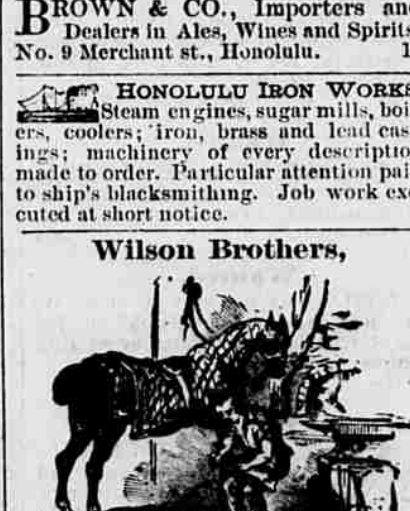

Full Particulars of the "Suez."

The brig John D. Spreckels arrived off port and anchored outside last night. A small mail was brought ashore. By courtesy of Messrs W. G. Irwin & Co. we are enabled to assure our readers that the Suez arrived in San Francisco on the 21st, having broken her propeller after 4 days out.

The *Chronicle* says she had two blades of her propeller broken by striking a spar afloat on the water. The accident made its occurrence immediately felt by the jar, and the reduced speed. She, however, continued on her way until the following day, and then turned back. Fate seemed to be against the ship, for on the same day, shortly after she had started on her return, she was struck by a gale and one of her top-gallant masts and topsail yards were carried away. Seven days were consumed in making port from the point where she turned back. In her damaged condition she only made 6 1/2 knots. She was to sail on the 27th or 28th January. She discharged part of her cargo to enable her to dock and replace the broken screw with the extra one she carried.

FORT STREET CHURCH.

On Sunday evening, was well filled with people anxious to hear how the missions to the South Seas were getting along. The Rev. Mr. Houston first addressed the meeting, giving a slight outline of the voyage to, and his experiences on Ponape.

He found it was very easy to get congregations, but much more difficult to get practical Christianity. Still the work was encouraging, as the inhabitants were more intelligent than those in the low islands.

It is a beautiful place, thickly covered with jungle and forest vegetation, through which paths have to be cut. There are four tribes or divisions on the island, each of which has its King; this makes the work more difficult, as tribal differences sometimes upset the result of previous teaching. He had suggested improvements in their dwellings, such as better windows, stools, &c., and in their modes of living with some share of success. His slight knowledge of medicine had been a great help in gaining their confidence and sympathy.

The heathen portion are noticeable from the fact that they keep up the old customs and dress in the old style, and these matters serve greatly to distinguish the Christian from the heathen native.

Their habits are gregarious. When one has a new or fine house all his relatives go and stay with him.

He then mentioned the case of two chiefs as examples of what had been done in Christianizing the islands, one of whom was now being trained for a missionary for islands to the West, having given up all his possessions.

The station he was at was called On, mountainous and least eligible for residence, but the people were good and kind. Near it were some old ruins, where the people used to gather annually to worship the spirits of their ancestors—the only religion they seemed to have had.

Captain Bray then read an interesting and amusing report, which, however, hardly seemed to speak highly of the work being done in the different groups, as he deprecated the want of system and advocated the changing of missionaries to different stations to those they now occupied. The meeting dispersed after prayer and benediction.

The ship *Cimbria* sank Jan 21 after colliding with the Sultan off Hamburg. A fearful scene occurred. SHIPPING NOTES.

The *Gettysburg* Captain Theobald arrived on Saturday from Newcastle N. S. W. 104 days, having called at Tahiti on the way and leaving there 20 days ago. She brings 1500 tons coal for W. G. Irwin & Co. She will come in to-day as she draws 2 1/2 feet of water.

The ship *Lehua* brought 1279 bags sugar and 2 horses.

The ship *Nettie Merrill* brought 480 bags sugar

Schr *Kekaulohi*, brought 100 bags sugar, etc.

Schr *Kauikeouli* brought 2800 bags of sugar.

Schr *Jennie Walker* arrived yesterday, 11 days and 21 hours from Washington Island. She brought 192 bags of copra.

The bark *Ullock*, from Liverpool, brought 2,805 cases brandy, 175 cks. alum, 349 kegs hardware, 81 bales baskets, 1 boiler, 198 wheels, 3 dogs, 1900 parcels samples, etc.

The *Jennie Walker* reports very rough weather at Washington Island and on the way back. They lost 1 boat there and brought yart of her cargo back.

LOCAL & GENERAL ITEMS.

The Japanese Ambassador and suite will visit the schools to-day.

The *hookupa* is reported to be coming in in great quantities. Wai-lua and Honokaa are to the front.

It is said that quite a number of the prisoners now at the goals will be pardoned at the Coronation.

YESTERDAY 20 prisoners were sent to cut some Maile and 20 others to cut grass for next week's festivities.

Word has been received in Honolulu that every district on the different islands will be represented by a number of delegates.

The Hawaiian Amateur Minstrel Troupe will give their second performance at the Music Hall on Saturday next.

A lecture will be delivered this evening at the Reading Room by Mr. Cruzan, at 7:30 o'clock. Subject, "Kings of Men."

The Japanese Embassy and suite were entertained on Saturday night at the Hotel at a dinner given by the Ministry. The dinner was in the Hotel's best style.

The time draws near every available piece of velvet and satin in the dry goods shops has been sold. How gorgeous will be the amphitheatre!

YESTERDAY afternoon a drunken man rode furiously on horseback along King Street. Although the police attempted to stop him they couldn't. This shows the need of mounted police.

YESTERDAY morning a grocer's delivery wagon ran away along King Street and turned up Nuuanu Street. The driver of Dodd's sprinkler jumped down and running after it stopped before it reached the corner of Hotel Street.

G. Davis, W. More and C Taylor were, yesterday, committed for trial at the Supreme Court, for robbery in the 1st degree.

There is at present a larger number of foreign vessels in port together than has been the case for many months past. We have 4 men-of-war, 2 ships, 7 barks, 2 barkentines, 2 terns, 4 brigantines and 1 schooner—22 in all.

Some complaints have been made about holes in the sidewalk of Fort street, mauka of Beretania street, which were caused by the owner of the adjacent property moving his fence back and neglecting to fill up the space thus created. These holes are now being filled up.

How is it that there is no place in the Coronation Procession programme for the citizens at large? are they not to be represented? Or is it believed that our down-town Merchants are not wishful to take part in the ceremony.

It is rumoured that to a certain order in this town some time ago a wish was expressed that it would make the largest show at the procession and urging it to enroll new members. What shifts are we reduced to?

To a public dinner in all civilized nations, the press are invited to send representatives to report proceedings. Here it is not so. The more public an affair nominally is, the more private it is sought to be kept, for fear that the public will know too much of the little games.

The *Likilike* made exceedingly fast time on her last trip up to windward. She left this port at the same time as the *Iwalani*, and after stopping one hour and ten minutes at Lahaina, only arrived at Maalaea ten minutes behind the *Iwalani*. This shows the benefit of the thorough overhauling and cleaning she has undergone lately.
