Minutes of Board Meeting

Supervisors Send Attorney Coke to Honolulu.

The County Supervisors met in the board room Wednesday and disposed of the most important matters during the first two days. An adjournment was taken Thursday until Saturday morning. The board employed Attorney James L. Coke to push the bond issue matter. He left Thursday evening for town and is expected back today.

The minutes are as follows: Wailuku, Maui, March 11, 1908. Afternoon Session.

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Maui was called to order at 2 P. M., Chairman W. Henning presiding.

Roll call: Present: W. Henning, T. M. Church, W. P. Haia, S. E. Kaiue and T. T. Meyer.

The minutes of the February meeting were read and the same were ordered approved as read.

Communication of Alexander & Baldwin acknowledging receipt of our communication cancelling order for steel bridge was read and the same was ordered placed on file.

A communication of D. H. Case, County Attorney, transmitting opinion on subdivisions 6 and 7 of Section 9 Chapter 4, Act 29, Session Laws of 1905 was read and the same was ordered placed on file.

(The sections in question are as follows: Section 6, no contract involving an expenditure of public funds amounting to Five Hundred Dollars or more shall be awarded except to the lowest bidder after public advertisement for tenders, and no public work or requisition for material therefor shall be divided or parcelled out for the purpose of evading the provisions of this section and no new work involving the expenditure of Five Hundred Dollars or more shall be done except by contract as above set forth; but the provision of this section shall not be applicable to road work.

Section 7, all contracts authorizations payments and liabilities entered into granted, made or incurred in violation of this Act shall be void and shall never be the basis of a claim against the County.)

A communication of the Honolulu Iron Works Co. in re Engine Hoist was read and the same was ordered placed on file.

A communication of D. H. Case, County Attorney, transmitting Ordinance in re town limit of Wailuku was read and action on the same was deferred.

Governor's Maui Trip

Plan to Keep the Party Fully Busy on this Island.

Governor Frear and party arrived in Kahului on Saturday on their tour of Maui.

Hon. H. P. Baldwin invited the Governor and members of his official family to breakfast with him at his Spreckelsville residence, afterward to look through Pannene mill and go anywhere else they chose in the neighborhood. Automobiles would be at their service. The invitation was accepted.

A visit to the mill was made and a trip to the lower end of Omaopio lands was made in automobiles and the great field that have been barren for ages but are now producing many tons of sugar were viewed.

The party returned in time to view the townsite that has been laid out at Kahului. They visited the breakwater constructed by the Kahului Railroad company at a cost of over \$100,000, and noted the great improvement in the harbor that is now of sufficient depth for the largest vessels and where they lie quietly at anchor while heavy swells may be running outside.

From Kahului the party landed at Hana and the first homesteads visited were through the rubber region as far as Keanae.

There was some land that was examined in the region of Keanae, which is now under lease having fifteen years to run. The leasees are willing to homestead the land. There are still some lots through the rubber country not taken up.

On Monday a proposed exchange of road lands in Hana was looked into. There is an outstanding question of compensation on account of cane land taken for roads.

In the region of Makawao a proposal is pending for an exchange of land, that would be good for cane when the ditch is extended, for lands that would be good for pineapples and therefore for homesteads. The party reached Keanae Monday evening and Paia Wednesday evening. They were visited many places of interest including the great pineapple orchards and then continued their tour of the Kula district where many homesteads are and where many more are desired.

At Ulupalakua there is land under lease, part of which may be homesteaded and part reserved for forest purposes. Perhaps an alteration of the terms of lease may be effected to conform to the present conditions which are different to those existing when the lease was made.

There were no public hearings, the Governor preferring to deal with the people interested.

Is Charged With Libel

Paper Publishes Morato Article.

Another criminal libel case has resulted from the articles which appeared in the Portuguese newspaper, the A. Liberdade, in which Gregorio Jose Morato, who arrived here in the Kumeric, was accused of being an anarchist, and which intimated that he might have left Portugal because of his being implicated with the conspirators who killed King Carlos and the Crown Prince.

