor Carter and Land Commissioner Pratt from carrying out the proposed exchange. The move by McCandless was a big surprise and caused a great deal of comment in official circles this morning when the details of the course became known.

Senator McCandless's opposition to the proposed exchange whereby Charles Gay or probably the Spreckels interests will secure complete control of the island, is well known. The island comprises 86,696 acres of land and out of this over 47,000 acres are government land. One special reason for McCandless opposing the government allowing its control of the island to pass, is the fact that there are at least two good harbors on the island. All water front control would pass from the Territory if the transfer be made.

The allegations in the bill in equity are of some length. The bill first sets forth the usual facts that McCandless is a resident of the territory, that Carter is governor and Pratt land commissioner. It then continues:

"First. All those certain public lands known as and called Kamoku containing an area of 8,291 acres, and those public lands known as Poamal containing an area of 9,078 acres, all of said lands being now leased to Charles Gay by the Territory of Hawaii under Government Lease No. 167, dated December 19th, 1890, for the term of 25 years, said lease expiring January 1st, 1916, at an annual rental of \$500 lawful money of the United States of America;

"Second. All those certain public lands known as and called Mapana containing an area of 7,900 acres said land being now leased to Charles Gay by the Territory of Hawaii under Government Lease No. 220, dated November 1st, 1878, for the term of 31 years, said lease expiring November 1, 1907, at an annual rental of \$100 lawful money of the United States of America;

"Third. All those certain public lands known as and called 'Kalulu' containing an area of 6,000 acres, 5,000 acres of which said land are now leased to Charles Gay by the Territory of Hawaii under Government lease No. 569, dated June 2, 1904, for the term of 21 years said lease expiring June 2, 1925, at an annual rental of \$600 lawful money of the United States of America;

"Fourth. All those certain public lands known as and called 'Kaomolu' containing an area of 7,400 acres, said land being now leased by the Territory of Hawaii to Charles Gay under Gov-

ernment lease No. 270, dated February 9, 1880 for the term of 27 years, said lease expiring February 9, 1907, at an annual rental of \$250 lawful money of the United States of America;

"Fifth. All those certain public lands known as and called 'Keala-Paawili' containing an area of 6,300 acres; and all those certain public lands known as and called 'Kamao' containing an area of 2,700 acres, all of said lands containing an area in all of 9,000 acres being now leased by the Territory of Hawaii to Charles Gay under Government Lease No. 168, dated June 23, 1873, for the term of 35 years said lease expiring June 23, 1908, at an annual rental of \$150 lawful money of the United States of America;

"And your orator further showeth unto your Honor that the island of Lanai, Territory of Hawaii, contains a total area of not more than 86,400 acres and that out of said total area of 86,400 acres the Territory of Hawaii holds as public lands only the lands above described by name containing a total area of 47,969 acres, that said 47,969 acres constitutes more than one-half of the total area of said island of Lanai;

"And your orator further showeth unto your Honor that on the 28th day of November, 1906, the respondent herein George R. Carter, as Governor of the Territory of Hawaii caused to be promulgated the following order, to wit:

"LANAI LANDS. Notice is hereby given that having decided an exchange of the Public Lands on the Island of Lanai to be advisable, the Commissioner of Public Lands is prepared to receive offers of other lands that are equal in value to those of Lanai, and of greater immediate service to the Territorial government, from any responsible person, up to and including Saturday, the fifteenth day of December, 1906.

G. R. CARTER, Governor.

Executive Building, Honolulu, November 28, 1906.

"That said notice and order was printed and published in the daily papers of the Territory of Hawaii, and more particularly in the Hawaiian Star by order of the said George R. Carter, Governor as aforesaid, on the 28th day of November, 1906, and the 1st, 4th, 8th and 11th of December, 1906;

"And your orator further showeth unto your Honor that the said George R. Carter as Governor aforesaid and the said James W. Pratt as Commissioner of Public Lands as aforesaid each and both decided, prior to said 28th day of November, 1906, to exchange

CHESTER DOYLE'S MYSTERIOUS MISSION

DEPARTS SECRETLY FOR MAUI LAST NIGHT—ATTORNEY GENERAL WAS ALSO ON MAUI.

