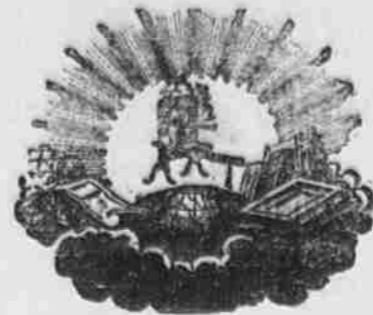

A DEMAND FOR JUSTICE.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—Just as our mind's eye perceives the first hopeful glimmer on the horizon of Hawaii's future, an incident occurs, which, like a threatening thunder cloud, shuts out the welcome light.

The man Trainor is dead! Laid away in an unknown, uncare-for grave, he has become part of nature's wealth. His hopes and loves, his virtues and vices, his sorrows and joys, all rest with him beneath Hawaiian soil.

There is nothing strange about this common occurrence. A man dies, friendless and destitute, is buried—and forgotten.

There would be nothing strange in his case if we had the mitigating satisfaction to know that our duty towards this stranger had been done. But it was not, and as long as this criminal negligence is not branded upon the inhuman wretches who perpetrated the devilish deed, which cries loudly for investigation by an enraged public, whose feelings have been lacerated and whose manhood has been insulted, that long our national escutcheon will be besmirched by this blot of cruel neglect, and when the Recording Angel shall have entered in his Book of Doom this barbarous deed, he will set a mark upon the page; and on the Day of Judgment God will clear the Court of Heaven before He opens the detestable record.

Friends, let us remember that this man who suffered from our neglect was once cared for by gentle hands, that hearts kind and true loved him or may love him still, and that he is a child of the same inheritance which all of us may justly claim in a civilized community, which is brotherly love. Yet Mercy has been cheated, Truth belied, and now one and all of us, demand that Justice, with all her majesty and sternness, step to the fore and deal with these inhuman men, who were the direct or indirect cause of this stranger's death, as they dealt with him.

And not until they are brought to light will the remembrance of Mr. Trainor's death become bearable to our memory, and not until then will the blush of shame fade from our cheeks, and our eyes sparkle, if not with joy, yet with satisfaction in the knowledge of having done our duty.

Sleep thou, O stranger, in peace! and reverently we ask thee to look down upon us with Mercy's eye. We ask forgiveness of thee and offer in return all the amends we can make.

POLICE COURT.

Nothing special in the criminal department of the Police Court this morning. In the civil department Hyman Bros. brought two suits against J. THE HAWAIIAN BLUE RIBBON LEAGUE.

The Temperance Society among the Hawaiians had a gala day on Saturday last. The attention of the natives was devoted to the Sunday School exhibition during the forenoon, but as these exercises neared the close, the people—men, women and children—all dressed in their best came streaming in to the premises of Queen Emma Hall and rested under the cool shade of its trees.

By one o'clock over 600 persons had gathered here and ice cream, ice cold soda and cakes fresh from the Pioneer Candy Factory were served to the eager multitude. At 2 p. m. the Royal Hawaiian Band took its station and played to the delight of the people, a larger proportion of whom were from the outer districts and who had come to the capital to the anniversaries of the week.

It was difficult to obtain quiet for the speech making that followed, but the Stentorian lungs of Mr. W. B. Keam of Waialuku finally secured the attention of all the audience, except the small boys who were too intent after Horn's buns to listen to even a temperance speech.

Hon. H. S. Townsend followed in English, his remarks being interpreted by Hon. H. Waterhouse. Mr. T. G. Gribble then held the attention of the listeners in a crisp speech interpreted by Hon. A. F. Judd. Revs. S. L. Desha and E. S. Timoteo, always favorites with a Hawaiian audience, closed the speech making and the procession was formed by the committee who, distinguished by large blue rosettes, acted as marshals.

Led by the band and the blue banner of silk, the procession—consisting first of Sunday school children, next of women, then of boys and lastly of men, all four deep, and at least 500 persons—marched out of the gate. The line of March was down Nuuanu street to King, thence up King to Fort street, and up Fort to Beretania, thus passing the majority of the liquor saloons, whose destructive work ruining the Hawaiians it is the object of this Society to suppress.

On reaching Queen Emma Hall again the band played for some time longer, and the people gradually scattered homeward.

The Blue Ribbon League among the Hawaiians is conducted by a committee of the Y. M. C. A. of Honolulu, who live these very convenient and commodious premises in the interests of the Hawaiians and Japanese. The few foreign visitors at the celebration last Saturday felt much encouraged at the zeal of Hawaiians in the temperance cause and at the impulse forward given to it by this festival.

HAWAIIAN OPERA HOUSE.

W. I. BISHOP MIND-READING EXPERIMENTS.

Mr. Washington Irving Bishop's mind reading exhibition, at the Opera House, last night, is correctly characterized by the phrase "a thorough success." At 8 o'clock, the hour announced for the experiments to begin, the house was jammed full of curious or expectant people.

