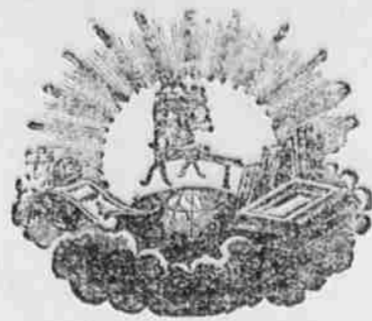

Representative Paehoe wants the decisions of the Supreme Court translated into Hawaiian and published, and has introduced a bill requiring this to be done. Considering that so many people, lawyers and laymen, interested in the decisions know no language but the Hawaiian, publication in that language, as well as in English, is a proper thing to do.

WATER AND LIGHT.

Both extension and improvement are needed by the Honolulu Water Works. During periods of drought the supply runs dangerously low. Rain spells bring muddy water into houses. Housekeepers would prefer to see the earthy material appropriated for the use of public grounds and parks. They pay for pure water and are cheated so long as the Government does not supply that commodity and a sufficiency thereof.

The present Appropriation Bill asks for a large amount for the water supply of Honolulu. For new pipes, laying them, increasing the lower reservoir, and general repairs, the total is over \$275,000. Besides this about \$40,000 is wanted for a filtering system in connection with the Nuuanu Valley supply, and \$8000 for purchase of land and water rights for extension. These proposed appropriations make a grand total of \$323,417, which looks very large for a single public service out of an entire expenditure of only four millions.

The Water Works, however, are among the reproductive public works that eventually will pay for themselves. Therefore, although the appropriation desired looks heavy when there are many other projects of national development, new and old, thundering at the treasury doors for assistance, the country will not be made any poorer in revenue, but the reverse, in the long run by this expenditure, the interest on which at six percent will be less than \$19,000.

There is a revenue of \$43,000 a year on the present basis, and a promise of \$46,150 almost certain to be realized on the proposed extension. The revenue for the two years ending 1888 showed an increase of \$29,979.20 over that for the two years ending 1886. The net receipts on the present basis would amount to \$27,475, and on the extension to \$30,975 a year.

It is also proposed to increase the electric light service, partly on the strength of the increased water supply. The Government must light the streets, and it has contrary to our advice gone into private lighting. Anything that will improve the service and prevent the account coming out on the wrong side should be supported. The amount wanted for electric light works improvement is \$275,217, against the interest and sinking fund accounts of which is an estimated revenue of \$28,800. This will probably from various little causes fall somewhat short of realization, but there is a respectable margin against all ordinary eventualities.

Judge Foster in the United States District Court, at Topeka, Kan., has just rendered an important decision on the original package question. Frank McGuire of Lyons, Kan., received a wooden box containing fifty bottles of whiskey, each bottle being in a pasteboard box, and sold a number of these bottles. Judge Foster now holds that in opening the wooden box he broke the original package.

THE CONSTITUTION.

A Large Delegation Wait Upon His Majesty and want a Constitutional Convention.

The committee appointed at a mass-meeting held on Palace Square some weeks ago, with delegates from country districts, met this morning at the hall of Engine Co. No. 4, corner of Beretania and Nuuanu streets, for the purpose of proceeding to the Palace to present the resolution adopted at the mass-meeting, together with a petition, to His Majesty for the appointment of a convention to revise the constitution. A procession was formed, and led by the Royal Hawaiian Band, marched down to and along King street to the makai gate of the Royal Palace. Crowds of spectators assembled about the Palace Square and on the sidewalks on the line of procession.

Fifty-eight men walked, two abreast, with Kila in front bearing aloft the Hawaiian flag. Mr. George Markham acted marshal and carried the petition. An engrossed copy of the resolution adopted at the mass-meeting was borne by Mr. Paaleka-lulu. The processionists, all native Hawaiians, wearing tall hats, full dress suits and white gloves, presented a highly respectable appearance. No demonstrations were made by the spectators. The procession filed into the Palace grounds whither it was accompanied by a quiet and orderly company of men, women and children to the number of probably about five hundred.