Last week Board of Health Inspector Durao, who wrote the offending article, was arrested for criminal libel, and this morning a similar charge was made against the A. Liberdade Publishing Co. The complaint was sworn to by Morato, and the warrant served on J. C. Souza, the secretary of the company.

When the case came up in the Police Court this morning E. C. Peters, who represented the defendant, pointed out that the complaint was defective in that it did not state that Souza was the secretary of the company, although service had been made on him. Attorney Correa, who appeared for the complaining witness, stated that this was not necessary, as such service was made legal by provision by statute. The hearing of the case, as well as of argument on the point raised, was continued until next Wednesday, on which date the Durao case has been set for trial. The matter has stirred up great excitement in the Portuguese community, and the outcome of the trial will be watched with great interest.

A look was taken at the Kula homesteads. Interesting matters were seen all along the route, for instance the pineapple growing and canning in Haiku, where pineapples are said to do better than anywhere else in the islands.

Commissioner Pratt is in general charge of the arrangements for the tour of the island. Superintendent Marston Campbell gave an outline of the bearings of the executive visit upon public works.

"I am going to make an investigation of the landings and derricks on the island," Mr. Campbell said. "We have just finished a lot of new work on some of the landings.

"Waterworks and public buildings will also be inspected, including the new courthouse at Wailuku and perhaps some of the new schoolhouses under contract. The waterworks of Lahaina and Wailuku will receive attention, there being some important matters connected with the Wailuku service.

"There is a hard proposition in the needed repairs of the old courthouse at Lahaina, for which some money is available. It is a stone structure and holds considerable historic interest."

In this connection Governor Frear later said that he remembers when the Supreme Court judges held circuit terms in the old building at Lahaina. When he was teaching at Lahainaluna Seminary twenty-seven years ago, the late Judge McCully presided at a term of court there.

Mr. Campbell also referred to the proposed investigation of Kahului harbor and breakwater. Another matter he would give attention to is the town hall proposition.

To Entertain The Governor

Wailuku District to Entertain.

A citizens meeting was held in the Wailuku Court House Monday evening to consider the manner in which to provide for the entertainment of Governor W. F. Frear and party when they arrive in Wailuku. The meeting was largely attended and was one of the most harmonious meetings ever held here.

J. N. K. Keola had consulted with a number of citizens as to the names to be placed on the various committees and at the meeting he presented a motion placing the names agreed upon as the ones to be on the various committees which motion was carried without a dissenting vote.

H. M. Coke who came in late moved that the name of C. M. W. Kanui be added to one of the committee as Waihee was not represented. This was carried.

The question of refreshments was discussed. R. A. Wadsworth moved that no spirituous or intoxicating liquors be purchased by the refreshment committee nor served. This notion carried without a dissenting vote.

Before the meeting closed attorney James J. Coke called the attention of the citizens present to the fact that no effort had been made to get any part of the American fleet to visit Maui and suggested that such a course be pursued.

J. L. Coke, A. N. Kepoikai and D. H. Case were appointed a committee to use their best efforts to get one or more of the great fleet to visit Maui on their arrival in the territory.

Chairman Saffery called the members of the various committees together on Wednesday when definite arrangements were made.

At this meeting it was announced that the Governor's party would arrive in Wailuku on Monday and would be ready to meet the people on Tuesday. It was planned to have him visit the school at 9 a. m. and then visit Iao Valley and inspect the Court House and other matters of interest in the afternoon and attend the reception at 7:30 p. m.

Roosevelt Deals with Criminal Wealth. The "business" which is hurt by the movement for honesty is the kind of business which, in the long run, it pays the country to have hurt. It is the kind of business which has tended to make the very name "high finance" a term of scandal to which all honest American men of business should join in putting an end. The special pleaders for business dishonesty, in denouncing the present administration for enforcing the law against the huge and corrupt corporations which have defied the law, also denounce it for endeavoring to secure sadly needed labor legislation, such as a far-reaching law making employers liable for injuries to their employes. It is meet and fit that the apologists for corrupt wealth should oppose every effort to relieve weak and helpless people from crushing misfortune brought upon them by injury in the business from which they gain a bare livelihood. The burden should be distributed. It is hypocritical baseness to speak of a girl who works in a factory where the dangerous machinery is unprotected as having the "right" freely to contract to expose herself to dangers to life and limb. She has no alternative but to suffer want or else to expose herself to such dangers, and when she loses a hand or is otherwise maimed or disfigured for life, it is a moral wrong that the whole burden of the risk necessarily incidental to the business should be placed with crushing weight upon her weak shoulders, and all who profit by her work escape scot-free. This is what opponents of a just employers' liability law advocate; and it is consistent that they usually also advocate immunity for those most dangerous members of the criminal class—the criminals of great wealth.—Roosevelt's latest message to Congress.

