OWNERSHIP OF HAWAIIAN SUGAR PLANTATIONS. The table on the next page has been prepared with much labor, to exhibit the ownership of sugar planting interests in Hawaii.

Regarding the nationality, it ought to be stated that the present owners are classed as their fathers were, whether American, British, German, etc., and this seems to be the only rule which can equitably be adopted.

The following is a statement of the amount of the cane and sugar interest in Hawaii credited to each nationality.

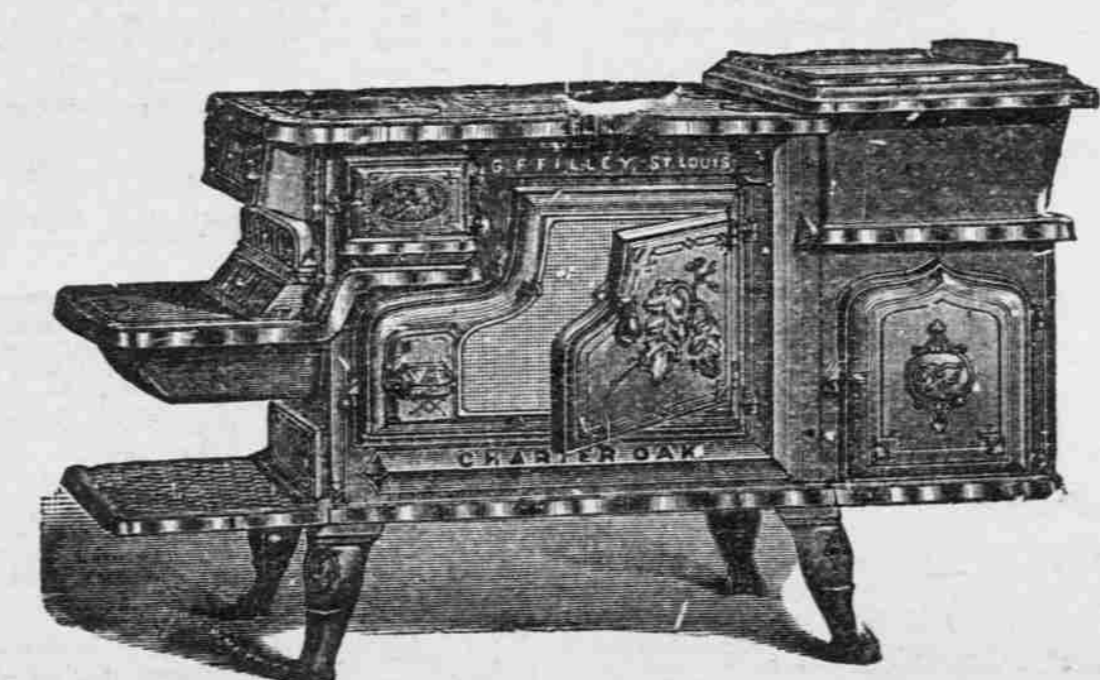

HAWAIIAN SUGAR PRODUCTION.

A FIELD FOR AMERICAN ENTERPRISES.

On the first page will be found a table showing the ownership, as regards nationality, of sugar plantations on these islands. It has been compiled with great care by Messrs. Walker and Giffard from official documents, and includes all the incorporated companies or individuals engaged in the production of sugar cane and manufacture of sugar. The statement was prepared chiefly to disprove the assertion made by Mr. Kinney, that the planting interest on these islands is controlled by those who were not Americans, by an overwhelming majority. The facts and figures presented contradict this assertion very plainly. Facts are stubborn things to disprove, especially in this instance, where out of a total of thirty millions invested in sugar, some twenty-three millions are owned by Americans, and over fifteen millions owned in the United States. If we mistake not, this was the intention of the treaty, to encourage and build up an industry here in which American and Hawaiian capital might find investment; and this has been the case, so that to-day one half of the entire capital invested in sugar here and one half the profits derived from it are owned and distributed in the United States. If European capital has been invested here, so much the better for the increase of local business and the prosperity of the whole country. European capital is constantly moving to the United States for investment, and adds largely to the prosperity of that country, with out any one begrudging the introduction of new capital simply because it is foreign capital. Europeans migrate to Louisiana, Texas and Kansas, invest their capital there in cane and sorghum, and secure the benefit of any bounty or protection to their industries, and no one cries out against this foreign capital and industry. So let us have more financial help both from the United States and Europe, to expand our yet undeveloped coffee, ramie, rice, banana, sugar and other industries, which are capable of being carried on with profit to the producers and to the country at large. Hawaii has by no means reached the limit of her industrial capacity.

THE AMERICAN INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS.

One of the most important conventions that has assembled of late years is the International American Congress, which convened at Washington October 2d, comprising delegates from every American government, excepting Canada, which was not invited owing to her being a dependency of Great Britain, and therefore unable to act as a Sovereign state. The congress will comprise over forty delegates, including some of the most prominent statesmen of the Central and South American Governments. The countries represented are: Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua, Costa Rica, San Salvador, Columbia, Ecuador, Bolivia, Peru, Chili, Argentine Republic, Uruguay, Brazil, Venezuela, and Hawaii. On the 3d of October, the delegates started on a tour of inspection through the United States, purposing to visit the New England States, then west to Omaha and St. Louis, returning via Cincinnati and Pittsburg, arriving at Washington about November 13th. They are, in fact, the guests of the United States, and the tour is designed to give them an idea of the progress and condition of the country. It is, in short, a peace congress of powers met in harmony to consider and adopt a commercial policy beneficial to all concerned in the convention. For the first time in the history of the New World its States are to meet in friendly council. Secretary Blaine has been chosen presiding officer, as it is the custom to choose the secretary of foreign

affairs of the country calling the congress, to preside on such occasions. In his address of welcome to the convention, Mr. Blaine said: "It will be a great gain when we shall acquire that common confidence on which all international friendship must rest. It will be a greater gain when we shall be able to draw the people of all American nations into closer acquaintance with each other, an end to be facilitated by more frequent and more rapid inter-communication. It will be the greatest gain when the personal and commercial relations of the American states, south and north, shall be so developed and so regulated that each shall acquire the highest possible advantage from the enlightened and enlarged interests of all."

