Amendment to Section 26.

OF THE RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR ADMINISTERING TO OFFICIALS, SUBJECTS AND RESIDENTS, THE OATH TO SUPPORT THE CONSTITUTION AND LAWS; PROVIDING FOR THE REGISTRATION OF VOTERS, AND OF HOLDING ELECTIONS FOR NOBLES AND REPRESENTATIVES, PUBLISHED JULY 25, 1887.

Section 26 of the said above mentioned Rules and Regulations is hereby amended so as to read as follows: "26. The ballot for Representatives shall consist of a white paper ticket, and the ballot for Nobles of a blue paper ticket, upon which there shall appear no word, motto, device, sign or symbol, other than the name of the office and name or names of the candidate or candidates voted for. "Such ballot shall be written or printed, or partly written and partly printed, only in black.

Such writing or printing shall be upon one side of the ballot only. "Such ballots shall be rectangular, and shall be not more than four and one-half (4 1/2) inches, nor less than (4) inches, long; and not more than three and one-half (3 1/2) inches, or less than (3) inches, wide. They shall be of paper furnished by the Minister of the Interior, free of charge. "No ballot enclosed in an envelope shall be received or counted."

AN IMPORTANT QUESTION.

Are delegates to the Convention for nominating candidates for the Legislature, Representatives and Nobles, themselves eligible for nomination? This is a question which has come to us from various sources, in search of correct information. Will some of our readers who are familiar with such matters, please reply?

A STRONG ARGUMENT.

A collision between a brake quietly driven by its occupant and a horse ridden "faster than a walk" around a corner, reported in another column, is a strong argument for making a regulation or passing a law to obviate the danger, as advocated by this paper. It is really surprising that so few accidents of this nature occur, considering that riding and driving rapidly around corners, not knowing what is ahead, is the rule. Let it be stopped as quickly as possible, by making it a punishable offence.

THE MEN TO ELECT.

It is not so easy to select seven Representatives and nine Nobles, the number apportioned to the island of Oahu by the new Constitution, competent and willing to serve. Among those whose fitness is unquestionable are some decidedly unwilling, for reasons best known to themselves. The question of competence, we take it, is not altogether regulated by a man's ability and general knowledge. A particular knowledge of this country, its needs, and its people, is an essential. It is desirable, too, that candidates should be nominated and elected who are sufficiently broad in their sympathies to embrace the native and foreign races. It would be a mistake to put forward or support men whose sympathies run wholly on the one side or the other. Anything and everything like race prejudice should be stamped out if possible. The various nationalities domiciled in the kingdom, with the aboriginal natives, constitute one nation, with reciprocal interests. True patriots, from the both sides, will do their utmost to foster genuine friendly feeling. These are the men we hope to see returned to the Legislature.

RENTS OF BUSINESS PREMISES.

The owners of stores, offices, etc., in Honolulu are gradually coming to realize that they have been asking too high rents, and rents are gradually coming down as a consequence. When told by this paper a year or two ago that a reduction was imperative, that the then present and prospective condition of business would not warrant the rates demanded, some interested gentlemen spurned the idea, and characterized it as "croaking." By degrees they have been converted, and compelled by the force of circumstances to confess the truth of our position. It has been, and still is, argued by the owners of business premises, that lower rents than they have been in the habit of asking, would not pay them. Granting this to be so, it is not a question for the lessee. He has to consider what he can afford to pay, or whether the condition of business will enable him to give the rent asked, and live. Then the practical lessee will conclude that "a half loaf is better than no bread," that a small interest on his investment is better than nothing, and that it is more profitable to have his premises occupied by a tenant who pays a low rent than shut up altogether.

