IGNORANCE OF WHAT?

EDITOR BULLETIN:—
I have always been taught and led to believe that Adam sinned. But if we are to believe Dr. Hammond, there was no sin committed until after the law was given at Sinai nor none committed since Sinai came. What does Paul say: "For where no law is, there is no transgression." (sin). Rom. 4:15. "But sin is not imputed (charged) where there is no law." Rom. 2:13. John says: "Whosoever committeth sin transgresseth also the law: for sin is the transgression of the law." John 3:4. Why do Paul and John mention these things? if the law was done away by Christ? Says himself: "I think not that I am come to destroy, the law or the prophets are not come to destroy, but to fulfill. Matt. 5:17. (fulfill is fully to preach; Col. 1:23 margin). Fulfill is "fully to declare the word of God."—Col. 1:25. (Diaglott).

Again Paul says: "Know ye not, brethren, how that the law hath dominion over a man as long as he liveth?" Rom. 7:1. Still if we do not break the law we are not under it. So it is in regard to the law of these Islands; we are not under the law until we break it. But the law has dominion over us as long as we live here. Again Paul says: "I had not known sin, but by the law: for I had not known lust, except the law had said, Thou shalt not covet. Rom. 7:7. Adam sinned, "for all have sinned and come short of the glory of God." Adam repented and he did not have to wait for a new dispensation (as Dr. Hammond terms it) to learn that he must repent in order to be saved. Christ led the children of Israel out of the land of Egypt. See Ex. 17:16, 1 Cor. 10:4. It being a theocracy they had many ceremonial laws, such as circumcision, and tithes to be offered. Such laws were typical and were abolished when Sinai came.

But God's law is his righteousness. Ps. 119:172, 142. And His righteousness is not to be defiled. Is. 51:6. When we do away with the righteousness of God then man need not expect any righteousness, for God would not give man what He had not Himself. God says: The Sabbath was perpetual (never ending). It is a sign (seal) between me and the children of Israel for ever, (and because they were in bondage in Egypt) for this reason "for in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, and on the seventh day he rested, and was refreshed." Ex. 31:17, 17.

"Because that Abraham obeyed My voice, and kept My charge, My commandment, My statutes, and My laws. Gen. 26:5. This was three hundred and thirty-one years before it was spoken at Sinai. In reading many of the Doctor's questions one is led again to quote from Paul, who says: "Because they receive not the love of the truth, that they might be saved. And for this cause God shall send them strong delusion, that they should believe a lie." 2 Thess. 2:10, 11. Dr. Hammond has talked so much about the law beginning at Sinai, and ending at the coming of Shiloh that I verily believe he thinks it is true. "Ye blind guides, which strain at a gnat, and swallow a camel." Matt. 23:24. Dr. Hammond is mistaken in regard to my ever offering \$1000 for anything, but one could not expect anything better of one who perverts Scripture as he has in his last article. Dr. Hammond says, The Apostles partook of the Lord's Supper on the first day of the week, and quotes Acts 20:7. If he (Dr.) or anyone takes his Bible and easily find that the meeting was at the end of the Sabbath or what we falsely call Saturday evening, that there were lights burning, (a queer time to partake of the Lord's Supper). Paul preached all night and on Sunday morning walked 100 miles to Assus to take ship, where it had sailed during the night, and early morning.

A Christian may lead a holy life, but that does not go to show that he could make a day holy that God had not. He can keep holy the day that God made holy, but that is as far as he can go. "It was great to create a world, but greater to redeem it." So says Dr. Hammond. It might be in the case of those who pervert the Scriptures. My friend Dr. H. quotes several verses but fails to cite us to where he would work they may be found. I presume he thinks we will accept his word on it. I feel satisfied to obey that law that God proclaimed and live and smoke and of which he is seen to judge the world. James 2:12.

"Stand by the law once proclaimed from Sinai."
Some its precepts and therefore deny: What say'st thou, saint? now nearken and...
"Not one precept shall pass away."
"Ten are the precepts—consider them again."
Law to be kept till I go to followman: Four points of seal and the duty that we owe;
And stay, my relation to mortals show.
"Since by the law we are sinners proved to be."
Christ has said that we may all be free:
Free from the death which the broken law demands.

