LATE NEWS ITEMS.

Troops and Police Charge a Determining Mob at Bradford, England—Many People Hurt.

LONDON, April 13.—Ten thousand striking weavers assembled at Bradford to-day to protest against the action of the municipal authorities in forbidding a meeting which the strikers had arranged for yesterday.

The police vainly tried to disperse the gathering. Finally, the Riot Act was read and the military summoned. The soldiers joined forces with the police, and a combined charge was made upon the ranks of the stubborn strikers.

A fierce struggle ensued, but the strikers were unable to resist the increased force, and were compelled to retreat before the bayonets and batons. The police used their batons very freely, and many strikers were injured. Several policemen were also hurt during the fight.

During the riots windows were smashed and lamps extinguished. Many arrests were made. All the prisoners had gashes on their heads from stones or police batons, but no one had bayonet wounds.

The Pacific Mail Steamship Company is about to place apprentices on its steamers, reverting to a former custom. In 1874 the company voluntarily placed apprentices on the steamers of its various lines, but after some years was dropped.

Captain Wm. Ward, the handsome young commander of the steamer City of Rio de Janeiro, is the only one of one hundred and fifty apprentice boys who entered into the company's service in 1874 who has remained with the company and risen to distinction.

He is the youngest captain in the company's service and one of the most capable. He has served on every steamer of the Pacific Mail and been in every port where the steamers touch. Capt. Ward is barely thirty years of age.

BERLIN, April 13th.—The medical faculty of the University of Bonn has abandoned the use of both Koch's and Liebreich's remedies for tuberculosis.

LONDON, April 13th.—Queen Victoria will prolong her stay at Grassano week.

THE LAW OF SMUGGLING OPIUM.

The extent to which the lucrative business of opium smuggling has reached, has been faintly shadowed forth to the public by recent seizures.

With regard to the opium business in these islands, it is incumbent on all Hawaiian officials to use the full power of the law to put it down peremptorily.

vides that "The importation of opium or any preparation thereof into this Kingdom, except as authorized by Sec. 2 of this Act, is hereby strictly prohibited, and whoever shall import, sell, give or furnish opium, 'except as provided,' shall be liable to a penalty of not less than one hundred dollars, nor more than five hundred dollars, or to be imprisoned at hard labor for any term not exceeding two years, or to both such penalty and imprisonment, in the discretion of the Court, one half of which pecuniary penalty shall be paid to the party giving information which shall lead to the conviction of the offender."

Section 2 of the law quoted above authorizes the Board of Health under certain conditions and safeguards to import such quantities of opium as the said Board may deem necessary, and supply the same to properly certificated physicians and surgeons, and to the person in charge of the medicines at the Leper Settlement at Moikakai, and to captains or surgeons of outward bound foreign going vessels, at cost prices.

By Sect. 5. "The several police and district courts of the Kingdom are hereby invested with authority to try and determine all cases arising under this Law."

By these provisions the law and executive authorities appear to be sufficiently armed to wage war against opium smuggling, the rest then lies in their hands. To put this law as it stands, in active and efficient operation, rests with the heads of the various departments concerned.

It is well known, that for several years past the number of Chinamen leaving the kingdom has considerably exceeded the numbers coming in, and that there are fewer Chinamen in the kingdom by several hundreds than there were four years ago.

But they too have diminished in number, so that what we see now is, a larger supply of the drug and a smaller number of consumers, and this must effect, first a fall in price, and secondly an increasing consumption, both by reason of habitual users increasing the dose, and secondly the cheapness attracting those who have hitherto been deterred by the high price of the article.

We ought not to hear again of a vessel loaded with sand, freighted with a cock-and-bull story and manned by old Hawaiian coasting seamen, beginning to attract attention in executive quarters when she had been notably knocking about unrequented parts of the island coast, and might have landed as much opium as she had on board and then come bravely in to the capital port, as empty of opium as she was of the implements or indications of honest trading.

The latest drop-a-nickel-in-the-slot machine takes a portrait while you wait. There are half a dozen in operation in New York and one in Philadelphia, and in a short time they will probably be in every hotel corridor and railroad station in the city.

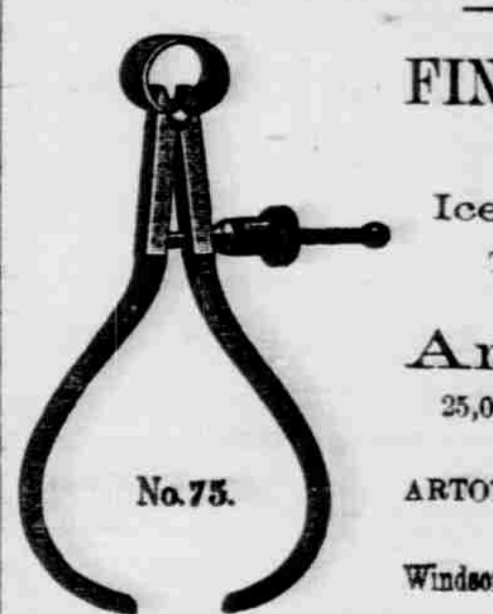

IN THE ARCTIC CIRCLE. Adventures of an Englishman in the Frozen Regions of North America. Says a special dispatch from Winnipeg: Washburton Pike, an English explorer, has just returned from the Arctic circle. Leaving Calgary in June, 1889, Mr. Pike proceeded to Athabasca Landing and from there to Fort Resolution, on Slave river. Here he secured the services of two Indian guides and helpers and started for the barren lands in search of musk ox, caraboo and other large game.

Mr. Pike absolutely refuses to say anything of his tortures during this time, but many facts were gleaned from those who saw them on their return to the rapids, and who were compelled to feed them as they would a babe. As an example of the terrible state of affairs some hundreds of miles were tramped with bare feet on ice, and their frozen condition when rescued was simply terrible, while some of the party were so reduced from cold and hunger as to be totally helpless.

When asked to describe the barren lands Mr. Pike said that it was an immense tract of barren rock on which grew a kind of moss and shrub, on which deer that run by thousands feed and appear to be very fond of it. There are numerous lakes among rocky bluffs whose waters freeze in the cold season to the depth of from seven to nine feet. He reports temperature as low as sixty degrees in the winter, but the summer months, July and August, he says, are very hot. Six months during the year the sun never shines on these barren parts.

Mr. Pike reports musk very scarce, but says there are large numbers of musk ox and thousands of caraboo deer, the latter taking to the woods in winter. Mr. Pike is the only white man who has ever trod the path of the Franklin sufferers, on the Fish river. Travel during this trip was almost entirely done on foot, dog trains being used for the carrying of provisions and wood. The currency is in skins. A skin is valued at 50 cents.—[Washington, D. C., Star.