The delegation was received at the Palace door by Mr. James W. Robertson, Vice-Chamberlain, and admitted to audience of His Majesty with whom there were present Col. G. W. Macfarlane, H.M.'s Chamberlain, the Hon. J. A. Cummins, Minister of Foreign Affairs, and Hon. Godfrey Brown, Minister of Finance.

The petition was presented by Judge S. K. Mahoe, chairman of the delegation.

Following is the petition: To YOUR MOST GRACIOUS MAJESTY, DAVID LAAMEA KALAKAUA.

By the Grace of God of the Hawaiian Islands, King:

We the Committee of Your Majesty's subjects, request to present the sentiment of the Nation, and for the benefit of the Crown, the country and the people, and

Whereas, we have been appointed a Conventional Committee of Your Majesty's subjects, present from the Islands of Hawaii, Maui, Oahu, Kauai, Molokai, and Lanai, and

Whereas, in a meeting of the Conventional Committee of the Kingdom assembled in the City of Honolulu, Island of Oahu, on the 9th day of August, A. D. 1890, it was voted, in accordance with the strong feelings of the subjects in the different districts whom we now represent, to present to Your Majesty's the petition of Your subjects, and

Whereas, Your Majesty was forced to abolish the Constitution of Kamehameha V, without the allowing You proper time to consider and consult with Your subjects in regard to the Constitution which was forced upon You, and is at present in force, and as such was a very disgraceful act to the Crown of Hawaii nei, and placing You in a very peculiar predicament, and that You could not prevent at that time; therefore You approved and signed the said Constitution under threats; and

Whereas, the rights and privileges of the Ballot box given to Your subjects by the Constitution of Kamehameha V, on the 20th day of August, A. D. 1864, and amended by King Lunalilo in the year 1873, and amended again in the year 1874 in the reign of Your Majesty, said rights of Your subjects have been taken from them. And Your subjects were forced to be sworn under the present Constitution, in order that they might have their rights at the ballot box; and if they did not consent to be sworn, they would have been deprived entirely of their right to vote; and

Whereas, on account of the many objections now springing up in the Kingdom of Hawaii and among Your people with regard to the present Constitution, obstructing all manner of work and promotion of peace in the land, as well as perfect personal safety, hitherto enjoyed by Your independent Government of Hawaii nei; and

Whereas, Your Majesty's subjects cannot bear with patience its troubles under the present Constitution, and in order to wipe out these difficulties and to set at ease the minds of Your subjects; therefore,

Be it Resolved, that the Petition of Your subjects be a good cause for our King to request the Legislature to enact a Law authorizing You to call a Convention for the purpose of drafting a suitable and equitable Constitution for Your Kingdom immediately after the prorogation of the Assembly of 1890.

And Your petitioners will ever pray.

Following is His Majesty's Reply: Judge S. K. Mahoe, Chairman of Delegates from the People.

Sir:—In reply to the petition presented to me by the delegates from the several electoral districts of the Kingdom, I announce through you and the other delegates, to my people, that their requests shall receive my consideration. I commend the propriety with which you have presented the wishes of the people, using your constitutional right to present their petition for the redress of grievances. I shall submit the matter to the Legislature and request that body to take the steps required to carry out the desires of my people, in whose behalf this petition has been laid before me.

The gentlemen of the delegation on coming out of the Palace, seemed to be pleased with the result of their mission, several of them remarking to enquiries from the spectators, "all right," "all right." The procession re-formed and marched to headquarters at Arion Hall, when several short impromptu speeches were made from the verandah, the speakers being cheered by the crowd. Mass meeting is to be held this evening on Palace Square to hear the report of the delegates. These cheers were given for the King, for the delegation, and for the proposed New Constitution, after which the crowd dispersed in good order.

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THE LEGISLATURE.

