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CONSUL - GENERAL OSBORN
Something About the New American Representative in Samoa.
Whose Arrival May Mean the Restoration of the Lost American Influence in the Islands.

Lack of space prevented extended mention of the presence in this city last week of Hon. Luther W. Osborn of Nebraska, recently appointed Consul General of the United States at Samoa, who was on his way to his post in the steamship Moana.

President McKinley's first choice for this position was Church Howe of Nebraska, who ran for Congress a few years ago and was beaten. Mr. Howe was nominated and confirmed by the Senate. Then he commenced to read up on the Samoan situation. The more he absorbed information about the last home of Robert Louis Stevenson the less he cared for the prospect of a long stay in the South Pacific, where Americans and iced drinks are equally scarce and butter a dollar a pound. He finally told Senator Thurston he would like another place. Through that gentleman's influence President McKinley was induced to send Howe to Palermo, Italy, and give the Samoan appointment to Judge L. W. Osborn of Blair, Nebraska.

Mr. Osborn had a rival for the position in the person of Lloyd Osborne, stepson of Robert Louis Stevenson and vice-consul of Apia for the fifteen months regime of the present Consul-General, William Churchill, but President McKinley evidently did not give his application any serious consideration.

It was stated that as soon as Mr. Osborn's appointment was confirmed, instructions were given him by the State Department, which when carried out will form the basis for the restoration of the lost influence of the United States in the Samoan Islands. Under the Cleveland Administration Samoa was virtually abandoned to Germany and Great Britain, and no attempt to live up to the provisions of the tripartite agreement has since been made by the United States Government. President McKinley, however, considers the islands well worth holding, to the limited extent provided by the agreement, and his ideas on the subject are embodied in the instructions which Mr. Osborn carries with him to Apia.

Before proceeding to his post Mr. Osborn spent several weeks studying the correspondence and archives of the State Department at Washington on the Samoan affair. Briefly stated, his instructions from the State Department are to make an inquiry into the political conditions in the islands, with particular reference to the workings of the tripartite arrangement, and so suggest a plan for the improvement of the provisions of the agreement. His report will be made to President McKinley, who has given the matter considerable study and has been impressed with the strategical and commercial importance of the Samoan group to the United States.

In view of the prospective annexation of the Hawaiian Islands by the United States Samoan affairs have assumed an importance hitherto denied them by the United States administration, and it is now said in Washington that everything will be done to secure American influence there.

The German Government views the advent of the new Consul-General with more or less displeasure, and the German press is full of abuse of him. One of the chief organs of the Colonial party, for instance, says he is "an unscrupulous American who considers all means justifiable to reach an end" and argues from the state-

ment that the German Government should deal with Samoa as the United States has with Hawaii, as the only possible means of protecting Germany's interests, contending that the opportunity for annexation is favorable, owing to the United States seizing Hawaii and Great Britain claiming the Tonga Islands.
It must be apparent that the new Consul General's berth will be no bed of roses and that he will have much to contend with in restoring American prestige in the islands. Whether he will be equal to the position has yet to be proved.

THE OAHU PLANTATION.
Cane Planting is Now Going Ahead at a Lively Rate.

Cane planting was commenced at the Oahu plantation last Monday but very little progress was made the first two days. The first of the new pumps was started up, but everything being new about the machinery several stoppages were necessary to tighten and pack valves, etc., but by Tuesday afternoon everything worked to perfection. About fifty acres of cane were planted by Thursday night, and when the laborers knock off work this afternoon Manager Ahrens expects to have fully one hundred acres planted.

Halloween Dance.

There was a large attendance at the Halloween dance of the Scottish Thistle Club at Sans Souci last night. A gay time was had, the Highland schottische being a feature. Delicious sandwiches, cake and hot coffee were served at intermission, besides lemonade the whole evening. Free busses connected with the cars. JUSTICE SWIFT IN CHINA

Part Played By Dr. Burns in Exposing a Fraud.