The Vanity of the rich. The news papers throughout the United States frequently announce the marriage of some wealthy young lady to a titled rake of Europe. Columns are devoted to an account of the affair and an attempt is made to leave the impression that the match is a brilliant one and bids fair to be a happy union. The announcement is made in a casual way of the anti marriage settlement of a few hundred thousand dollars on the husband and the relatives of the bride try to convince themselves that the bride has not been virtually sold in a more despicable manner than were the slaves of the south before the rebellion although every one knows that is just what has been done.

If it were strictly a case of bargain and sale as is the custom in some half civilized countries we should imagine the bridegroom would naturally pay for his bride but this is not the case, with the titled paupers who have nothing to offer the bride but a dishonored name, a broken down constitution, a depleted treasury and a meaningless title.

A few months elapse and hints at wild escapades begin to reach the ears of the public. The bride suffers in silence for a time and then an open rupture is announced and the courts are called upon to sever the bonds of a misguided union.

This has been the ultimate result of a great majority of the matches of American young women with the titled paupers of Europe. In spite of this knowledge wealthy parents allow their vanity to get the better of their judgement and allow their daughters to marry these worthless fellows knowing full well that unhappiness is almost certain to follow.

The Governor's trip. The plan of the Governor of the territory to visit the various islands and familiarize himself with the industries and possibilities is a most commendable one.

While making his trips through the group he has an excellent opportunity to get acquainted with the people and gain their confidence.

He will see the country as it is and study the industries and be in a better position to know the possibilities of the different localities.

The Territory is only beginning its development and many new industries are possible while others such as rubber and the pineapple industry and horticulture are as yet in their infancy.

The McBryde plantation has done much to solve the labor conditions there and it is probable that many other plantations will follow their example. Their plan is to supply each family with a house and lot and a tract of land that may be planted to vegetables or pineapples and while this land furnishes much of the food of the family they spend most of their time as laborers on the plantation. While this is of course a private undertaking it furnishes a successful illustration of what may be done in certain localities and may be of service to the territorial officials.

On this island the plan to give the worthy laborers lands in fee after having worked a certain number of years on the plantations is proving a success in certain localities and the results of the labor of these people is a matter of interest to all who would wish to see citizen labor employed to the exclusion of Asiatics where the same is possible.

The amount of land that is required for a family in the pineapple district is a matter of interest as it may be used later when lands suitable for the cultivation of pines will be placed on the market.

These and many other matters of interest will demand the attention of the Governor and his party while on the island.

News Makes Hawaii Wonder.

One of the main topics of discussion in Honolulu today is the cable from Tokio stating that Japanese warships are being hurriedly loaded with coal and supplies and that Japan "is undoubtedly preparing for war."

Such a statement from the Association Press, a conservative and accurate news agency, is full of possible significance to those islands. "The next few days will be full of the deepest possible influence on our island destiny for years to come," said a Honolulu man who is about as familiar with the situation here and in Washington as anyone in the islands.

As China is without a navy, the rush of preparations in the Japanese navy is regarded as scarcely to be considered as for China alone. And if it is meant for the United States, the Japanese fleet might soon be on its way here. Here is the way the matter is figured out in well informed military and naval circles:

"If Japan is to war with the United States, the time to begin is when the American fleet is on the last part of its way to Magdalena Bay. That is now. The American fleet is now at its worst. The vessels have dirty bottoms and the supplies and coal are about as low as they ever will be. Give the fleet a bit more time and it will be cleaned, re-supplied and at its full strength.

