AROUND OAHU.

Three Wheelmen Make a Circuit on Cycles.

Thos. P. Cummins, J. K. Kalani-annole and A. L. C. Atkinson returned from a pleasure tour around the island on their cycles on Sunday afternoon. The wheelmen started to make the circuit at 5:50 o'clock Saturday morning and arrived at the top of the Pali, a distance of 6 miles, at 6:45 o'clock, less than an hour from the start. This is considered fast time as the road is uphill. The trio walked down the Pali and immediately made for the Kaneohe courthouse. From there they went over to Heeia place, a few hundred yards further on, and were met and entertained to lunch by Mr. F. Buchholtz, the genial manager of the Heeia plantation. The three were famished and viands disappeared in quick time. A good run was made between Heeia and Kahana. When at the latter place the weather was so hot (150° in the shade or thereabouts) and the beautiful bay so tempting that the boys were induced to take a plunge in the briny. It was with difficulty that the natives living in the neighborhood of Mr. C. Brown's place at Heeia, would allow them to pass on their way. They wanted to kill the fatted pig right away, but there was no time to spare, so they pushed on past Kahuku plantation, over the difficult crossing at the mouth of the Waimea river and on to Waialua the