Fakir and His Attorney and the Man He Duped Sent to Jail by a Shanghai Mandarin.

"When the Victoria touched at the port of Shanghai on her last west bound trip," the Tacoma Ledger is told by Dr. A. E. Burns, of Tacoma, who made the voyage in the Victoria as ship's physician, "We lay off in the stream. There were a number of Chinese passengers aboard, and the native water rats of Shanghai, as is their custom, came in sampans to sell liquor to the Chinese passengers."

"Captain Panton, master of the Victoria, had given orders not to allow any of the peddlers aboard the ship.

"Quartermaster Sorenson obeyed the order, and as a result was arrested within a few hours on the charge of murder, and before the end of the next day the men causing his arrest were in jail, together with the man he was supposed to have killed, together with the native lawyer, who lent his services to prosecute the alleged murderer. The affair came about in this way:

"The captain and others, including myself, and gone ashore to look around had attend to business. While we were away a peddler came alongside in his sampan, bringing with him liquors to sell.

"His wife was with him. The peddler seized a rope hanging over the ship's side and began to climb aboard.

"The quartermaster made a rush to the side and vehemently commanded the coolie to leave the ship.

"Of course there were a number of his fellow countrymen along the rail. When the quartermaster gave his orders the peddler had climbed about eight feet up the ship's side, and seized the opportunity to play a trick worthy of the slyest son of Old Confucius.

"When the quartermaster's foot came down on the deck, and his arms flew frantically about as if to play the battering ram on the intrusive water-rat the wily Chinese loosened his hold and dropped with a thud into his sampan.

"Of course he was dead, and immediately a great hub bub prevailed among the Chinese aboard the ship. The peddler's wife set up a mournful wail, shouting that her husband had been killed by the quartermaster.

"The Chinese aboard took up the cry and nothing would do but that the quartermaster should be arrested.

"Accordingly two Chinese passengers took the matter in charge, and soon raised a large sum of money with which to conduct the prosecution.

"The trick was played in the afternoon, but the supposed dead man was not removed until the next day. In the meantime he

feigned death, and lay in the boat in the position in which he fell, and with his woman staying there all night, cold and still, but as the man on the night watch said, warm enough to smoke a cigarette during the wee sma' hours.

"The day following, the two Chinese having the prosecution in charge, went ashore, and going before the proper authorities secured the arrest of the quartermaster.

"The captain's party was then informed of the matter, and we took a launch and went out to see the dead man. I being the physician, was called upon to pass on the condition of the corpse.

"Some one said take a large knife and act as though you were about to cut him open and see how quickly he will tumble in the bay and swim away, but I did not do so.

"I seized the hand of the corpse. His pulse throbbed like that of a mule. His pupil was as bright as day, and his eyes popped out like jacks-in-the-box when the lids were lifted.

"He breathed steadily, as strongly as a locomotive but he was dead. Yes and stiff; too stiff in fact for a genuine corpse.

"The body was taken ashore and hauled in a rickshaw to the mixed court, presided over by a mandarin decked in official robe and the cap of rank.

"In the meantime the ship was delayed, but that could not be avoided. The woman followed the remains of her husband to the seat of justice, and there the preliminary trial was opened and the case quickly settled.

"About the first thing the corpse did was to open his eyes; the court caught the drift of the game, and everyone else present pricked up their ears and looked annoyed. The parties having the prosecution in charge were there with their attorney.

"A few words of inquiry and explanation were sprinkled between the acts of the reviving dead man before the mandarin gave the royal peacock feather a flourish and pronounced the sentence:

"The two prosecutors, the man who played dead and the attorney who defended him were each sentenced to four months in jail and to wear the kiang about the neck two months.

"In the latter condition the wearer cannot eat unless some one hands him food over the board and the penalty is considered a disgrace.

"We, of the ship, told his honor that it was a shame and a grievous matter to permit the practise of such affairs and that the ship and the mail she carried had been delayed. The court evidently thought so, too.