There may be "something doing" on the island of Maui. Certainly there is some indication of a "clue" last evening Chester A. Doyle the criminologist of the attorney general's department quietly took the steamer Claudine and departed for Maui. What port he was bound for or what his purpose was not learned. In fact every effort was made to keep his departure a secret. He did not book his name for passage by the boat but went aboard her just before she sailed.

When Doyle makes trips of that character it is generally upon a mission of considerable importance in the public service. What gives additional cause for suspecting that Doyle has gone on a secret mission of importance is the fact that Attorney General E. C. Peters went to Maui this week, returning by the Claudine on Thursday and the following afternoon he dispatches Doyle secretly to the same island.

No statement was made at the Attorney general's office today relative to the departure of Doyle and evidently the nature of his mission is of such character that the absence of the criminologist is being kept quiet.

MAY SAVE CARGO FOR FUEL

It is not likely that the transport Sherman will leave for the Coast before Thursday next as the work of discharging her 1500 tons of Nagasaki coal is slow and working only one hatch, little more than 200 tons can be handled each day.

It is possible that all of this coal may not be discharged, for the transport Thomas reported difficulty in getting all the coal she needed before she left San Francisco and it may be considered best for the Sherman to save some of her cargo for fuel on the return voyage from the Coast.

YOUNG CHIEF TO TAKE SHERMAN HOME

CABLE FROM YOKOHAMA THAT CAPTAIN LAFFIN IS IMPROVING—JOHNSON COMPLIMENTED.

Chief Officer F. H. Johnson of the U. S. A. transport Sherman, who brought the vessel on dead reckoning from Yokohama where the master, Captain Laffin, was put ashore for an operation, will take the transport right through to San Francisco. He is but 24 years of age and has only been first officer of the Sherman for about a year. It is considered quite an appreciation of his ability that he is permitted to take the ship on the Coast and that her regular master, Brougier, was not sent down from the Coast where he stopped off a trip, in the Thomas, to take command from Honolulu up.

Johnson will undoubtedly be master of one of the boats of the transport fleet in a very short time. His father and his maternal grandfather were both well known masters his father, who died several years ago, having long been with the Pacific Mail S. S. Co. and his mother's father having been the master of a famous round-the-Horn clipper.

Captain Johnson received a cable last night from Yokohama to the effect that Captain Laffin is improving. This was good news aboard the Sherman and the inference is that the operation was successful.

TENDER FOR LANAI LAND

H. E. Cooper as attorney for W. M. Giffard, submitted a tender to Land Commissioner Pratt today for an exchange of the Lanai lands.

CUTS OUT PORTLAND

Advice received by Wm. G. Irwin & Co., the agents of the S. S. Hilonian of the Matson Line, state that the repairs to that steamer will be completed in about five weeks. The Hilonian's schedule will have to leave out Portland until the company can acquire another steamer to help out its freighting business during the coming sugar season. Intending shippers of freight from Portland by the above steamer therefore need not depend on her calling at Portland during the coming spring and summer.

SOLD THE LEWIS PROPERTY.

High Sheriff Henry sold at auction at noon today at the Capitol building six lots on Kalakaua Avenue known as the Lewis property. The property was sold under foreclosure of a mortgage held by A. S. Wilcox. J. E. Humburg bought the lots for \$500. J. H. Boyd was the only other bidder.

PRATT BACK FROM HAWAII.

Land Commissioner Pratt returned this morning from his trip to Hawaii and Maui. He went to attend to the leases of land at Hakalau plantation as some settlers desired to secure possession of public lands where the leases had expired. He also stopped at Kahuhi to attend to some land matters.

WON HAWAII CASES FOR TERRITORY

Assistant Attorney General F. W. Milverton returned today from Hilo where he went to represent the attorney general's department at the session of court and to transact several matters for the Territory. One of the matters that Milverton had to handle was the appeal that had been taken by Kaaihue Puao from the ejectment proceedings by Land Commissioner J. W. Pratt, to force him to relinquish some lands at Hamakua. Kaaihue's lease to the public lands had been cancelled by Pratt owing to the non-fulfillment of conditions. Puao took an appeal. Milverton settled the case, Puao withdrawing his appeal and allowing the territory to take possession of the land.