RAMIE.
MY DEAR CURIOUS—I am very glad to answer your questions. We decorticate enough freshly cut ramie stalks—in ten hours with 5 men—to produce 1000 lbs. of dry fibre. Prof. Felix Fremerey of Newark, N. J., U. S. A. In a lecture delivered at New Orleans, March 3d, 1885, on page 9 says "a two or three years plantation should produce 220,500 stalks to the acre, each stalk weighs when green about 3 1/2 ounces, and should produce 2,950 lbs. of marketable fibre which is about 6 per cent of dry fibre for green stalks and at this rate we would only have to handle 18,000 lbs. or 9 tons to get our 1000 lbs. of dry fibre. While we find that we must handle about 15 tons of the green stalks to get the 1000 lbs. of fibre, so that is say 3 tons for each man, this would give each man 28,000 stalks to place in the machine but as he handles from ten to fifteen each time the number is less than 3,000, and the weight in such small lots is trifling. A type setter handles from ten to 12 thousand type per day, our men do not need the activity of the type setter, as both hands are used and the motion of the hands is always the same and does not exceed 18 inches forward and back, the feet are stationary.

Where sugar cane is fluted 4 men have for day after day, handled 80 tons of cane, lifting it from the ground and placing it in the flume. At one sugar plantation that I know of 15 men pick up from the ground a single stalk of cane at a time cut with a knife in two or three pieces every stalk as it falls into the flume, enough cane to make 40 clarifiers of juice. If there still remains any doubt in your mind in regard to our ability to produce 1000 pounds of fibre per day Friend Cousins, will you kindly visit our plantation and "see for yourself?"

Even a very indifferent knowledge of the laws of business, and the causes prompting the investment of capital, and the taking of commercial risks and ventures do not confirm the truth of these statements, on the contrary their fallacy becomes more and more apparent at every step.

Shortly after the fire already mentioned, the local insurance agents formed themselves into a board, and advanced the rates of figures, which in many cases were prohibitive, and numbers who formerly carried policies have either reduced their amounts of insurance, or taken the risks themselves. OUR PARIS LETTER.
 June 29.—The knotty and naught-
 ily clauses of the army organization
 bill, have been voted by the deputies.
 After sixteen years' thrashing,
 winnowing, shuffling, and shunting
 every Frenchman capable of carry-
 ing arms, must now serve three
 years under the flag, no substitutes,
 no shirking allowed; and next, all
 candidates for the church and pro-
 fession of schoolmaster, must be-
 come "bold sinner boys." The
 Senate will most likely massacre the
 latter clause of the bill, so neither the
 church nor the school is in dan-
 ger. Many vigorous divines have
 wielded the material sword effectively.
 Cardinal Richelieu was the best
 war Minister France ever posses-
 sed. He was a Bismarck and Moltke,
 two single gentlemen rolled into one.

The gulf between the slow coach
 and the go-ahead republicans, is
 becoming wider and deeper every
 day. The Rouvier Cabinet has to
 depend for its existence on the sup-
 port of the monarchists, and that
 condition of things, exasperates the
 purists. There is certainly thunder,
 and lightning in the political atmos-
 phere, and many good judges think
 the storm will burst on the 14 July
 —national holiday. The military
 review on that occasion, will be
 seized by the growlers and froi-
 deurs, to burrah-up Boulanger, and
 to vent their spleen on President
 Grevy, who, rightly or wrongly, is
 accused of effecting the Morganatic
 marriage between the royalists and
 the republican opportunists. The
 advanced republicans are now push-
 ing to the front all reforms hitherto
 corked up to prevent disunity. No
 more gulling, is the watchword: no
 pocketing of your flag; let colors
 be nailed to the mast all round. In
 the foggy, flabby, enunch politic
 stage, that France is heaving and
 tossing through, the resolute men,
 with a plain unvarnished programme,
 will come uppermost. But how
 long they will keep there, is another
 matter.

What struck the French most in
 the British Jubilee, was the correct-
 ness of the immense crowd which
 framed the procession of the Queen,
 and the unity of patriotism, that
 made the million hearts beat as one.
 In Paris, such a spectacle would be
 wholly impossible. The twenty
 army corps would be required to
 watch such a gathering of the clans.
 Then there is no Louis or Jules, the
 Well-Beloved, to attract the million,
 and unite the animating sentiment
 of respect. The idol of France
 appears to have is General Boul-
 langer, like Nehilles, he has retired
 to his tent; *mais, il raviendra*, as
 the street poets carol his praises.

