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THIRTY-THIRD DAY

More than a Score of Prisoners Plead Guilty.

Court convened at 9:30 o'clock this morning. James Aylett, brother of William Aylett, cornetist of the Hawaiian National band, was the only prisoner brought up. He was charged with misprision of treason. The charge and specifications were read to him. Prisoner desired no counsel. He pleaded guilty to both charge and specifications. The Judge Advocate stated to the Court that Aylett knew of the landing of the arms at Rabbit Island.

The Court cleared for further business.

On re-convening at 10:15 o'clock the following prisoners were brought in: George Townsend, Charles Warren, Charles Bartow, Sam Pua Mio, Bill Ihu, Robert Hakuole Silva, Kahimalani, Joseph Ahin, J. Panoso, Solomon Kupihea, Kawika, Kalua, Sam K'a, Sam Kanahele, Kawelo, Kauli, Nasaiono, Limahopu, Kini, Kaohimauu, Sam Keauu, William Olepau and Niolo.

None of the prisoners desired counsel.

Judge Advocate Robertson read order convening commission.

The prisoners had no objection to any member of the commission.

The charge of treason with specifications was read.

To the charge and specifications the prisoners answered individually: "Ua hewa" (guilty).

They did not desire to make any statement but would leave their cases with the Court. The Judge Advocate would not make any address and the case was closed.

At 11:30 o'clock the Commission re-assembled and the following prisoners were brought in,

Charles Clark, William F. Kase, John Kahoeka (Keoni Liliu) and J. K. Kaimi.

Charles H. Clark, William F. Kase and John Kaimi did not desire counsel.

John Kahoeka wanted John Kaulukou to represent him. Later he withdrew his desire.

Regular form gone through.

None of the prisoners had any objections to the Commission.

The charges of treason with specifications was then read to the accused.

The prisoners severally pleaded guilty to the specifications and charge as read.

The Judge Advocate submitted the case.

The prisoners have all been used as witnesses in previous cases.

Mr. Kaulukou arrived in the Courtroom at this point. He desired to make a few remarks in the interest of John Kahoeka whom he had previously seen at the Police Station through the courtesy of the Marshal. I advised Kahoeka to plead guilty and I understand that he has already done so. I hope that the Court will be very lenient with him and allow him to go. He has a family to support. He has been used as a witness by the government and this should be taken into consideration.

The Judge Advocate asked that the minimum penalty be imposed, but this Court had no right to release any prisoner. That would be left to the Executive.

Before recess the Judge Advocate announced that the case of A. M. Hewett would be called at 2 o'clock. Paul Neumann will appear for him. Recess taken till 2 o'clock.

A. M. HEWETT ON TRIAL.

The Court did not re-convene again until 2:40 o'clock, the delay being caused by Mr. Neumann desiring that his witnesses be all called and be present before the case proceeded.

The Judge Advocate announced that he had a charge and specifications to prefer against Alexander M. Hewett.

After the swearing in of the Commission the charge of misprision of treason was read against the accused.

TELEPHONES FOR HAWAII.

Prospectus of the Kona-Kau Telephone and Telegraph Co.

It is proposed to form a joint stock company under the Hawaiian statutes, for the purpose of establishing telephonic and telegraphic communication on the Island of Hawaii, and more especially in the districts of North and South Kona and Kau, to rent telephones and electrical instruments of all descriptions, and to do a general telephone and telegraph business. So says a prospectus just issued.

The several districts above mentioned have been thoroughly canvassed with the object of ascertaining the number of subscribers that can be secured to an efficient telephone system, and residents and property holders one and all are earnest in their desire to lend support to a project that will place them in telephonic communication with their neighbors, the steamer landings and the other districts on the island.

A conservative estimate of the subscribers to be obtained at six dollars per month places the number at seventy, with very good prospects of an increase to at least eighty-five subscribers within two years from date.

