TO SET GALICIAN FREE THE JUDICIAL GRIST MILL

MISSION OF GEORGE D. GEAR TO WASHINGTON. Goes Before the Supreme Court for a Decision as to Whether the Constitution Extends to Hawaii.

The case of the Galicians is to be brought before the Supreme Court of the United States. The question of whether the contract labor laws of Hawaii can be penalized enforced, now that the Islands have been annexed is to be brought before the highest American tribunal. The whole question of whether the Constitution of the United States is now in force here is to be put before the supreme court in Washington.

"My object in going," said Mr. Gear, "is to get a determination by the highest court in the land, of the question of whether the United States Constitution is in force here. As a means of securing that determination I have taken up the case of the Galicians who are in Oahu prison for deserting contract labor, as in that case a petition for habeas corpus sued out in the supreme court or before one of the justices of the supreme court, will bring up the whole subject and will secure speedy determination. That case is taken as a means to the general end.

From another source it was learned that very eminent counsel in the United States have been secured on behalf of the Galicians, and there are some who think the case will become another Dred Scott case so far as being a landmark in jurisprudence is concerned.

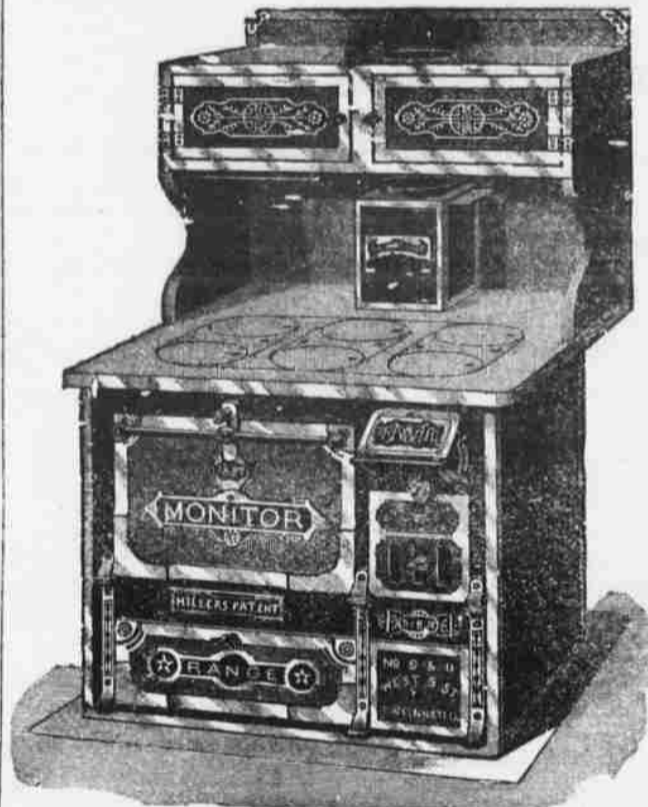

know him.

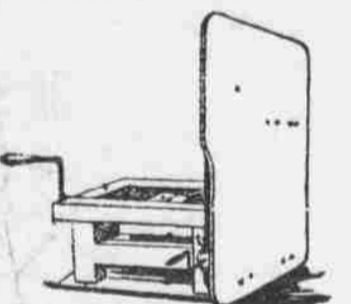

The matter of salaries and the appropria-  
tion was again taken up. Discus-

**IRRIGATION IN INDIA.**

At a recent report gives some idea of  
the extent of the irrigation systems in-  
troduced by the Indian Government, by  
which great tracts of land have been  
reclaimed from barrenness. At the present  
time, in the Punjab alone, 9500  
miles of main and branch canals have  
been constructed, not including 10,500  
miles of small distributaries. The total  
area irrigated by these means, which in  
1868 amounted only to 1,000,000 acres, in  
1878 to 1,300,000 acres, and in 1888 to 2,-  
300,000 acres, has risen, owing to the  
startling progress of the last decade, to  
5,200,000 acres. These figures form a  
striking testimony to British philan-  
thropy, organizing power, and engineer-  
ing skill.

**WOULD BRING RUSSIANS.**

Mr. Braun of Hilo, has arrived in the  
city with a proposal to bring Russian  
peasants to the Hawaiian Islands to  
labor in the cane fields. The gentleman  
comes from a thickly populated district  
of Russia and the language is his moth-  
er tongue.

Mr. Braun's proposition will be laid  
before the Planters' Association and  
will likely be looked into.