Nor were the French blind to the
 political significance of the unparal-
 leled Durbar of the Great White
 Mother; the pagentry of England's
 might, wealth, and friendship, is
 equivalent to obligatory military
 service, only the silver streak dis-
 penses with her having armed land-
 hosts on European lines. A keen
 mast head lookout is being kept in
 reference to the forthcoming jubilee
 naval review, because on the Con-
 tinent the belief is general, that Eng-
 land intends to raise her maritime
 strength up to the broom at the
 mast head standard. When a power
 is strong enough to sweep seas, the
 transport of soldiers by an enemy
 becomes next to an impossibility.

This question naturally leads up
 to the latest shuffle of the Egyptian
 cards. Impartial judges incline to
 the opinion, that the best result for
 England would be, the refusal of
 the Sultan, under Russo-Franco
 pressure, not to ratify the Conven-
 tion. England is not expected to
 clear out of Egypt to allow a rival
 European power to ride in. Italy
 and Austria especially, can never
 permit to be hemmed in by Russia
 at the Bosphorus, and France at
 Morocco, for there are the gages the
 latter two powers will seize, if Eng-
 land settles down in the Nile Valley
 till it pleases her to go. And Ger-
 many has important colonists in
 Syria, that she might deem it pru-
 dent to protect. A general all-
 round war is quite on the cards, to
 maintain the freedom of the Medi-
 terranean or to dominate it. Powers
 will group together as they have
 interests to defend, or ambitions to
 advance. But it does not at all
 follow, the ultimate settlement will
 be made near the coveted territory.
 In the diplomatic cords, the best
 hands are held by the Central Powers
 and England. Russia at Constanti-
 nople, would be more calamitous for
 France than England care-taker of
 Egypt. Respecting Morocco, France,
 Italy, Spain, and England, have
 Argus eyes fixed on the country.
 As yet no Khroumirs have been dis-
 covered. It is rumored that on the
 very first attempt by a European
 Power to play at protectorate in
 Morocco, England will send a divan-
 tage to hold a selected coin of van-
 tage. One Gibraltar ought to be
 sufficient for the Mediterranean.

The special Paris newspaper cor-
 respondents at Madagascar states,
 the situation of France in the island
 is improving. The Wesleyan mis-
 sionaries are, however, an obstacle.
 Colonel Willoughby has arrived,
 and the writers seem to enjoy a de-
 light at some studied sleights organ-
 ized against him. It is asserted,
 the English influence loses ground
 daily, which is not astonishing, see-

ing that there is no military force to
 back it. At the hotel, the servants
 only pay attention to the French,
 and overlook the English; in the
 streets the natives take off their hats
 to salute the French, a politeness
 they refuse to *peufide Albon*. As a
 slight shade to these colors, it seems
 his exequatur signed by the rep-
 resentative of France. In the Paris
 press quite a little war is raging be-
 tween the colonial expansionists and
 the Reformed Churchists; the latter
 are accused of being mouldy patri-
 ots for defending the Anglo-Ameri-
 can missionaries at Madagascar
 against the charge of being mere
 political agents.

Eighty-one years ago Napoleon
 founded the famous "councils de
 prud'hommes"—a council composed
 of wise and honest men. These are
 a kind of Justice of Peace courts,
 for regulating in a friendly manner,
 disputes between manufacturers and
 their employees. The court con-
 sists of an equal number of masters
 and men, each elected by their
 peers. The disputants appear be-
 fore them and plead their cause.
 If no agreement can be come to,
 they have to seek redress before the
 ordinary tribunal, but the party who
 declines the arbitration of the prud'-
 homes, enters the new list, hand-
 capped. There are 131 of these
 Councils in France, in the cities and
 towns elevated to the arts and
 trades; during the last year, 105 of
 these technical courts sat; heard
 42,478 disputes; ruled 33,136, and
 which means, free of expenses; of
 this total heard, 18,591 were ar-
 ranged amicably; the remainder
 were sent before the law; between
 here, over 9,000 were settled amic-
 ably.


