OUR LONDON LETTER.

[Continued.]

The many protestations that have of late been made against the continuation of the British Indian Government of the sale of opium to China, finally culminated in a public meeting on last Monday evening at Westminster Chapel.

The meeting was presided over by the Rev. J. F. B. Tilling, B. A. A number of distinguished persons were present. Upon an invitation from the chair, the Rev. W. S. Swanson addressed the meeting on the subject.

During his remarks, Mr. Swanson said it would be impossible to exaggerate the evils of this nefarious traffic, which was a dark blot on the fair name of the empire.

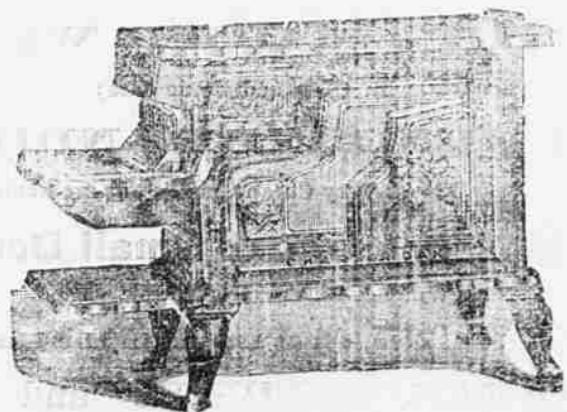