FIFTY-FOURTH DAY. Thursday, Aug. 14. The House opened at 10 o'clock. REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

PETITIONS. Rep. Rickard presented a petition from Hamakua with 41 signatures, that no liquor licenses be granted after the present ones expire.

Rep. A. Horner presented a petition from Laupahoehoe for \$1000 for a landing. Public lands committee. Noble Phillips presented a petition from 137 residents of Honolulu, for a law to prevent the spread of lanтана. Public lands committee.

COMMITTEES APPOINTED. The President appointed the following select committees: On ocean line subsidies—Kahua, Bush, Rickard, Isenberg, and Baldwin.

RESOLUTIONS. The President read a communication from W. O. Smith, a member, in the absence of H. S. Townsend, the chairman, of a committee of the Legislature of 1888, enclosing a bill prepared by Mr. Whiting, to provide for taking the census.

Rep. Paeahoala read a first time by title his bill requiring decisions of the Supreme Court to be translated into Hawaiian and published. Rep. Kalua read a first time by title his bill to establish and regulate the Waikuku Water Works.

Rep. Bush read a first time his bill to amend the Crown land laws. The same member gave notice of a bill to re-establish the office of Governor.

Rep. Baker read a first time by title his bill to allow sugar plantations to introduce laborers from abroad. Rep. Kahoakano read a first time his bill to provide for additional terms of court for the Third Judicial Circuit.

ORDER OF THE DAY. Third reading of bill to amend Sec. 102, Civil Code, relating to fares of boats for hire in Honolulu harbor.

Rep. Lucas moved it pass. Carried. Third reading of bill to amend the leper segregation law. Deferred, on motion of Rep. Kahoakano, till next Tuesday.

Rep. Lucas moved the bill pass. Noble Widemann moved the bill be indefinitely postponed, because the reasons for it were insufficient, and it was not intended for the well-being of the town.

Noble Muller moved the bill be amended according to the report of the committee. Rep. Lucas said the bill was for the benefit of residents of Alakea street, and would enable them to beautify that street.

Ayes—Ministers Cummins, Brown, and Peterson; Nobles McCarthy, Hind, Burchardt, Marsden, Baldwin, Walbridge, Anderson, Von Tempsky, G. N. Wilcox, Kanoa and Isenberg; Repts. Lucas, Baker, Kahoakano, Kanae, Kahua, Halstead, Rice, and A. S. Wilcox.—22.

Noes—Nobles Widemann, Berger, Macfarlane, Muller, Pan, Phillips, Crabbe, Kauhane, J. M. Horner, and W. Y. Horner; Repts. Cummings, Marques, R. W. Wilcox, Bush, Kaubi, A. Horner, Waipulani, Apiki, Paehaole, White, Kamai and Knudsen.—22.

The vote was declared 23 to 21 in favor of the bill. Several members doubted the count and called for another vote. Noble Phillips said no member had a right to question the official count when declared.

RECESS from 11:55 to 1:30. MEETING NOTICE. THE regular quarterly meeting of the Union Feed Co. will be held at the Company's office, on Queen street, on FRIDAY, the 15th inst., at 12:30 o'clock P. M.

Rep. Lucas said there was one fireproof business building on that street—the Mutual Telephone Co.'s—and the stores in it could not be rented. There was a fire station with good apparatus and men close by the street, so that there was not much danger of fire.

Noble Isenberg remarked on the absence of a provision in the bill to require fireproof buildings on the Government property. He had confidence in the present Minister but they might have another gentleman there one day.

Noble Phillips reminded Rep. Lucas that this was not committee of the whole, and he had no right to be getting up so often. Rep. Lucas claimed privileges as introduced by the bill, and said if Noble Phillips would keep his seat the House would make more progress.

The motion of Noble Muller carried, and the President said the bill could not pass until the amendments of committee were inserted. Third reading of bill to add Kahoaloawe to the Waikuku District.

Noble Macfarlane spoke of an onslaught on Lahaina this session. If they did not remove the town of Lahaina he would be surprised. It was time to call a halt and protect the rights of Lahaina.