**UNIVERSITY EXTENSION.**

At the meeting of the University Ex-  
tensionists at the High school last evening  
it was decided to leave the program  
for August in the hands of the Univer-  
sity Club, which had charge of the Rolfe  
lectures. Remarks were made by Dr.  
Dewey, Professor Rolfe, Minister Mott-  
Smith, Mr. Townsend and others. Dr.  
Dewey's lectures will begin next week.

**MORE IMMIGRANTS.**

The China brought 33 Chinese steerage  
passengers, 30 males, 2 females and  
1 child, 372 Japanese steerage, 316 males,  
79 females and 9 children; and 11 Jap-  
anese in the cabin, 3 males, 7 females  
and 1 child. The total of Asiatics is 405  
steerage and 11 cabin.

In the way of small crimes, or rather of crimes involving small amounts, yesterday reported a rather plentiful supply. Three hold-ups and a burglary was a fair allowance, for a town where crime is by no means prevalent. The hold-ups are charged to soldiers, but the chances are very much in favor of its being some young hoodlums in the disguise of soldiers. People are prone to believe evil of soldiers, and though all soldiers are by no means angels, they often get blamed for things they do not do.

Benjamin Ide Wheeler, who has been selected President of the University of California, is a man of varied attainments, and of great organizing capacity. His knowledge of classic and modern literature is profound. He has recently performed a brilliant piece of work in his "History of Alexander the Great." He has treated his subject from a thoroughly modern standpoint, and has written a book which will take the place of all previous effort in the same direction. He has made the dry bones of history live. If he rules his university as well as he writes, his presidency at Berkeley will be a notable one.

No place will welcome its water supply more heartily than Wailuku. Up to the present the supply has come in open ditches, and has been woefully inadequate, besides being anything but clean. The houses will shortly have water from a source up the valley where it is pure and clear. The good supply of water will have an excellent influence upon the public health. The next place that will need water supply will be Lahaina. By the bye, Lahaina is waking up from the sleep of years and is again becoming an active spot. It was during the whaling days of the 40's and 50's that Lahaina was a metropolis, and hundreds of ships used to be at anchor in the roadstead. When the whaling industry was snuffed out, Lahaina was snuffed out with it. The starting up of new sugar plantations, however, is pushing forward Lahaina.

**THE COMING ASIATIC.**

Mr. Townsend showed in his letter yesterday that he made his statement that "nearly half of the generation to be born" on these Islands would be composed of Asiatics, after careful calculation and was not carried away by the mere number of Asiatics on the Islands. But even on this calculation he finds 40 per cent and not half as his result. The Star has already published its reasons for thinking that Mr. Townsend's views were incorrect, his letter does not alter the position of The Star. The letter centers its ideas upon the Asiatic to the exclusion of all others.

Taking his first table, Mr. Townsend dwells on the fact that the Asiatic women, numbering 24 per cent of the population, are credited with 25 per cent of the children under 1 year of age, he loses sight that the Portuguese women, who numbered 15 per cent of the population, are credited with 24 per cent of the children under 1 year, and that of children between 1 and 5 years, these same Portuguese women are credited with 25 per cent while the Asiatics are credited with 22 per cent. Moreover the Portuguese have 26 per cent of those between 6 and 15, while the Asiatic has but 11 per cent. And from this 26 per cent during the last three years, there must have been a considerable accession to the ranks of Portuguese mothers, a race, it must be remembered that averages 5.68 children per mother, as against 1.65 per mother of Japanese and 2.88 per mother of Chinese. While the Asiatic may be taking steps, it can be shown that the Portuguese is taking strides, and in a smaller degree the progress of the part Hawaiian might be shown to be very large.

The main part of Mr. Townsend's argument is based, however, upon getting at the number of women of each nationality between the ages of 15 and 45 and considering them as possible mothers. Upon this plan he arrives at the result that 35 per cent of the possible mothers on December 31, 1898 were Asiatics, and if this is the case, he considers that 40 per cent is not too great an estimate for the coming generation of Asiatics.

But one is not disposed to allow Mr. Townsend all his possible mothers. In the maternity statistics of 1896, which were calculated upon all above 15 years of age, without subtracting those who were over 45, and are therefore more favorable to the Asiatics upon the showing of the argument, the percentage of Asiatic mothers to the total female Asiatic population above 15 was 43.9. The percentage of the Portuguese mothers to the same class of population was 72.42, that of Hawaiians 59.36, and of part Hawaiians 52.34.

Viewed in this light the figures claimed would tumble to pieces. That Mr.

Townsend arrived at his result by calculation must be granted, but the calculation is based upon an assumption not warranted by facts. To calculate upon full possibility of mothers, when fact shows that the percentages of actual mothers among Asiatics was smaller than that of any other race is to base the calculation upon a false premise.

