IN SPECIAL SESSION.

The Legislature Touching the Financial Situation.

HOUSE—EIGHTH DAY.

(MORNING SESSION.)

The Senate returned House Bill 4 (salaries of Assessors) with certain amendments, and on motion the amendments were concurred in by 26 ayes and 1 no (Lewis).

Secretary Atkinson called attention to a bill from Thrum's bookstore, amounting to \$33 10, for expenses for stationary, etc, for the House preparatory to convening the Legislature in special session.

Clerk Savidge of the Senate transmitted two Senate Bills (12 and 13). The first is to repeal Act 79 of the P. G. relating to increasing the facilities of the Hawaiian Treasury, and the second is to amend Section 1 of Act 49 of 1903, to further provide for the payment of Current Accounts.

On the Order of the Day being taken up, third reading of Senate Bill 8 was taken up and passed, and so were Bills 7 and 6. Bills 8 and 7 were passed unanimously (23 ayes each) and Bill 6 by 25 to 3 [Kumale, Kupihea and Oili].

Senate Bill 9, relating to jurors fees and costs of Court, was taken up on second reading and tabled by a vote of 15 ayes to 14 noes.

Senate Bill 1 was reconsidered and referred for further consideration. Recess taken at 10:45 to 2 o'clock this afternoon.

AFTERNOON LEGISLATURE.

In the House yesterday afternoon a number of appropriation matters were considered and acted upon. The jury bill was again taken up and killed once more. In the Senate the salaries bill passed its third reading and went to the Governor.

BUGHOUSE ABOUT PARASITES

The newspaper fight between Jared Smith, head of the United States Experiment Station, and Professor (?) R. C. L. Perkins, of the Hawaiian Board of Agriculture, is highly amusing. Everybody knows that Smith is thoroughly up in his business, while nothing of the sort is known in these Islands of Perkins. Smith came here as the representative of a great and powerful government, and a government that is extremely particular in the selection of men for special work of every kind. That in itself is an endorsement sufficient to pass him up to the front rank of scientists in any part of the world. Perkins came out here for some society in "Lannun" to mount butterflies and search for bull-bats, or words to that effect. Nothing is positively known of his abilities. He has certainly done nothing here to evidence any, unless, indeed, it be the preemption of a pull with the official family, which at present, seems to count for more than brains.

As a matter of fact, Smith is right in the discussion and Perkins is wrong. Smith charges that Perkins is a crank on the subject of parasites. Every time a palm leaf fades and seeks to fall, or a cocoon ripens prematurely, Perkins sees visions of some terrible blight and forthwith writes

to Prof. Koebeler for a new parasite. It is probably true, as Perkins intimates, that the ladybird has been of value; but has any other pest destroyer proven so? Almost invariably the remedy has turned out to be worse than the disease. In dismissing the subject for the moment, we would like to ask Prof. Perkins one question. Is he aware that the parasite, recently introduced to prey upon lantana is attacking the fruit trees of Honolulu and the country? If not he should immediately discover the fact. Allan Herbert and other practical men of the city have been watching the matter for some time, and Perkins will find far more in a similar investigation than in writing letters to newspapers, attacking Jared Smith, a man who happens to know exactly what he is talking about.

Would Be Unjust Tax

We beg to differ in the matter of paying jurors' fees. Why should they, when empanelled to serve the state, be not paid for rendering such an ungrateful service? To summon anyone to do such duty is to impose a hardship upon the poor workingman, who does not live but just barely exists. The subsistence of the poor hard working man is only a poor existence, and not a living worth the mention.

Residents of this city are now very heavily taxed, but to further impose another tax for the use of sewers is to make existence much harder. Excessive sewerage charges should not be imposed and property holders should not tolerate its imposition, but an equalization of the burden of such taxation ought not to be opposed. The proposition of Senator McCandless to make one flat rate for all connections is an unfair and unjust imposition and Senator Achi rightly termed it as "a foolish proposition." Line must have fallen asleep by the wayside and woke up on the wrong side. Sure Kela, Mac.