Noble Von Tempsky argued in behalf of the bill that the change was desired by the owner of the island. Noble Crabbe was at Lahaina in 1852 and used to go to and from Kahoaloawe in a day.

Therefore he moved Kahoaloawe be left where it was. Noble J. M. Horner did not like this snap way of doing things, this attempt to cut up districts by filibustering legislation.

The people had not asked for the change. If they allowed this manner of changing boundaries, how did they know how many of their districts would be divided this session. It was the principle of the thing he regarded.

Both party platforms called for government by the people, but the legislation of this session was taking power from the people. Lahaina was once the holy of holies, the sanctum sanctorum of Hawaii.

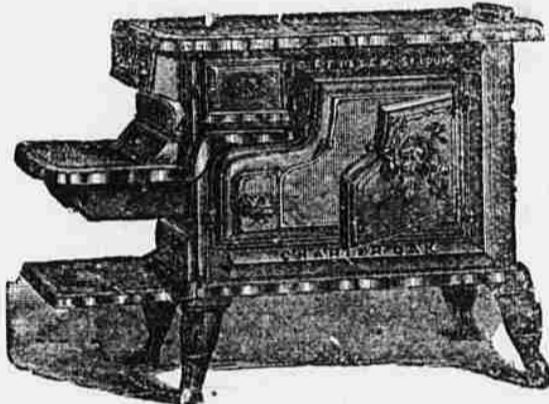

THE LEGISLATURE.

FIFTY-THIRD DAY.

WEDNESDAY, Aug. 13.
AFTERNOON SESSION.

The House resumed at 1:30. Noble Widemann, resuming the debate on reconsideration of the vessels' liability bill, said his objection to the present law was that we put a premium on smuggling and then punished the owners of vessels for the offense. He would save the Minister of Finance from the discretion mentioned. The Minister had exercised the discretion in different instances but got no credit for it.

Minister Brown would like to reply to some new arguments introduced that day. It had been stated in public print that an opium ring dominated the country and that the Ministry was implicated in it. Yet notwithstanding a committee had been searching for evidence since the session opened nothing had been discovered. The hon. Noble had said that the opium prohibition demoralized the country. That was true and this bill was the evidence of how far the demoralization had gone. No good reasons had been given since yesterday to change the decision of the House and there was little use in further discussion.

Rep. Kaubi moved the previous question, and Rep. White that the ayes and noes be called on indefinite postponement, both motions being carried.

The ayes and noes were called with the following result:

Ayes—Ministers Cummins, Brown, and Peterson; Nobles Pua, J. M. and W. Y. Horner, Anderson, and Von Tempsky; Rees, Cummings, Kaubi, Nawahi, Baker, A. Horner, Kahookano, Waipulani, Paehaole, White, Kanalii, Kalua, Halstead, Kamai, Knudsen, and Rice.—23.

Noes—Nobles Widemann, Berger, Muller, McCarthy, Phillips, Hind, Burchard, Cornwall, Walbridge, G. N. Wilcox, and Isenberg; Rees, Rosa, Rickard, Apiki, and A. S. Wilcox.—15.

Noble Baldwin, on being called, asked to be excused, as he believed there was an injustice in the present law, but he did not wish to record his vote in any way to assist the introduction of opium in the land. With some alterations he would vote for this bill, but not in its present shape.

Noble Marsden, on being called a second time, asked to be excused for the same reason as that given by Noble Baldwin.

Rep. R. W. Wilcox also voted doubtful on the second call.

All three were excused.

The foregoing vote was announced and the bill declared indefinitely postponed.

Rep. R. W. Wilcox moved reconsideration of the vote indefinitely postponing the bill to transfer the Island of Kahoolawe to the District of Wailuku. Carried.

Rep. Kalua moved the bill pass. The public and private relations of the island were closer to Wailuku than to Lahaina.