"If there is to be war, Japan will strike her first blow at Hawaii. Using Hawaii as a base she can attack the entire Pacific coast of America, choosing her own place. So if there is to be a war, Hawaii may expect to be quickly occupied." This is the sort of "dope" the strategists in town were giving out today. It is all the speculation caused by Japan's preparations.

Six Republican Territorial Delegates.

Honolulu March 11.—I have received definite information that that Republican Conventions in the Territories of Arizona and New Mexico will send six delegates and six alternates to the Chicago convention. My advice is that Hawaii do the same.

This statement was made this morning by National Committeeman Robertson, and has to do with the number of delegates the Territories are to send to the National Convention. The National Committee allotted two delegates to each Territory. This is a reduction. The proposal now is for the Territorial convention to elect six delegates and six alternates, send them to Chicago and make a contest before the convention for their seating.

There is no doubt that Hawaii will get a strong support for the seating of its six-delegate delegation, and it will have a good fighting force with Arizona and New Mexico working for the same object.

Why C. B. Wells, Sugar King, Left Manila.

The Manila Times deplores the loss of Hawaiian millions in the following, which appeared in that paper of February 1:

"Through the lack of a suitable hotel in Manila, the Philippines have lost a possible investor, worth, according to one of his friends, \$15,000,000. The man is C. B. Wells, one of the richest 'sugar kings' of Hawaii.

"Whatever reasons for his premature departure Mr. Wells may have given officially, to at least one of his close acquaintances he intimated that the lack of suitable hotel accommodation in Manila was the motive which actuated him. He had arranged to visit Negros and Panny, the two sugar islands of the archipelago, and the government was pressing him to look over the field there even to the extent of putting every facility in his way. He had practically decided on this step but, not caring to take Mrs. Wells and his daughter with him, he was brought face to face with the prospect of leaving them in Manila, which meant putting up with such hotel accommodations as they had. The presumption is, from their sudden departures, and such opinions as Mr. Wells expressed, that they decided not to undergo any longer what to them seemed privation, and so they packed up bag and baggage and left for countries where they can secure the comforts and conveniences they have been accustomed to on their travels. They sailed on the Zafiro today although only a day or two previous Mr. Wells had intimated he would spend two or three weeks here."

Wireless Expert Arrives From The Coast.

HONOLULU, March 10.—Matson Navigation S. S. Enterprise arrived at Hilo this morning from San Francisco and prominent among her passengers was Arthur A. Izbell, for years manager of the Massey wireless system on the Pacific coast who comes to make tests preparatory to establishing a long distance wireless station on this island for the Wireless Telegraph Company.

Izbell will arrive in this city in the S. S. Claudine on Thursday morning and will at once begin tests. He has with him the finest testing apparatus available.

It is the intention, says President C. J. Hutchins of the Wireless Telegraph Company, to get the long distance station established on this island by the time the big fleet gets here, if such is possible.

We therefore decline to consider your proposition and hereby withdraw our offer.

Wailuku Water Works was read and the same was ordered filed.

A communication of D. H. Case, County Attorney, in re lockers for the Wailuku Armory was read and action on the same was deferred.

A communication of J. B. Bett to Mr. Henning in re excuse for the absence of Mr. Case was read and the same was ordered placed on file.

REPORTS.

The report of the County Attorney for the month was read and action on the same was deferred.

The report of the Sheriff was read and the same was ordered placed on file.

The following reports were submitted and the same were ordered placed on file.

The reports of Sanitary Inspector Lahaina, Sanitary Inspector Wailuku, Sanitary Inspector Hana, Fish Inspector Lahaina, Fish Inspector Wailuku, Statement Poundmaster Wailuku, Makawao, and report Poundmaster Hana, Deputy Sheriffs Lahaina, Wailuku, Molokai and Hana, Treasurer and Auditor.

Mr. Church moved that the deposit of \$50.00 deposited by Mr. Chas. O'Sullivan when he made a bid for the construction of two concrete bridges at Kahului be returned to him. Seconded by Mr. Kaue and carried.

At 3:35 P. M., claim demands were taken up for examination. Claim demand 2236 was laid aside and the Clerk was instructed to investigate and report at the next meeting of the Board.

