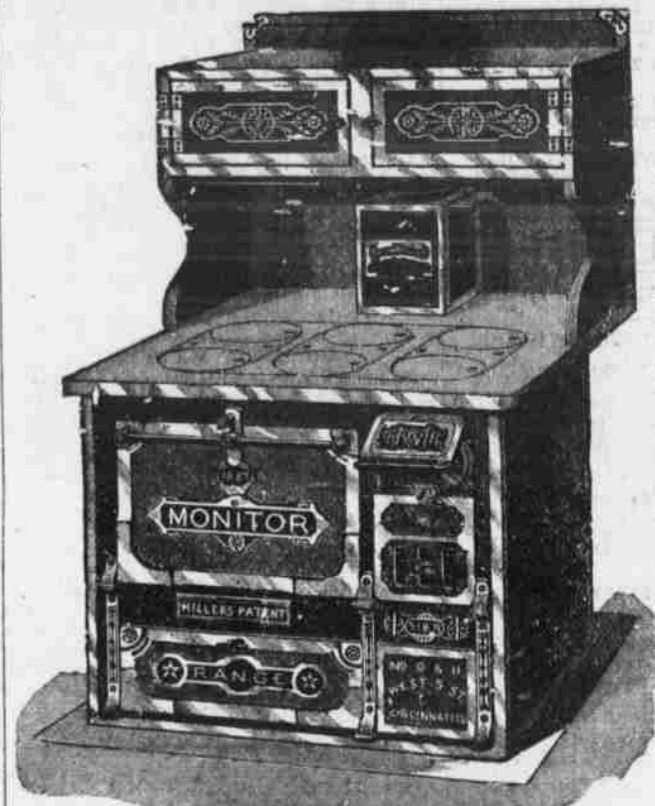

A letter from Maui, of a somewhat vituperative character makes complaint of some of the government officials upon that island, alleging gross misconduct against some of them. It might be well for the Minister of Interior to make enquiries into the conduct of the employees in his department who have positions on Maui.

The Hilo Railroad seems now to be assured. When one looks back into the years one remembers that this was the scheme which was so dear to the heart of the late S. G. Wilder. But in this he was a man in advance of the community. He saw, but they did not see, and the result was that the worry of the matter practically drove him to his grave. A community always needs progressive men to drive it on. It usually abuses them when living and mourns for them when dead. History is repeating itself even now on these islands.

"LUNG TUNG PEN."

"The taking of Lung Tung Pen" is one of Rudyard Kipling's funniest stories. It recounts how a small detachment of troops under a subaltern swam a river and took a dacoit village without so much clothing on "as would dust a fire."

But what might be very amusing in Burmah, is by no means as funny on the beach at Waikiki. As will be seen in another column, a regiment of soldiers was marched out to the beach, there the rank and file were ordered to strip and they then proceeded to parade the sand, entered the house lots, and even tried to gain access to houses, while stripped to the buff.

The question is, whose fault is it? One would certainly put the blame upon the officers. It is their business to keep their men in order. As a rule, among the many thousands that have passed through, there has not been much cause for complaint, and The Star has been ever ready to give credit to the American soldiery for its good conduct. But it is an outrageous thing that the officers of a regiment should allow their men to make an indecent spectacle of themselves, among houses occupied by ladies and children.

Would the citizens of San Francisco acquiesce tamely should a horde of naked men be turned loose upon the beach near the Cliff House? Certainly not. And the citizens of Honolulu have a just right to protest against the repetition of such scenes.

It is understood that the matter has been laid before Colonel Mills, and that as military commandant on the Islands he will see to it that nothing of the kind occurs again. The material that is used for soldiers is not always of the best. There are good men in every regiment and there are bad men. The wedding of the mass into a disciplined whole depends upon the officers, and an indecent exhibition such as that of yesterday reflects more upon them than upon their men.

COFFEE.

A very interesting report on the world's coffee trade in the eight principal markets of Europe and the six principal markets of North America has been compiled by Consul Hugh Pitcairn of Hamburg.

From these it is learned that the supply of coffee has steadily increased from the year 1896 to 1899, the closing of the year being September 1st. In 1896 the supply was 104,944 tons; in 1897, 172,852 tons; in 1898, 259,329 tons; and in 1899, 297,126 tons.