"Of course the Chinese who caused all the trouble expected his 'widow' would be offered a fat sum to leave the ship with the corpse or that the passengers would make up a purse and present it to her.

"When we put in at Shanghai on the return passage I visited the jail where the principals were in custody. The lawyer begged the captain to secure his pardon, but we did nothing for him."

LUMBER SHIPMENTS.

San Francisco is Still in the Business of Supplying Hawaii.

Many people run away with the idea that San Francisco is out of the lumber trade with Hawaii, and that all the lumber imported comes from Humboldt and Mendocino counties in California and from Puget Sound and the Southwestern ports of Washington. While this is true of pine lumber, a great deal of redwood still comes from San Francisco.

The shipments of redwood lumber from San Francisco to ports in Hawaii during the month of September last amounted to 109,316 feet, valued at \$1853. During the same month there were also shipped to Hawaii 480,000 shingles, 100 packages of shooks and 6428 railroad ties.

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On a damp, muddy or dusty excursion the dress is raised out of harm's way, but the petticoat takes its own share of hardship, with the addition of what belongs by right to the dress skirt. It is spotted by water, stained by mud and grass, permeated by dust, and, however carefully it may be brushed daily, unless it is of a kind that can be washed its beauty is soon a thing of the past.

How to Stain a Floor. It will be found very difficult to stain the center of a floor to match the border. The quickest means will be to stain it with burnt umber mixed with vanilkye brown ground up in water (not oil) and diluted with boiling water in which a piece of soda has been dissolved.

How to Improve Defects in the Hands. Starched linen should be placed next to only those skins that have the firmness and perfect texture of youth. White, starched linen is fatal to almost any woman's charms.

How to Prepare Cauliflower Au Gratin. Boil the cauliflower, drain, lay in a dish and pour over it a cup of drawn butter well seasoned. Sprinkle with four tablespoonfuls of grated cheese and brown by holding a red-hot shovel so close to the cheese that it sizzles and takes fire.

How to Make Candied Lemon Peel. As lemons are used, drop the yellow rind into a weak brine in a glass jar. When a dozen are thus pickled, they are freshened by putting them into cold water and letting them scald, changing the water once or twice to extract the salt.

How to Cook Carrots. Peel and scrape some carrots and divide each into four quarters. Boil in salted water till tender and drain very dry. Dissolve some butter in a saucepan and add the pieces of cooked carrot. Shake constantly and after five minutes serve very hot with good brown gravy or dry, as taste dictates.

San Francisco and California will better realize the value of the Hawaiian trade when a huge proportion of it goes to the Atlantic seaboard the coming year "round the Horn."

If there is one thing the Government deserves credit for more than another, it is in the way new roads are being constructed and old ones repaired. One can ride out of town nearly to Koko Head now with ease and pleasure on a wheel.

Sometime ago the Hawaiian Tramways Co. advertised ten minute cars on Beretania street from five to six o'clock in the evenings for the benefit of business men who might be detained in their places of business after the regular closing time. The favor has not been very well carried out. From six to seven the cars might be dropped out altogether, if they were run oftener the previous hour.

For the high standing the sugar industry of these islands holds, in respect to advancement in methods of cultivation and manufacture, organization must be largely credited. If the coffee industry is to take the place it should, it must do so through organization. The coffee growers have an association but, as the Sunday school boy said of his father when asked if he had religion, they are "not working at it much." Unless the coffee industry secures a system of official classification, marking and warehousing, it will be long in passing the merely speculative stage.

JUDGE STANLEY.

Mr. Thurston's Mundane Partner Second Judge of First Circuit.

W. L. Stanley, of the law firm of Thurston & Stanley, was this day appointed by the Cabinet as Second Judge of the First Circuit of the Hawaiian Islands.

A member of the Cabinet said to the BULLETIN representative: "Several persons were considered, and it was a matter of a great deal of interest to members of the Bar and the Bench.

"The appointment of E. P. Dole, Deputy Attorney General, would have been acceptable to a majority of the Bar and the Bench, but his relationship to the President was deemed by President Dole to be an obstacle.