The Board ordered \$10.50 deducted from bill of the Maui Telephone Company on account of no telephone having been placed in Kamaile's house.

When examining the payroll of the Wailuku District, Mr. Church moved that the pay of J. K. Kupanahi be reduced from \$36.25 as on the payroll to the monthly rate of \$25.00. Seconded by Mr. Haia and carried.

(The reason for this was that Supervisor Kaue contended that under the law a laborer could not be paid less than one dollar and twenty-five cents per day. Mr. Church pointed out that he was drawing another salary of ten dollars per month as janitor and if placed on the basis of a road laborer he could not draw the two salaries.

Mr. Church contention prevailed and the lamp lighter will continue to draw a total of thirty-five dollars per month.

Mr. Church also pointed out the folly of hiring a watchman at two dollars per day for the crusher.

Mr. Kaue stated that County Superintendent of Roads J. H. Wilson had stated this was necessary and had employed the man but that if the board thought it unnecessary he would make some other arrangements.

Mr. Kaue presented Resolutions No. 694 to 731 inclusive thereby approving Salary, payrolls and material and supply demands for the month of February, and moved the adoption of the same. /Seconded by Mr. Haia and carried.

At 6:45 P. M., Mr. Church mov-

ed to adjourn to 9 A. M. tomorrow. Seconded by Mr. Meyer and carried. Wailuku, Maui, March 12, 1908. Morning Session.

The Board of Supervisors was called to order at 9:00 o'clock A. M., Chairman W. Henning presiding.

Roll Call: Present: W. Henning, T. M. Church, W. P. Haia, S. E. Kaue and T. T. Meyer.

The minutes of the proceedings of the previous meeting were read and the same were approved as read.

Communication of Clinton J. Hutchins, President Wireless Telegraph Co. in re re-opening the Molokai Wireless Station was read and action on the same was deferred.

The Clerk was instructed to acknowledge receipt of communication and to state that the matter had been deferred until the next meeting of the Board.

The Report of the County Engineer for the month of February was read and the same was ordered placed on file.

Mr. Haia moved that the County Engineer be allowed a competent man to assist him in carrying out the work planned for the Bond Issue Roads. Seconded by Mr. Meyer and carried.

The Clerk was instructed to get a typewriter for use if the office of the County Engineer.

The County Engineer stated that he had a communication from Mr. Searle, Mgr. Honolulu Ranch asking for permission to fence the old road at Napili since the same is now abandoned.

Mr. Church moved that the County Attorney be instructed to prepare an Ordinance to close the old road and opening the new road at Napili, also to prepare all transfer papers relative to the same matter. Seconded by Mr. Kaue and carried.

An Ordinance prohibiting the throwing of bottles, garbage stable manure etc. was read, and action on the same was deferred until the next meeting of the Board.

The petition of J. M. Harvest et al in re road and bridge at Honuhou Waiehu was again taken up and Supervisor Kaue was instructed to go on with the work as petitioned for, and the petition was ordered placed on file.

The Clerk was instructed to answer the petitioners that their petition will be complied with.

The matter of the County Bond Issue was again taken up for consideration. The following wireless on the subject being read: Henning, from Case. At Board meeting today have all members present. Pass Resolution fixing County Bonds redeemable 5 yrs. payable 10 yrs. Adjourn. Or keep open until Saturday for other proceedings all members present. Letter Friday night. The Board requested an opinion of Attorney Jas. L. Coke in this matter.

At 12:35 P. M. the Chairman ordered a recess to 1:45 P. M. Afternoon Session.

The Board was called to order at 1:45 P. M. Chairman W. Henning presiding.

The Board Bond Issue matter was again discussed. Mr. Church moved that Jas. L. Coke Esq., be engaged as an Attorney representing the County to assist in the matter of the County Bond Issue, and that he be instructed to proceed to Honolulu with the Treasurer to consult with the Attorneys in Honolulu who have this matter in charge. Seconded by Mr. Kaue and carried.

Mr. Kaue presented Resolution No. 762 thereby creating the office of Clerk of Road Department, and defining the duties of said Clerk, and moved the adoption of the same. Seconded by Mr. Haia and carried.