Insulter Shuns Insults.

A report has been brought to us that Walter G. Smith has said to certain parties, that as he was on the eve of his departure, he don't like to be insulted by anyone, let alone by a kanaka. Is that so? Did he give that much thought to others when he heaped insult upon insult on them and theirs? Being a paid hireling, he came here with such a purpose in view, and he stopped at nothing to gain the ends and purposes of those that hired him. Probably, in his opinion, a kanaka has no business whatever to have a feeling, being too low, in his estimation, to need have such a quality. But we want him to understand that kanakas, although tan colored, have feelings just as much as he or any other haoles have, and whether he has any use for them or for any particular one of them. His only use for any of them is for a certain purpose, and when that is gained, it is then that they become cast-offs and of no further use, like an orange squeezed dry.

Let Us Look Pleasant.

Another thing that would promote tourist travel is a sort of habit on the part of the people of Honolulu of appearing satisfied with conditions as they are. For instance, the Islands possess advantages that are not met with by the sight-seeker anywhere. Strangers coming in experience a thrill of delight at sight of the novelty and beauty of everything. After a few days, however, some dyspeptic resident butts in with his or her tale of woe, and the air freezes. The result is that the traveller leaves with the impression that the country is very beautiful, everything is extremely nice but the people are all dissatisfied. That is not as it should be.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

"Cannot see the mote in the beam of the eyes of others" is good, but bad on Biblical quotation. That's one on us, Senator Dickey.

Our tip the other day with regard to "lobbyists" has had good effect. It seems that those whom we aimed at were soon found out early yesterday and taken to task. Good.

The expected reconsideration of the tabling of an administrative measure by the House yesterday did not materialize. It is still lying on the table and may lay there for good.

Why should the "Nature Man" be permitted to strut around the way he does? Let him wear a kimono. If he was a Jap, he'd surely be locked up for being nude and exposing himself to public gaze on the public highways.

Why dispense with the Dispensary service altogether, Governor? It is much better to look after the sick poor than to squander in undesirable quarters and expensive luxuries. Save the dispensary to the poor, is our appeal.

Representative Vida is still a member of the House and still an employe in the road bureau. And Representative Andrade is in the same boat, an employed attorney in delinquent tax suits. Are these instances right and in accordance with law? We think not.

Wanted:—A press censor as to what is obscene matter, unfit for publication, or not, Walter Gifford Smith, of the Advertiser, would be the best man for the place. But will he know what is obscene in the paper that he edits, or probably, he only can see it in other's? Teuf! Teuf!!

If the High Sheriff is on to his job, he ought to be able to spot a convicted felon now serving on the Territorial grand jury. And the Attorney General's Department should also know it too. Won't the actions by such a jury have no force and effect because a felon is on it? We think so.

Can a man who is a convicted thief and has served sentence for it be permissible to serve as a grand juror?

Such a one, we understand, is on the Territorial grand jury. There's also another, one convicted for having opium in possession. A nice pair to sit in judgment and indict others.

The Senate today amended the County Act commission joint resolution to conform more reasonably to our suggestion of yesterday. And now the Republicans can have it all their own way. Senators took our hint, anyway.

Of two names mentioned for Republican delegates at large to the Chicago convention, we think Delegate Kalaniana'ole should be the main choice. We believe that Governor Carter should stay at home and look after his charges here, for if the cat should go away, all the mice will scamper about and play. But we understand there is a movement to outvote the Delegate and not have him.

A bill was sent this forenoon to the Governor for his approval, providing for the salary of the Judge of the Land Registration Court. The pay is to be provided by the Legislature, but if that fails, then he is to be paid out of the "expenses" of said Court. Funny, isn't it. And the Governor, we learn, is racking his top-knot as to what is thereby meant, whether the expenses or the income of said Court. Great Solons, aren't they?

Republican Senators were very uneasy this forenoon on account of the passage of the garbage and sewerage bill by a vote of 9 to 3. The majority vote was composed of four Republicans, four Home Rulers and one Democrat-Republican, those in the minority being one Home Ruler and two Republicans. A reconsideration is being worked for but the bill has already been returned to the House, from where it emanated, without amendment and will go to the Governor.