The topics which will come up before the Congress for discussion are specified in Mr. Blaine's letter of invitation, as follows:

- 1.—Measures that shall tend to preserve the peace and promote the prosperity of the several American States.
2.—Measures toward the formation of an American Customs Union, under which the trade of the American nations shall, so far as possible and profitable be, promoted.
3.—The establishment of regular and frequent communication between the ports of the several American States and the ports of each other.
4.—The establishment of a uniform system of customs regulations in each of the independent American States to govern the mode of importation and exportation of merchandise and port dues and charges, a uniform method of determining the classification and valuation of such merchandise in the ports of each country, and a uniform system of invoices, and the subject of the sanitation of ships and quarantine.
5.—The adoption of a uniform system of weights and measures, and laws to protect the patent rights, copyrights, and trade marks of citizens of either country in the other, and for the extradition of criminals.
6.—The adoption of a common silver coin, to be issued by each government, the same to be legal tender in all commercial transactions between the citizens of all the American States.
7.—An agreement upon and recommendation for adoption to their respective governments of a definite plan of arbitration of all questions, disputes and differences that may now or hereafter exist between them, to the end that all difficulties and disputes between such nations may be peaceably settled and prevented.
8.—And to consider such other subjects relating to the welfare of the several states represented as may be presented by any of said states which are hereby invited to participate in said conference.

At a dinner given to Hon. M. M. Este, the delegate from California to the Congress that gentleman made an address, from which we call the following paragraphs:

The law under which we will act submits eight points for our consideration, all of which are important, but two of which are especially so. The one is: "The establishment of regular and frequent communication between the ports of the several American States and the ports of each other." The other is: "The adoption of a common silver coin to be used by each government, the same to be legal tender in all commercial transactions between the citizens of all the American States."

For my own part, I am in favor of maintaining by governmental aid, in some form, lines of steamers to all the chief ports south of us. And I would aid American lines of vessels plying between San Francisco, Australia, Japan and the islands of the Pacific. I would thus make new highways for trade across the Pacific ocean, and direct the traffic of those islands to the United States. While doing this, such provision might be made that in the case of war these vessels could be utilized by the general government, and thus in carrying out this scheme of building up the American commerce, we would at once aid in creating an American navy—for it requires men accustomed to the sea and inured to the rough and tumultuous life of a sailor to man our war vessels. If we have no merchant marine, we will necessarily have no creditable navy, and in my judgment, you cannot secure one without maintaining the other.

The adoption of a common silver coin to be used by all the American nations, the same to be legal tender in all commercial transactions, between citizens of all the American States, would be the longest step toward carrying out the idea indicated of obtaining for the United States the trade of the South American countries. To illustrate: At the present time, we buy nearly all our coffee in South America. We pay, as we have before seen, a large amount to balance our accounts with those nations. Last year, as we stated, the trade was against us by \$54,000,000. Now, if we had a uniform silver coin of equal value in all these American States, these people would be more apt to deal with us, and we would be more willing to deal with them, because we are a large silver producing country, and so are most of the South American States.

The result would follow that as the American silver dollar, would be received at par in the United States, and also in all other American States, while in Europe it would be treated as a commodity to be sold in the market for what it would bring, our people would prefer to deal with the South American people, and the American nations would prefer to deal with us. This, in my judgment, is the true way of securing the trade and maintaining the friendship of our neighboring nations, for the dollar thus created would be known and received all over the civilized world as the American dollar. Behind it would stand more than a hundred millions of people with the moral force and wealth of twenty American nations, and thus the American dollar would become a continental dollar.

The Naval Commission appointed to select a site for a navy yard on the Pacific Coast north of the forty-second parallel, has formally reported to the Secretary of the Navy that in its judgment Puget Sound was the best locality in the entire region. Port Orchard possesses many advantages over all other divisions and the particular site should be sought for behind Bainbridge Island.

FROM THE BRITISH WAR OFFICE.

England Wants to Know the Facilities for Transporting Troops Through Canada.

MONTREAL, October 10.—"To the Deputy Adjutant-Generals of the several military districts of Canada: On receipt of this communication you will immediately take steps to ascertain in your several districts the fullest information regarding all facilities for the transportation of troops from one part of the country to another, giving details as to the means of transport by rail and water, and also ascertain how many horses are available in your district at short notice for this purpose of military transport."

Such is the order that has just been received by the commanders of the military districts in the Dominion from the British War Office. As news of the order became public, as might have been expected, it caused considerable excitement in civic as well as military circles, in the latter of which extraordinary activity prevails.

What is the cause of such a mandate from such a quarter? Is Great Britain preparing to engage in immediate war with some other power, and is Canada to be unknowingly drawn into the struggle? Such are the questions asked by citizens.

By many the order is considered as a hint that the alleged agreement between England and the United States on the Behring Sea difficulty is not satisfactory, and that England wishes to show the United States that she is ready for business.
