SCHEME TO BE AFOOT

Hawaiian Talks of the Meeting Held Last Night.

Believes It a Plan to Gain Restriction of Franchise—Aloha Aina and National League Not Represented.

In regard to the meeting of a few of the members of the Hui Kalaiaina on Palace Square last night, a prominent Hawaiian, one who has been a Royalist and a loyal one and who has now taken the oath of fealty to the United States, said:

"The action of the natives last night should have no effect whatever on the good judgment of the Commission in regard to the large body of Hawaiians who see the state of affairs and are anxious for the United States to give them the right of franchise.

"I tell you right here that there is something beneath that meeting at the square last night. There are certain men in this town who do not wish to see the Hawaiians able to vote no matter how much they may feel within themselves the ability of the natives to do the same. Why? You can answer that question yourselves?

"They are therefore scheming to give the Commissioners the opinion that the natives as a whole are clamoring for the restoration of the monarchy which we know is a perfectly stupid conclusion. However, the more stupid the conclusion, the better for the clique now working against the natives.

"How many were at that meeting last night? Just a scant hundred. Most of those present were natives who think that by some special act of Providence the Monarchy will be restored. They cannot think otherwise. Where were the majority of the members of the Hui Kalaiaina? Does the small crowd present on the square last night represent that organization. Not by any means. The memorial adopted last night was then from a body of natives gathered at random. Some were of the Kalaiaina, others from any where. Where were the members of the Hui Aloha Aina, the largest native organization on the Islands—an organization that has sent over thirty delegates to Honolulu to the convention? At home. Where were the Hawaiians of the National League, men of recognized standing among the Hawaiians. At home thinking of the memorial asking for the franchise.

"Now then what is to be done? Just this. Tell the people through your columns what is on the tapis. Tell them that the Hawaiians do want the franchise, despite the efforts of certain people to prevent the consummation of such a thing.

"They do not want us to vote because they think it will give us a little power—power that is our right.

"FATHER OF ANNEXATION"

Dr. McGrew Pleads for Native Rights Before the Commission.

The Hawaiians Were Worthy of the Franchise—No Fear of Their Missing Political Privileges.

Dr. J. S. McGrew appeared before the Hawaiian Commission yesterday and, after speaking for a little while on the Portuguese question, went directly to the question of suffrage for the native Hawaiians. He was in favor of no restriction whatever, such as President Dole and his Ministers advocated. He had been an annexationist ever since he had come to the country, but he had also been a friend of the natives. More than three-fourths of the Hawaiians were able to read and write and had as much of a right to vote, and more even, than he himself.

The country had been taken away from the natives and a better one given them. Was there any justice, and right, in placing restrictions on the rightful owners of the land?

The following question was asked Dr. McGrew: "Supposing the Portuguese, Hawaiians and Japanese should unite, would they not frame iniquitous laws?"

Dr. McGrew answered that he was not afraid of the judgment of the natives. The very men who under royalty, were proved to have the native vote which put them in to office, and glad to live under the laws the natives made, should not be the ones to clamor now after a restriction.

In regard to labor, Dr. McGrew said he was in favor of restricting Chinese and Japanese immigration. There were enough of the two nationalities here now.

TIFF IN COURT.

Judge Wilcox and Attorney Davis Have a Word.

There was more than one tiff between Judge Wilcox and Attorney Davis in the Police Court this forenoon. One of them took place when Captain Milnor stood up to speak in regard to the charge of assault and battery against him.

Captain Milnor—I desire to enter a protest against the jurisdiction of this court in this offense and for that reason would ask for a continuance of this case until 2 o'clock.

Judge Wilcox—I had intended to bring up the matter of jurisdiction myself.

Attorney Davis—Your honor, this is American territory and—

Judge Wilcox—One at a time Mr. Davis.

Attorney Davis—Well, can't I say a word in regard to this matter?

Judge Wilcox—When the proper time arrives, you can. The case is continued until 2 o'clock. You can say what you have to say then.

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ROYAL BAKING POWDER
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ROYALISTS ARE UNREADY

Delegation of Five Come Before the Commission with Nothing.

Advanced Hawaiian Delegation Interests the Commission with Remarks and Presents a Memorial for Rights.

Five representatives of the Royalist mass meeting sought audience of the Hawaiian Commission this morning. They were asked what they had to say, and answered that they had nothing.

What did they want? They wanted to present a memorial from the mass meeting.

Where was it? They did not have the paper with them, but only wanted to know when they might present it.

