THE DOCTORS ON TYPHOID

Conference of Local Medical Men Over Injurious Publication.

Typhoid Fever—Almost Unknown in Honolulu for Twenty Years—Introduced by Military—Committee of Investigation.

There was a meeting of physicians in the dining room of the Pacific Club last night, to take into consideration an editorial on Honolulu in the Medical Record.

Dr. McGrew was elected chairman, and Dr. Alvarez secretary. Others present were Drs. Andrews, Emerson, Day, Herbert, Cooper, Myers, Wood, Howard, Burgess, Raymond, Hoffmann, Noblett and Garvin, also Geo. W. Smith, member of the Board of Health.

Dr. Raymond stated the double object of the meeting. It was desired to bear the experience of local physicians with typhoid fever, and to have a committee appointed to investigate typhoid fever as found to exist here and its causes.

Dr. Day read the obnoxious article in the Medical Record.

One after another of the doctors arose, giving their experiences ranging from many years to a few months in Honolulu. There was general agreement on these points:

Typhoid fever cases have been very rare in Honolulu for many years. It has not been epidemic since twenty years ago. These are typhoid fever in the military hospitals here now, but it was brought here by the Manila expeditionary and Honolulu garrison soldiers.

Malarial fever sometimes assumes a type in these islands which is liable to be mistaken for typhoid.

Dr. Alvarez related a warning example happening at Maidstone, England, some years ago, a fearful epidemic arising from the hop pickers' camp. He urged that the physicians should combine to prevent contamination of our water supply.

Part of his experience was in the typhoid epidemic at Kahuku plantation a few years ago, when there was disgraceful overcrowding against his protest. Six married couples of Japanese laborers were packed in a room 12 by 14 feet.

Dr. Herbert said the history of military campaigns everywhere was marked with malarial fever, "Jungle fever" it was sometimes called. Intestinal hemorrhages and lacerations were not certainly indicative of typhoid fever.

Dr. Hoffmann, who lately arrived from Germany, was positive of the existence of typhoid in the military hospitals here. He described the evidences as appearing in post mortem examinations he had conducted. His microscopic investigations having not been completed, he was unable as yet to make a thorough report.

Dr. Day produced a statement of fever cases from Board of Health records, showing that out of 97 since January 1 this year 50 were designated typhoid fever.

Dr. Cooper explained the cases reported from the Queen's hospital. Seventeen were Japanese who arrived in bad condition from Oahu plantation. A number of the Mauii transports also left some very sick men at the hospital, some of whom died.

Drs. Raymond, Wood and Myers had privately treated soldiers, who came to them with high fever, but the cases yielded to treatment for malarial fever.

Dr. Garvin, who is now attached to the military hospital, said there was typhoid fever among the patients without a doubt. But there were many cases of malarial fever that looked like typhoid, so that he often delayed diagnosis a week. He would call some cases "peri-

The following committee was appointed to investigate the typhoid fever conditions, also to look into the matter of protection of the water supply from infection: Drs. Herbert, Andrews, Alvarez, Howard, Myers, Cooper and Raymond.

Dr. Alvarez complained that the medical fraternity was not consulted, as a rule, in matters of importance to the public health.

It was the sense of the meeting, expressed by many speakers, that the medical corps of the military ought to be enlisted in the investigation.

Matters in Probate—Verdict in Ejectment—New Jury Trial.

A jury is being drawn before Judge Stanley for the \$50,000 suit of M de J. Gouveia et al vs. Wailuku Sugar Co. Creighton, Kekoikai and Correa appear for plaintiffs, and Kinney, Ballou & McClanahan for defendant.

William Hooper, administrator of the estate of Charles Hooper, deceased, files his first and final account, with receipts of \$2738 36 and payments of \$2646 45. Besides real estate given in a former inventory, there is personal property of \$3844 55 in the estate.