But not from obedience to its commands.
"Now if the law was unknown till Sinai,
All were righteous who before did die! And if its precepts by Christ were done away,
There lives not a sinner on earth to-day!"
"All yearly Sabbaths and offerings Lost their meaning when the saviour came;
But kill the law, and all would go to heaven!
No need of a Saviour, or sins forgiven!"

This truly enchanting location for suburban homes must be seen to be appreciated; a lovely grove of albatross trees covers the entire grounds, streets 80 feet in width are laid out, and 6-inch pipes are being laid to conduct water from a 10-inch artesian well which is pronounced by McCandless Bros. to flow the sweetest water of all the wells they have bored on this island.

The Railway Co. have constructed two reservoirs with a storage capacity of over two million gallons, and built a flume extending 3 1/2 miles into Waiawa Valley, which in years of ordinary rainfall will supply an abundance of pure water for a large population; to guard against such droughts as we have experienced during the present year, the Company have ordered a Blake Pump with a capacity of 450,000 gallons per day, which will be replaced by one or more of larger capacity when needed. 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LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.

Five fatalities for drunkenness were recorded today.

There was a private trial of the chemical fire engine in a yard off Union street yesterday. It worked well.

A PRAYER meeting for men will be held in the Y. M. C. A. hall this evening at 7:30. Subject: "Daniel in Power."

Her Majesty the Queen, attended by Mrs. U. B. Wilson and a groom, was out horseback riding at Waikiki this morning.

A WOMAN named Kahanalei has been fined \$5 and costs for chastising a little boy, with whom she had nothing to do lawfully.

Mr. Wm. Wood put in a hard day's work in the Police Court this morning, questioning and interpreting the evidence of a deaf old woman.

St. Louis vs. Aliolani will play in the Amateur League series at 3:30 to-morrow. The boys will put up a good game and should be patronized.

POLIA, widow of the late Elwin Hall, died suddenly at her residence, Alaala, this morning. A little orphan is left to mourn the loss of father and mother.

SEVERAL elderly natives seem to take the Police Courtroom for a lodging house, being seen at the noon hour oblivious to earthly scenes in the arms of Morphine.

A TELEPHONE message was received at the Police Station this morning from Kilihi asking for policemen. The disturbance at the place was over when the police arrived.

Dr. Hammond at Emma Hall tonight. Subject: "The Saviour's prayer for us—was it 'That they may all be one.' John 17:21. Bring your Bibles. Everybody invited.

SEVERAL hundred Chinese lined King street between the Chinese Theatre and Maunakea street this morning, awaiting the landing of Chinese from the Quarantine Station.

The wedding reception of Mr. Arthur Gunnis and Miss Stella Kenake next Wednesday evening will be confined almost exclusively to the relatives and family friends of the couple.

Mr. F. Wilburton, steward of the O. S. S. Co.'s dock, who had the contract for loading the bark Lanefield with her 1000 tons of wheat, completed the feat with native laborers inside of fifteen hours. Very quick time.

WHILE two girls were chasing a baseball in a game at the Punahou Preparatory School yesterday they collided. Alice Robertson sustained a cut on her head from which the blood flowed freely. The other girl was not hurt much.

KALUAWA, for larceny of taro valued at \$2, occupied this morning's session of the Police Court. The indictment was returned, owing to indefinite answers made by a deaf witness, to next Tuesday, V. V. Ashford for prosecution; S. K. Kane for defendant.

FURTHER trouble was reported from the Quarantine Station today and three armed police guards were dispatched to the scene. It appears that the disturbance was caused by the thirteen laborers who had agreed to ship, but now refused to sign the labor contracts, and wished to land without doing so.

The funeral of the late Peter Dalton took place this morning from the Roman Catholic Cathedral. The interment was in the Catholic Cemetery, and the hearse was followed by a large number of carriages. Father Valentine conducted the last rites. The pallbearers were Messrs. John McLean, H. McIntosh, F. Philp, T. Hollinger, Wm. Dean and Francis Muldoon.

A NATIVE named Maipu was brought into the Police Station this noon and charged with assault and battery on Mr. F. F. Porter and a Chinaman at Leihai. Maipu was under the influence of liquor and had made himself quite obnoxious, when Mr. Porter remonstrated and asked him to leave the vicinity. At this Maipu turned on him and assaulted him, his Chinese assistant coming to his assistance also being assaulted. Maipu was locked up.