The curtain rose, and Mr. Bishop, after announcing in few words that his physical condition was not the best for the performance of what he had promised, requested the selection, by the audience, of a committee of a dozen to occupy the stage: to see that everything was as he professed and that there was no trickery in it.

The audience nominated the following gentlemen, who went forward and took seats on the stage. Messrs. C. O. Berger, S. E. Bishop, Muller, W. W. Hall, L. A. Thurston, C. B. Wilson, J. W. Luning, C. M. Starkey, Roche, J. F. Smith, F. M. Swazy, and F. Spencer. Dr. Miner and Dr. Day also went forward, by request, to attend professionally to Mr. Bishop.

These preliminaries being arranged, Mr. W. I. Bishop stated that he had been informed a gentleman in the town, Professor Scott, had expressed disbelief in his (Mr. Bishop's) ability to do what he professed, and he therefore invited Mr. Scott, if present, to take a seat on the stage. Repeated calls were made, but it was ultimately reported that the gentleman was not present, whereupon Mr. Bishop said he would have a carriage placed at the professor's disposal, so that the latter might come, if so disposed, without inconvenience.

Mr. Bishop explained that he did not profess to perform anything supernatural, or to do anything by spirit agency, but simply to detect by his own mind what was in the mind of others, and that the person operated on must be sincere and honest, and keep his mind concentrated on the object sought to be revealed, otherwise the operator's mind would be confused and accuracy would be difficult to attain.

The first experiment was to discover a person supposed to have been murdered and the weapon with which the deed had been committed concealed. Mr. Hall was furnished with a dagger. Mr. Bishop was taken from the stage and blindfolded by two or three committeemen, while Mr. Hall came down among the audience, singled out a victim for the pretended deed, and then concealed the weapon under the matting in the passage way of the hall. Mr. Bishop led Mr. Hall to the spot where the dagger was hidden, drew it from the place of concealment, and then conducted him to the victim.

Mr. Thurston was then asked to write the name of some person in the audience, and enclose it in an envelope, the latter being undressed. The person whose name was enclosed was then ferretted out, as in the previous case. Mr. W. Kinney was the gentleman to whom the envelope was delivered, who on opening it announced that it contained his name.

Mr. Swazy, from the committee, was deputed to go among the audience and abstract articles from three different persons, and then conceal them in one parcel. Mr. Bishop, blindfolded as before, conducted Mr. Swazy to the hidden parcel, and then restored to each person, in different parts of the hall, one up in the gallery, his lost property.

The reading of the number on a certificate of deposit was the last experiment. Mr. Geo. C. Williams went on the stage from the audience. Holding in his hand a sealed envelope, he stated that it contained a \$20 certificate, and that no one knew the number except himself. The number was then privately communicated by him to Mr. S. E. Bishop and Mr. W. W. Hall. These gentlemen accompanied the mind-reader to the blackboard, upon which after a few seconds, the latter chalked the number 874. The envelope was entrusted to Mr. Thurston to open, which he did and declared the number on the note to correspond with that on the blackboard.

Mr. Bishop having thus correctly given the number was entitled to the \$20, but handed it and along with it an equal amount from his own pocket, to the Chairman of the committee, Mr. S. E. Bishop, to be donated to some local charity.

Dr. Day here announced that Mr. Bishop was becoming so exhausted, that he was not fit to proceed with any more experiments. The entertainment therefore terminated.

The audience was brimful of enthusiasm. In fact, so full that it could scarcely be restrained at times from applauding before the proper moment had arrived. At the close of each experiment the clapping and other expressions of satisfaction were deafening. The disappointment of the postponement of the previous week was fully atoned for by the success of last night.

Legislative Assembly.

MORNING SESSION.

12TH DAY—June 12th.

The House opened at 10 a. m. President S. G. Wilder in the chair.

PETITIONS.

Noble Waterhouse presented a petition from the Hawaiian Evangelical Association, praying that the sale of liquor be prohibited in this kingdom. Laid on the table to be considered with a bill on the subject.

Rep. C. Brown presented a petition from one Hosea, praying that he be refunded certain money paid twice by him for taxes. Referred to Finance Committee.

Rep. Paehaole presented a petition from Molokai containing four prayers relating to lepers. Referred to the Committee on Miscellaneous Subjects.

Rep. Kamaouha presented a petition from Kalawao, Molokai, containing several prayers. Referred to Sanitary Committee.

Rep. Paehaole presented a petition from Kalawao, praying that the Leper Hospital at Kakaako be abolished, and that two receiving hospitals be maintained on Molokai. Referred to Sanitary Committee.

Rep. Nakaleka presented a petition from Molokai asking for certain changes in the administration of the affairs of the Board of Health. Referred to Sanitary Committee.