It is proposed to incorporate the company with a capital stock of \$12,000.00. The stock is to be divided into 480 shares of the par value of \$25 per share.

The liability of each stockholder to be limited to the amount due upon the stock to be subscribed for before incorporating, and 50 percent of the capital paid in before the commencement of the operations. The remainder of the capital to be paid in upon assessment as circumstances may require and the directors shall decide.

An approximate estimate of the cost of construction is \$11,250, while the cost for maintenance of entire system per year is put at \$3620. The estimated receipts first year are, for rent of seventy telephones at \$72, \$5040, from which deducting cost of maintenance would leave a balance of \$1420.

With the advent of new roads, the rapid increase of a desirable population, the increase in the coffee and other industries, North and South Kona and Kau are rapidly advancing to a place among the other districts of the islands. Therefore a means of communication such as the telephone would afford is of the utmost importance and will be earnestly supported by all interested in the advancement of the districts.

L. Aungst, the experienced electrician and lately superintendent of the Mutual Telephone Co., is the promoter of the scheme.

RELEASED FROM PRISON.

Nine Men Again Breathe the Air of Liberty.

THE CABLE TO HAWAII.

The Vote in the Senate for the Appropriation of \$500,000

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 9.—By the decisive vote of 36 to 25 the Senate voted to-day to inaugurate the project of laying a cable from the Pacific coast to Hawaii.

This was the first practical result coming from the intermittent Hawaiian debate, lasting more than a year, and renewed with intensity the last week in connection with the proposed cable.

But this party division had notable exceptions during the debate, and was emphasized in the final vote. Six democratic senators, Morgan, Gorman, Hill, Butler, Call and White voted with the twenty three republican senators, and three populists, constituting the majority for the cable.

The diplomatic and consular bill was then passed.

THE VOTE ON THE CABLE.

Following is the detailed vote on the Hawaiian cable:

The pairs on the Hawaiian cable proposition were as follows, the first named would have voted for the proposition: Allen and Bate, McMillin and Blanchard, Dolph and Coke, Cameron and Gibson, Shoup and Pugh, Quay and McPherson, Mantle and Voorhees, Gallinger and Mills, Wilson and Gordon, Jones (Nev.) and Daniel, Dixon and Irby, Pritchard and Faulkner.

Mr. Camden said his absence was accidental and he would have voted no if present. Mr. Power was present and did not vote.

DIPLOMATS WERE PRESENT.

During the discussion on the amendment appropriating \$500,000 for beginning a cable to Hawaii, Mr. Hastings, secretary of the Hawaiian legation, occupied a place in the diplomatic gallery and several other foreign diplomats were present, expecting a final action on the Hawaiian item.

Mr. Blackburn protested against making the cable amendment a "rider" to an appropriation bill, declaring that it was an unprecedented incumbrance of the diplomatic bill with general legislation.

Mr. Manderson expressed himself in favor of breaking senate rules and precedents in order to adopt such a meritorious project. The senator urged the annexation of Hawaii. Mr. Gray said the speech of Mr. Morgan yesterday would lead one to believe we were on the eve of a great war with England.

"Not at all," said Mr. Morgan. "I merely gave the circumstances, showing we were likely to be badly cheated."

Mr. Hawley said he was surprised that Mr. Gray closed his eyes to the extent of the British navy and her establishment of strategic stations, the last one sought being Hawaii.

"I have no fear of Great Britain," continued Mr. Gray. "We are not yet ready to embark on her course of empire around the world." The senator denounced the cable plan as one in the interest of corporations and others having interests in Hawaii.

Mr. Lodge varied the Hawaiian discussion by urging an amendment to the diplomatic and consular bill placing the foreign service on a civil-service basis.

The first vote was taken by agreement at 2:30, and was on the point of order raised against the Hawaiian cable amendment. The point of order was defeated—36 to 25.