Foreign News By Cable

SOME SPECIAL MESSAGES.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—President Roosevelt will send special messages to Congress next week dealing with the report of Metcalf on the San Francisco school situation and Secretary Taft's reports on the Cuban settlement and the matter of the disbanding of the Twenty-fifth Infantry, the regiment of negroes.

A special message will also be presented dealing with the conditions on the Panama canal zone as seen by the President.

FUEL FAMINE GROWING SERIOUS

MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 15.—Conditions throughout the Northwest owing to the fuel famine have grown desperate. The farmers are tearing down their out-buildings and burning the lumber. In some states appeals have been made for the Governors to order out the militia to move the coal trains.

GENERAL BROWN IS DEAD.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—Brigadier General Justus M. Brown is dead. General Brown joined the army in 1862 as an assistant surgeon, serving through the Civil War, being brevetted captain and major for meritorious services in 1865. He served on the frontier during and after the war, rising in rank to the position of Assistant Surgeon General. At his own request he was retired after forty years' service in 1903, being made a brigadier general by act of Congress. He was born in Ohio in 1840.

Inequality of Representation

The summary quietus to S. W. Logan's contest of the election of J. M. Kealoha as supervisor from Koolau, while decidedly satisfactory in itself, ought to find its greatest importance in the attention it calls to needed re-arrangement in the allotment of supervisors to the various portions of this county.

If Logan had won his contest the glaring inequality of representation would be seen of a man having one-seventh of the voting power of the Board of Supervisors of the whole county who was elected by 98 votes out of a total of something like 6000 cast.

It is true that the man he tried to unseat was elected by only 109 votes, and that the whole constituency represented, cast only 384 votes. But that is the very point. Seven supervisors control and manage the affairs of the county.

While the Board does not have the taxing power, it has the control of the expenditure of the money raised by taxation, which is in effect the same thing. So that by reason of the present inequitable distribution of supervisors among the districts of the county, there is practically taxation without representation in the District of Honolulu.

World-Wide Human Nature

Human nature is probably much the same the world over. Self interest is a strong factor in human conduct. It has been charged that the effort to require Japanese physicians to pass a medical examination in English in Hawaii is largely because of the fear of the white members of the medical profession that an influx of Japanese medicos would cut into the business.

Now the same accusation is made against the Russian physicians in Vladivostok, under very similar circumstances. It is thus described in the Japan Gazette:

The Military Governor of Vladivostok has communicated to the Japanese Commercial Agent at Vladivostok that Japanese physicians will be prohibited from practicing in Primorsky from March next. The Japanese Agent then asked the Russian Governor whether Japanese physicians are able to continue their practice for Japanese patients only, but the Governor replied that he had merely conveyed to the Agent the St. Petersburg Government order to that effect and he was not able to interpret the order.

THE HAWAII DEBATE.

The Tribune and Herald of Hilo are now engaged in an animated debate. The Herald to prove that the County of Hawaii is "busted," and the Tribune to prove that it isn't—that it has thousands of dollars of hard cash right in its treasury. They have been at it for three or four weeks. After the preliminaries of demurrers and pleas in abatement, to the jurisdiction and in bar had been gone through the Tribune filed this rejoinder:

"Despite the attempt which have been made to injure the credit of the county by published stories to the effect that the county is 'busted,' the fact remains that it is very far from being so."

"No, the county is not busted. It is registering warrants just for fun. On November 21 the Honolulu Iron Works presented a warrant for \$3550. In a fine spirit of levity the treasurer told the company that he could not pay it, and amid roars of hilarity it was duly registered. The amusement created was so great that the treasurer has kept it up ever since, and he now has fifty-three warrants registered, aggregating \$6,481.98. The owners of these warrants, who cannot get their money, will be delighted to learn that the county is not busted."