The delegates were told that their memorial would be received when it was presented, and they went away as if to get the document but did not return. It was a matter of curiosity to the American members of the Commission, what ideas of business suggested the appearance of five men with nothing to say or to offer.

A delegation of the advanced Hawaiian patriotic association was also received. Its members had a memorial to present, asking for the franchise of American citizens for natives.

They readily answered questions also, their statements being received with a great deal of interest. One of the American Commissioners describes them as "very intelligent men." John E. Bush, former Minister and at different times a legislator, was one of the spokesmen. He said he had been a Royalist as long as there was any hope in the cause. Now he stood for the Hawaiians under the American flag.

The committee consisted of C. L. Hopkins, Chairman, D. L. Nason, John E. Bush, Robert H. Baker, S. K. Kane and Carl Widemann.

As yet there is no appointment for any hearing tomorrow, "the open day" of the Commission. It is expected, however, that some other organizations not yet heard will ask for a hearing before the close of the sessions in Honolulu.

CAPITAL STOCK INCREASED

At a meeting of the stockholders of Oahu plantation held this forenoon, it was decided to increase the capital stock from \$1,800,000 as it now stands, to \$2,400,000.

This will be distributed among the stockholders at par.

Should there be any stock left over it will be distributed among the employes on the plantation at par. It is, however, hardly probable that any will be left over for the men who do the work that sends thousands upon thousands of bags of sugar across the ocean.

The manager of the plantation has been authorized to put in, at the earliest opportunity, another large pump.

Took in About \$350.

The ladies of the Red Cross Society did remarkably well last night. About \$350 was taken in. This is, of course, not counting expenses which will not be very heavy.

A Japanese girl is at the quarantine station who never figured on a ship's manifest. She arrived last Saturday and will be classed as a Hawaiian born in the next census.

B. F. Dillingham entertained the members of the Hawaiian Commission at dinner last night. "Woodlawn" was beautifully illuminated.

DELEGATE TO WASHINGTON

Portuguese Will Send a Man to Back Up Petition.

J. M. Vivas Will Probably Be the Man—Will Employ Another in Washington—Meeting Last Night.

The Portuguese Union held another big meeting in Lusitana hall last night for the purpose of discussing the advisability of sending to Washington a man to back up the petition from the Portuguese that was presented to the Commission yesterday forenoon.

J. M. Vivas presented the report of the committee on memorial. This was accepted with thanks.

Next came a discussion of the object of the meeting. The Portuguese spoke freely on the matter and finally decided to send one man to Washington. While it was not decided who should be sent, the impression is pretty general that J. M. Vivas, who has always identified himself with his countrymen in all matters of interest to them, is the man decided on. Certainly no better could be chosen.

It was further decided that someone in Washington, fully acquainted with the "lay of the land" be employed to work with the Portuguese representative from these Islands.

There was one thing in the way of appointing a man on the spot. The branches of the Portuguese Union on the other islands had not been heard from. It was therefore decided to wait until hearing from these in the matter of proportion of expenses toward sending a man to Washington.

The reason for sending a representative to Washington is this. The Portuguese believe that the memorial at Washington would not have much effect unless there was someone present fully acquainted with the situation here and able to answer any questions and give necessary information.

Japanese May Die.

The case of Neda, charged with assault with a weapon on another Japanese, came up in the Police Court this forenoon. Marshal Brown asked that he be returned into custody as the Japanese was hit in the head was in very bad state and not expected to live. Defendant was sent below. His case will be continued from day to day pending an improvement in the condition of the injured man or the worst.

Some Healanis Jottings.

The Healanis will jollyify at their club house this evening. The crew and all members are urged to come. Besides other things, there will be post mortem speeches over the death of the Myrtles.

The Healanis have now four brooms flying from their flag pole over the boat house.

WILL OF THEO. H. DAVIES

Disposition of Estate Worth Two and Quarter Million Dollars.

Executors and Trustees Both Appointed—Bequests All to Family and Near Relatives—Large Settlements.

F. M. Swanzy has presented to the Circuit Court in probate at chambers an exemplified copy of the last will and testament of Theo. H. Davies late of Ravensdale, Tonbridge Wells, county of Kent, England, deceased, with a petition that the exemplification be admitted to probate. The petitioner, Mr. Swanzy, and Thomas R. Walker, Theophilus Clive Davies and George Frederick Davies are named as executors in the will.

The testator died at Ravensdale on May 25, 1898, leaving estate in the Hawaiian Islands comprising real estate valued at \$40,000 and personal estate at \$1,674,000. He left a widow living and as heirs at law and next of kin Theo. Clive Davies, George F. Davies, Arthur Whitcliffe Davies, Theophilus Maxwell Davies, Harry Llanover Davies, Alice Marion Davies and Violet Mary Davies, all residents of Ravensdale.