The vote was regarded as a test, and the vote on the main question—the \$500,000 amendment for beginning work on the Hawaiian cable—resulted in the same vote exactly. The amendment to place the foreign service on a civil-service basis was disposed of on a point of order by a viva voce vote. The diplomatic and consular bill, as thus amended, was then passed without division.

Hawaiian Republican Club.

At the meeting of the Hawaiian Republican Club last night, the constitution was amended to do away with the initiation fee, and to admit white men to membership. A resolution was adopted condemning as unjust the resolution of the citizens' guard, which called for dismissal of all Government employees who were not in the military or police prior to January 6, 1895, as this club had placed itself on record by previous resolution to support the republic in time of trouble as well as of peace.

THIRTY-SECOND DAY.

Kekoa's Trial Ended and Another Squad Arraigned.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Mau, one of the guards at Washington Place before the trouble, gave evidence concerning Kekoa much the same as previous witness; Kekoa had no gun Thursday night but had one Sunday night.

William Hakalau was a luna of the first watch at Washington Place; talked with Kekoa on the Thursday night about what was likely to happen; knew what the object of the guns was; expected fighting; Charlie Clark said they were to work when he gave the order.

Opanui gave no new evidence. Several witnesses were called by Kekoa, but the best any of them had to say for him was that they did not see him with a gun.

NINE NATIVES ON TRIAL.

After the cases of the eight brought up yesterday had thus concluded, nine natives were arraigned for treason. All but two pleaded guilty. The two who pleaded not guilty were Kanekoa and Peter Hookano. Evidence was adduced to show that they were among the rebels at Kaalawai and had guns.

Social Conditions.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—

In the Advertiser of Feb. 13 we notice some very peculiar views of the social conditions existing here, which strike us as more fanciful and desirable than true. For instance, remark the following quotation: "There never has been and never will be social lines as sharply drawn here as in the old Puritanical State of Massachusetts." Again: "Hawaii has absorbed more of the western spirit where merit wins irrespective of race, nation or previous condition." Now, we are extremely glad to hear of this favorable state of things, because we had come to quite the opposite conclusion. For instance, we had supposed that social lines were more sharply drawn and far more clearly defined here than they were in America or the Colonies. But we may remark that this is more true of the city of Honolulu than the country, and of the women than the men.

We had also thought that we had noticed a class of aristocrats on these islands that are more exclusive than the famous "four hundred" of New York, or the best set of London or Paris. And we had further supposed that it was just about as impossible for an ordinary person to invade the sacred precincts of this magic circle as it is for a camel to walk through the eye of a needle, or for a rich man to enter heaven. If our supposition is not absolutely true it is very nearly so, for there is, or seems to be, some unwritten law, some tacit understanding, which like some invisible barrier shields the rich from the encroachment of the poor, and it matters nothing though one may trace his genealogy back to the time of William the Conqueror and have the learning of a Johnstone, the manners of a Chesterfield, and the instincts of a gentleman, they will avail him nothing if he is poor or has to work for a living. For according to the idea of social ethics in force here labor is debasing and to be poor is next to a crime.

It is unquestionably true that it is wealth and not merit or right and varied parts and talents, that is the golden key that opens the massive portals of the rich, and without this useful appendage it is useless for a man to hope to see anything of these favored individuals of fortune. These remarks, however, I should say, do not apply to a certain class of flash adventurers that are constantly arriving here, for they are almost always graciously received, and handsomely entertained, and usually go away boasting of their adventures. According to a New York dispatch elsewhere, the commander of the Chinese warship Chen Yuen, reported to have been sunk, was a brave American officer.

There is a scheme prospectused for giving Kona and Kau districts, on the island of Hawaii, an efficient telephone system. It is in the hands of an expert telephone man, and the BULLETIN wishes him complete success.

If the vote in the Senate carrying the Hawaiian cable amendment to the diplomatic and consular bill is anything like a gauge of annexation sentiment of that body, the prospects are anything but discouraging for the desired consummation within a not remote period.