To this the Tribune in its next issue filed the following rejoinder: "Comment on the above may not be necessary. It will do to submit the facts and figures. On December 6 the following was the actual state of the funds of the County of Hawaii:

The President On The Inheritance Tax

The following is the portion of the President's message relating to income and inheritance taxes:

ENACT INHERITANCE AND INCOME TAX LAW

The question of taxation is difficult in any country, but it is especially difficult in ours, with its Federal system of government. Some taxes should on every ground be levied in a small district for use in that district. Thus the taxation of real estate is peculiarly one for the immediate locality in which the real estate is found. Again, there is no more legitimate tax for any State than a tax on the franchises conferred by that State upon street railroads and similar corporations which operate wholly within the State boundaries, sometimes in one and sometimes in several municipalities or other minor divisions of the State. But there are many kinds of taxes which can only be levied by the general Government so as to produce the best results, because, among other reasons, the attempt to impose them in one particular State too often results merely in driving the corporation or individual affected to some other locality or other State. The National Government has long derived its chief revenue from a tariff on imports and from an internal or excise tax. In addition to these there is every reason why, when next our system of taxation is revised, the National Government should impose a graduated inheritance tax, and, if possible, a graduated income tax. The man of great wealth owes a peculiar obligation to the State, because he derives special advantages from the mere existence of government. Not only should he recognize this obligation in the way he leads his daily life and in the way he earns and spends his money, but it should also be recognized by the way in which he pays for the protection the State gives him. On the one hand, it is desirable that he should assume his full and proper share of the burden of taxation; on the other hand, it is quite as necessary that in this kind of taxation, where the men who vote the tax pay but little of it, there should be clear recognition of the danger of inaugurating any such system save in a spirit of entire justice and moderation.

EQUALIZE TAX BURDEN.

Whenever we as a people undertake to remodel our taxation system along the lines suggested we must make it clear beyond peradventure that our aim is to distribute the burden of supporting the Government more equitably than at present; that we intend to treat rich man and poor man on a basis of absolute equality, and that we regard it as equally fatal to true democracy to do or permit injustice to the one or to do or permit injustice to the other.

I am well aware that such a subject as this needs long and careful study; in order that the people may become familiar with what is proposed to be done, may clearly see the necessity of proceeding with wisdom and self-restraint and may make up their minds just how far they are willing to go in the matter, while only trained legislators can work out the project in necessary detail. But I feel that in the near future our national legislators should enact a law providing for a graduated inheritance tax, by which a steadily increasing rate of duty should be put upon all moneys or other valuables coming by gift, bequest or devise to any individual or corporation. It may be well to make the tax heavy in proportion as the individual benefited is remote of kin. In any event, in my judgment the pro rata of the tax should increase very heavily with the increase of the amount left to any one individual after a certain point has been reached. It is most desirable to encourage thrift and ambition, and a potent source of thrift and ambition is the desire on the part of the breadwinner to leave his children well off. This object can be attained by making the tax very small on moderate amounts of property left, because the prime object should be to put a constantly increasing burden on the inheritance of those swollen fortunes which it is certainly of no benefit to this country to perpetuate.

PLAN IS ETHICAL.

There can be no question of the ethical propriety of the Government thus determining the conditions upon which any gift or inheritance should be received. Exactly how far the inheritance tax would, as an incident, have the effect of limiting the transmission by devise or gift of the enormous fortunes in question it is not

necessary at present to discuss. It is wise that progress in this direction should be gradual. At first a permanent national inheritance tax, while it might be more substantial than any such tax has hitherto been, need not approximate, either in amount or in the extent of the increase by graduation, to what such a tax should ultimately be.

This species of tax has again and again been imposed, altho only temporarily, by the National Government. It was first imposed by the act of July 6, 1797, when the makers of the constitution were alive and at the head of affairs. It was a graduated tax; the small in amount, the rate was increased with the amount left to any individual, exceptions being made in the case of certain close kin. A similar tax was again imposed by the act of July 1, 1862; a minimum sum of one thousand dollars in personal property being exempted from taxation, the tax then becoming progressive according to the remoteness of kin. The war-revenue act of June 13, 1898, provided for an inheritance tax on any sum exceeding the value of ten thousand dollars, the rate of the tax increasing both in accordance with the amounts left and in accordance with the legatee's remoteness of kin. The Supreme Court has held that the succession tax imposed at the time of the Civil War was not a direct tax but an impost or excise which was both constitutional and valid. More recently the court, in an opinion delivered by Mr. Justice White, which contained an exceedingly able and elaborate discussion of the powers of the Congress to impose death duties sustained the constitutionality of the inheritance tax feature of the war-revenue act of 1898.

INCOME TAX DIFFICULT.

