REGENT ELECTION IN THE STATES.

(Special Correspondence of THE INDEPENDENT, by Charles A. Edwards.)

WASHINGTON, D. C. Nov. 12:

The election is over and the democracy has much to congratulate itself for.

This is a time for democratic jubilation and elation. In every state where the democrats made the attempt they either defeated the republicans or cut down the majority in such a manner as to give encouragement to every democrat in the land. Only in the single state of Ohio were we defeated worse than we expected to be. No democrat in the country expected Tom L. Johnson to be elected governor. He did not expect it himself. He was fighting for the legislature to defeat Mark Hanna for the United States Senate. He made a gallant fight and with right principle. He preached the gospel of humanity to the people of his state, the gospel of the people's rights as against the rights of the corporation, and it is a gospel that must in the end prevail or the people not alone of his state but of the entire nation will have sacrificed their birthright on the altar of corporate greed. His defeat and the defeat of the ticket and the principles he represented must be attributed to the defection in the ranks of the democratic party in Ohio and to the lavish use of money at the polls and before the election. Some day those people in the state of Ohio will see and know the truth and it will be a democratic state. In the meantime the only thing those patriots in Ohio can do is to pick their flint and keep their powder dry. There will be another battle next year and the indications from the battle of the 3d of this month presage a glorious victory.

It is the consensus of democratic opinion here among the clans of gathering democrats who come to the assembling of the Fifty-eighth Congress, that the democrats have much in the election at which to rejoice. We more than held our own in the little state of Rhode Island by re-electing our governor; we carried the state of Maryland not only for the state ticket but for United States Senator; we carried Kentucky by an increased majority which eternally puts the kibosh on republican assassination in that state; we reduced the majority in the rockribbed republican state of Iowa by at least 20,000, and we made a clean sweep of the great city of New York. The latter was a great victory for more than one reason. It was a victory for the great common people, for home rule, for democratic methods, and a defeat for hypocrisy, false pretense, the rule of the corporation and the aristocrat, a cold bath for the bootlicks and sycophants who whine about the knees of predatory wealth.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

Now the Government is in the "hollow way" of going about and making the appointment of an unknown malihini. And this has happened after the "cooper" got out.

No, Thursday night's display in the sky was not the aurora borealis. It was only the after-glow of George Carter's eloquence while reading his Thanksgiving proclamation at Central Union church during the morning.

A pun was let of today at the expense of The Independent, that lately we have been "injecting tobacco with a hypodermic syringe." Some may think so, and others think that we have been rather severe. Toot-toot.

Residents of Puunui are thankful that the Government has at last put in electric lights to assist the wayfarer through those darksome roads. The only remaining things are water and good roads, and these will probably come later.

We have been informed that at a private native dinner out Palama way last Saturday night, a couple of native police officers assaulted a native lady without justification. The only cause, our information goes, was because the lady, having a mother's pride and

jealousy, resented the slapping of her son's head by one of the officers, who had become unruly and insulting through drink, and for this she was choked and her chair upset. If this is true, some investigation should be at once instituted.

Mr. Bryan's "President Carter of the island of Hawaii" is something like E. M. Boyd's "snowy slopes." There is, however, nothing like a variety. With a lot of governors and presidents and sunny shores and snowy slopes we should certainly be able to cater to the fancy of almost anybody.

All the Judges of the First Circuit Court are of this class, but more we must have in the Executive.

Had President Roosevelt appointed all of the Republican candidates that were defeated in the last election to be ambassadors in Europe or to become members of his cabinet, the matter would be very satisfactory in Hawaii. But it is manifestly unfair for a Governor to foist upon this or any other public a man whom they had determined at the polls was not worthy of their confidence.

Our strenuous Governor found a new aide in G. E. Smithies yesterday. It is claimed that he wants Hawaiians for just such a place and he had to fall back upon Mr. Smithies, who did it to perfection, so we are informed. But where was the late aide, Mr. Hawes, the carpetbagger brother-in-law of our Francis Hatch, who had to be fed as a recompense for the part played by him in the destiny of this country?

We would advise our friends to withhold judgment in the Brooks case until the facts are disclosed in the court. It is true that the Advertiser has already tried and convicted the young attorney, but the latter has not yet played his card and a fair-minded public should await that before forming an opinion. In this affair Mr. Brooks will ultimately appear as the scape-goat of certain other people, or we are mightily badly mistaken—and we seldom make mistakes.

To mention the name of W. R. Hearst is followed by consequences about as funny as trailing a stick through the colony of a cage of monkeys. The Republican press proceeds instantaneously to stand on its head, jump over itself and make face that would cause a horse to laugh. There is much behind the fact, however. Our g. o. p. friends well know that if Mr. Hearst is nominated by the Democratic party next year, he will be the President of the United States on March 4, 1905. Hence all this funny business.

The closing of the Moana hotel (should that occur) will be a matter of general regret. In such event, however, the public will have only the morning press to thank. It began its "tourist" campaign last January by stamping this country as a place ridden with dengue fever, and from morning to morning published the names of prominent citizens that had been laid out by the terrible scourge (?). Next, it was mosquitoes. To read the morning paper meant "nixie" to any prospective tourist. The Advertiser's yel-

low streak has put all the hotels of Honolulu on the wrong side of the ledger.

In another column a former visitor to Honolulu, and a staunch Republican, gives his views in regard to the results of the next Presidential campaign. He has figured the thing out in about the same way as several millions of other people. The United States is done with a party that seeks to make the rich man richer and the poor man poorer. It is done with a party that oppresses weak nations and uses the power of the Government to absorb them at will. It is done with the scandals that have been going on in the postoffice, interior and other departments in the past year and that stink from Puerto Rico to the Philippine Islands. As our Republican friend intimates there must and will be a change.