J. M. Monsarrat has qualified as guardian of the J. I. Dowsett minors, in a \$3500 bond with M. D. Monsarrat as surety.

Lau Lam Chin by his attorneys, Lyle A. Dickey and A. S. Humphreys, has discontinued his suit in equity against H. A. Heen.

Agnes Jones and others failed to convince a mixed jury of their title to real estate in King street, Honolulu, claimed against Hoopuloa and others.

F. F. Porter vs. Hawaiian Pork and Packing Co., assumpsit, is on for new trial before Judge Perry and by this foreign jury, found satisfactory after eight jurors had been rejected: E. E. Tai Wo refused to move his laundering establishment to the suburbs of the city and is in jail charged with violating Board of Health regulations.

A. Gumerson will be sent to the insane Asylum from the police station this afternoon. He has been in the Queen's hospital for a long time. Gumerson is an Englishman, 69 years of age.

The indications are that he has cerebral softening.

HIS THIRTY-FIFTH YEAR

Record of Geo. C. Beckley as Seafaring Man.

Hawaiian Who is a Hard Toller—Began Before the Mast on a Whaler—His Present Position.

Among the native Hawaiians who have started from the foot of the ladder in business and risen step by step persistently to the top, Geo. C. Beckley of the Wilder Steamship Co. stands out prominently. Tomorrow he will complete his thirty-fifth year as a seafaring man, a life which he has followed from a boy.

It was on November 23 in the year 1863 that he went before the mast on the whaling bark Catherine and sailed away for Arctic waters after the sperm whale. Shortly after this, he and the whole crew met with a very exciting adventure. The Catherine was captured by the Confederate privateer Shenandoah in the Bering sea and burned. The crew was transferred to the Richmond, a ship flying the Hawaiian flag and owned by Wilcox & Richards of Honolulu.

For two years Mr. Beckley served on whalers and in 1865, returned to Honolulu to work on the Kilauea. There he remained for six months and then, returned to the whaling business, shipping on the Monticello of New London, whose agent in Honolulu was C. A. Williams F. S. Pratt was then secretary in Williams' office.

In 1870, Mr. Beckley having saved up quite a little sum of money, returned to Honolulu and again went on the Old Kilauea, this time as freight clerk.

That was really the beginning of his career with the Wilder Steamship Company. From that time until now, he has occupied many positions. Now he is purser of the largest steamer in the Wilder company, is a director in the company and has the fortune of being one of the largest stockholders.

During his whaling career of seven years, Mr. Beckley was on the Catherine, Richmond, Monticello, Kohala, Eagle and Arctic, all whalers that touched here. Captain Phillips commanded the Catherine, Monticello and Eagle and Captain Tripp the Kohala and Arctic while Beckley was on those vessels.

This functionary, Jules Harder, is originally from New York, where he served in some famous hotels and restaurants—such as Delmonico's, the Metropolitan, Grand Union and Saratoga—after which he was chief culinary genius in several of the leading hotels of Charleston and Savannah in the South. Mons. Harder came out to the Pacific Coast with Warren Leland to open the Palace hotel, where he held the position of chef for eleven years at a salary of \$400 a month. Later he filled the same position at the Hotel del Monte, Monterey. His engagement by E. C. Macfarlane for the Hawaiian hotel is part of the policy of "expansion" adopted by that gentleman whenever he came into fee simple ownership of this famous old hostelry. The improvements already accomplished have greatly increased both the accommodations and the comforts of the hotel, and trouble or expense will not be spared to still further promote its metropolitan character. Mons. Harder takes full charge of the culinary department and dining room.

VERY ACCOMMODATING.

Certificates of Death to Order at Short Notice.

There are some Chinese doctors of good reputation in Honolulu. Others there are who hold licenses that were given them twelve years ago simply to enable them to sign permits for buying opium. An incident has just come to light which may lead to the holding of a house cleaning day by the Board of Health among the household of Chinese physicians.