Rep. Paehaole presented a petition from Molokai praying that \$2,000 be appropriated for landings at Pukoo, Kaunakakai and Kamalo, and \$1,200 for a wharf at Kalauapapa. Referred to Public Lands Committee.

Rep. Kamaouha presented a petition from Hilo, from one Waialea, for \$150, promised to him for building a certain road. Referred to Finance Committee.

Rep. C. Brown reported from the Judiciary Committee, recommending the passage of the Patent Rights Bill with two very slight amendments. On motion the report was accepted and laid on the table to be considered with the bill.

He also reported from the same committee on the bill regulating Labels and Trade Marks, recommending its passage, with a few slight amendments. Accepted and laid on the table to be considered with the bill.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE.

Noble Hitchcock reported from the Special Committee, to whom was referred the Married Woman's Bill, recommending its passage, with the following amendments, Section 1 to read as follows: That no sale or mortgage of her real estate shall be valid without the written consent of her husband; that Sec. 2 be amended so as to read as follows: A married woman may make contracts oral and written, sealed and unsealed, in the same manner as if she were sole, except that she shall not be authorized hereby to make contracts for personal service, without the written consent of her husband. That Section 13 be amended by striking out all after the word here, in the 13th line, and add thereto, "Subject to a life interest of the husband in one-third of the wife's real estate." And that Sec. 10 be amended by inserting the word personal before property. The report was accepted and laid on the table to be taken up with the bill.

RESOLUTIONS.

Rep. Kalauka offered a resolution to the effect that the Minister of the Interior be ordered to instruct the Board of Health not to send certain people from Kakaako to Molokai, until the views of this House have been obtained on the several resolutions now before the Assembly relating to lepers. Laid on the table.

Noble Castle read for the first time a bill to give Circuit Judges certain powers. Referred to Printing Committee.

He also read two other bills, one to amend the Act relating to Private Ways and Water Rights; and one To Provide for the Importation and Sale of Alcohol. Both bills referred to Printing Committee.

Rep. Paehaole offered a resolution to the effect that a select committee be appointed to proceed to Molokai and report upon the conditions of the lepers confined there, and that the expenses of the committee be paid out of the appropriation for this Session of the Legislature. Adopted.

Noble Young moved that this committee be authorized to take two physicians with them, and also two newspaper reporters.

Rep. C. Brown amended the motion, that the two doctors be selected by the Committee.

The President ruled that the resolution must be taken from the table in order to be amended.

Rep. Kamaouha moved the reconsideration of the resolutions, which was carried.

take, but the number not to exceed two. Rep. Kauihi moved an amendment that if the Committee choose to take two physicians with them, they pay them for their services.

Noble Widemann said that he did not think that a committee would be able to elicit any information in regard to the treatment of lepers, and allowing this committee to take physicians will be an extra expense for which we shall receive no benefit. If any benefit was to come from it he would support the measure, but as it is he hoped the resolution would not pass. He said he had been to Molokai officially and accidentally, and he did believe that such committees as this resolution contemplates would do the public no good, and would do those poor unfortunate people much harm, as it makes them discontented with their lot.

Noble Smith said he hoped the resolution would pass, as several petitions are before this House for the removal of the President of the Board of Health; also for the removal of the doctor at the Settlement. Within the last few days we have seen in the newspapers where people have resorted to arms, and shots have been exchanged in the capture of lepers. Now all these things should be investigated. It may be the fault of the Government, or it may be the fault of the lepers, and their complaints may be frivolous, but a thorough investigation should be made and reported to this House, therefore he favored the appointment of an investigating committee.

The amendment of Noble Smith was carried and the resolution as amended was adopted.

The Chair then appointed the following Committee: Paehaole, Daniels, Kinney, Helekuhili, Gay, John Richardson, S. G. Wilder.

The House adjourned until 1 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The House resumed at 1.15 p. m. and took up the

ORDER OF THE DAY.

Third reading of the Prison inspector's bill. Passed.

Third reading of bill providing for the computation of terms of imprisonment of prisoners in certain cases. Passed.

Second reading of bill defining adultery. Indefinitely postponed.

Second reading of a bill relating to stamp duties. Referred to Finance Committee.

Second reading of bill regulating suits by or against the Government. Referred to Judiciary Committee.

Minister Thurston stated that he had been informed that the member from Molokai had stated that lepers were taken and sent to Molokai without an examination. If such a statement was made it is utterly false, as every suspect is examined by a board, consisting of three physicians—Dr. Emerson, Dr. Trouseau and Dr. McKibbin. Their diagnosis of the disease is put down in writing, and if one of them thinks that the suspect has not got the disease, they are not sent.

Rep. Nakaleka said that he got his information from patients at Molokai, that this explanation was something like that which was made about wood, and had been in the House at the time such explanation was made, would have contradicted it.