We have it pretty-straight that the discharge of Mr. Thompson and Mr. A. Seale from the Bishop Museum was a caprice of Prof. Brigham, the cranky curator of that institution. The two gentlemen whose services have been lost to the Museum on account of a mere old-maidish whim, are experts in their respective lines, and the whole country suffer by the loss of their work in their important provinces. It is high time that the directors of the Bishop Estate woke up to the fact that the curator of the Museum is an undesirable quantity, and the sooner he is allowed to go the better the public will like it.

Governor Carter will give a banquet to members of the Legislature on Saturday evening at the Young hotel.

It is reported that Walter G. Smith has also lodged a complaint against F. J. Testa with the Territorial grand jury for criminal libel.

L. E. Pichham, the new president of the Board of Health, took charge his office yesterday. A great deal of routine business was finished up during the meeting in the afternoon, most of it being matters regarding the Molokai settlement.

IN SPECIAL SESSION.

The Legislature Touching the Financial Situation.

SENATE—NINTH DAY.

After the disposal of the usual routine, Diskey, from Judiciary, presented a majority report on House Bill 3, relating to garbage and sewerage, offering a schedule of charges as an amendment, J. T. Brown not concurring. Report tabled.

Achi, from Judiciary, reported on House Joint Resolution 1, relating to the appointment of a County Act Commission, submitting an amendment making it that "the Senate to nominate two and the House of Representatives to nominate two," the rest of the amendment being the same as reported on yesterday. Adopted unanimously [12 ayes].

Then House Bill 3 was taken up on third reading and passed, 9 ayes and 3 noes [Kalauokalani, McCandless and Paris].

A short recess of 10 minutes was then taken at 10:30 o'clock. On reconvening, Clerk Wise of the House transmitted House Bill 6 [Unpaid Bills] and read.

Another short recess was taken and House Bill 6 passed first reading on reconvening. And on motion, under suspension of the rules, it was referred to Finance.

Achi, from Judiciary, still under suspension of the rules, reported on House Bill 5, relating to malicious injury cases, recommending passage. Tabled for consideration with the bill.

Recess at 11:20 to 2 p. m.

HOUSE—NINTH DAY.

Disposing of the usual routine,

Clerk Savidge of the Senate transmitted Senate Bill 17. This Bill is amendatory of Section 6 of Act 42 of 1903, relating to the bond issue.

House Bill 1 [Salaries] was returned by the Senate with certain amendments. It was concurred in by a vote of 23 ayes and 6 noes.

Senate Bill 17 was taken up on first reading. Fernandez moved to table and Harris to pass it, and the latter motion prevailed. On motion of Keliinoi, under suspension of the rules, it was referred to Finance.

On taken up with the Order of the Day, bills on second reading were taken up, viz: Senate Bill 12, referred to Judiciary, and Senate Bill 13 [warrants] passed unanimously.

Recess taken at 10:40, subject to call of the Chair.

On reconvening shortly before noon, Harris, from Finance, reported on the unpaid bills of the regular and extra sessions of 1903, recommending their payment out of the expenses provided for this special session. They are as follows: Enoch Johnson \$240.80, John Wise \$240.80, Charles Wilcox \$57.60, W. J. Coelko \$458.60, D. H. Kahaulelio \$105.84, Solomon Mabeula \$585.02, Paradise of the Pacific \$634.20, and Hawaiian News Co. \$21.25. Total \$2,344.11.

Andrade, from Judiciary, reported favorably on Senate Bill 12, recommending its passage. Kupieha moved to table and lost. Adopted.

A motion by Kumalas to take a recess was put and lost.

The Senate returned House Bill 3, relating to garbage and sewerage, as having today passed third reading without any amendments. Keliinoi, under suspension of the rules, offered a concurrent resolution that the Governor be authorized to appoint a commission of three men, to serve without pay, to investigate and report to the next Legislature a plan for the establishing of a system of providing funds for each district. Adopted.
