BISMARCK DEAD.
The Great German Statesman Passes Out of Time.
 Prince Bismarck died at his castle of Friedrichruhe at 11 o'clock the night of July 30. The death of the former Chancellor came as a surprise to all Europe, on account of favorable bulletins issued regarding his condition until nearly the last. Dr. Schweininger's assertion that there was no reason why Bismarck should not reach the age of ninety was accepted by the public.
 It appears that the Chancellor's death was not precipitated by sudden complications, but was rather the culmination of chronic disease—neuralgia of the face and inflammation of the veins—which kept him in constant pain, which was borne with the iron fortitude which might have been expected.
 Otto Edward Leopold Bismarck, born April 1, 1815, was the son of an old Prussian family long settled in Pomerania and Brandenburg. He first saw the light on his father's estate of Schonhausen.
 Bismarck was studious but wild in his youth. He was intended for a career of jurisprudence. At 32 years of age he entered parliament in Berlin as Knight's Deputy to the Landtag of Prussian Saxony. From the first he took a lead as the defender of royalty against the constitutional movement of the time.
 His wonderful career of diplomacy, that only ended in 1890 was begun in 1851 as Minister Plenipotentiary to the Frankfurt Diet. He then saw and convinced his king that Russian supremacy meant the downfall of Austria in Germany. In 1862 Bismarck was raised to the double dignity of Russian Premier and German Chancellor. From that moment until he handed his resignation to the grandson of the monarch he made an Emperor, he had been the foremost man on the continent of Europe and the incarnate genius of his country. All he did was on a perfect system. He drove the Danes from Schleswig-Holstein and annexed the duchy to Prussia. Austria showed her teeth, and this heralded the war he sought. On June 14, 1866, war against Prussia was declared. Hanover, Saxony and Hesse supported Austria. Within a few days Bismarck had overrun and disarmed these three German States. Before the end of June, so fully was Bismarck prepared, the Prussian troops had entered Bohemia, and on the 3rd day of July Austria was routed, horse, foot and dragoons, in the decisive battle of Sadowa. Austria had been crushed in nineteen days after Sadowa. Throughout the combat Bismarck was at King William's side. By the treaty of Prague, which followed, the German Bund was dissolved, a North German Confederation under the Presidency of Prussia was enacted, and Hanover, Schleswig-Holstein, Hesse and a large slice of Saxony were annexed to Prussia. Austria's power in Germany was over and Prussia had taken her place. Bismarck at once rose to the pinnacle of popularity.
 His part in bringing about the humiliation of Austria in 1866, and in the defeat of France, the overthrow of the French monarchy and the creation of the German Empire in 1870 and 1871, forms many of the most highly illuminated pages of modern history. Bismarck formed his plan of German unity as early as 1856.

THE PHILIPPINES.

Aguinaldo, the Insurgent Leader. Causes Serious Apprehensions.

Douglas White, the Examiner correspondent, sent a special cable from Cavite, Manila Bay, dated July 26, saying that Emilio Aguinaldo, the insurgent leader, is going to cause trouble here, and already Admiral Dewey regards him as an enemy rather than a friend. It has been evident for some time that he has been jealous of American power, as transport after transport landed American soldiers.

While he has kept up a friendly front, he has issued secret orders to his men not to permit the Americans to secure the necessary horses and other equipments. All this has been very annoying to Admiral Dewey and the American Generals, and General Merritt, now that he has taken command in the field, will probably find Aguinaldo a more formidable opponent than Captain-General Augusti.

Admiral Dewey has communicated this state of affairs to Washington, though he is not at all alarmed at the outlook.

The insurgent leader would not dare to order an attack on the American camps, because they are protected by the guns of the squadron, and it is not at all certain that the other chiefs would obey his commands. Even if they should, General Merritt, aided by the squadron, could repel a combined assault from both Aguinaldo and the Spaniards. The other insurgent chiefs are chafing under Aguinaldo's orders, and trouble is brewing in his camp. His officers are offended by his assumption of dictatorship, and the rank and file object strenuously to the war taxes.

John Barret, another Examiner correspondent, gives the following news from Manila on July 28:

General Augusti was preparing for desperate resistance until he heard that Camara was not coming with a fleet. Now he only hopes that peace will come in time to prevent his being compelled to yield to force of the American arms.

If not, when General Merritt and Admiral Dewey send an ultimatum that they will attack Manila by land and sea unless it surrenders without resistance, Augusti will propose to capitulate on these terms:

The Spanish troops to march out with the honors of war.

The soldiers and military and civil officials to be granted parole to return to Spain.

Protection to be assured to the life and property of Spaniards. Generals Green and Anderson narrowly escaped being shot while riding near Malate.

Dewey expects to take the city without loss of life.

The Spanish officer who reported Sampson's victory in Manila was treated as a traitor and threatened with death.

Four thousand Americans are camped within a mile of Manila, protected by artillery and the guns of the Boston and Callao. The rebels are firing shells into the city from four guns on the south side.

A Washington dispatch quotes General Merritt's announcement of his arrival at Cavite in the Newport on July 25. The remainder of his fleet was about four days in the rear. Health of the commands good. General Merritt concluded, "All troops assigned me will probably be needed."

Another dispatch received from Admiral Dewey announces that Aguinaldo has assumed a bold attitude of defiance, and that it would take a large force from this country to subdue the insurgents.

Aguinaldo, the insurgent Philippine chief, has declined an American protectorate. The Administration has cabled Admiral Dewey to grant no terms which do not include the absolute submission of Aguinaldo to the scheme of American military operations.

The President and Cabinet are united on the absolute necessity of preventing Aguinaldo from capturing Manila. Humanity, civilization and common sense protest against the subjugation of a city of 200,000 white people by a mob of Malays.