"Free Lance," a country correspondent, is no doubt extreme in his criticisms of what were probably extreme views. It is open to question, besides, what he says about town society being more exclusive than country society. People who have spent times at some of our rural villages have been heard to express a contrary opinion.

Great Britain will hardly decline to submit the Venezuelan boundary dispute to arbitration, at the request of the United States Congress, after a deputation from the House of Commons has presented the United States Government with a memorial in favor of a treaty to provide for the submission of all disputes between the two nations to arbitration.

JUDICIAL JOTTINGS

Proceedings at Circuit Court Term
Before Judge Cooper.

John E. Bush and Joseph Nawahi, charged with conspiracy, were brought before the Court to plead. They asked for further time and were granted until 1:30 p.m. to-morrow. W. R. Castle appeared for the prisoners.

Louis Christ, alias Louis Quetavao, pleaded guilty to the charge of forgery, and was sentenced to 30 days at hard labor and to pay \$10 fine. He tried to pass off an 1893 tax receipt for an 1894. The sentence was made mild on account of his being an industrious man with a wife and eight children.

John Hapa, granted a new trial for robbery, is to be released on \$500 bail.

Three Japanese pleaded not guilty to malicious injury first degree. They are alleged to have attempted to wreck a train on Waianae plantation. Paul Neumann for defendants. They are to be released on \$500 bail each, which the company will furnish to save their labor for the plantation.

Several cases were continued till next term.

MASCOT'S ROUGH PASSAGE.

The sealing schooner Mascot arrived this morning, about 32 days from Victoria, B. C. After leaving Victoria the Mascot went to Queen's Island, where she got a crew of Maset Indians. From there she sailed for Yokohama, but during the passage she experienced a very heavy storm, in which she had considerable damage done to her rigging. This occurred during the early part of this month. The captain decided to put into this port. The Mascot has Indian boats besides an Indian crew. The Indians came ashore this morning. They are dressed in civilized clothing and are strapping big fellows. They attracted considerable attention about town. The sealer is lying in the stream. She will begin repairing immediately.

If persons writing letters to friends in the States persist in drawing upon their imagination and neglect to mark their letters "not for publication," they must expect to be ridiculed by the people of Honolulu who are familiar with all the events of the late revolution. They should not overlook the fact that Honolulu is well supplied with regularly paid newspaper correspondents whose duty is to gather items when they can and to send them to their respective papers. If the fact that two or three hundred Japanese laborers were placed on a steamer and sent out to sea with nowhere as their destination should be brought to the attention of the foreign office in Tokio, international difficulties might ensue. President Dole may have deemed it necessary to stalk around the government grounds with a couple of revolvers buckled to his side, but we doubt it; it savors too much of the actions of presidents of some of the South American Republics on the part of the President, and a hearty meal of corn beef and cabbage on the part of the writer.

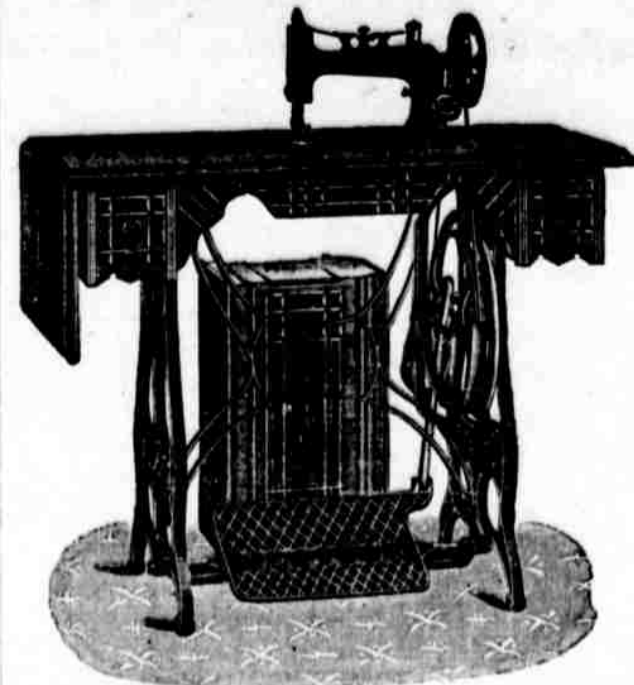

FIVE YEARS IN PARLOR

Sentence of Mrs. Liliuokalani Dominis the Ex-Queen.