In the matter of the world's consumption the year 1898 shows up the strongest with 421,980 tons, while the present year, closing September 1st shows only 406,830 tons. The fluctuation however is largely caused by the drop in coffee consumption in Germany. In 1898, Germany consumed 100,470 tons, in 1899 she only consumed 94,400 tons. But in 1896, the whole world only consumed 317,560 tons of coffee, so that the consumption has increased enormously, since that date. The consumption of Great Britain is the smallest of any of the great countries of Europe and has remained practically stationary during the period under review, in 1899 it has been 7,850 tons, in 1898, 7,600 tons in 1896, 7,350.

The great increase in the consumption of coffee is to be seen in North America. In 1895, the consumption in North America was 153,823 tons, in the present year, closing September 1st, it was 215,000.

In 1895, the consumption of coffee in Europe exceeded the consumption of coffee in America by nearly 15,000. The consumption in America has steadily increased, until in the present year the consumption in America exceeds that of the whole of Europe by nearly 20,000 tons. Comparing the relative increase in consumption from 1895 to 1899, the European increase has been 25,584 tons,

while the American increase has been 59,179 tons.

The immense increase in the use of coffee in the United States is due to two causes, the low price of Brazilian coffee, due to overproduction, and the increased prosperity of the farming class in the middle west, whose principal stimulant coffee is. But coffee becomes a habit just as liquor becomes a habit, and those who have taken to drinking coffee during the period of prosperity will not feel disposed to knock it off, if even a period of depression should arise. The increase in the consumption of coffee on the North American continent may therefore be looked for to continue.

A prime article of coffee, like that raised here, should find a ready market on the mainland. Our trouble has been that we have not yet had enough coffee to export. When we have, our coffee will have a great name. Though coffee has had a black eye of late there are those who fully believe in it, and their faith will probably be rewarded. There is a growing market for coffee.

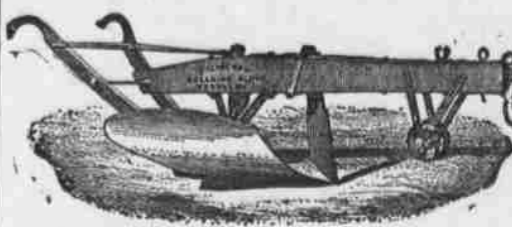

HOUSE THAT CAUSED TALK

IS MOVING DOWN KING STREET TO PALAMA.

It Temporarily Supersedes the Trams as a Popular Object of Objection—Itinerary of Its Travels.

Someone and something has been found that beats the tramway and tram cars as a street obstruction and has temporarily overshadowed the latter as a popular subject for "Hammer and Anvil" club discussions. It is a house that is on its way down King street and learned discussions touching both the legal and ethical right of the house, which was once a home, to wander about the streets, have been in progress all morning.

John Ouderirk, the contractor, has an immense job on his hands today in moving a cottage from the Turner premises at the corner of Fort and Beretania street to Liliha street in Palama. The house is a big one, quite tall and is hampered by a wide veranda, which sweeps a large area of the streets.

The building started yesterday out Beretania street to Alakea and "camped" last night opposite the Christian church, completely blocking the street. No special obstruction was met with. This morning the turn was made into King and the procession came up with the great tree opposite the old Gulick residence. Several big limbs came down so as to strike the house below the roof. There was a delay of two hours. Workmen finally cut off the limbs of the tree and the familiar old monument now looks like a fence post with spurs on one side of it.

Between the tree and Fort street a net work of telephone and electric wires had to be removed and a big limb had to go off the tree at McIntyre's corner. The whole trouble is that the house is too large to be moved, unless the streets were wider. If some of the fine trees cut were private property it would doubtless have proved cheaper to tear the building to pieces.

AH WO MEETS WITH WOE

BUT SWEARS IN GOOD CHINESE ENGLISH.

Ran Through a Volume of Hot Steam and Was Severely Scalded—Taken to the Queen's Hospital.

Ah Wo, a Chinese fireman employed on the steamer Lehua, was very badly burned Sunday afternoon while the vessel was at the wharf unloading. He was down below working on the machinery when a small "washer" blew out and a heavy volume of hot steam was let loose, striking his arm and severely scalding it. Instead of getting out of the way the Chinese went into the midst of the steam and before he had got through it to make his escape his neck and face, his back and one side were scalded. In some places the skin was all burned off, and a fatal result is feared.

The Chinese ran on deck, but fell down before he reached the wharf. He showed remarkable nerve as he was being removed to be taken to the hospital and was well enough to swear at the engine in good Chinaman's English. The accident is attributed to his own carelessness, and there appears to have been no one else to blame. Wo was taken to the Queen's hospital.