A STREET car collision occurred at King and Fort streets at 4 o'clock this afternoon. The Thomas Square car was coming from Palama on King street, and the Beretania car was coming toward the city front, Fort street. The King street driver put on his brake on seeing the other car coming, but failed to stop in time. The Beretania street car was slightly damaged. It had one passenger, a white lady; the other had one, a Chinaman. A fight was the only damage to any person. The King street mule turned completely round to get out of the way. The collision caused both cars to jump the track.

MIDNIGHT FIRE.

Fire started in the restaurant and general store of Lee Chung, opposite the Hawaiian Tramways Co.'s Stables, Palama, at 11:15 last night. It took people in the neighborhood five minutes to make themselves understood over the wires and then the alarm was sounded. Engine Co. No. 1's new machine was soon hurrying at a gallop down King street, followed by Engine Co. No. 2's at a rattling pace. When the first engine reached the spot the restaurant building and a dwelling in the rear were nearly consumed, and the flames were making headway in the general store and pot shop of Wah Chung. There was some water in a ditch on the mauka side of the road, but not enough to cover the end of the suction hose. In consequence the stream was very feeble and at a quarter to twelve stopped entirely. No. 2 engine turned back to town from the stone bridge.

Principal Oleson of the Kamehameha School turned the artesian stream from that institution on to supply the engine as soon as possible. A very strong stream was the result, with which the firemen soon put out the flames. There was a large area covered with burning embers of the two houses burned down, outhouses, dovescotes, fences, etc., over which the stream was swept, reducing everything to blackness with magic-like quickness. The frame of the third building was left standing, a telling testimony to the efficiency of the department, when it is remembered that the fire was about a mile and a quarter from the engine house.

Foreman Robert More directed No. 1 company, and Foreman James Hunt of No. 2, with firemen from several companies, assisted the operations. The fire police rope was stretched across the road and the crowd of onlookers was effectually kept back out of the way. Second Assistant Engineer Boyd was in general command at the fire.

It is supposed that the fire was caused by Chinese gamblers in the restaurant overturning a lamp. The houses to leeward of the fire, along the road leading to the back of Walker's brewery, one of which is occupied by Captain Fehleber, were in great danger for the ten or fifteen minutes that there was no water. The white pot flag on the corner of the block was still waving when the last spark of fire was quenched.

Wah Chung had \$500 insurance in the North German Fire Insurance Co., with Messrs. H. Hackfeld & Co.

Supreme Court. Thursday, Oct. 2. Before Judd, C. J.

Awai vs. Kahaloa, an assumption appeal from the Police Court of Honolulu. The Court after hearing gave judgment for plaintiff for the sum of \$16 25. Kaulokou for plaintiff; Nawahi for defendant appellant.

In the case of Dr. L. F. Alvarez, assumption appeal from the District Court of Koolauloa, the Court gave judgment for plaintiff for \$20. Smith for plaintiff; defendant appellant in person.

W. J. Wright vs. J. F. Hackfeld and others, bill in equity to establish a claim and to come in pro rata with sundry creditors of Messrs. Wright & Mello, the Court heard testimony of witnesses, after which the case was argued and submitted. Ashford & Ashford for plaintiff; Hatch for defendant.

The Queen vs. John E. Bush. The Court hears arguments of counsel on the demurrer which was filed at the last July term. Crediton for the prosecution; Ashford & Ashford for defendant.

HONOLULU FIRE DEPARTMENT. The monthly meeting of the Board of Representatives of the Honolulu Fire Department was held at the Bell Tower yesterday evening. In the absence of the Chief Engineer, Mr. Geo. Norton, First Assistant Engineer, presided, supported by Col. J. H. Boyd, Second Assistant.

After preliminary business Col. Boyd moved that the Secretary and Fire Marshal present a complete financial report on the Department's appropriation to next meeting. This was seconded by Foreman Julius Ash of the Hook and Laidler Co., and supported by several members. It passed unanimously.

Mr. Henry Smith, Secretary, moved a resolution for the submission of a letter to the Minister of the Interior, asking His Excellency's opinion on the question raised at last meeting, as to whether the Chief Engineer without the Board's direction has the control of the expenditures of the Department. The resolution passed unanimously. No other business was done.