Judge Perry has appointed Friday the 14th day of October for hearing the petition.

The first bequest in the will is of one hundred shares in Theo. H. Davies & Co., Limited, to each of the four executors on condition that they prove the will and accept the said gift in lieu of any commission or remuneration payable to executors or trustees under Hawaiian or any other law.

The marriage settlement to his wife made October 3, 1870, and amended October 3, 1876, is confirmed except as to her life interest in Craigside, the family home in Honolulu, and the benefits thereby taken in lieu of any claim to dower and the said life interest in Craigside.

The testator's wife, his sons Theophilus Clive and George Frederick, his brother-in-law Frederick James Jackson of Manchester and his partner Thomas Rain Walker are appointed trustees of his will and guardians of his infant children during their respective minorities.

One thousand pounds is bequeathed to his wife to be paid immediately after his death. All of the personal property in and about the dwelling house at Sundown, England, except money and security for money, goes to the wife. The house itself is given to the trustees in trust as a residence for the wife and such of the children as are bachelors or spinsters, these to enjoy the same for ten years after the death of the wife or his own death if he survived her. Permission is given for continuing the lease of the premises by wife or children if required, also for the purchase of a permanent residence in place of "Sundown."

All of the "Craigside" property in Honolulu is placed in trust for twenty years after his death as a family home.

Sixty thousand pounds is set apart as his wife's annuity fund, and £2000 per annum is to be paid her in equal quarterly payments. Other bequests are as follows: To Theophilus Clive Davies, all the testator's shares in the Honolulu Iron Works.

To George Frederick Davies, property in Winnipeg, Canada.

Five several sums of £10,000, invested in Theo. H. Davies & Co. Ltd. and Hawaiian plantation stocks, as the settled legacy each of Arthur Whitcliffe Davies, Theophilus Maxwell Davies, Harry Llanover Davies, Alice Marion Davies and Violet Marion Davies. Thomas Morris his valet gets £200.

MINNEAPOLIS EXCURSIONS

Are Backed by Times and the Boston Herald.

Manager Parker Representing Col. Haskell, Now in Honolulu—Many Wealthy Tourists.

George W. Parker, the advance manager of the two big excursions coming to Hawaii under the auspices of the Minneapolis Times, is stopping at the Arlington. He will remain in Honolulu for two or more months.

These excursions, which have been previously referred to as among the good works of Commissioner Shingle, are backed by Col. W. E. Haskell, the proprietor of the Minneapolis Times and a prominent business man of the northwest. Col. Haskell's father, the proprietor of the Boston Herald, is also cooperating in the scheme. The mere mention of these men's names as active promoters, guarantees that the excursions will be ably conducted, and will undoubtedly bring a large number of the class of tourists Hawaii is looking for. The rate made is a very reasonable one and the people taking advantage of them will be drawn from New England to the Northwest.

Mr. Parker remarked this morning, "You needn't be afraid that these excursions will bring a class of citizens to Hawaii, which I learn are being warned away. I have in mind one young man who will come on one of the trips. He is now drawing a salary of \$350 a month, and is rated as worth \$200,000. He is coming to look over the field and at present has particular interest in the coffee prospects of Hawaii. There are numbers of the same calibre, who having heard so much about this new territory are anxious to at least have a look over the field and figure out the real prospects. How many will stay with their newly invested capital I cannot of course say.

"The first excursion will be along the first of November and the second probably a month later. There's no question that the climate will be all that is anticipated, and the business men coming are the sort of people who recognize that business is business whether in Honolulu or Minneapolis and Boston."

About McComb Robbery.

An arrest has been made in connection with the supposed J. McComb robbery of Monday night. The defendant has pleaded not guilty and the case has gone over. The police have an idea in the matter. The friends of the defendant do not believe him guilty.

For More Mules.

THE WAR'S DEATH LIST.

Those Who Have Succumbed to Wound and Sickness.

Chicago, Sept. 1.—The Tribune tomorrow will print statistics showing the number of soldiers who have been killed in battle and have died of disease in camps during the war with Spain. The Tribune says: While 350 officers and men have been killed in battle or have died of wounds received, there have died of disease in camps between 1200 and 2000 volunteers and regulars.