Rep. Nawahi moved the bill be indefinitely postponed. The island now belongs to Lahaina and no good reason had been given for the change. There had been no trials arising on the island to be taken to either Wailuku or Lahaina. They ought not to make laws without any reason being given. The people of Kahoolawe had not asked for this bill. Coming from Kahoolawe to Wailuku was like going up hill, while to Lahaina there was a leading wind both ways.

Noble von Tempsky saw no reason for arguing over this paltry bill. He would not reply to Rep. Nawahi, who knew nothing about the matter. He moved the previous question which carried.

The bill passed to engrossment, to be read a third time to-morrow.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

The House went into committee of the whole, Noble Marsden in the chair, for consideration of the Appropriation Bill.

Bureau of Education, continued. Industrial and Reformatory School, \$12,000.

Noble Crabbe moved it be stricken out.

Rep. R. W. Wilcox said that for a long time there had only been four boys in the school. About election time the number had been brought up by a supreme effort to something nearer the complement. It would be better for the Government to pay for the boys at the Kamehameha School, where at least they would be taught to play ball well.

Noble Crabbe gave as the reason for his motion that when connected with the police force some years ago he observed that a great many robberies were traced to this school.

Noble Isenberg moved the item pass as in the bill. If the number of boys were few it might be a matter for congratulation. As to the robberies referred to, perhaps they were owing to the man then in charge. It was not likely that boys liable to commitment to this school would be admitted to Kamehameha School. There would be more boys in the school if the judges throughout the group would remember that there was such an institution.

Noble Widemann said the school was established twenty-five years, but it had been largely a failure. It was well conducted when Mr. Hill, owner of the BULLETIN, was in

charge of it, but afterward it fell into disgrace. He did not think, however, that it could be abolished now, as there was no other provision for boys committed by the courts. He agreed with the hon. Noble from Kauai that this class of boys could not get into Kamehameha School. He moved the item be referred to the committee on the public schools item.

The motion to refer to committee carried.
Stationery and incidentals, \$12,000. Passed.
Expenses of normal instruction, \$2000.

Rep. Kalua wanted information. Minister Brown said the object was to train students of the higher grades for teachers. Some good teachers have thus been turned out. It was the intention now to make a selection of candidates to be sent to a normal school at San Jose, Cal.

Rep. Kalua being satisfied with the explanation moved the item pass. Carried.

Minister Brown moved to insert an item inadvertently left out—Professor of chemistry, Oahu College, \$2400. This professor made analyses in post mortem examinations, also of the water supply, for the Government without charge.

Rep. R. W. Wilcox thought if money was appropriated for this purpose, it ought to be for a school attended by more Hawaiian boys. If it was desired to establish a school of chemistry, why not take the Reformatory School for the purpose? He would oppose the item.

Rep. Nawahi was opposed to putting this item in here. This talk of analyzing stomachs and water was only to influence the House. Such work should be done by the Government physicians.

Noble Isenberg considered the item necessary. Every civilized Government had to employ a chemist. For \$1200 a year this Government could have the services of a competent chemist. Plantations on Kauai wanting chemists could not get one less than \$3000 a year. Government physicians and physicians in general were not chemists, and residents of Honolulu and the Government were to be congratulated on having a chemist on whom they could call any day.

Rep. Wilcox suggested that the hon. Noble wanted this chemist to go over to Kauai and do his work.

Noble Isenberg—No, no.

Rep. Nawahi said the item had been passed session after session in accordance with a law passed in 1848.

Noble Widemann would be glad to vote for striking out the item, but there was a law providing for it, and the incumbent had a claim at law for his salary. If the appropriation was to be stopped hereafter, that law would need to be repealed.

The item passed.

Compiling, printing, and binding School History of the Hawaiian Islands, \$2000. Passed.

Minister Brown moved to insert an item for taking the census of 1890, \$12,000. This was larger than the expenditure of 1884, but there was a greater proportion of illiterate people now.

Carried.

Sec. 2.—The following sums amounting to \$71,391.65, are hereby also appropriated out of any moneys in the Treasury, other than the moneys which may be derived from the sources mentioned in Sec. 5 of this Act, for the service of the biennial fiscal period commencing with April 1, 1890, and ending with March 31, A. D. 1892.