An application was made at the Board of Health on Saturday for a burial certificate for "A. P. Moe-honua," Hawaiian male aged 42, alleged to have died of consumption at Auwailimu. Mr. Reynolds told the applicant that a certificate of death from the attending physician, if there was one, should accompany the application. In answer to a question the applicant gave name of Dr. Miner as that of the attending physician, and Mr. Reynolds told him to get a certificate of death from Dr. Miner. As he could not get back to the Health office before the closing hour, he was told he could get the burial certificate at Mr. Reynolds' house.

When he came to the house the physician's certificate he brought was of the death of "Kaulumu" aged 40, and signed by Dr. Leong Pung Tong. It was for the same dead man, however, the applicant explaining that he had to change the name to get the certificate. There has been no physician in attendance, the truth is, but the Chinese doctor was accommodating.

It is probable that proceedings will be taken against the physician for issuing a fraudulent certificate of death.

Our morning friends overlooked one joke in its almanac list. Sam Small said: "What makes the wheels go 'round?" "Grease" was the answer from the audience. "I will now proceed to pass the contribution box." Paste this in the book and mark it for use on the BULLETIN.

The incident at Buena Vista hospital is of no particular moment except to show that mistakes may be made by officials outside the army. Col. Barber accepts the correction in the spirit it is made. We believe he has also gone so far as to correct an official letter which ended, "We trust this will happen again."

Wow, wow, wow. The BULLETIN is grateful to the Advertiser for free advertising. Our contemporary apparently believes in newspapers "soaking" the business community and giving everybody else the use of its column free. Every American knows that church directories in American papers are placed on a par with other advertising. Business is business, dear friend, and if you want to look up christianity in business affairs, trot out a few more incidents and we'll compare notes before the public.

IN THE MILITARY CAMPS.

This is a time when many complaints are heard on the conditions in the army hospitals, but it is a notable fact that when brought down to a cool consideration of the situation, those making the complaints admit that the physicians are doing the best they can with the means at their disposal.

The facts of the matter are that the boys are discouraged, that there is a generally depressed spirit pervading the ranks which all the medicines druggists can concoct cannot eradicate. Unfortunately some of the men have feigned sickness in order to get a furlough and discharge and as a result some of those ill have suffered. Physicians and stewards have made preparations to care for the sick, taking into consideration the demands likely to be made, only to find that the demand is greater than the supply and some one has to wait. Friends feel injured that they cannot see sick ones, but if visiting were allowed it would increase the labors of an already overworked force, and it is practically impossible to draw the line other than to allow no visitors.

The necessity of the situation seems to be the following of the advice of the old darkie, "Look to yer marcies chile, look to yer marcies." Brace up boys. Look on the bright side of life and make the best of what comes. That's the spirit of the true soldier whatever task he may have to perform. Even a volunteer's cake is not all dough. The boys in the civil war on both sides suffered greater hardship than this campaign has produced and they pulled through. Don't exaggerate the idea that Honolulu is down on the New Yorkers. Look around and note the many pleasant and thoughtful things that have been done. Don't always be harping on the desire

to go home. It makes the men dissatisfied and keeps friends and relatives constantly worried. Keep a stiff upper lip. Don't let the blue devils get the best of a regiment that would never give way before an armed force. The boys were mustered in to fight, and the unexpected foe is the "blue devils." Accept the opportunity, fight it out and in the end you'll win.

No one questions that many of the boys are having a hard time of it, but many a mother will be saved sleepless nights and days of worry of the boys will face the hardship with the same undying courage with which they would, if called upon, protect their homes.

BUENA VISTA INCIDENT.

Odorless Excavator Makes Trouble for Health Authorities.

An incident at the Buena Vista hospital has caused not a little comment among the army officers. Local physicians visiting the hospital decided that the cesspool should be cleaned.

The odorless excavator was sent up to the place and went to work. After the cesspool was emptied the refuse was dumped in close proximity to the hospital.