In its incidents, and apart from the main purpose of raising revenue, an income tax stands on an entirely different footing from an inheritance tax; because it involves no question of the perpetuation of fortunes swollen to an unhealthy size. The question is in its essence a question of the proper adjustment of burdens to benefits. As the law now stands it is undoubtedly difficult to devise a national income tax which shall be constitutional. But whether it is absolutely impossible is another question; and if possible it is mostly certainly desirable. The first purely income-tax law was passed by the Congress in 1861, but the most important law dealing with the subject was that of 1894. This the court held to be unconstitutional.

The question is undoubtedly very intricate, delicate and troublesome. The decision of the court was only reached by one majority. It is the law of the land, and of course is accepted as such and loyally obeyed by all good citizens. Nevertheless, the hesitation evidently felt by the court as a whole in coming to a conclusion, when considered together with the previous decisions on the subject, may perhaps indicate the possibility of devising a constitutional income-tax law which shall substantially accomplish the results aimed at. The difficulty of amending the constitution is so great that only real necessity can justify a resort thereto. Every effort should be made in dealing with this subject, as with the subject of the proper control by the National Government over the use of corporate wealth in interstate business, to devise legislation which without such action shall attain the desired end; but if this fails, there will ultimately be no alternative to a constitutional amendment.

THE STORM AT KAHULUI

SEA WAS QUITE HEAVY AND THE EMILY F. WHITNEY STRAINED HEAVILY AT HER MOORINGS.

KAHULUI, Maui, December 12.—Kahului harbor has this past week presented quite an old time appearance with a forest of masts from the sailing ships and at times the masts and funnels of steamers. The bark Emily F. Whitney, Capt. Goodman, master, arrived from Eureka, Cal., on Saturday last, the 8th inst., with a full cargo of lumber and K. W. posts for the Kahului R. R. Co. The vessel excited quite a little comment as she entered the harbor, as she had quite a big list to one side, due to a shifting of the cargo en route.

The bark will have all of her cargo of coal out by tomorrow, and expects to sail for Port Townsend on Saturday or Sunday. The Mohican is experiencing the usual trouble in getting a crew to go out with. Most of the sailors made trouble and were paid off here when the vessel arrived, and Capt. Hersey went to Honolulu to get new men. He brought several sailors up with him, but three of them walked ashore the same day that they arrived, their objection being that they did not want to work the coal. The captain is now expecting more men from Honolulu and his departure will depend on his luck in securing the same.

The schooner S. T. Alexander is discharging and has most of her deck load off, but she will not get away until after Christmas.

Sunday and Monday last the S. S. Nebraskan lay in the harbor also, giving the harbor a decidedly busy appearance. This trip of the Nebraskan has been unique in a way, as it is the first time that one of the large steamers has come to Kahului and gone away without taking any freight at all. This was also the first trip of Capt. Knight as master of the big freighter. Capt. Knight states that he story in the San Francisco Examiner as to his elevation to the command of the big liner Mongolia was all a fake, as he was not offered the said command, the story originating through the overzealousness of a reporter. Capt. Knight further states that he is very well satisfied where he is. The Nebraskan sailed on Monday evening for Hilo, and expected to get away from Hilo for Seattle on Tuesday evening. There is a rumor about here that the Nebraskan is soon to be put on the run from Kahului to Salinas Cruz, carrying the sugars from that island direct, and cutting out the Maui port. Maui people hope that such will not be the case, for the Nebraskan is a favorite boat here.

For the past week a very heavy surf has been running here along the coast, the breakers at times going right over the breakwater, although the inner harbor has been quite calm. The breakwater has shown the effect of the heavy hammering of the breakers to a certain extent, the rocks having been leveled down somewhat, but not more than was expected. The breakwater being in very much of an unfinished state the effect of the winter's storms upon it has been feared, but so far there has been nothing to worry about. If it goes through this winter, in the state that it is, here will then be no question about its lasting when completed. Last night a very heavy tide was running out of the harbor, which caught the brk Emily F. Whitney and swung her against her opes with great force, and put such a strain upon them that several lines parted and for a time but one line was holding her. The severe strain also carried away a part of her rail and some bits, but she was soon made secure, and the damage will be easily repaired.