Also to Pay a Fine of Five Thousand Dollars

CUMMINS AND DAVIES.

Major Geo. C. Potter, aide to the President, waited on the ex-Queen, Mrs. Liliuokalani Dominis, and read to her the sentence of the Military Commission, as modified by the Executive. Major Potter was accompanied by Major McLeod.

Originally the sentence was imprisonment at hard labor for five years and a fine of five thousand dollars, the minimum sentence of the law for treason.

The Executive exercised its clemency in abating hard labor to imprisonment without labor in the Executive building.

It is to be presumed that Mrs. Dominis will be confined in the parlor now occupied by her in the second story, opposite the office of President Dole, although no official information could be gained for this publication upon that point.

The sentence dates from the 9th day of February.

While her sentence was being read to her, the ex-Queen was attended by her counsel, Paul Neumann, and her agent, Charles B. Wilson, and her companion, Mrs. Wilson.

Major Potter went to Oahu Prison afterward to announce their sentences to John A. Cummins and Captain William Davies.

Mr. Cummins is sentenced to pay a fine of five thousand dollars and to be imprisoned until the fine be paid.

Captain Davies is sentenced to ten years' imprisonment at hard labor and to pay a fine of five thousand dollars, but the Executive, taking into consideration his services as state's evidence, orders enforcement of the sentence suspended until further order.

THE MONROE DOCTRINE.

Venezuela's Boundry Dispute Brings Up the Historic American Policy Again.

The joint resolution adopted by the house last Wednesday recommending England and Venezuela to submit their boundary dispute to arbitration is a step in the right direction.

For nearly two generations this controversy has been dragging along. The English, relying upon their superior strength, have continued to push their outposts into the territory of Venezuela until they are now in a fair way to command the whole Orinoco valley, embracing perhaps the richest area in South America. The republic thus despoiled has frequently urged arbitration, but England has always replied that there was nothing to arbitrate.

Under the circumstances it is the duty of our government to stand by Venezuela in her reasonable demand for a peaceful settlement of the points in issue. We must either do this or abandon the Monroe doctrine. The action of the house would indicate that we are not ready to give up a policy which has been heartily indorsed by our own people and by all Spanish-American countries. To yield this historic doctrine at this late day would place the republics of Mexico, Central America, and South America at the mercy of the great powers of Europe if they should ever decide to extend their monarchical institutions in this hemisphere. Naturally the adoption of such a course on our part would have the effect of turning all the southern republics against us, and they would not look with favor upon those closer trade relations which we hope will result from our great international exposition, and which we believe will be mutually profitable.

It is to be hoped that our government will firmly insist upon the arbitration demanded by Venezuela. We cannot afford to hold aloof, abandon the Monroe policy, and leave our natural allies to be oppressed and plundered by stronger nations of Europe. We must stand by our sister republics in this part of the world.—Atlanta Constitution.

The Original Chinese.

Before the discovery of iron, and not less than 8000 years ago, the territory of what is now China, Corea, and Japan was occupied by a brown race, either Malayan or Malay-negroid in character. This is pointed out by tradition, by ethnology, anthropology, and archeology. The brown people bore the same relation to eastern Asia as did the Iberians and Lapps to prehistoric Europe. While of a low grade intellectually, they had mastered nearly all the primitive arts. They had domesticated the buffalo, dog, cat, monkey, and the barnyard fowls. It may be questioned if they had tamed the horse or cow. They lived in huts, tilled the soil, and understood pottery. As a race they were split up into innumerable clans and tribes. They were perpetually warring among themselves, using as arms weapons made from wood and stone. They worshiped fetiches and devils, practiced polygamy and polyandry, offered human sacrifices to their idols, and were altogether pretty respectable savages.—Overland Monthly.