The Tribune gives the following statistics of dead in each camp, giving in every instance a full list of names and nature of the disease. The records by camps is as follows: Camp Thomas, 352; Santiago, 341; San Francisco, 78; Camp Alger, 75; Camp Wikoff, 63; Jacksonville, 50; Tampa, 58; Miami, 76; Ferdinand, Lakeland, Camp Meade and other minor camps, in private hospitals at home, etc., 115; state camps, 36; transports and hospital ships, 90; total, 1284.

FIFTH JUDICIAL CIRCUIT

Proceedings Thus Far at September Term at Lihue.

Many Cases Not Presented—Pleas of Guilty and Convictions—Independent Label Suit Continued.

By the kindness of Charles Creighton, the following report is given of the progress of the September term of the Fifth Circuit Court, before Judge Hardy at Lihue, Kauai:

A nolle prosequi was granted in each of these criminal cases:

1. J. Koani Jr., malicious mischief.
2. Beni, profanity over ten cents' change in Spitz's store. Kaulukou for defendant.
3. Piopio, malicious mischief in killing and eating a dog belonging to Chas. Rice. Kaulukou for defendant.
4. Ah Kui, unlawful possession of opium.
5. Chon Pun, unlawful possession of opium. Creighton for defendant.
6. Yamada, vagrancy. Correa for defendant.
7. Emada, assault with intent to main.
8. Ah Sin larceny second degree. Davies for defendant.
9. K. Nii, embezzlement.
10. Three Chinese for gaming, three comrades pleading guilty. Davis for defendants.
11. Leong Fook, unlawful possession of opium. Creighton for defendant.

Kaio and others, malicious mischief, pleaded guilty and sentence was suspended until next term. Creighton for prosecution; Kaulukou for defendant.

Pua paid his fine, withdrawing appeal from Hanalei magistrate for larceny in stealing a pair of pants worth 35 cents.

J. Birt was convicted of gross cheat in selling opium for molasses, and sentenced to four months at hard labor. Correa for defendant.

Ah Sin, contempt of court, was dismissed. Davis for defendant.

Kapuipai, S. S. I., pleaded guilty to burglary second degree. Sentence not pronounced.

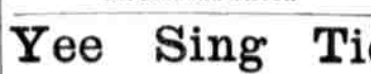

The Long Drawn Out Trial Ends in Hung Jury.

The mixed jury that tried the

AN ESTEEMED VISITOR

Gives His Views On Some Matters of
Local Interest.

Major Frank X. Cicott, former-
ly coiner of the U. S. Mint at San
Francisco, under Presidents
Grant and Harrison, will sail in
the Alameda. Major Cicott has
been in Honolulu several weeks,
part of the time the guest of the
Dillingham and Macfarlane fami-
lies. In a conversation he ex-
pressed unbounded pleasure at his
experience here. In reference to
the future of the country he is an
enthusiast, and predicts a glorious
and stable future.

Referring to the excursion
expected in November from Min-
neapolis, Major Cicott says the
party will be composed of
merchants and capitalists.

His information is that the
main object of this party will be
to investigate the resources of the
Islands with a view to the estab-

lar system of travel between the
Atlantic sea-board and Honolulu.

The sum of £33,000 invested in American securities is left in trust to pay annuities to the persons here named:

His sister Margaretta, wife of Joseph Dredge, £500, and after her death £100 to each of her three daughters.

Each of the three daughters of his late sister Mary Anne Jackson, £100.

Each of the three daughters of his brother William Henry Davies, £100.

William Henry Davies his brother, £200, to be paid to his wife for life if she survive him.

The widow of his late brother Frederick Davies, and after her death her son Eric, £100.

Frederick Mills Swanzy is appointed by the testator as managing director of Theo. H. Davies & Co. Ltd.

Legacies are made of £1000 each to his partner Harold Janion of Liverpool and nine of the testator's nephews.

The will concludes with many pages of directions to the executors and trustees. It directs that it be construed, as far as may be, according to English law, as the testator's domicile was English. The will executed January 25, 1896. A codicil dated January 14, 1897, directs that the will shall be construed as if the name of the testator's then present residence, "Ravensdale," had been inserted throughout instead of "Sandown." It also revokes the bequest of \$5000 to Harold Janion, as the amount had been paid in partnership settlement. Further, it directs that if any of the bequests lapse, the shares in Theo. H. Davies & Co. Ltd., given to the four executors shall be increased accordingly.

The personalty mentioned in the will shows investments in English, East Indian and Canadian, as well as Hawaiian stocks and bonds. Probably the total value of the estate is two and a quarter million dollars.

The exemplification filed for probate is written in English style without any marks of punctuation.

Mass Meeting of Natives.