Of all the Central and South American countries only one—Guatemala—has expressed sympathy for Panama in the present rumpus. And why should Guatemala take such a stand? The reason is so plain as to make the endorsement of very little real value. Guatemala and Nicaragua are the worst of enemies, and have frequently been at war. Matters between them still remain unsettled. If the canal went through Nicaragua it would be an immense lift for that country but would not help Guatemala in any direct and appreciable way. On the other hand the choice of the Panama route would help Guatemala both directly and indirectly, and would be a terrible blow to her old enemy. With Guatemala it was purely a spite and business proposition, and she has acted precisely as was to be expected.

If Colombia is a gem of the ocean Uncle may yet conclude to wear it on his shirt front.—Advertiser.

Yes, that may be true; but by what means? The United States has the force to acquire all of South America if she wants it. In backing up the defection of Panama, or in the annexation of any territory in South America, without the consent of the people, the United States is, however, taking a stand diametrically at variance with the plan mapped out by Thomas Jefferson and the forefathers of the country. The absorption of Central and South America will come as a natural sequence. It is only a question of time. But for God's sake, let it be with the approval of the people of those parts at the time. That and that alone is the true American policy. If the Republican party wishes to inaugurate a new policy, it will be a stew of their own making and they will have to eat it: it is certain that the American people will not stand for it.

A GOOD WORD FROM OKLAHOMA.

Former Visitor Writes of Hawaii.

Remembers Charms of Honolulu—No use for Asiatics—Post Office Scandals, Etc.

(SPECIAL CORRESPONDENCE)

ED. THE INDEPENDENT:

I read with pleasure every package of Independents I receive. They keep me in touch with your beautiful city and its surroundings. Though I was there but a short time, I formed an attachment for the "Paradise of the Pacific," that will last through life and that may again land me on your beautiful shores. I learned to like the open-heartedness of the Hawaiians; their generosity and hospitality had a refreshing charm, for one who had seen so much of the selfishness of the world. But I have no use of the mongolian part of your population; especially the Chinese. I think they must have been created as an experiment by the Almighty. Just to see how much He could make a human being like one of the lower animals.

I read with a good deal of interest your Washington correspondence. The wholesome truths your correspondent at the nation's capital tells, are a pleasant change from the "tickle me and I'll tickle you" policy of most of the newspaper men there.

The rottenness that seems to pervade every department of the government, is sickening to one who has not become lost to all decency, and who want to realize that the Star Spangled banner floats over a nation of patriots, instead of a nation of political grafters. The developments that even the make believe investigation has brought forth in the Post Office and Interior departments, is sufficient to show that the same state of affairs prevails in every department of the government. While I am a Republican I can't swallow such a dose as Roosevelt is giving the people. His treatment of the veteran General Miles has roused the indignation of thousands especially of the old soldiers who respect General Miles, and know him to be a valiant soldier, whose record of more than forty years service in the army of his country, is without a single stain.

The gigantic steal that the Isthmian canal is bringing to light, is another instance of the political rottenness that is a festering sore on the body politic as it is represented at Washington. The Nicaragua route was and is the one that ought to be adopted, from every consideration, except that there is no money in it for certain United States Senators, who with the French grafters at the other end of the scheme are trying to pull the peoples leg for forty millions of dollars. It is the opinion of the best informed people, that the revolution in Panama, was instigated by the United States, or rather by its boodling representatives in the Senate, in order to carry out their Panama canal scheme. These are only a few of the leading instances of corruption that are eating out the vitals of the nation.

With many others, I am of the opinion that our Philippine acquisitions are a burden that the people will not much longer bear. As a prominent paper said the other day, "our exports are live American soldiers, and our imports are dead American soldiers." That, so far, has been the extent of our trade with these newly acquired posses-

sions, and there is no prospect that it will ever be anything else. I think it would make "mighty interesting reading" as Horace Greeley would say, if your Washington correspondent could ascertain from the War and Navy departments, just how many American soldiers and sailors have lost their lives in these miasmatic, malaria stricken jungles on the coast of Asia. The subjugation of the natives has already cost this country more blood and treasure than the miserable plague spots will ever be worth, and they are not subjugated yet. In order to shut the people's eyes, the constituted authorities that are keeping up this piece of political claptrap, have changed the name of the vast force of American soldiers that are constantly necessary to keep anything like order in the Philippines, from the army, to the "constabulary." Just think of it. A constabulary of thousands of soldiers. The political mountebanks at Washington, know that the people are too busy looking after the almighty dollar to give much of any attention to what is going on in this grave yard of American soldiers. But we must grin and bear it. The evil will possibly cure itself after a while. If it does not, it will kill the patient. H. B. M.

Next Monday is St Andrew's day and the anniversary of the death of King Kamehameha IV. It is intended to hold a memorial service in St. Andrew's Cathedral on that day.

Rear Admiral Terry yesterday received a cablegram from Rear Admiral Evans, at Yokohama, requesting him to secure and hold at Honolulu any mail on the Gaelic (due here on Tuesday) destined for his fleet in the Orient. This would seem to indicate that the fleet will leave Japan in a few days.

Loan Money Will Be Here.

Treasurer Kepoikai has decided to have the recent loan fund, as paid over by Fisk & Robinson of New York, amounting to \$1,007,283.53, brought here by each of the four local banks in equal proportion. This morning the order for exchange were passed over by the Treasurer to the banks, each of the banks giving a receipt for their one-quarter portion (\$251,820 88 1/4). It is expected that the whole amount will be here before Christmas at a cost to the Territory of one quarter of one percent on the exchange.