THE PITTSBURG CORNER. It has been found by the Panama canal commissioners that there is a scarcity of laborers in all parts of the world, and it is even reported from New York that the supply of chorus girls is running short. Something must be done to stop people from going to Pittsburg and becoming millionaires.—Chicago Record-Herald.

KOREAN GARRISON TO BE REDUCED

IN VIEW OF MILITARY INCREASEMENT AT HOME JAPAN WILL ECONOMIZE ABROAD.

VICTORIA, B. C., November 2.—Marquis Ito, resident general for Japan in Korea, is to return in December and Count Katsura, former premier, will replace him. News to this effect was given in a letter received yesterday from a Japanese journalist of Tokyo who is in close touch with the government.

The writer also says that, in view of military increase at home and in keeping with economic measures planned by the military authorities, half of the Japanese garrisons in Manchuria and Korea are to be recalled. The military program comprises the augmentation of the Japanese army to nineteen divisions, exclusive of the imperial guards division of Tokyo. At present four divisions are maintained as garrisons in Korea and Manchuria. These will be reduced to two divisions.

News was given out of how the Japanese secured a big British steamer without cost owing to a legal controversy arising out of the coming of the ill-fated Baltic squadron of Rojestvensky to Japanese waters. When the Baltic squadron was passing Formosa the British steamer Oldhamia was

captured. Having been abandoned vessel and Japanese newspapers report when the Russian squadron was defeated in the sea of Japan, the Manchester Steamship Company, have consented to the possession of the steamer by Mr. Murakawa on condition that he will give evidence in connection with the claim for damages filed by the company against the Russian government.—Washington Star.

Pratt as the Commissioner of Public Lands as aforesaid have issued said advertisement above set forth calling for offers to be given the said Commissioner of Public Lands of other lands that are equal in value to those of Lanai and of greater immediate service to the Territorial Government from any responsible person up to and including the 15th day of December, 1906.

"And your orator further showeth unto your Honor that your orator is informed and believes and upon such information and belief alleges that the said James W. Pratt as Commissioner of Public Lands as aforesaid threatens to and will exchange said public lands on the island of Lanai for other lands equal in value to those of Lanai in case said Pratt receives an offer therefor from a responsible person; and the said George R. Carter as Governor of the Territory of Hawaii as aforesaid threatens to and will consent to and approve of such an exchange, unless he the said Pratt, and he the said Carter, be restrained and enjoined from so doing:

"And your orator further shows unto your Honor upon information and belief that the said public lands of Lanai are of great value, the said land of Kapokua containing about 8000 acres of land which is good grazing land, and having about 3 miles of sea frontage with a good harbor; said land extending inland about 6 miles and having a value of \$40,000; and that the said public land known as and called Paomai which is good grazing land, having about 5 1/2 miles of sea frontage including a fair harbor or landing, and extending inland over 6 miles, has a value of \$37,000.

"And your orator further shows unto your Honor that the tracts of said public lands of Lanai other than said lands of Kapokua and Paomai are also of great value each of said tracts of land being worth more than the sum of \$5,000."

The petition further sets forth the fact that the governor was about to direct the Land Commissioner to make a transfer of the government's holdings on Lanai and prayer for the issuance of a temporary injunction restraining Pratt from making the transfer or Carter approving such transfer.

Judge Robinson issued a temporary injunction and a bond of \$1,000 was given by McCandless. Service was obtained today. The matter was submitted to Attorney General Peters by Governor Carter.

Today, December 15, was the final day when tenders for the transfer of the land could be made. The upset price of the government property was placed at about \$107,000.

"I consider," said Judge Gear the attorney for McCandless "it is an outrage that such exchange of public land should take place. Senator McCandless has shown himself to be a public spirited citizen in seeking to prevent the transfer. There is at least one good harbor about that island and the government loses entire control of the water front and harbor facilities of the island. If such an exchange is made, there is nothing to prevent any private owner from selling that land to the Japanese if he chose, and giving them a foothold in these islands. I consider the situation quite a serious one and I think that every influence should be brought to bear to prevent the transfer, on political considerations aside from the actual value of these government lands which are shown in the governor's report to be exceedingly valuable assets.

"I believe that the President would order the sale stopped, if the facts were presented to his notice."

TOWN TALK

By The Man About Town.