"Mr. Stanley, although a young man, has gained the esteem of members of the Bar and the Bench in a great degree. He is well-grounded in law, industrious and of high character.

"Although he accepted the office with great reluctance his legal attainments have already made a good record.

Judge Stanley is a year older than Judge Perry, now promoted to the first place, was when he was first appointed a Judge."

John E. Bush has been appointed Hawaiian interpreter to the higher courts. Congratulations, John.

Sir Nowell Salmon, Admiral of the British navy, and Admiral Miller, of the United States navy, called on Minister Cooper of Foreign Affairs and President Dole this morning.

CURTAINS AND PORTIERES.

Novel and Effective Styles For the Coming Season.

The newest things in curtains are lace ones elaborately decorated with ribbon work. The designs are floral and are very pronounced. When carried out on cream nets with white satin ribbons of various widths, the effect is very striking. This is only one item of many reported in the New York Sun by a writer who had been interviewing dealers in curtains for the coming season. Following is additional information from this same source:

The newest curtains have centers of plain coarse nets, with an edge of lace and an inner border of ribbon work. One pair of curtains whose design is particularly beautiful has an edge of renaissance lace 8 or 10 inches deep, with an inner border 12 inches wide of Marie Antoinette design, showing long handled baskets filled with flowers and caught together with bowknots. The baskets, flowers and bowknots are all worked in cream satin ribbons of various widths. The centers of these curtains are of plain white bobinet. The design on another curtain is a combination of renaissance, Egyptian and Marie Antoinette styles.

In curtains of brussels lace the greatest change is in the plain borders and plain centers. The edges of the new brussels curtains have plain hems instead of the old fashioned scallop. Lace curtains in deep cream promise to be more popular than ever, and there are two new styles, both of French origin. Terza curtains, the handsomest of these, have a center of plain net almost as heavy and coarse as Russian lace, with a border of a floral scroll design in a lace which appears to be a combination of royal battenberg and duchess. The other new curtains have a deep openwork border made up of brussels lace, Irish point and tambour work.

For bedrooms Irish point and tambour net will take the place of swiss and the various muslins which for several years have been so popular. These two laces will be much more reasonable in price than heretofore. Japanese silks will be extensively used in bedrooms for curtains as well as draperies. The newest comes of double width in deep rich colors, with grotesque figures of trees, flowers and occasionally animals several feet in height. There is a double width cotton fabric in excellent imitation of bagdad, which is new and cheap and will be much used for bedroom draperies. The new crotonnes are all double width, with floral designs, brilliant in coloring and gigantic in size.

For portieres and heavier curtains the newest is a heavy silk moire with deep knotted fringe top and bottom. These curtains come in white and all shades, with fringe varying in depth from four inches to one foot. In the various qualities of silk or wool damasks the newest designs are Syrian and Moorish. The figures and colorings are larger and more brilliant than have been used in a dozen or more years. Bead portieres will be used, and the most popular is the style known as "Job's tears." Bamboo curtains, which are much cheaper than those made of beads, come for next season more reasonable in price, though better in quality and coloring, than ever before.

HAWAII AS A TERRITORY

Powers of the Territorial Legislature Prescribed by Congress.

May Not Vote Charters or Special Privileges — Expenditures Limited to Congressional Appropriations.

EDITOR EVENING BULLETIN:— The legislative power of any territory hereafter formed in the United States is vested by Act of Congress in a governor and legislative assembly, the latter consisting of a council and house of representatives, the qualifications of which have already been mentioned in a previous letter. Members of the legislature must reside in the district or county for which they are respectively elected.