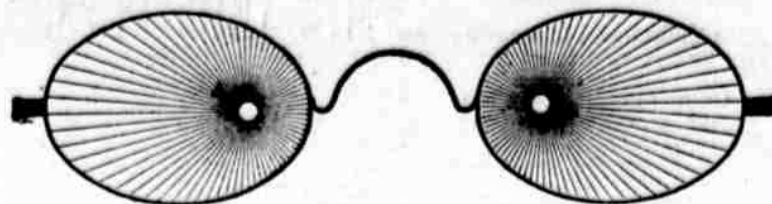

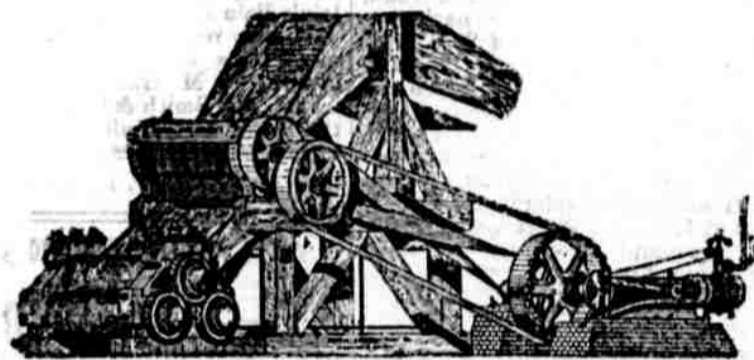

AN AMERICAN IN COMMAND.

Philo Norton McGiffin Believed to Have Gone Down with the Chen Yuen.

New York, Feb. 9.—Philo Norton McGiffin, an American, was commander of the Chinese battleship Chen Yuen, reported sunk at Wei-Hai-Wei by a torpedo. At the battle of Yalu he fought bravely and was severely wounded. Subsequently the jealous Chinese officers demanded that he and other foreign officers be dismissed. It is thought, however, that being in favor with Admiral Ting, Commander McGiffin was retained on the Chen Yuen and that he may have gone down with her. Some of McGiffin's letters from China since the war began, to his brother, a professor in the Brooklyn Polytechnic institute, have been printed in The Times. McGiffin was a graduate of Annapolis, known as a fearless, dashing young man, fond of adventure, but also fond of books. He became a little nettled because some of his associate officers secured ratings a trifle higher than he did at an examination, resigned from the United States navy, and enlisted in the Chinese navy, then commanded by an English officer named Admiral Lang. Admiral Erben was especially fond of the dashing young officer. He is said to have been greatly disappointed when McGiffin quit the service, and predicted for him a brilliant future. When he acquired reputation in the war between China and Japan, Admiral Erben was not surprised, remarking: "The young men who surpassed him in examinations have never been heard of in naval circles, but McGiffin was of the right kind. He was bound to come to the front."

McGiffin comes of a well-known family of Washington, Pa. His father, Col. Norton McGiffin, was a soldier in the war for the union. McGiffin was graduated from Washington Jefferson college in 1876, and then went to Annapolis.

No Sign of Regret.

A drill sergeant of a volunteer regiment, in drilling a squad whom he was instructing in the funeral exercise, said: "Now, lads, I want to see how well you can do it. I'm going to walk through the ranks, and I wish you to suppose I'm the corpse."

He ordered the squad to rest on their arms reversed and stand at ease. Then he walked through the ranks and addressed them as follows: "Your arms are all right and your feet are all right, but there is one thing wanting, my lads—you hadn't that look of regret on your face that you ought to have when a corpse walks past."—Tit-Bits.
