TWO CONTRASTING PROCLAMATIONS.

The edict of the Japanese Emperor, announcing his resolve to declare war against China, was published on the 1st of August; and the response of the Chinese ruler followed a few days later. By this time the two proclamations have been closely studied by the nations of Europe and America, and the judgment of the civilized world as to their respective merits has been pronounced. Some weeks will pass before the record of foreign opinions will reach this country, and in the interval it may be interesting to institute a few comparisons, with a view to forecasting the probable estimate of Western observers of events.

The Japanese decree presents a brief explanation of the circumstances under which hostilities became inevitable, with emphatic assurances that in spite of a sincere desire to maintain peaceful relations, the provocations persistently offered by the continental power compelled the island empire to take up arms. The argument might have been much more extended, and put in more forcible terms, without exhausting the subject or conveying a full idea of the injuries which Japan has suffered; but it may be doubted whether any representation of the sort was really essential. Foreign nations will scarcely need the direct avowal of moderate and prudent intentions, to convince them that Japan would not lightly abandon her steady course of material progress, or invite the desperate hazards of war except under a necessity equivalent to compulsion; while the people of this country are so thoroughly familiar with the causes of the quarrel, and so confident of the justice of their position, that the recital of grievances seems superfluous, so far as they are concerned. For the rest, the imperial rescript merely commends the heads of the army and navy to perform their duties diligently, and expresses the hope that "by the loyalty and valor of our faithful subjects peace may soon be restored and the glory of the empire augmented." The document is calm and firm in tone, and is entirely free from exaggerated pretensions. The governments of Europe and America can find in it nothing that conflicts with the "Law of Nations," or fails to accord with the true principles of civilization.

Turning to the Chinese proclamation, we find the characteristics of that country exemplified in a degree which would be diverting if the subject treated were not of so grave a nature. The arrogance and conceit of the governing body at Peking are conspicuous in every phrase. That the truths of history are entitled to a reasonable measure of respect appears never to have occurred to the authors of this remarkable production. All the events leading up to the final rupture are distorted in China's favor when it is possible to so pervert them, and when their bearing is such that no amount of false coloring could make them serviceable, they are suppressed altogether. But the blemishes which will go farthest to deprive the decree of credit are the insolence with which it rails and scoffs at the adversary, and its bombastic assumption of invincible superiority. The mere designation which it applies to the Japanese is sufficient to cover it with disgrace. They are repeatedly called "Wu-jeu," a term which appears to be misunderstood by many Japanese newspapers, since they render it "people of Yamato." But the character "Wu" used in the rescript, is said by scholars whose reputation entitles them to respect, to be not the same as that which may be translated "Yamato." Its original meaning was "dwarf-land," or "country of pygmies." The Chinese have, however, so long employed it as an epithet of contempt and opprobrium for Japan, that it has become, in their mouths, a word of still more flagrant offense. In English, their "Wu-jeu" may be taken to signify "midgets" or "vermin"; and in Japanese its sense would be hardly less odious than that of "ujj" although the Chinese imply by it considerably more than "ujj" alone would indicate. In any case, it is a vile and obnoxious name and although it may aptly represent the taste and fancy of the Chinese rabble, to insert it, over and over again, in an imperial edict, is a greater departure from decency than the magnates of the "Middle Kingdom" were supposed to be capable of. The English have a proverb which tells us that "curse, like chickens, will come home to roost." To the same purpose it may be said that phrases like the following will "come home to roost," and will surely inflict themselves upon those uttered them.

"It was found difficult to reason with the vermin."

"The vermin have broken all the laws of nations and treaties."

"We command Li Hung Chang to root the vermin out of their lairs."

Thus we are constantly reminded that the Japanese are vermin, while the Chinese, as it appears from this astonishing state paper, are but little lower than the angels. "We make it known," declares the august expert in polite and modest forms of speech, "that we have always followed the paths of philanthropy and perfect justice." China, the world must believe, has done nothing that is not admirably consistent with broad humanity and a paternal regard for the little kingdom on the

TRIP TO THE WRECK

Nothing Further of Value Has Been Recovered by the Wreckers. The steamer J. A. Cummins made another trip to the wreck of the bark Geo. N. Wilcox on Saturday evening, arriving at daybreak on Sunday.

The steamer came to an anchor near the schooner Haleakala and learned from Captain Kaai of the schooner that only two boxes containing pepper and spools of thread had been picked up since the steamer was there last.

The men on the Haleakala were not able to go near the wreck, but watched her from the deck of the schooner. Captain Kaai and his men stated that until a "southerly buster" sets in nothing can be done, except to lie on deck and watch the wreck. J. Bowler, Fred. Harrison and a petty officer from H. B. M. S. Hyacinth were passengers on the steamer.

The steamer made two trips to the exact location of the wreck during this last visit. On the first one a boat party, including Messrs. Harrison and Calway of the syndicate, was run over the wreck, which is now entirely submerged, and made fast to the uplifted main top-gallant yard. It was a very daring venture.

Later on, when both wind and sea were stronger and more forceful. Mr. Calway and the boat's crew again ventured alongside and made soundings. The last trip was watched very anxiously from the deck of the steamer, the white-capped breakers threatening imminent danger to those in the boat.