What is really needed for a proper elucidation of the argument is a proper list of births. The Star has urged this upon the Government, and the law is on the statute books to be carried out, but it is a dead letter. Had there been a birth rate from month to month to go by, the question would have been settled by reference to that rate. There would be no need for assumptions. That Mr. Townsend spoke in perfect good faith, no one will deny, least of all The Star, but that he is correct The Star challenges out and out.

**DOWN TRODDEN ITALIANS.**

Some weeks ago comment was made in The Star upon the absurdly false statements which appeared in the New York Sun relative to Italian laborers on these Islands. Whence the report came it was very evident. It was manufactured by the same hand and head, or one very similar, which prepared the tirade for the San Francisco Labor Union. As soon as the paragraph reached the Islands the utter absurdity of it was shown, and it was pointed out that the only Italians here were working for Mr. Damon, and that they were faring extremely well.

Mr. Damon was not satisfied with mere denial, but yesterday wrote to The Star stating exactly how these people were getting on. The letter concisely tells how the men were engaged, what work they have had to do and how they have been treated.

Out of twenty-four Italians in his employ, Minister Damon has seventeen under contract and seven under no contract whatever. Though there was some friction when the men first came, which was fomented by people in town, there has been no friction since, and the men are satisfied.

Certainly these men seem to be down trodden. They are so ill-used that each man has an account at the savings bank, the aggregate saving of this little colony being \$722 45. This is not a large sum here, but in Italy it is quite a stake. This has been accumulated in a little less than two years. Most assuredly these men would not have been as successful had they stayed in their own country. In addition to their savings, moreover, every one of these men has sent money to assist his relations at home.

The men have worked with one of their own countrymen as luna or overseer, who came out from Italy with them. There has been "brutal Saxon" in charge. They have been well treated and their employer has even given them an extra allowance for food, because he found that so great was their desire to save money that they did not feed themselves properly.

In the matter of housing they have been well cared for, they have comfortable dwellings, are supplied with wood and water at their doors and have garden patches, where they can raise vegetables for their own consumption. And it is people who have been thus well-treated, who are well housed, well fed, and who have saved money, that are represented in the New York Sun, as leading a life of degraded slavery, and suffering all kinds of injustice.

It is the easiest thing in the world to circulate irresponsible and false statements, and there are those here, who maliciously send these false statements abroad. It is on the other hand very hard to combat them. It is purely envy and malice which circulates such foul aspersions upon the leading people of this community, but to chase down a lie is no easy task. In the matter of these Italians there is not a syllable of truth, no a shred upon which to hang a little of the lie that has been told, and yet it has been freely circulated to the detriment of every person in this place. What irresponsible rascals of this kind cannot see, is that by spreading such stories, they not only injure the successful whom they hate for their success, but they injure all those who are dependent upon the prosperity of the place for a living.

# THE CENTER OF POPULATION

WHERE WILL THE NEW CENSUS PLACE IT.

In 1860 it was in Ohio—in 1890 in Indiana—Will the Philippine Population Court?

Inasmuch as the time for the taking of the census of 1930 is near at hand the annexed remarks from the Northwest Magazine, which are apropos of the probable center of population, should prove interesting. Says the Magazine Writer: "It will be interesting, when the returns of the census of 1930 are made up, to see where the center of population is then shown to be located. In 1860 it was near Athens, in Southern Ohio. In 1870 it had moved westward to the neighborhood of Hamilton, Ohio. In 1880 it was in Southern Indiana, near the Ohio line. In 1890 it still rested in Indiana, but had again moved westward. Probably the census of 1900 will show it to be somewhere in Southern Illinois, and we expect that it will have swerved a little northward from a line running due west from its last location."

"When the late General Francis H. Walker was superintendent of the census he explained the method of ascertaining the center of population somewhat as follows: Upon an imaginary board, shaped exactly like a map of the United States, and having no weight, the population is grouped in accordance with the distribution shown by the census returns. Each inhabitant is supposed to have exactly the same weight. Then the point at which the board balances is the center of population. Whether the people of our Philippine and West Indian possessions are to be included in making the new calculation is an interesting question for Director Merriam to decide. If the Filipinos are included the center of population will make a long jump to the southwest, and this movement will be only in part counteracted by the weight of the inhabitants of Cuba and Porto Rico. The center is not likely to cross the Mississippi river, however, in any case. The growth of Minnesota and the Dakotas will probably about counterbalance that of Texas and Oklahoma; so that we need not expect a variance to the south from the line of march which has been almost due westward for the past half-century. There has always been a much larger area of territory south of the center than north of it, but population in the south increases much less rapidly than in the north."