Minister Brown moved to strike out the amount, as he intended moving new items.

Interior Department.
Postal money order reserve, \$7,000. Passed.

Purchase of road between Hilea and Honouapo, \$3500.

Minister Spencer said this was a necessary road, but it would cost \$12,000 to build the road, and he moved the item pass. Carried.

Purchase and rent of Ahiolani lot, \$2200.

Minister Spencer said it would cost \$3000 and he moved that amount. Carried.

Finance Department.
Subsidy to ocean lines, \$48,000.

Noble Muller moved the item be referred to the commerce committee.

Rep. Kalua moved in amendment, a select committee. He referred to the Hilo-San Diego project.

Rep. Paehaole saw no necessity for reference to a committee. There was a law providing for this subsidy, subject to conditions of freight charges and tonnage.

Noble J. M. Horner said the committee might get some information. He understood the company did not give the service required by the law. The United States was about giving a subsidy to steamers under her flag, and if this company shared in that it might let this little country off.

Rep. Bush thought it would be hasty to pass this item without information. There was a law but it had not been observed. The Chamber of Commerce had been seeking improved mail facilities. Then the San Diego line just started might be worth while encouraging. He was in favor of reference to a committee. Referred to select committee.

Rep. Kalua moved to insert, Subsidy to Steam Line, Honolulu to Tahiti, \$24,000.

Noble Phillips moved the item be deferred till after consideration of bill on the subject.

Rep. Kalua moved it be referred to the same select committee, but

accepted an amendment by Noble Widemann for a separate committee. Minister Brown said no company being specified in the main item, the committee might recommend its subdivision. He was, moreover, credibly informed that there was a likelihood of a line being started next spring between Vancouver, terminus of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and Queensland, touching at Honolulu. While he had nothing to say against the present line, another line might result in an improved service.

Noble Widemann had heard of this line for years. It was always coming about six months hence. Doubtless it would come in time, but at present the House could take no action on the prospect. The San Diego line and the Tahiti line ought to be examined by a committee.

Noble Baldwin favored the Tahiti line but thought it should go to a separate committee. He agreed with the previous speaker that nothing should be done to cripple or prejudice the excellent service now given us to the Coast, and for which the original item here was doubtless intended.

Noble Phillips urged on the hon. member for Wailuku to withdraw his motion for a committee until the bill be introduced. The bill asked for \$36,000 instead of \$24,000, and would have to go to a committee anyway.

Rep. Kalua could not withdraw his motion.

Noble Phillips then moved to amend the item to \$36,000.

Referred to a select committee.
Rep. Nawahi moved to insert, Steam line between Honolulu and San Diego, calling at Hilo going and returning, \$48,000, and that the item be referred to a select committee.

Rep. Marques moved it be referred to the same select committee as that to which the ocean lines item was referred. The Spreckels contract he understood expired to-day, and some new arrangement might be devised.

Noble Baldwin wanted to know what San Diego line was, did it exist in the imagination of the hon. member from Hilo? San Diego was a little town over there, with which we had no business.

Rep. Nawahi informed the hon. Noble that the pioneer steamer arrived a few days ago and now they could be bought cheaper at a store on King street than before. San Diego might be a little town but it had a railway now direct from the East, and had the largest hotel in the world. It was more preferred for health by tourists than San Francisco. Passengers thence could come direct to Hilo to visit the Volcano, afterward coming to Honolulu. Smaller boats would be put between the islands, to collect produce at Kona and elsewhere. Probably we should have more frequent mails by the new line coming between the trips of the San Francisco steamers.

Referred to special committee.
Rep. Kahookano moved the committee rise. Carried.

Noble Marsden reported progress from the committee of the whole. Adopted.

The House adjourned at 3:55.

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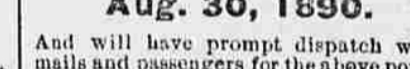
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