I had a dream the other night— You bet it was a julu; I dreamed that Absorandolph Hearst Came out to Honolulu. He came to start a newspaper, To swell his string of papers, And some of his experience Was full of funny capers. Before the first issue came out, A business delegation Swooped down upon poor Willie Hearst To make an explanation. "Please, Mr. Hearst, if you're a man, You'll understand conditions; We admit they are peculiar And affect our high positions. "But please refrain from printing here What we would call 'sensations'— We don't object to a weather report (With proper explanations.) "But do not tell the truth, you know, Of our unique condition, For we're afraid the town will go Too quickly to perdition." But Willie Randolph went ahead And published news exclusive, Whereat the timid, tender ones Jumped up with talk abusive. They shouted: "Yellow, freak and fake!" And straight began to whoop, sir, And the papers that had not the news Lied hard to down the "scoop," sir. A brick fell on a citizen And smashed his dollar dice; The man called at the office and Said: "Mr. Hearst, be nice, sir. "I ask you, for my family's sake, Not to make a mention Of this deplorable accident. Nor draw it to attention." A lady had a cat that died, To Hearst she quickly hurried: "Oh, Mr. Hearst, don't print it, please; My husband will be worried." And ere I woke I dreamed that Hearst, Without an explanation, Had run away to dull New York For rest and recreation. It was not until the files of the Coast papers began to arrive here early this week that the local community had any adequate conception of the acute stage of the relations between Japan and the United States. So far as any cable advices by the Associated Press was concerned Japan might as well have dropped into the sea. While the people of these islands are more directly concerned in possible friction between the two nations than any other people, I do not think that we fully realize the cause of the trouble. People here who know the

Japanese well and understand them cannot appreciate the reason for certain elements of the mainland entertaining such violent antipathy against the Japanese, at least when it comes to the extent of their attending schools. Hence it is that the local community can not fully understand why such a big row should come out of the school difficulty at San Francisco. There is one other feature about the situation that is to my mind, exceedingly disquieting. Suppose that the President carries his point and the Japanese are admitted to the regular public schools in San Francisco and the "treaty rights" of the Japanese are recognized will that end the trouble? I think not. There is every reason to anticipate that the existence of the Japanese in those schools will be made disagreeable in many petty ways, ways that hurt the feelings and injure the sensitive pride of the Japanese in a manner that nothing can heal. It is by such personal slights that sentiments of hatred that have been the moral force that has driven nations to war have been created. I have not seen so many Japanese war medals worn since that story of the presence of two Japanese regiments in Honolulu from colonels down was published. I wonder why. And do you know what two regiments of Japanese means. It does not mean 2,500 men as in the American service. It means about 4,000 men as the Japanese regiments are larger than ours. By the way do you know how Honolulu would first learn that the two countries had come to war? Well it would not be through any cable advices of a declaration of war—quite the contrary. Honolulu would wake up some morning and hear that cable communication between San Francisco and Midway had been stopped, and then Diamond Head Charlie would begin to report the smoke of steamers off Barber's Point and Koko Head and those two regiments would begin to get busy and take possession of Honolulu. Just contemplate for an instant the result. Our yard boys would go into our houses and put us out watering the grass; it would be Harrysan and Thomasan and Williesan and every body would wear kimonas, eat rice, use chopsticks and drink saké. The last is, to my mind, the worst condition of the lot. Fine Job Printing, Star Office.

Mills Institute and Kamehameha Boys' School tied for the banner awarded in the same way to a school society, each having 100 per cent of its members present. **MANY HEIRS, SMALL ESTATE.** A petition that letters testamentary issue to Joseph L. Pa was filed by

him yesterday with the circuit court. The proceedings were brought in the matter of the estate of Mary Ann Pa, who died at Honolulu, November 29, 1906. The property consists of real estate in the territory valued at \$2500; cash with Castle & Whittington, \$171; money loaned on mortgage, \$810. The heirs are Daniel and Joseph, sons; Bernice, daughter and T. K. Pa, husband. **FATHER SYLVESTER'S ESTATE.** A petition was filed in the circuit court yesterday by Judge Perry as attorney for the Bishop of Zeugma, asking that letters testamentary issue to the bishop in the matter of the estate

of Rev. Father Sylvester Stappers, who died at Maui, November 12, 1906.