The sergeant in charge suggested that this was hardly proper, but says that the man in charge of the excavator said the refuse was dumped anywhere so long as it wasn't found out. The physician in charge reported the matter to Minister Smith, who was immediately up in arms and reprimanded the superintendent of the excavator severely, going so far as to recommend suspension. The latter was required to take a lot of disinfectants to the place and do all possible to repair the mistake.

Will be Back Soon.

Professor Koebele, whose splendid work on these Islands is so well known as to need no recounting here, is expected back very soon.

In a letter to Mr Haugh's of the Government nursery he stated that it was his intention to make a trip or so more in California for the purpose of discovering, if possible, some enemy of the caneborer now existing here. He was then at his home in Alameda.

At the time of writing to Mr. Haugh's, Professor Koebele had not yet received his instructions from this Government to return as soon as possible, so that he may be expected by any steamer now, even by the Australia tomorrow.

Mules and Horses.

One of the passengers in the W. G. Irwin from San Francisco this morning was R. B. McLain, a stock breeder from Lancaster, Mo., who was here with horses last April. With him he brought twenty-six head of mules and four head of horses which he, as agent for W. P. Hall, will place on the market here. The animals are all in fine shape, having had a quick, fine passage and the very best of care on the W. G. Irwin.

When Mr. McLain was here before he sold a fine team to J. S. Walker and another to the Club Stables. His departure at that time was hastened a bit on account of the impending war between the United States and Spain.

To Kona and Kohala.

Prince Cupid Kalaniana'ole and wife left in the Mauna Loa this forenoon for a trip to Kona where they will be guests at the home of the Queen Dowager Kapiolani in Kailua. They will remain there for about a month and will then visit the woods ranch in Kohala. A complete hunting outfit was taken along.

Notwithstanding the occasional heavy showers, there was a large audience at the public band concert last evening. Miss Berliner, David Moe and Charles Kreuter won well deserved applause for individual efforts.

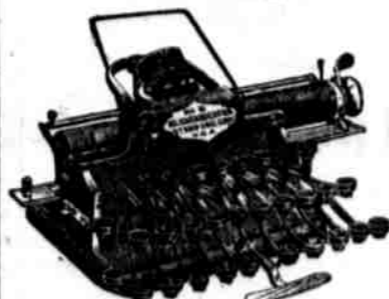

MINISTER KING'S TOUR.

Tells People of Hawaii What Will be Done by Government.

Minister King is on Hawaii and will do the Hilo, Puna, Kau and Kona districts for the purpose of getting everything in order to push ahead the public works authorized by the last Legislature, so soon as the loan money is available from the bonds now being sold. It is intended to have all the works authorized completed by July 1, at which time, according to present indications, the Government of Hawaii will be transferred in toto to the United States.

These works include among many other matters, the completion of the circuit of Hawaii by a Government road, the extension and widening of Pitman, Bridge and other Hilo streets, and road extensions in Kaumana, Kaiwika, Olaa, Puna and on the other side of the island. The improvement in Postoffice and Custom House buildings will be reserved for the action of the United States Government. The Kaumana road will be thoroughly repaired and widened out of current expenses, even if it costs more than the \$2500 appropriated.

Minister King says that this Government has done more in real improvement and extension during the past six years than the previous government did in twenty years, and when this proposed work is completed he thinks they have no occasion to be ashamed of their activity in this line. There have been mistakes in judgment, but there has been also sincerity of purpose and honesty of expenditure. Minister King and Mr. Rowell leave today for Puna and tomorrow will meet the Olaa coffee planters at Mountain View. They go thence to the Volcano, Kau, and Kona, leaving Kailua for Honolulu on the 28th inst.—Hilo Tribune.

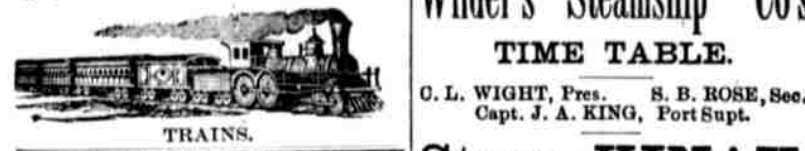
