Residence in the islands was evidently what the law was intended to require. Elsewhere, in similar provisions, the act uses the term Republic of Hawaii, or Hawaiian islands. 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

If this inflammation is not checked, it can do three things. It can attack the tonslis, whereupon it is called "Tonsiliitis." It can attack the bronchial tubes, whereupon it is called "Bronchitis" if inside the tubes and "Asthma" or "Catarrhal Asthma" if outside the tubes. Or it can work down into the lungs and give you a consumption "scare" (which may turn out to be real consumption). to be real consumption)