APPORTIONMENT OF MEMBERS. This is provided for in Section 1847 of the Revised Statutes, as follows: "Previous to the first election for members of the Legislative Assembly of a Territory in which Congress may hereafter provide a temporary government, the governor shall cause a census of the inhabitants and qualified voters of the several counties and districts of the territory, to be taken by such persons and in such manner as he may designate and appoint, and the persons so appointed shall receive a reasonable compensation for their services. And the first election shall be held at such time and place, and be conducted in such manner, both as to the persons who superintend such election and the returns thereof, as the governor may direct; and he shall at the same time declare the number of members of the council and house of representatives to which each of the counties or districts is entitled under the act providing such temporary government for the particular territory.

The next section provides that the apportionment above provided for shall be as nearly equal as practicable among the several districts and counties, giving to each section of the Territory representation in the ratio of its population.

LAWS SUBMITTED TO CONGRESS. Section 1850 provides that all laws passed by the legislative assembly and governor of any territory shall be submitted to Congress and, if disapproved, shall be null and of no effect.

SUBJECTS OF LEGISLATION. Section 1851 provides that the Legislative power of every Territory shall extend to all rightful subjects of legislation not inconsistent with the Constitution and laws of the United States. But no law shall be passed interfering with the primary disposal of the soil; no tax shall be imposed upon the property of the United States; nor shall the lands or other property of non-residents be taxed higher than the lands or other property of residents.

Section 1852 limits the sessions of Territorial Legislatures to forty days.

PER DIEM OF MEMBERS. Section 1853 provides that the members of the legislature shall receive six dollars per day and the usual mileage. The president of the council and speaker of the house of representatives receive ten dollars per day.

SUBORDINATE OFFICIALS. Section 1861 says the subordinate officers of each branch of every legislative assembly shall consist of one chief clerk, who shall receive a compensation of eight dollars per day, and of one assistant clerk, one enrolling clerk, one engrossing clerk, one sergeant at arms, one door keeper, one messenger and one watchman, who shall each receive a compensation of five dollars per day during the sessions, and no charge for a greater number of officers and attendants, or any larger per diem shall be allowed or paid by the United States to any Territory.

LIMITATION OF POWERS. Section 1888 provides that no

legislative assembly of a Territory shall, in any instance or under any pretext, exceed the amount appropriated by Congress for its annual expenses.

Section 1889. The legislative assemblies of the several Territories shall not grant private charters or especial privileges, but they may by general incorporation acts permit persons to associate themselves together as bodies corporate for mining, manufacturing and industrial pursuits, or the construction or operation of railroads, wagon roads, irrigating ditches and the colonization and improvement of lands in connection therewith, or for colleges, seminaries, churches, libraries, or any benevolent, charitable or scientific association.

No corporation or association for religious or charitable purposes shall acquire or hold real estate in any Territory, during the existence of the territorial government, of a greater value than fifty thousand dollars; and all real estate acquired or held by such corporation or association contrary hereto shall be forfeited and escheat to the United States; but existing vested rights in real estate shall not be impaired by the provisions of this section.

Section 1891 provides that the Constitution and all laws of the United States which are not locally inapplicable shall have the same force and effect within all the organized Territories, and in every Territory hereafter organized as elsewhere within the United States. GEORGE MANSON.

HOW FLIES HANG ON.

An Entomologist Advances a New Theory on the Subject.

In our youth we were taught that flies adhered to the ceiling or to the window panes because their feet were provided with suckers from which they had the power of exhausting the air. This was disproved by the fact that a fly could run up the side of the exhausted glass receiver when a vacuum under his feet would do him no good even if he had the power of creating it, and by the further fact that a microscopic examination showed that his feet were not provided with suckers, but with multitudes of hairs from which exuded a fluid in minute drops. It was then suggested that this fluid was viscous or gummy, so that the fly adhered by a sort of mucilage. This too was disproved, as it was shown that the fluid possessed no adhesive properties. By a series of careful experiments detailed in Our Animal Friends for September Dr. Drexel proves that capillary attraction, the adhesion of water to a surface, is enough to support a fly even if he were 50 percent heavier than he is. The hairs give out an infinitesimal drop of water, and as there are a great number of them the fly is enabled to hang on the ceiling and to tickle any sensitive surface on which he alights in a highly scientific manner.