Minister Thurston, under the suspension of the rules, asked leave to introduce a resolution. He stated that the Auditor-General refused to audit any more bills unless accompanied by vouchers for certain expenses connected with the care of lepers. He also says that the audit law does not allow him to audit a bill unless it is accompanied by a voucher. This may be all right in Honolulu, but there it will work much harm, as vouchers for expenses cannot always be had in time. Mr. Meyers has sent for about a \$1,000 for current expenses at the settlement, and the money should go up to-night, but the Auditor-General refuses to audit the amount and the money cannot be drawn from the Treasury. This may lead to some trouble, and in the future to avoid all trouble would ask to have the resolution pass.

In answer to a question how this had been done before, the Minister said that it was only now the Auditor-General had refused to audit any drafts from there for current expenses, so long as there was money in the Treasury. Following is the resolution: Resolved, that whereas the Minister of the Interior has informed the Legislature that the Auditor-General has declined to sanction the withdrawal of money from the Treasury, for certain necessary expenses of the leper settlement, under the claim that the audit law does not allow him so to do; and whereas the lack of such money will work serious injury to the public interests, therefore the Judiciary Committee is hereby instructed to inquire into the above mentioned state of facts, and recommend as early a date as practicable such course as may be necessary to avert such injury.

Noble Hitchcock moved to take bills 12 and 13 from the table and consider them. Carried.

And on motion of Rep. C. Brown bill No. 12 regulating the "Issuing

of Patents' was taken up first, and considered section by section.

Section 1 was read, amended and passed.

Section 2 was read and passed, as also the title and enacting clause to engrossment, to be read a third time on Thursday next.

Second reading of a bill to provide for the registration of "Prints and Labels."

The bill was read section by section with the report of the Judiciary Committee in connection with it. Some amendments were made.

The title and enacting clause were read and passed, with the amendment to the title by adding the words "Trade Mark." The bill passed to engrossment, to be read a third time on Friday next.

Adjourned until 10 a. m. to-morrow.

13TH DAY—June 13th.

The House opened at 10 a. m. President S.G. Wilder in the Chair.

PETITIONS.

Rep. Kamaouha presented a petition from Kona praying that an appropriation of \$400 be made for a landing at Napoopoo. Referred to Finance Committee.

Rep. Kamaui presented a petition from one Maikaaloa of Hilo, praying that he be paid \$7 for work he performed on the roads in 1880. Referred to Minister of Interior.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

Rep. F. Brown reported that two bills had been printed and were ready for distribution.

Rep. Kinney reported from the Judiciary Committee on the bill relating to Copyright, recommending certain amendments. The report was received and laid on the table to be considered with the bill.

Rep. C. Brown reported from the Judiciary Committee on the bill to repeal section 55 of the Penal Code, recommending its passage. The report was adopted and the bill passed to engrossment to be read a third time on Saturday.

He also reported from the same committee on the bill relating to suits brought by or against the Government, recommending its passage. The report was accepted and laid on the table to be considered with the bill.

Also from the same committee on the bill relating to rewards of sheriffs, etc., recommending its passage. The report was accepted, and laid on the table to be considered with the bill.

Rep. F. Brown reported four more bills printed and ready for distribution.

Noble Young reported from the Military Committee on the bill relating to the Military forces of the Kingdom, recommending its passage with some amendments.

The report was laid on the table to be considered with the bill.

RESOLUTIONS AND BILLS.

Rep. Rice gave notice of a bill to repeal section 54 of the Civil Code, relating to the carrying of passengers by vessels.

Rep. Kalauka gave notice of a bill to regulate the practice of medicine in the Kingdom. Also to make surveyors take out a licence.

Rep. Paehaole offered a resolution that \$3 be inserted in the Appropriation Bill to refund one Opu for taxes paid twice. Referred to Finance Committee.

Noble Hitchcock read a first time a bill to better prevent the illicit traffic in spirituous liquors. Referred to Printing Committee.

Rep. F. Brown read a first time a bill to amend section 12 of Session Laws of 1882, relating to the sale of wines and spirits. Referred to Printing Committee.

Rep. Nawahine offered a resolution that the Minister of Finance be requested to refund Kamamahimoku the sum of \$8, being amount of taxes paid twice. Referred to Minister of Finance.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

Third reading of the Lawyer bill. Noble Castle offered an amendment to section 3, changing "twenty-five" to "fifteen." Carried.

Noble Smith moved to indefinitely postpone, and spoke at length against the bill.

Noble Castle spoke in favor of the bill.

[With the view of overtaking our reporter to-day, his full notes of the discussion is omitted.]

The ayes and noes were called on the passage of the third reading of the bill. Ayes 22; Noes 23.

Noble Smith moved the vote be reconsidered. Carried.

Motion to take a recess until 1 p. m. was carried.