Happily the venture was accomplished in safety and the information obtained proved that the main body of the vessel is now under two fathoms of water.

Between \$1300 and \$1400 was realized on Saturday at the sale of goods brought from the wreck by a previous trip of the J. A. Cummins. The liquor, of which there are twenty-seven cases, was not sold.

OFFICIAL CHANGES.

From Captain to Sheriff and Other Promotions. S. F. Chillingworth, Sheriff of Maui, has resigned that position. He arrived in town by the steamer Claudine yesterday.

The position of sheriff will be assumed by L. A. Andrews, who has held the office of senior captain of the Honolulu police force. Captain Robert Parker of the first watch succeeds Captain Andrews as senior captain, and Captain Rosehill, clerk of the Station, will be captain of the first watch.

August Hammer, customs officer, has resigned that position to take Captain Rosehill's place as clerk. At 8:30 o'clock this morning the newly appointed captains and the men of the three watches assembled at the Police Station, where they were addressed by Marshal Hitchcock and Sheriff Andrews.

PASSING BASE PAPER.

A Native Fakir Turns Up in a New Role. Puhala, the bunco man, is again in trouble. During the past week Puhala has been going among Japanese endeavoring to pass Confederate bills. He had in his possession one twenty-dollar bill and two ten-dollar bills of Confederate money.

Those who are acquainted with the bills know they are not worth the paper they are printed on. However, Puhala managed to pass one ten-dollar bill on a Japanese doctor on Maunaloa street. The Jap finding that he had been cheated, reported to the police and on Saturday Puhala was caught. While being arrested he took out the two remaining bills and tore them up.

The fragments, however, were picked up and pasted together by Captain Rosehill. Puhala is now charged with gross cheat.

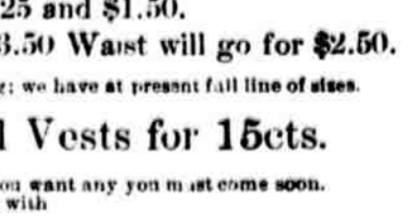

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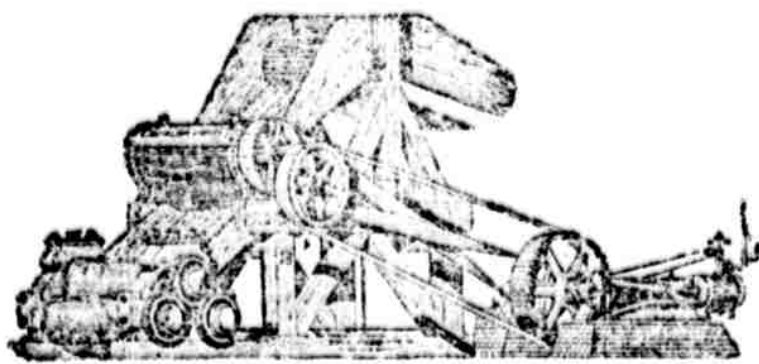

peninsula, which Japan is "running rampant with her false and treacherous actions, and laying herself open to condemnation by the various powers at large." It really does seem as if the judgment of mankind might be left to declare itself, upon these the whole question at issue from two declarations of war. Certainly nothing could better illustrate the different spirit with which each party enters upon the contest. Perhaps the most striking contrast is found in the words addressed to the commanders of the forces. The Japanese Emperor orders them "in obedience to our wish and with a view to the attainment of the national aim, to exert their abilities by sea and land, with all the means at their disposal, consistently with the law of nations;" and expresses the earnest wish that by the loyalty and valor of our faithful subjects, peace may soon be permanently be restored." The Chinese Emperor calls upon his officers to "root the vermin out of their lairs;" to "fire on the vermin ships, if they come into our ports, and utterly destroy them;" and to "refrain from the least laxity in obeying our commands in order to avoid severe punishment at our hands." This final behest tells a story the moral of which will be plain to every reader. It reveals the secret of much of the incompetency and unmanliness which distinguish the Chinese armies in the field. Not a sign of confidence in the leaders of the troops. Only a threat of punishment in case "the least laxity" is shown. What wonder that with such a prospect before them, both soldiers and sailors fall at the critical hour! If they run away, they have at least a chance for their lives, but if they fight and are beaten, they must fall before the wrath of their imperial lord. If they succeed at any point in checking the advance of the enemy, they are confronted by the danger of death from the wounds they may receive; for it appears to be an attested fact that no surgeons accompany the celestial warriors when they go forth to battle. The surgical department of an army is a folly and weakness which may be suitable to the vermin insects of the Wujin, but the fine robust old civilization of China mocks at such puerilities. A few officers of rank and wealth are attended by their private medical advisers, but for the masses, if once struck down, there is no hope—not even that of carrying with them to the grave the belief that their efforts are appreciated or their fate commiserated by the master for whom they die. The whole system is paralyzing to every impulse of ambition or courage. Li Hung Chang, the foremost subject of the Empire, has already undergone a form of humiliation, because the Chinese ships ran away in the bay of A-san and the forces on the shore fled and dispersed. These are the disciplinary methods of the middle ages. They will scarcely be effective in opposing the fully developed nineteenth-century methods which Japan possesses and practices.
